#### TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

December 31, 1933.

To His Worship the Meyor, Commissioner, & Aldermen:

#### Gentlemen:

Notwithstanding the tremendous reduction made in the Appropriation for this Department for 1933, due to the assistance of relief labour, it was found possible to maintain all our developed park areas in a reasonably good condition and to carry on considerable improvements on several new areas. We have suffered considerably, however, in so far as the maintenance of our buildings and equipment is concerned, as it has not been possible to purchase replacement parts, material for repairs, etc. to the extent that would seem desirable.

The reduction in appropriation compared with 1932 amounted

to \$22,448.79; making a total reduction since 1931 of \$43,604.14.
With the small sum available (\$54,780.16) it was only possible to pay the wages of the permanent staff and no additional labour was employed during the year, and trucks and teams were hired

only when the need was most urgent.

During the past year we have endeavoured to provide and maintain, as adequately as possible, all recreational facilities; for which leisure time increased, and in fact, forced upon our people to such a tremendous extent, we feel that it is the proper function of this Department to ameliorate as much as lies in our power the discouragements under which they are suffering, and to at least make it possible for them to utilize this leisure time in healthful recreation.

Our work embraces a great diversity of functions, including as it does the maintenance of the parks, gardens, and recreation grounds, with all their complex contents, --fences, bridges, buildings, comfort stations, shelters, and other buildings, drives, walks, trees, shrubs, flowers, lawns, lawn seats, lighting systems, sewers, water systems, running tracks, cricket pitches, ball fields; the Zoo and its inhabitants, the maintenance of 70 miles of street boulevard and the 18,586 trees and shrubs upon them, the maintenance of the cometeries and the interment of 700 dead with all the necessary recording that goes therewith, the operation of the Municipal Golf Course, the care of ten equipped and supervised summer playgrounds,--

70 skating and hockey rinks, and many other activities.
Whilst appropriations have been tremendously restricted, yet because this Department has been asked to furnish work for many unemployed, the net result is a gain in parks and recreational services which we probably would not have obtained in the next ten years, under normal conditions. Many new parks, many new facilities have been built during this period of depression, and it is possible that the services of these unemployed could be utilized in no better way in view of the stabilizing, character building, and cultural influence of the services which a parks and recreation department

provide.

The mon have been used on work of a character that calls for thr greatest amount of labour and the smallest amount of material, the underlying thought being to carry on worth while improvements with the least possible expenditure. The men have been utilized as far as possible to the best advantage according to their physical abilities; those not previously used to heavy, laborious labour being given work of a less arduous nature, and work, as far as possible, that they were experienced in. Whilst there have been occasional evidences of dissatisfacthon with this arrangement amongst cortain types. arrangement amongst certain types, the majority seem to have realized that working for the relief received, at least saved the odium of pauporization, and this no doubt helped to keep up the morale of many of the men.

Our revenue from the various sources for the year amounted to \$21,769.54, heing \$304.54 in excess of our estimate, and \$915.68 above that of 1932.

Additions to Parks System:


I suppose Calgary's park system is unique in that it has the greatest number of individual areas in proportion to their total acreage of any city, and as each year passes the number of small plots is being increased. As a matter of fact we have no really large parks that are developed as such. However, there are many advantages in having these many small areas scattered through-out the city for they provide opportunities to develope neighbour-hood centres for recreation of various kinds.

As a result of a potition signed by residents in the neighbourhood, it was decided to reserve the front portion of Lot 12, Block 10, Plan 3845.0, Section 9 (North west corner of 5th Street West and Elbow Drivo) for park purposes. This has an are of less than one quarter of an acre in extent (9406 square feet) and therefore can only be utilized as a small ornamental garden. This has an area It has been prepared for that purpose and will be planted next season.

The plan of the subdivision to the west of the Sunalta Ravine in Section 17, Block 7680 A.N., which is Canadian Pacific Railway property with the exception of a few city-owned lots; has been cancelled and exchanges made between the City and the Canadian Pacific Railway, by which the former becomes the owner of a strip, approximately 100 feet wide, along the west side of the Ravine. This will enable us to complete the scheme of improvements outlined in my last report in so far as the western side of the ravine is

Villa lots 12,13,14, and 15, Bridgeland, comprising an area of twenty acres opposite the north entrance to St. George's Island has been reserved as an athletic park and playground at the request of the Bridgeland Ratepayor's Association.

That portion of the Hillcrest hillside extending from the land already owned by the city eastwards to Hillcrest Avenue was transferred to the City by the formal action of the Canadian Pacific Railway and now makes this hillside a complete unit from 8th Street West to Hillcrest Avenue with access from both east and west.



Weather:

The sub-zero temperatures experienced early in October 1932, as was to be anticipated, did very considerable damage, shrubs being the greatest sufferers. Roses, in particular, were very hard hit, and the percentage of losses was by far the greatest in my experience. Trees did not suffer to the extent I anticipated, but there was considerable loss amongst certain classes of herbaceous perennials.

The winter weather of 1932-33 was very equable. January and February were moderately cold but there were no great extremes.

March was rather cold and stormy with frequent light falls of snow.

The spring season opened unusually early as is indicated

by the fact that we had to commence the cutting of grass on May 10th.

