Pursuant to Section three of the Parks Bylaw I beg to submit for your information my eighteenth Annual Report covering the management of the Parks, Playgrounds, Athletic Fields, Boulevards, and Cemeteries of the City during the year 1930.

The Department now has jurisdiction over 802.42 acres of land appraised at a valuation of \$2,262,009.00. This area is comprised of six parks with an area of 180.42 acres, 15 combined parks, athletic fields, and playgrounds, with an area of 181.25 acres; twelve children's playgrounds and playground sites with an area of 11.05 acres; nine small ornamental plots and gardens with an area of 2.45 acres; four athletic fields, and one golf course with an area of 188.5 acres; three cemeteries and cemetery sites * with an area of 238.73 acres; and seventy-two and one-half miles of parking strips with 32,122 trees.

There is more and more evidence annually of public interest in all features of the Department's work as is indicated by the hundreds of requests and suggestions, verbal, and by letter and telephone, that are received day after day, suggestions as to how the facilities for public recreation could be enhanced and requests for improvement to existing ones. Whenever possible these suggestions are acted upon if it is deemed advisable. Though many are impractical or of a very trivial nature, and some are such as the department has had in mind for many years, but has not been able to finance, they do indicate a real interest on the part of the public.

In many of our parks where improvements have been commenced, large areas still require to be graded, seeded, and water services installed. Until this work is done the improvements already made are more or less wasted so far as the public use is concerned.

Additions to the Park System

A comparison of the list of park properties with that of last year indicates no gains of notable area, but a number of small plots were set aside for playground purposes on the recommendation of the Playground and Parks Committee. These are as follows:-

The growth of our park system has, up to the present been more or less haphazard,--a piece of land set aside here and there as it appeared to be desirable for park purposes or in response to local demand; but without any consideration as to its place in a completed system. We should, without further delay initiate and prosecute a comprehensive plan for adequate park facilities. This plan should consider first,--Distribution; (some districts are still unprovided with sufficient recreation space; secondly,--Character of System; the special uses to which the respective areas are best adapted; and thirdly; the development of special features that will make the system distinctive and reflect credit on the City. At the present time there is a tendency to have every area developed on similar lines--a certain amount of landscape development and the inclusion of a number of athletic facilities.

It is significant that whilst the improved area of park land to be maintained has been increased by approximately one hundred and fifty acres during the past ten years together with an additional twenty miles of boulevard and an entirely new Cemetery to be cared for; the appropriation in 1930 was only about \$1,400.00 more than in 1920.

Bridle Paths

Interest in horseback riding as a recreation is rapidly regaining popularity. Many letters have been received during the past year from prominent business men of the city urging the provision of facilities for this sport by the Department, Calgary has an exceptional opportunity to feature this pastime by a system of bridle paths, threading the hollows and ridges with their exceptionally fine wooded glens and magnificent view points that surround and intersect this city. These bridle paths could be constructed at comparatively small cost and could by cooperation with the Provincial Government be extended out into the foothills in various directions and even as far as Banff thereby adding another inducement to a certain section of tourists to stop off in Calgary and make the trip from here to the mountain resort by this means.

Weather

The past season was a trying one as regards weather conditions. Extreme drought was detrimental to growth; particularly newly planted trees and shrubs; and newly seeded grass areas. Except in those locations where water could be regularly and frequently supplied newly sown grass did not germinate; and much of the new turf of the previous year was killed out. The remarkably open dry winter; characterized by a continuous succession of chinook winds is also likely to prove very harmful; particularly to newly planted stock.

Arboriculture.

The winter season was devoted to the regular routine of pruning, cutting out dead or damaged wood, and topping where necessary of trees in all parks and boulevards. General planting, transplanting, and propagating was carried on in the spring, with all possible dispatch, but, as usual the season was far too short for the full programme to be completed. Throughout the summer and autumn watering, spraying, fertilizing, and cultivating was systematically attended to.

The number of pernicious insects attacking our trees has been very much on the increase in recent years, and, now that there are so many large trees in the city, high power spraying equipment, though costly, is becoming yearly more necessary. The care and preservation of our trees is most important but is yearly becoming a greater problem.

The planting of trees and shrubs was commenced on April 7th and discontinued on June 14th. During that period the following planting was done.

