# MacLeod Trail SE – What we've heard

The dotted line on the map indicates the potential area to be considered for change as described by citizens (for example, potential areas for mixed use development). This input will be analyzed to inform the planning strategy for each main

# **OUTCOMES**

### 1. Safe and vibrant main street sidewalk

An active, safe and comfortable high quality sidewalk area providing a high degree of pedestrian mobility, safety and comfort.



### 2. High quality park and public realm elements

More street trees along Macleod Trail, with more public or private green spaces to promote high quality development.



### 3. More street trees

More street trees along centre meridian of Macleod

# **OPPORTUNITIES**

More people would walk if the

- public realm was inviting Density by LRT stations, create
- employment nodes
- Mixed use / affordable housing
- Offer local small shops businesses to residents
- Green bridge like wildlife bridges in Banff National Park at Heritage Dr over Macleod Tr.
- This area would be a great use of space model, walk ways accessibility (Between 90 Ave and Heritage Dr)
- Bonaventure Dr could be developed as a better pedestrian access because of the presence of a mix of residential, retail and topography
- Topography at intersection of Heritage Dr and Macleod Tr presents an opportunity for an open space development because of proximity to developments at Heritage LRT
- Pedestrian crossings / linking to Macleod Tr (e.g. Fairview)
- 10. Pedestrian Bridge across Macleod Tr at Heritage Dr
- 11. Bike lane along LRT/CPR rightof-way or along Macleod Tr to downtown
- 12. Linear rainwater capture-type gardens to promote healthy green diverse traffic calming; could be integrated into central meridian

## **ISSUES**

- Generally, lack of street trees to create an inviting and safe pedestrian realm
- 2. Poor sidewalks, need separation, protection for pedestrians
- Pedestrians have to cross sea of parking to access big box stores
- Difficult pedestrian access from Haysboro and Southwood
- Spill-over traffic into surrounding neighbourhoods, Bonaventure Dr. Fairmont Dr.
- Retail and restaurant options, Big Box Retail kills area; destinations that encourage walking, transit,
- Unfriendly pedestrian crossings, Poor access to LRT Stations
- Traffic (automobile), noise, air pollution, too much to appeal to pedestrian commuters
- Street facing parking lots barrier to inviting pedestrian realm
- 10. Bad pedestrian circulation
- 11. Need more mix use density with cohesive building frontages
- 12. High volume of traffic at a higher

speed - 60 km/hr is fine, but speeding creates a lack of safety