Another intensely dry summer made the maintenance of grass areas, and the establishment of newly planted stock, a difficult problem, particularly where watering facilities were inadequate, as they are in many of our recently developed parks. There was a quite heavy fall of soft wet snow about the middle of October, and this should, normally have improved soil maintains conditions for the middle of october. normally, have improved soil moisture conditions for the winter. This snow was, however, quickly dissipated and then followed a long period of mild dry weather which caused considerable alarm to many citizens by the unseasonable swelling of buds on trees and shrubs. On December 12th there was a considerable drop in temperature and the weather was continuously and intensely cold from that date till the end of the year. Fortunately, during this period of intense cold, there was a heavy snow covering.

The temporatures were extremely variable throughout the

This is reflected in the Annual Report of the Dominion Meteorological Department, which shows Calgary as having the greatest daily range of temperature, 21.4 degrees. The highest recorded temperature for the year was 97 degrees on July 25th, and the coldest day was February 8th, --26 degrees. During the months of December there was a range of temperature of 81 degrees, the mean for that month being 3 degrees. One foot of snow fell during the month. Calgary was again the driest point in the Dominion, with a precipitation of 11.4 inches. Rain fell on 37 days, and snow on 41 days.

Owing to the very small permanent staff available and the unsuitability of relief labor for this class of work very little progress had been made at the end of the year with winter pruning.

A careful inspection of shrubbery in various parts of the city revealed that much damage was done as a result of the remarkable weather experienced in the early winter. The unseasonably mild weather of November caused much swelling of buds after growth had become dormant. Buds effected in this way were completely destroyed by the sub-zero weather of December. It was found that the buds on all lilacs examined were quite dead, mountain ashes have suffered badly in certain situations.

The floral displays of the past season, particularly that in Memorial Park, were the most brilliant and striking of any season so far, and were so pronounced to be by very many citizens. This was probably due to the very warm sunny summer season, which was very favorable to the class of annuals used. It had the effect, however, of making the season for perennials a very short one.

The almost world-wide exchange of seeds that I have been fortunate enough to establish has enabled me to secure and test species here that would otherwise have been unattainable. This exchange has also created a correspondence that is becoming annually more extensive and intensely interesting.

## ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND PARK

As the result of an ice jam in the Bow River, the Island was flooded early in the year and was sealed under a heavy coating of ice till the spring. The loss of border plants was considerab and all the roses were killed. It was anticipated that the water The loss of border plants was considerable system would be completely ruined, but, strangely, no demage was done to the pipes.

The beds were filled with annuals and these made a very

fine display all season.
A large number of holes have been dug in readiness for planting of trees and shrubs; both on St. George's Island and St. Patrick's Island, in the spring.

The grass was kept as green as possible, but this is a difficult problem during long periods of dry weather, due to inadequate watering facilities.

The fertilizer spread on the west end proved of great

benefit to the grass.

Seven rustic seats around trees were rebuilt, also two

hundred yards of new fence near the south entrance.

The roads were kept in as good condition as possible, but, owing to the extremely dry weather, they at times became very rough, and grading under these conditions was practically useless. They were however, dragged on several occasions when rain fell. No oiling was done during the past season. A large pile of screened gravel is in readiness to put on in the spring if it is possible to get trucks to haul it. The road along the south side of the Island has been raised approximately two feet, it having been suggested that this would prevent flooding. Rock protection work has been built at the north east corner of the south bridge near the comfort station, where considerable erosion was taking place and endangering both the bridge foundations and the comfort station.

#### ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND ZOO

While the increase of specimens has not been so great as in previous years, yet a number of very interesting specimens have been received. Notable additions include a pair of African Lions secured from the Castle Hirsch Shows, Ltd., and Fallow Deer, Japanese Deer, and a Himalayan Tahr donated by the Parks Department of the City of Toronto. Baboons and monkeys received from San Diego Zoo have also been a great attraction, and it is in this respect that our housing falls short of requirements. Several varieties of pheasants, peafowl, and doves, have added to the beauty of the avian exhibit.

The general health of specimens has again been good and losses low. The most serious loss was that of the Mountain Goat and Mountain Sheep. These animals had been in the Zoo nearly three years and had thrived. Following the flood of December 1932 a very luxuriant growth of vegetation appeared in the paddocks. appeared to cause dysentery and almost immediate death. Such animals appear subject to this trouble, and gravelling of yards in which they are kept is often resorted to.

Approximate value of donated foodstuffs was \$540.00, compared with \$607.85 in 1932. Cost of foodstuffs purchased by the Parks Department was \$267.27, compared with \$349.36 in 1932.

Attendance by the public has been very great throughout the year except during very severe weather. High water in the Bow River has caused alarm on several

occasions.

Improvements:

As was the case during 1932 the material has been provided by the Calgary Zoological Society and City of Calgary jointly, and Relief Labor utilized. The work done in the early part of the year consisted mainly of repairing damage caused by the 1932 December flood. New work done consisted of the following:-

Dismantling and rebuilding, placing on foundation, and relining of old log cabin.

Carving and erection of totem pole.

Remodelling of old Fort Calgary (incomplete).

Moving and placing on foundation of winter quarter building.