The tree groups and shrub masses in all parks were thinned where necessary, the material removed being used for new plantations.

A marvellous improvement could be made to the general appearance of our city by a certain amount of skyline planting on the bluffs around the city, which skyline in its present condition is hard and austere.

Floriculture

The planting of herbaceous perennials commenced on April 26th and was discontinued on June 14th, the planting of annuals following immediately.

During the year 670 packets of seeds were received from the Botanic Gardens of Harvard University; 28 packets from Lady Byng's establishment, Essex, England; 3 packets from Sumner, New Zealand; and 6 packets from Victoria, B.C. Suitable exchanges of seeds of indigenous or locally grown plants were made in each case.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND PARK

Very considerable improvement work was done on the Island last winter by cutting out dead trees and limbs, thinning the underbrush and clearing the evergreens and choicer shrubs. About half the area of the Island was covered and it is hoped that it will be possible to complete this work this winter.

Four new rose beds and one large peony bed have been prepared for planting next spring.

One hundred and fifty-four loads of fertilizer were used to topdress lawns.

A number of picnic tables were made. The island continues to be as popular as ever as a picnic ground, and a shelter is still very urgently needed.

All buildings and structures were painted.

The roads are in poor condition notwithstanding considerable expenditure on grading, gravelling, and oiling. The traffic is very heavy and the driveway narrow, and the only solution of this problem of road maintenance is the paving which I understand it is proposed to lay in the near future.

Zoo

Never in the history of this park were so many people attracted to it as in the past year, and this was entirely due to the development of the Zoo. As many as five hundred cars have been counted in the parking space at one time, and whilst the park was formerly completely deserted during the winter months there is now a daily winter attendance, with quite large crowds on fine Saturdays and Sundays. On Sunday, December 28th, some 1,500 people visited the Zoo.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND PARK (CONT'D)

To relieve traffic congestion the parking space had to be enlarged to twice its former size, but still proves quite inadequate.

The general health of the animals and birds has been excellent throughout the year. Some specimens are not in the best of health when received, but these usually improve after being in the Zoo for a short time. Nearly all losses were due to either fighting, accidents, theft, or specimens being in poor health when received. An endeavor is made on two days a week at least to supply natural food to all the animals according to their species. This takes the form of brush, loaves, berries, rats, mice, sparrows, crows, rabbits, etc., and is a great factor in keeping them healthy.

During the year numerous wild birds have been attracted to the vicinity of the Zoo by feeding. These include chickadees, waxwings, red polls, grossbeaks, robins, woodpeckers, ducks, and pheasants.

An effort is made to have the animals and birds really tame and on view as much as possible.

Construction work during the year consisted of the following:-

- 1 Badger Pen.
- 1 Raccoon Pen.
- 8 Rodent Huts.
- 1 Ten Section Aviary.
- 6 Chicken Coops and runs for breeding purposes.
- 2 Pigeon Huts.
- 1 Wolf Den.
- 1 Bear Den, with rock wall.
- Foundation for ice house.

Most of the above work was financed out of the Grant made to the Calgary Zoological Society.

Other construction work consisted of alterations to present aviary, erection of a guard railing, building of a rock pile in the Mountain Sheep Pen, construction of sewer outlet from bear dens, extension of water supply to the bear dens.

We have been very fortunate in the matter of donations of food, which has kept our maintenance cost in this regard very low, and had we proper facilities for storage of this food when received there would be a further very substantial reduction in up-keep. The construction of an ice house was commenced last year and the completion of this is urgently recommended.

The very rapid development of the Zoo and the tremendous public interest displayed would indicate that this will soon become the most important of our park features. The limitation of the site should compel us to seriously consider expansion beyond the limits of the Island itself and this could be readily done by setting aside St. George's Heights as an enclosure for large grazing mammals as deer, elk, moose, buffalo, mountain sheep and goats, etc., and these would present a very picturesque appearance climbing about the steep hillsides of this area. Other land that might be acquired and would be very suitable for zoo purposes is that area on the north bank of the Bow River extending eastwards from the present zoo site, and enclosed on the north and east by the Blackfoot Trail and Nose Creek respectively.