Building root cellar.
Building small concession building.

Repairs and additions to old concession building.

Completing of five squirrel pens.

Making and painting some 75 signs for various pens.

Building shelter in west deer paddock.

Building foundation for new winter quarter building.

Building four new redent houses.
Repairs to fences of deer paddocks.
General repair work and improvements.
Constructing 50 feet of rustic seating.

Winter quarters are urgently needed for tropical animals, but our housing for native specimens is in excellent condition, although recent arrivals have caused overcrowding in the pheasant aviaries.

#### RILEY PARK

During the early part of the season a large part of this park was under water and much damage was done to the turf as a result; particularly at the south and of the east cricket pitch and around the centre one. To remedy this condition it was necessary to remove the turf from an area of approximately 4,600 square feet and to raise the level,40 cu.yards of loam being used for this purpose, which loam was taken from along the south side of the wading pool. The turf used was that removed from the site of some new flower beds that have been prepared in the north west section of the park. It is intended to dig a large hole in the vicinity of the centre pitch and fill this with rock to provide drainage. The area near the pool from which the loam was removed was refilled with gravel taken from the bog at the west end of the wading pool. Soveral loads of loaves were trenched into this bog with a view to converting it eventually into a water garden.

Six trees, 307 shrubs, 210 perennials, and 11,600 annuals were planted in this park. The trees and shrubs in most instances were used to replace old stumps that were removed from the borders.

A number of trees and shrubs were removed from the boulevard on 10th Street to provide space for a foot path along the East end of the park. The trees and shrubs thus removed were planted on the boulevard on the west side of the park.

During the fall ten new flower beds were made, one of which

was planted with a collection of Iris as a special feature. About 300 shrubs were planted in gaps in the borders, 2,000 square feet of lawn was relaid, and another 4,000 square feet stripped in readiness for sodding in the spring. 135 leads of fertilizer was spread on lawn areas.

Considerable trouble was exparimed in connection with the pool, due to the heaving of many of the concrete blocks by frost. A careful examination disclosed that there were a number of wooden pegs under these blocks that had been lifted by the frost and these pegs had not receded when the frost left the ground. Many of the slabs had to be taken out, the pegs removed, and the slabs replaced.

The swimming pool and playground in this park was by far the most popular rendevous of the children of the city during the past summer.

#### CRESCENT PARK

About two hundred trees and shrubs were transplanted; the enclosed area at the north end of the park, which was in a most insenitary and disgraceful condition, thoroughly cleaned up, and & new quoiting pitch of eight ends constructed and enclosed with a fence, and playground apparatus repaired.

The unseeded portion of this park was given to the

Unemployment Self-help Committee for the cultivation of vegetables.

#### SOUTH MOUNT ROYAL PARK

Good progress was made in the development of this park and the grass area is now nicely established, being much benefited by the covering of fertilizer placed there the previous winter. So where the grass had failed to come were sodded. A few trees and shrubs had to be replaced.

The flower beds provided for on the original plan were prepared in the fall, and one of the paths extending from the north west to the south east corner was graded and gravelled. A rustic arbour and a number of seats were placed on the park. A four inch water connection was made and service extended into the edge of the park. It will be necessary to extend this service well into the park this year to provide means of watering. Last year we had to resort to the use of fire hose and hydrants for this purpose.

#### KILLARNEY PARK

All stones and refuse was removed from the park. Borders were regularly cultivated. Trees and shrubs were watered, and grass and weeds cuts. This park was supplied with a hockey enclosure this winter for the first time. In levelling the site for this hockey rink considerable loam had to be removed, this was transferred to the borders in readiness for tree planting next season; and the sub-soil removed from the tree holes was used to embank the rink.

#### MOUNT PLEASANT PARK

Further levelling and reclamation of the prairie sod was carried on in an effort so convert it into lawn without breaking the surface. This park is now taking on a very nice appearance as the trees and shrubs develope, and the borders were very gay with blossoms this season.

#### ELBOW BOULEVARD PARK

One new flower bed was prepared, the paths gravelled, bad patches of lawn renovated, perennial flower beds replanted, and the boulevard strip lowered.

#### MEMORIAL PARK

The past year was by far the most successful in my experience as regards the floral display in this park. 17,120 annuals; and 144 bulbs were planted. The Cenotaph flower beds were planted with tulips that had been used the previous season. Whilst these do not have so lengthy a blossoming period, and were not so fine as imported bulbs, they made a reasonably satisfactory display. All existing flower beds were lowered, 15 loads of loam being removed. Four new flower beds were made on the area in front of the Library.

Thirty-six shrubs were planted to add more variety to the shrubbery borders. A trench was prepared in readiness for the planting

of the dwarf cotoneaster hedge along the west side of the park.

Nine loads of manure were used for fertilizing lawns and borders, and 18 loads of mulch was used for winter protection.

#### OGDEN PARK

Considerable improvements were carried out during the year 996 trees were planted on the borders, and due to on Ogden Park plenty of attention in the matter of watering, were well established by the fall; 360 loads of loam were used for the purpose of planting 250 holes have been dug in readiness for planting next these trees. season.

## TOMPKINS GARDENS

This plot received regular attention as regards; mowing; watering, and cultivation. 1,208 annuals and 96 perennials were planted in the beds. Over crowded trees and shrubs were removed, those suitable for replanting, namely, 10 ash and 1 Chokesherry being returned to Nurseries, and 2 Poplars being destroyed.

#### SUNALTA RAVINE GARDENS

Sites for tennis courts and skating and hockey rinks were levelled, the total area being approximately 2,533 square yards. To do this levelling it was necessary to make a cut of about 1,805 cu. yards and a fill of 4;112 cu. yards.

266 yards of clay was removed from the hill to provide

space for a clubhouse.

A cut was made on the west side of the rink, and a bank built up for the purpose of diverting a spring from its course, about 50 yards of clay being used for this purpose. This bank loamed and re-sodded with turf lifted from rink site. This bank was

A water course was made between the tennis court and the rink to take care of a spring at the south west corner of the rink; about 20 yards of loam being removed. This was spread on the ad-

joining slopes

On the north end of the tennis court, about 30 yards of clay were removed and replaced with loam. This provides a planting area between the tennis court and rink of approximately 4,000 feet. On the cast side of the tennis court a water course was made, about 50 yards of clay being removed. The sides for about 120 feet have been built up with loam and rocks. Between the east boundary of the court and the stream 20 yards were removed, and replaced by loam. This provides a planting area east of the court to path running north and south of about 1,500 feet, including rockery and stream. For the purpose of making the tennis court square about 100 yards of loam was removed. This has been used for the purpose of loaming the afore-mentioned planting areas.

Four rustic bridges were built to provide means of crossing water courses where necessary. About 280 feet of 12 inch pipe was laid full depth, and 140 feet of \( \frac{3}{4} \) surface pipe for a water supply. This pipe was provided by the Sunalta Community Club. A paved walk 3 feet wide was laid from the clubhouse to the top of hill, a distance of about 330 feet. A flight of 50 steps, 30 inches wide was laid in the quarry section, about 3,120 feet of path graded and approximately 1,700 yards of dirt removed for grading and filling purposes.

A picnic ground has been levelled off providing an area

of about 4.000 feet. 100 yards of dirt being used for this purpose.
A quantity of rock has been quarried for the rockery, steps, walks, and fireplace, 130 cu.feet of rock being dressed for fireplace and chimiey.

160 trees and shrubs were planted on the east slope.

#### TRIANGLE PARK

Twelve crowded poplars were removed and returned to nurseries. Twenty shrubs were planted. A large flower bed was prepared at the centre of the plot.

#### SOUTH CALGARY PARK

A number of trees were planted, and the previously uncultivated portion of the border dug. People residing in the vicinity were permitted to use portions of this border for garden purposes.

#### ELBOW SWIMMING POOL GROUNDS

This place is yearly becoming more popular as a swimming resort, and the attendance is increasing to an enormous extent, both summer and winter. Last senson it was thronged with crowds of happy youngsters all the summer long. Supervision was provided

daily from 8:00 a.m. till 10:00 p.m.

The booms were placed in the river as usual, but the bathers were so numerous that the stream was used for many hundreds of yards beyond the limits of these booms.

A new raft was made for the use of the children. The swimming area could be greatly improved by removing boulders from the bed of the river and piling same across the river near the lower boom. This would slow up the current and improve conditions both for swimming and skating.

The floor of the dressing room should be covered with

rubberaid to exclude water.

A drinking fountain is badly needed.

#### ROSEVALE PARK

The shrubbery was extended along the north side. suitable material that could be obtained was deposited in the depression at the north end. The fence is badly in need of repair.

#### ROSEDALE CRESCENT PLOT

This plot was planted with annuals.

#### TUXEDO PARK

The playground equipment and fences required considerable repair during the season. Beyond this nothing but regular maintenance work was done.

#### CAPITOL HILL PARK

Fourteen trees and seventy-five shrubs were planted, and all trees and shrubs pruned, 190 perennials were added to the borders, rough grass cut, fences repaired, and baseball diamond maintained.

#### BRIDGE APPROACHES

Hillhurst: The established plots received the necessary attention as regards maintenance, and 100 annuals were planted in the beds. The north-east corner was graded, loamed, and fertilized in readiness for seeding, and loam was provided in readiness for the planting of trees and shrubs, 145 loads of loam and 14 loads of manure being used.

Louise: The plot at the north-east corner was graded, 290 cu. yards of loam and 28 cu. yards of fertilizer applied, and the whole prepared for seeding. All beds were cultivated and watered, and grass cut.

#### WESTMOUNT BOULEVARD

Considerable levelling of the coarse gravel was done on the south side of the avenue; grass renovated on established boulevards, and trees trimmed and staked. All rough grass and weeds were cut and burnt.

#### GLADSTONE AVENUE PLOT

This newly improved site was planted with nine arces and fifty-eight shrubs.

#### CENTRE STREET CUT

One hundred spruce trees were planted at the south-east corner. When these develope they will vastly improve the appearance of what is now a very bare ugly spot.

The grass on these slopes both east and west was kept trimmed during the season, also weeds were cut and burnt where they existed on unseeded ground. About 50 lbs. of Caragana seed was broadcasted on both banks.