RILEY PARK

Very considerable thinning of the overgrown and entangled masses of trees and shrubbery was done during last winter resulting in a marked improvement in appearance.

One hundred and fifty loads of fertilizer were used as top-dressing to lawns.

Considerable work was done on driveway and path improvement.

The construction of the rockery was completed.

CRESCENT PARK

Two hundred and thirty trees and 316 shrubs were planted; three hundred feet of one inch water pipe laid and 257 loads of earth hauled to the park for grading.

Cultivation of the borders was continued till the appropriation was exhausted.

One hundred loads of fertilizer were used on the borders.

The water service was extended by 300 feet of 1½ inch pipe along the south side of the park.

MOUNT PLEASANT PARK

Twenty-five trees; 25 shrubs; and 3,360 annuals were planted; and the borders regularly watered and cultivated.

Fifty loads of fertilizer used on borders.

The tool shed was painted.

SOUTH MT. ROYAL PARK

The only work done on this park was a certain amount of grading and the application and ploughing in of two hundred loads of fertilizer.

Improvements to this park have been delayed to some extent pending the curbing of the streets on its several sides; (which work is now complete) but more particularly to lack of funds. Owing to the nature of the soil on this park I am afraid its improvement will be a slow and expensive process.

ROSEVALE PARK

A fill was made along the north and west sides of the park and this fill planted with trees and shrubs. The established shrubbery borders were regularly pruned; watered; and cultivated.

The addition to the Community House was painted.

MEMORIAL PARK

All lawn areas have been topdressed with 26 loads of manure.

Two trees and 115 shrubs were planted.

A drinking fountain was installed.

The water service was extended by 200 feet.

Only one service was held at the Cenotaph during the past year.

SUNALTA PARK

The borders of this park that did not conform with the newly constructed curb were graded and seeded.

CAPITOL HILL PARK

The border planting was extended along the south side, replacements made along the east and north sides.

A water connection made and water service extended into the park 500 feet.

ELBOW BOULEVARD PARK

A wide stretch of lawn was destroyed by the pile driving operations of the Engineer's Department on the river bank. This was renovated. An earth fill was made behind the piles and planted with shrubs and perennials.

The grass was greatly benefited by the topdressing of 15 loads of fertilizer applied last winter.

All rustic furniture is being repaired.

OGDEN PARK

Eighty-seven trees and 50 shrubs were planted, and borders cultivated.

Fifty loads of fertilizer were spread on the shrubbery borders.

A shelter, swings, teeters, and other playground apparatus erected in this park was patronized to a remarkable degree and elicited many expressions of appreciation.

MILLICAN PARK

The facilities provided for bathing were of very little use during the past season, the Bow river being too low to keep any flow of water in the creek. The dam should be rebuilt.

KILLARNEY PARK

The block comprising this park was fenced, a strip twenty feet wide within the fence ploughed, cultivated, and partly planted, and 50 loads of fertilizer spread on this border.

A shelter was built and playground apparatus installed.

TRIANGLE PARK

A strip along the east and north side of this park was graded, loamed, and seeded to grass, and the previously seeded portion regraded to conform to the street curb. The grass was topdressed with twenty loads of fertilizer.

BANKVIEW PLOT

This area was dug over and all sod and weeds removed between trees and shrubs.

TOMPKINS GARDENS

A number of the large trees were removed, the shrubbery heavily pruned and thinned and some-re-arrangement of the plantings done.

CLIFF PARK

Thought might well be given to the planting of this hillside. The only treatment possible for the whole of this area is to plant it somewhat thickly with trees and shrubs, and this work should be commenced at once. The Public and Separate School Boards should cooperate in this work by extending the plantings across the west ends of their respective properties, thus making a complete scheme, which would not only screen an ugly hillside but make a very pleasant background and setting for the two school buildings and pleasing focal points for all the avenues ending on Cliff Street, but would eventually make an ideal play area for the school children. The planting would, of course, need to be protected in the early stages.

ELBOW PARK SWIMMING POOL GROUNDS

The grass was topdressed with fertilizer, new swings and sandboxes constructed.

This "Swimming Hole" reached the height of its popularity during the past year, as many as a thousand being in attendance on one occasion. This taxed the dressing room facilities to their utmost and emphasized the very urgent need for a comfort station and drinking fountain at this place.