## FOURTHENTH STREET NORTH WEST CUT

The rough grass and weeds were cut on these slopes several times during the season, and about 50 lbs. of Caragana seed down.

#### HILLHURST TRIANGLE

This plot was cultivated periodically, and replacements made where necessary. An addition, extending eastwards to 13th Street was dug and planted with 135 trees and shrubs.

#### UPPER HILLHURST CRESCENT

The grading of this area was commenced.

## ISLANDS ON 8TH STREET WEST, MOUNT ROYAL

The trees and shrubs on these were drastically thinned and that on 20th Avenue planted with annuals.

### MANCHESTER ATHLETIC GROUNDS

Weeds and rough grass were cut on these grounds and skating rink embankments repaired.

#### ROXBOROUGH PARK

During the winter the work of cleaning up this park was carried on by the removal of dead and dying trees, broken and entangled shrubbery, weeds, and refuse of all kinds.
A rustic bridge was constructed across water course at

the foot of hill.

A footpath is in course of construction along the hillside extending from river bank to Mission Road, and giving access to suitable points to summit of hill. This path will provide a pleasing walk and excellent view points.

The "swimming hole" in the Elbow River was supervised This path will provide a pleasing

throughout the season.

#### ROXBOROUGH COMMUNITY CENTRE

A site was graded and tennis courts and shelter constructed. The remaining space was levelled and banked for a skating rink site, and water connection installed.

#### ELBOW DRIVE PLOT

This newly acquired plot was trenched and graded and a path gravelled and curbed across the corner. The whole area has been topdressed with fertilizer.

#### ELBOW RIVER WALK

The very attractive and popular pathway along the river bank from 5th Street West to the Swimming Pool Grounds was improved by further grading and considerable dead brush removed. The path was extended westwards from the point where 40th Avenue reaches to river bank, to 5th Street. It is unfortunate that owing to the fact that much of the river bank is private property this walk cannot be made continuous.

#### ELBOW PARK CAR LOOP

This plot was manured and cultivated.

#### GARDEN CRESCENT

Considerable thinning was done to the trees and shrubs, 100 new shrubs planted, and the plot cultivated. 17.

## THIRTY-FOURTH AVENUE CUT

Some additional shrubs were planted here.

## EARL GREY COMMUNITY CENTRE

Considerable work was done on this area. A caragana hedge was planted on 10th Street and one of hawthern on Prospect Avenue. Lilacs were planted along the path to the shelter. A number of trees and shrubs were planted throughout the grounds. Considerable grading was done for the purpose of enlarging the rink sites, retaining walls of two inch plank were built where cuts in the bank existed, and a hockey enclosure was made. All fences and buildings were painted.

## SUNAL TA PARK

A commencement could well be made in the development of this park by planting of the steep slopes with shrubbery.

#### ROYAL SUNALTA COMMUNITY CENTRE

A site for regulation size hockey rink was graded, four feet of close board fence erected, water service extended to shelter, floor laid, and the building generally renovated, the bank at the east side of the property coated with 190 cu. yards of loam, and a rockery built.

The lot on which the Scout Hall is situated, which previously was steeply sloping to the north was graded to three separate levels, 190 cu. yards of loam and 488 cu. yards of subsoil were moved in the course of this grading. The whole area was enclosed with a rustic fence.

#### BOWLING GREENS, 16 TH AVENUE & 11 TH STREET WEST

The work of grading the extension was completed, 1,301 cu. yards of gravel being removed.

#### TALON AVENUE SUNKEN GARDEN

The fertilizer placed on this plot in 1932 greatly improved the sod. The rockery was planted with suitable material, two rustic seats placed on the park, and a water connection made to the main.

#### ROYAL NORTH WEST MOUNTED POLICE MENORIAL

Three large spruce trees were planted directly behind the Memorial to provide a better setting. Ten shrubs were planted in the border.

#### CITY HALL GARDENS

The new lawn (seeded in 1932) wintered very satisfactorily

and a good sod was established by the end of the season.

1,230 annuals were used in the flower beds.

It will be necessary to re-connect the water service. The water sergice as at present arranged necessitates the use of an unreasonable quantity of hose.

#### RIVERDALE AVENUE PLOT

This plot was fertilized, dug, and cultivated.

#### MILLICAN PARK

A new road was graded from the top of the hill down to the bridge and a new bridge constructed across the creek; thus making the approach much safer, and the picnic ground itself more accessible. Considerable work was done to prevent damage by floods.

#### HOSPITAL GROUNDS

The boundary plantation surrounding these grounds, which had had no attention for some years, and was in a deplorable condition, was thoroughly pruned and cleaned up.

#### CLIFF TRIANGLE

This plot was dug and levelled in readiness for further improvements this season. People living in the vicinity were permitted to crop the area with a view to eradicating weeds.

#### OLD BANFF TRAIL CUTBANK

An effort was made to improve the appearance of this eyesore by planting, seeding, removal of weeds, etc.

#### SUNDRY PLOTS

The following areas received the usual attention as regards cultivating, watering, grass cutting, planting, and general maintenance: -- Bankview Plot, Mission Park, and Ward Plot.

#### SHAGANAPPI PARK, MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE

Our Municipal Golf Course increased in popularity during the past year. The total receipts were \$9,561.70, and the dis-bursements \$6,419.20, showing a net profit for the year of \$3,142.50.

SHAGANAPPI PARK MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE (CONT'D).

That the season proved such a successful one was due largely to the fact that weather conditions were entirely favorable to outdoor sports. The members of the Club seemed to derive much more enjoyment from their golf during the past season possibly due to the many competitions arranged for their benefit.
The figures herewith submitted are conclusive evidence as

to the favorable weather during the season.

Having completed a nine-hole course for ladies during 1932, it was felt that some adjustment of the charges should be made; accordingly, the day fee for ladies was reduced from 35¢ to 25¢.

The course was available to players from March 18th to

December 3rd, with a few breaks due to unsuitable weather. From
May 8th to August 31st, a period of one hundred and fourteen days,
golfers played over the course daily. Such a long period of unbroken
weather is almost unprecedented and is certainly worthy of notice.

The end of the season seemed to take place on October 19th,
when a heavy fall of snow covered the ground, but a fortunate change
in the weather emplied golfers to again make use of our facilities

in the weather enabled golfers to again make use of our facilities, and over 600 games were played between November 11th and December 3rd.

It was pleasing to note that the members and their friends, made much more use of the Clubhouse and its facilities. Many members made the Clubhouse their evening quarters, playing bridge, and other games, so that it thus became quite a social centre, which is all to the advantage of the golf course and the revenue derived therefrom.

Development and Maintenance Work.
One hundred and five trees, and 86 shrubs were planted and all trees and shrubs pruned. Fonces were repaired, many new posts being required. The road to the Clubhouse was graded and surfaced as necessary.

Toos: Four new rubber mats were purchased and installed. All tees were rebuilt and mats laid. The tee on Number 14 was rebuilt with logs, it being found that the boulders that were previously used were not satisfactory. This tee was enlarged to 15 by 18 feet with a alpha at the front of 2 feet 6 inches; it was filled in with clay. The tee at Number 17 was also improved by erecting a 14 foot rock retaining wall. New tee boxes and stands were made and painted, and these were stencelled and varnished.

## SHAGANAPPI PARK, MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE (CONT'D)

Fairways: All loose stones and debris were removed, particularly from the fairways and from the course generally. Holes on fairways were filled with loam. Trails on Number 2 fairway were filled in. The fairways were regularly cut as required and the rough was cut once or twice during the season and burnt off in the fall. 41 cu. yards of clay was used to topdress Number 11 fairway and to build bank adjoining steps in gulley.

A retaining wall and log steps were built in the gulley on Number 11 fairway, 80 feet in length. A retaining wall was also built on the south bank of the gulley at this point to prevent sliding of gravel. This retaining wall is 95 feet long and 18 inches high.

Greens: All greens were resurfaced twice during the season and regularly topdressed with oil and sand as necessary; 18 barrels of fuel oil;  $4\frac{1}{2}$  barrels of motor oil, and 80 yards of sand being used. The old sand removed from the greens was used on the bunkers.

Clubhouse: The kitchen and living rooms were repainted and bedroom walls were lined with plaster board. Baseboards were constructed and casings put around doors and windows. A new heater was installed in the clubhouse.

A log shelter is in course of construction at the entrance to the course on Number 1 tee.

### MEWATA PARK

Park:

The old bandstand at the north east corner of the park is in such a dilapidated condition that it has become dangerous and it will be necessary to wreck it as soon as possible.

For the past three years I have called attention to the extremely dangerous condition that exists along the river bank, where the fence has been undermined by erosion during flood periods. The fence is too dilapidated to move and an entirely new fence will have to be built, but, up to the present no money has been available for this work.

The bleachers at the softball diamond are now rapidly decaying and will soon have to be entirely removed.

Stadium:
The representative Commission, appointed by His Worship the Mayor for the purpose of the allocating of dates, and the drafting of rules and regulations governing the use of the Stadium and Ball Grounds, functioned splendidly during the past season, notwithstanding that there was a tremendous demand for the use of the fields and the administration of a Stadium was an entirely new experience. The Commission cooperated in every possible way with this Department in the matter of keeping proper control of the grounds and in preserving the properties from unnecessary wear and damage.

There is every evidence that this project will be a financial success, the percentage of gate receipts collected by the Department amounting to \$1,129.81.

Stadium (Contid) The outstanding event of the season was the Olympic Trials which was made the occasion of the official opening of the Stadium, and on which occasion there were some bundred and fifty entries for the various events.

The Stadium was extensively used all the season for

training and practice.

A short track was built at the north west corner of the grandstand to provide a place to practice starting. This was done previously on the regular track and resulted in a good deal of damage.

Holes were dug along the inside of the north fence for the purpose of planting large shrubs this coming season. This should discourage the cutting of holes in the fence as it will be quite impossible to see the games through such holes after the planting is

The grandstand was divided into sections and all seats numbered, the bleachers were enlarged giving an additional seating accommodation to some 1,600 people. On the outside of the south fence "Calgary Stadium" was painted. The infield of the stadium was fertilized, there being 75 loads spread.

The tenders for the refreshment concession were so low that it was decided that the Department operate the concession on a The amount realized was more than twice the highpercentage basis. A careful system of accounting and checking was adopted; which worked very satisfactorily.