CITY HALL GARDENS

Two specimen Black Hill Spruce trees were planted in the circular beds. Trees were provided for illuminating by the Electric Light Department at Christmas time.

GARDEN CRESCENT

The large trees are being gradually removed and replaced with shrubbery.

ROYAL NORTH WEST MOUNTED POLICE PLOT

This plot is very difficult to maintain because of lack of a water service.

BRIDGE APPROACHES

Langevin Bridge

The grass was topdressed with fertilizer and some planting done. The fence is being constantly broken by careless driving of autos.

Hillhurst Bridge

A fill was made at the north-east corner and the already established plots regularly maintained.

PLOT AT INTERSECTION OF 17th AVENUE & SCARBORO AVE.

This plot was dug over and replanted.

ISLANDS AT STREET INTERSECTIONS, MT. ROYAL

The drastic thinning of shrubbery done in 1929 has spoilt the appearance of these plots for the time being, but they should have a better appearance during the coming season.

CUT BANKS, CENTRE STREET, ETC.

The slope on the eastern side of the Cut was coated with manure. Ten thousand willow cuttings planted and the whole seeded with coarse grasses. A number of the bare patches along the hill-side facing south were also seeded. The Kiwanis Club planted five hundred young willows donated by the Western Nurseries on the west side of the cut.

TUXEDO PARK

Two hundred and ninety-eight trees and 81 shrubs were planted as the commencement of a border strip for the western half of the park.

MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE

The cost of operation for the year 1930 was \$3,763.72, and receipts totalled \$5,537.85. This is an excellent showing for a business that is run, not for profit, but for the service of the people. And that was the return in dollars and cents, but it would be hard to estimate the greater value in physical health and clean recreation to those of our citizens who played the 20,782 games of the season which is evidence of the public appreciation of this service. And it is well to remember that this is a game that appeals to both young and old.

The course appeared to reach the height of its popularity during the past season and stood up very well under the heavy play and dry weather. This increase in patronage is very gratifying, particularly when the fact is taken into consideration that golf is one of the few activities of the Department that is self-supporting at least in so far as maintenance costs are concerned.

Tees

All tees were remodelled, graded, and slightly enlarged. New cups and pins were provided. All tee mats were relayed. Nine new tee boxes were made and painted, old ones repaired and names, numbers, and yardage restencilled.

Fairways

All loose stones were gathered off fairways, also through the rough. Twenty-four fairway posts were made, painted, and numbered, and yardage restencilled. Fairways 3,4,6,8, and 9 were top-dressed with manure for a distance of 150 yards, 100 loads of fertilizer being used. A ditch was ploughed two feet wide for a distance of 400 yards on the north side of No. 15.

Steps were constructed on both sides of gully on No. 12 fairway and on the east side of gully on No. 14. The drain across No. 1 fairway was repaired for a distance of 25 yards. X

Bunkers

A new five foot wide bunker was made along the south side of the clump of bushes on No. 14 for a distance of 60 yards.

Greens

All greens were re-surfaced twice during the season and equipped with new flags and mats.

Buildings & Furniture

All shelters and seats were painted.

The rustic shelter located at No.14 has been moved south to No. 12 where it better serves the purpose for which it was intended and blends more pleasingly into the surrounding landscape.

Club House

The roof and exterior walls of the Clubhouse were painted, showers repaired, and shower baths were lathed and plastered.

New Course

The fairways on the new course were harrowed and seeded with 500 lbs. of grass seed and the weeds and grass regularly cut over the whole of this area. We have been very unfortunate in that the three years during which improvements to the additional golf course land have been in progress have been dry years so that up to the present it has been impossible to establish a sod, but it is hoped that another year will see this area in use. The ground is of rolling contour, and, whilst there are no natural hazards, will lend itself to the development of a sporty course. This development will make a Ladies' Course possible and thus greatly relieve the congestion, and no doubt add to the patronage so that in the course of a few years all construction and maintenance expenditures will have been offset by the additional revenue.

MEWATA PARK

Considerable work was done on this park in the matter of remodelling it to fit the new conditions created by the erection of the Stadium. A new gateway was cut in the fence and an approach lined out with shrubbery planting from 11th Street West to the

MEWATA PARK (CONT'D)

western stadium entrance.

The grass areas were topdressed with 103 loads of fertilizer.

Stadium

Grading and fencing was completed, track laid out, the in-field and borders loamed and seeded and the whole covered with 569 loads of fertilizer. The new fence was painted two coats, space between fence and sidewalk on 9th Avenue loamed, the old dressing room moved to west side and some of the bleachers moved in.

In all \$7,523.09 was spent during the past year in the development of the stadium.

HILLHURST ATHLETIC PARK

The fence was completed and painted along the north side, further planting done on the inside of the fence, and further improvements made to the playing fields.

The dressing room has been enlarged to twice its former size, but is still very badly crowded during the skating season.

PLAYGROUNDS

The Playgrounds opened July 2nd and closed August 16th after a very successful season of seven weeks. In the success of the season the loyal cooperation and faithful work of each of the supervisors was the chief factor.

The greatest investment for a playground system is a staff of trained workers who are competent to supervise the leisure time of the children and thus to serve the needs of the community in this direction, and Calgary was fortunate in this regard in 1930.

Of these instructors two had served during previous years whilst seven were well prepared for the work, having all taken a course in playground work very kindly given by Mr. Rose, Physical Director of the Y.M.C.A.

PLAYGROUNDS (CONT'D)

The two newly opened centres at Ogden and Killarney proved a great success where Miss Smith and Miss Mainwaring did some excellent work under somewhat difficult conditions, and not only did the children of these districts greatly appreciate the opening of these centres but many expressions of appreciation were received from parents and the residents generally in these districts.

This year as previously baseball in three divisions was organized for boys and girls and basketball for girls. In addition to the many practice games the schedule provided for ninety-eight interplayground contests, the teams being first of all divided into leagues for this purpose.

The season was a rather warm one, emphasizing the need for adequate shelters on all playgrounds, for active games are out of the question during the hottest part of the day, and such work as the above-mentioned can only be carried on with pleasure and in comfort where shade is provided.

Through the organization of baseball leagues, tournaments of various kinds and classes in handiwork, the youngsters in the neighbourhood where a playground is established are encouraged to use the playground and keep off the streets, and these playgrounds are justified for this reason alone.

Owing to the weather conditions the major attractions were undoubtedly the pool in Riley Park and the "swimming hole" in the Elbow River, for they drew thousands of children throughout the summer.

The handicraft work, which is a recognised playground activity, this year attained an even greater degree of popularity than in the past. A very large number of articles were made by the children, but, unfortunately, owing to the infantile paralysis epidemic could not be exhibited as in previous years. This epidemic also prevented the holding of the final Field Day.

Throughout the season a weekly conference of all the supervisors was held with the Superintendent and the discussions that took place at these meetings proved very helpful. The keynote of these conferences was to raise the standard of efficiency, to promote a feeling of comradeship among the supervisors and to make plans for special playground days.

The need for a recreation leader on an all-the-year-round basis becomes more and more apparent each year. This has been particularly evident during the present winter when many difficulties have arisen with regard to the use of the skating and hockey rinks. Amongst the recreational activities such a leader could promote would be track and field meets, hand and soft ball leagues, tennis tournaments, golf tournaments, quoit leagues, football, cricket, bowling, nature study clubs, hockey leagues, ice racing meets, swimming meets, first aid instruction, pageants, folk-dancing, festivals, children's gardens, miniature airplane meets, handcraft classes, miniature boat-sailing, etc. etc.

The great need for many of our playgrounds is shade trees, and Community Clubs might perform a real service to their respective communities by doing some planting on these sites on Arbor Day.

During the past year two new playground sites were reserved in various sections of the city, all of these being the property of the city. It is hoped that the recommendation of the 1930 Parks and Playground Committee that five hundred dollars (\$500.00) be spent this year on the development of each of these sites will be concurred in, for they will provide play facilities for thousands of children

PLAYGROUNDS (CONT'D)

A study recently made by this Department reveals the fact that, at least twelve additional play areas will be required in the near future in order to provide adequately for the children in all sections of the city.

All wooden playground equipment should be eliminated and replaced with steel pipe. I hope funds will permit of us gradually doing this, for it is much safer, and more durable and therefore more economical in the final analysis. All apparatus will need a thorough overhauling this season.