The wooden curbing of running track has been destroyed and to be replaced. The bleachers also need considerable will have to be replaced.

repair.

Baseball Field: Mewata Baseball Field, the field that was known in 1931 as the west football field is now called the "Mewata Baseball Field"; this name is painted on the outside in large letters and it is enclosed with a twelve foot painted fence. During the summer season; baseball and football are played, and in the winter hockey and public There are two hockey rinks and one big sheet of ice for the the checking facilities. There is a skating area of 71,680 skating. public with checking facilities. square yards.

New bleachers were built with seating accommodation for two thousand people.

Games of baseball were played practically every night throughout the season.

#### HILLHURST ATHLETIC PARK

This park is rapidly declining in popularity as a summer athletic centre, due to a large extent, undoubtedly, to the opening of the Stadium. It has been in constant use for Association Football but the revenue from the gate has been negligable.

The grounds were kept in condition for play throughout the season and were in use for Association Football practically every day.

The gravel slope extenting along the north side of the park was evenly graded and is now ready for topdressing and seeding. The completion of this work will greatly improve the appearance of this park and will remove an eyesore that has been in existence since the park was first acquired.

The trees and shrubs recently planted inside the fences received all the necessary attention and are now beginning to have a very pleasing appearance. 22.

## HILLHURST ATHLETIC PARK (CONT'D)

About 200 additional holes have been dug in readiness for further planting for the purpose of thickening this strip and to make a more effective screen.

#### OTHER ATHLETIC ACTIVITIES

Archery: A portion of Roxborough Park was set aside for the use of the Calgary Archery Club and the club was established there for the season.

The club was subjected to considerable annoyance during the season by acts of vandalism, and finally their clubhouse was burnt down. At the present time this club is requesting space in some other part of the city.

Horseshoes: A battery of Horseshoe Courts were provided in the Rotary Recreation Grounds. This sport has grown greatly in popularity in recent years, mainly amongst men of middle age, and insistent demands have been made for facilities. Courts can be constructed at practically no outlay except for labour and it is therefore proposed to continue to construct them wherever suitable space is available.

Sports: Calgary Council Worker's Sports was granted the use of Bow Bend Park for athletic purposes at their request, but no use was made of these grounds.

#### **PLAYGROUNDS**

<u>Development Work:</u>
New tennis courts were constructed and enclosed at Rotary Recreation Grounds; and eight ends for quoiting built; the area being first levelled. The north end has been graded, the loam being first removed, and is now in readiness for development for whatever activity may seem to be most desirable. Twenty-five loads of manure was spread over the grass plots. The necessary pruning of trees and shrubs was also attended to in the fall. A hockey rink 168 by 64 feet was also constructed in this park.

Bridgeland playground was seeded to grass, a new set of

swings erected, and a dressing room and shelter placed on the ground.

A playground site on 24th Avenue was graded, and swings,
etc. erected on vacant lots on 25th Avenue West by request of citizens.

Stones, weeds, and refuse were removed from Bankview,

St. Stephen's West End Community, and Victoria Playgrounds.

Each playground is equipped with a complete first aid kit;

which is refilled as need arises throughout the season.

## PLAYGROUNDS (CONT'D)

, Supervision: An entire change of policy was adopted with regard to the supervision of the childrens' playgrounds last season, --men only being used, and these men being selected, as far as possible, from the ranks of the unemployed. This roved eminently satisfactory, and we had one of the most successful playground seasons yet experienced. The swimming activities were a particularly noticeable feature and lessons in first aid work was an innovation that proved very popular.

Average number of days playgrounds were in session was 41. There was a total daily average of 1,205 children on the eight playgrounds.

It will be noticed that the attendance records for Rotary Recreation Grounds and Riley Park are very much higher than for any other centres. This is probably due, in the first instance to the splendid way in which the grounds are equipped, and in the latter case to the swimming pool that is a feature of this park and attracts children from all parts of the city. So great was the attendance at the Rotary Grounds that it was found necessary to use two supervisors.

The supervision period opened on July 17th and closed on September 13th.

September 13th.

Playground Activities: Athletics: All the athletic activities of the past season proved very successful. Though the attendance was not as large as in 1932, owing to the fact that there were two playgrounds less, there was certainly greater enthusiasm. This was particularly true of the older youths, who in previous years had been in the habit of frequenting the streets and avenues, but who, this season, patronized the playgrounds to a much greater extent, and participated in the Sports Programme. In many cases these older lads acted as coaches and leaders thereby very considerably helping in the supervision. Competition was very keen, but of a friendly nature, as was demonstrated at the Swimming Gala and the Field Day; when loosers as well as winners were cheered.

This was undoubtedly the most popular game. 3offball: So keen was the competition and the friendly rivalry between the several playgrounds, that great crowds of youngsters followed their respective teams from playground to playground to watch the League Cames played. Riley Park won the championship in the Senior Boys

Softball (Contad) and Senior Girls sections; Riverside headed the Intermediace Boys, Junior Boys, and Juvenile Boys Sections; and Killarney were champions in the Junior Girls Class. These games drew quite a number of adult spectators who seemed to enjoy the fun as much as the youngsters. The winners of the different trophies were presented with prizes as well as the trophies at the final Field Day.