A very extensive programme of rink construction and maintenance has been carried out this winter, rinks being flooded as follows:-

Besides the above, large areas of ice have, as usual, been maintained for skating and hockey at Mowata and Hillhurst Parks; these rinks have been lighted, and heated dressing room facilities provided. These two rinks have attracted thousands during the season.

The Elbow River has been flooded wherever possible between the Glenmore Dam and 25th Avenue Bridge, and this has certainly been the mecca for large numbers of skaters, particularly during the week ends.

A number of rinks have been maintained for the Separate School Board. A number of private rinks have also been flooded, a charge being made for the service.

Difficulties have been experienced this winter owing to misunderstandings as to the control and use of rinks flooded by the city. Dual control is and will no doubt continue to be very unsatisfactory. The city's rinks should be maintained and operated by the city alone and such service given to community rinks as may be determined from time to time, but areas of park property that are required for public rinks should be abandoned by the Community Clubs, so that there be no restrictions of the use of these publicly owned areas by the public as a whole.

ATHLETICS

Very considerable work was done on Riley Park in preparation for the Western Canadian Tournament. New pitches were laid, paths levelled, pavilion and flagpole moved, some trees and shrubbery removed, a large area of lawn returned, border screens built and painted, the Clubhouse renovated, and painted externally, etc.

Horseshoe courts were established in Riley and Tuxedo Park, and proved very popular. We should have more of these courts in suitable locations for they can be installed practically without cost, and provide facilities for a very popular sport.

Besides maintaining the regular athletic facilities in all parks, including soccer and rugby in Hillhurst Park, cricket grounds in Riley Park, baseball diamonds in Mowata Park, etc. assistance was given in the maintenance of football grounds in Westmount and Parkhill,

cricket grounds at Inglewood and South Calgary, and in conducting the school sports at Hillhurst Park.

Whilst the Department does not, at the present time, actually provide bowling greens it cooperates to the greatest extent possible with the Calgary Lawn Bowling Club whose greens are situated on park property.

The need for larger areas for adult recreation is growing each year. The logical answer to this tremendously increasing demand for athletic facilities would be the development of one or two large flat areas of some thirty acres each, where provision could be made for all the major sports. The popularity of such a proposal was amply demonstrated by the tremendous interest taken in the model of such a play field exhibited by the Department at the Horticultural Society's Annual Exhibition.

The soccer football season started in Hillhurst Park three weeks earlier than usual, namely early in April. Sixty first division and fifty second division matches were played, five first division, five second division, eight High School Rugby, and eight baseball matches were also played on this park.

Forty-two basketball, 15 English Rugby, 12 School Football, and 10 School Rugby matches were played in Mewata Park during the past season.

K.M.C.A. Softball League

Mr. R.T. Rose, Executive Secretary, reports on the activities of the Y.M.C.A. Softball League as follows:-

The Y.M.C.A. Softball League last year was privileged to use many of the playground areas throughout the City, through the courtesy of your Department.

Total number of games played, exclusive of practise periods number one hundred and forty; total participations in those games two thousand eight hundred. The fields, however, were used for practise every day in the week and it would therefore be fair to estimate that the total participations of Baseball would be about seven thousand. While this is an estimate, however, I have checked it very carefully and believe it to be a fairly close approximation of the actual figures.

The Olympic Club which has used the Stadium for Track and Field training has had a participation of one thousand men and women who used the Stadium five nights a week for eighteen weeks.

This cooperation on the part of the Parks Department has been greatly appreciated by the Young Men's Christian Association and the cooperative endeavors which we can together put forward will, I am sure, result in an increased efficiency and effectiveness in the recreational life of this city.

Interscholastic Athletic Meet, Hillhurst Park, May 23rd,
Report of the Chairman, Captain A. H. Ferguson.

The weather-man was exceedingly kind to the High Schools of Calgary on the above date, as a better day it would be difficult to get.

The Parks Department, as usual, had the grounds in very good shape. The fact that several records were broken or equalled, notwithstanding the very worn condition of the ground, bears witness to the time and hard work spent in preparing the field for the 12 Field, 16 Sprint, and 4 Long Run events.

ATHLETICS (CONT'D)

The usual number of enthusiastic students (girls predominating) from the seven schools taking part in the "Meet", together with their friends, and many other interested spectators, were present. Each school, ably led by Cheer Leaders, kept up a continuous series of School Yells and cheers for the duration of the "Meet", about three hours, thereby not only keeping themselves busy, and inspiring their respective competitors to greater efforts, but by keeping together, kept the field fairly free from spectators, while the events were being held, and so there was less interference in this respect than in former years.

Calgary Cricket League

Mr. C. Falck, the Secretary of the Calgary Cricket League reports as follows:-

The Calgary and District Cricket League played eighty games in the city parks during 1930, of which fifty-four were played at Riley Park. More than 18,000 runs were scored in these games, Harlequins and St. Johns were bracketed at the head of the league at the end of the season. The matches were for the most part well attended, weather conditions making a difference at times. In the game played between the Harlequins and St. Johns at the end of September there were at least one thousand spectators present although the weather was chilly.

The Western Canada Cricket Tournament was staged at Riley Park this year, the contending teams being, British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba. Twelve games were played and 4,366 runs were scored during the week. These games were all played on the splendid new pitches specially prepared for the tournament by the kindness of the Parks Department. The pitches held up magnificently during a gruelling week of hard trial, more runs being probably scored during this tournament than in any for the last eight years. It was gratifying to note that every day crowds of spectators were present. On the Saturday when Alberta was pitted against British Columbia in the deciding game more than two thousand spectators were present and I can confidently say that they thoroughly enjoyed the game.

Other cricket matches played at Riley Park were Calgary versus Edmonton on Dominion Day, and Calgary versus Drumhellar on Labor Day, in addition to several mid week games, notably two between Hudson Bay Store and Eaton's store. Cricket practice was also indulged in on almost every evening during the season.

BAND CONCERTS

Six hundred and thirty-six dollars (\$636.00) was allowed this Department in 1930. This enabled us to arrange six concerts in St. George's Island, the bands participating being, the Elks, 50th Battalion, and Shriners. Bands consisting of thirty-six musicians and leader were provided. Concerts were given on Sunday afternoons during the months of July and August.

BOULEVARDS

11,052 trees and 3,733 shrubs have been pruned.
 799 trees and 888 shrubs have been newly planted, and 372 trees and 21 shrubs replaced.
 Many trees have been severely headed back because of interference with wires.
 All street trees throughout the city were cultivated, newly planted trees staked and continuously watered.
 Several blocks of boulevards that were above the level of sidewalk and curb were lowered and the material removed used to fill in low spots.
 All boulevards constructed during the years 1928 and 1929 had to be reseeded and loamed. Those loamed in 1930 were seeded and planted.
 21,710.3 feet of new boulevard was made in 1930. This will require seeding and planting this year.
 The parking strips in many of the main business sections owing to unfavorable conditions, both as regards grass and trees have become an eyesore rather than an embellishment to the streets, and it is very satisfactory to be able to record that they are gradually being removed.

AIR PORT

A number of trees, shrubs, and plants were supplied to the Electric Light Department for planting at the Air Port. Most of these died and the improvements made to the grounds were more or less of a failure due to lack of skilled attention. It has been suggested that this Department take charge of the horticultural features at the Air Port, and an item has been placed in the Parks Department's estimates accordingly.

MEMORIAL DRIVE

Approximately 23,000 square feet east of Langevin Bridge was levelled and seeded to lawn as an extension of the area already improved.

Two hundred and seventy trees were planted. The Kiwanis Club subscribed one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) towards the cost of this work and the members assisted with the planting.

CEMETERIES

All tree shrubbery and flower borders were dug in the spring and regularly cultivated and watered throughout the summer. All newly planted stock received special attention in the matter of watering.

All roads were weeded several times during the season.

Plots under maintenance were regularly cut and watered, and the individual flower plots attended to.

Dandelions were treated with a special preparation which was applied exactly according to instructions but proved ineffective.

Two hundred and eighty square yards grassway was seeded.
A new exit was made to the Macleod Trail and Burnsland Cemetery from a point near Section P.
Three hundred and fifty loads of manure were used for topdressing the poorer grass areas.
The water service was extended by 1095 feet of three-quarter inch, and 670 feet of one inch pipe.
The paving of the entrance to this Cemetery has to some extent remedied the unsightliness of this approach but much remains to be done in the way of grading, seeding, and the erection of a respectable fence before this entrance can be termed beautiful.
The storm sewer installed on Second Street East and across the nursery grounds to the Elbow River is also another most important and much needed improvement, as it will prevent any further flooding of the Cemetery entrance, the offices and nurseries, such as occurred so frequently in the past and has caused such great damage and inconvenience.

BURNSLAND CEMETERY

1,784 square yards of roadway gravelled six inches deep.
4,841.76 square yards of plots and grassways loamed and seeded.
Twenty-four graves reseeded after new burials.
Fifty loads manure used for topdressing lawns.
A new entrance and turnstyle was made at the south-west corner for the convenience of visitors from that direction.
The following trees and shrubs were planted in groups in suitable locations:-

15 Colutea arborescens	7 Morus tartarica

NURSERIES

The Nurseries, which contain, at the present time 20,927 trees of various sizes, 26,549 shrubs, and 15,729 perennials, valued at \$13,070.75, supplied much of the planting material for the several parks and gardens. The stock, as used, is replenished by purchase and propagation.

Two hundred and fifty-eight trees and shrubs were transplanted, 985 herbaceous plants propagated by division, and 7,041 perennials raised from seed.

The sprinkler system was extended 744 feet.

GREENHOUSES

83,654 bedding plants were supplied by the Greenhouses.

MAINTENANCE OF TOOLS, PLANT, AND EQUIPMENT

The motor mowers have given good service during the past season though the first Jacobsen machine purchased is getting somewhat the worse for wear.

One Toro mower used on the boulevards gave considerable trouble as a result of what is thought to have been malicious damage done to the engine.

The new Ransome machine purchased last year gave excellent service.

Many of the hand machines are becoming worn out and will need to be replaced.

The Triplex horse machines used on the Golf Course, though now quite ancient are still giving good service.

A large shed for the storage of the larger implements is urgently needed.

Much of the equipment such as water carts, etc. needs a thorough overhauling.

POLICING

One patrolman was attached permanently to the staff of the Parks Department on April 1st, and his services have proved very useful in warning violators and making arrests where necessary, in guarding visitors to the parks against accident or injury, in rendering first aid and in caring for people needing assistance, in guiding the people to the proper use of the parks, in protecting all park property, in directing the parking of cars, in assisting the regular police force, and in many other ways.

Claims for damage to park property to the extent of eighty-three dollars and thirty-three cents (\$83.33) have been collected.

Stolen property recovered consisted of one roller, and one war medal removed from a cemetery monument.

All large gatherings, such as baseball and football matches, sports, memorial services, etc. have been attended for the purpose of keeping order.

Notwithstanding the greatest vigilance on the part of this newly appointed patrolman there has been a certain amount of destruction on the park of that element, found in all cities, that is animated by a spirit of vandalism, and whose activities result in the aggregate in the loss of thousands of dollars. However, there has been a very great improvement since this appointment was made, and, as this man becomes better trained and more familiar with the work there will be still greater improvement. He does, however, need to be provided with means of more speedy travel and I recommend that a motor cycle be provided for his use.

The appointment of this man is not by any means an innovation for it is the general policy of cities throughout the country to have special patrol forces consisting of men specially trained for this work for as one report puts it "The city policeman is courageous, willing, and courteous, but he has not as a rule developed what one might term 'park eyes' due to the fact that his assignment to this work is but occasional".

MISCELLANEOUS

Decorations

The attractions platform at Victoria Park was decorated on the occasion of the Civic Reception of the Rt.Hon. R.B.Bennett.

Displays were made at all Flower Shows, that at the Calgary Society's Show taking the form of a model of a thirty acre fully equipped athletic field and playground.

MISCELLANEOUS (CONT'D)

An exhibit from the Zoo was made at the Calgary Poultry Show.

An exhibit of a model garden was made by request in the Palliser Hotel on the occasion of the Handicraft's Exhibition.

A model rock garden was constructed at the Calgary Industrial Exhibition.

Assistance in the form of labor and equipment was given during the week of the Bonspiel.

Similar assistance was also given Sunshine for the distribution of Christmas gifts.