Basketball: This game did not arouse as much interest as football, but the competition was keen between those playgrounds that mustered teams. Riley Park won the Intermediate Girls Basketball Several playgrounds were unable to organize regular teams to play in the league, but in these cases friendly games were organized whenever possible, and these games proved just as popular as the League games.

By way of experiment a football was supplied Soccer: to each playground. The children picked up sides and played game amongst themselves and seemed to derive much enjoyment from these The children picked up sides and played games matches, and indication is that a regular playground soccer league

could be established next secson.

Picnics: A sort of "get-together" amongst playgrounds
was established for the first time this season by having picnics in the different parks. For instance, Rotary, Balmoral, Riverside, and Victoria, had a joint picnic at St. George's Island. Refreshments were served and games played and the children had a great time. Individual playgrounds also had picnics:--St. George's went to Bowness and others had theirs on their own grounds. A number of Calgary business firms very kindly denoted income soft drinks. Calgary business firms very kindly donated ice cream, soft drinks, etc. for these picnics.

Hiking: This was another new activity that seemed to be greatly enjoyed by the children.

Swimming: Competitive swimming this season was also an added attraction and has apparently taken a permanent place in the playground curriculum. In former years the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. kindly placed their respective pools at the disposal of the playground children for one day each week for symming lessons. The same privilege was extended this year but on a larger scale, and the swimming holes on the Bow and Elbow were under the supervision of qualified swimmers appointed by this Department. Arrangements were made to have a swimming gala on the Elbow River, with picked swimmers from the playgrounds and swimming holes, to meet in friendly competition. Unfortunately the weather was so cold that it had to be abandoned as far as the Elbow river was concerned, but, through the kindness of Mr. A. Baxter of the Crystal Pool we were able to run off the competition in his pool. On September 7th, Commissioner Riley opened the Gala in front of a crowd that filled the spectators space in the pool to capacity. There were 144 entries in the space in the pool to capacity. There were 144 entries in the following classes:-

Every playground and swimming hole group was represented, each entering its full quota in the events, all competitors being under the direction of their Supervisors who were aided by the older lads who could not qualify for entry. The following swimming-hole groups, together with the regular playgrounds, participated,—St. George's Island, Victoria, Elbow Bend, C.N.R., Elbow Park, and 24th Avenue Swimming Hole, Rotary Park was placed first, 24th Avenue Swimming Hole second, and Victoria Park Swimming Hole third. The 24th Avenue squad under Mr. Fyfe made a remarkably fine showing, some thirty children having learned to swim well enough under his direction to take part in these competitions. Some very fine swimmers were also developed by Messrs. Holland and Sykes, who gave lessons at the Y.M.C.A. and the Y.W.C.A.

In view of the fact that this event had to be organized in a very short period of time and that we were lacking in experience in staging such an event we are well pleased with results.

The Gala as a whole speaks well for the interest in

The Gala as a whole speaks well for the interest in swimming and the indications are that this will be an annual event that will be looked forward to both by the youngsters and adults with the keenest anticipation.

Handicraft Work: This is a recognized playground activity, and this year attained to an even greater degree of popularity than previously on some playgrounds, whilst, on others, the interest was practically non-existant. With a complete staff of male supervisors it was hardly to be expected that this particular phase of the work would flourish, and the results that were attained on those playgrounds that took the work up with any degree of energy was quite surprising. A special supervisor, properly qualified, might well be appointed for this work to travel from playground to playground.

Sports Day: The final event of the playground season was staged on September 13th at the Stadium when all playgrounds entered their best athletes for the senior and junior trophies. The attendance was quite good there being between 600 and 700 spectators present in spite of threatening weather. Riley Park won the senior and Rotary Park the junior shields. Prizes were presented to the individual winners by Alderman Miss Pue and Mrs. Narold Riley. We are again deeply indebted to Mrs. Riley who was responsible for securing the very fine collection of prizes for the several events.

Regular staff meetings were held weekly at the City Hall throughout the season in order to coordinate the efforts of the staff as a whole and to plan for special days and for inter-playground competitions,

## PLAYGROUNDS (CONT'D)

The wide publicity given to the activities of the playgrounds through frequent articles in the local papers added tremendously to the popularity of the playgrounds, and this doubtless contributed to the larger number of parents who visited the grounds. This interest of the parents was particularly marked this year.

A feature that might well be introduced into the playground work is that of promoting a campaign to prevent accidents, by giving instruction on this subject by a qualified person. Good work could also be done by a qualified Health Supervisor to conduct health educational propaganda.

The season was undoubtedly one of the most successful in the history of playgrounds in this city, supervisors and children alike being well satisfied with the outcome, and all are eagerly looking forward with pleasurable anticipation to next seasons! activities. In the success of the season the loyal cooperation and faithful work of each of the supervisors was the chief factor.

Whilst the honors, trophies, and other awards must of necessity go to a few, there is absolutely no doubt whatever that every boy and girl participating in our playground activities, gains something of far greater value than these awards in the building up of a strong healthy body, the graining of the mind to think and act quickly, and the development of such desirable traits of character as self-reliance and self-control, loyalty, and team-play, or cooperation, and the spirit of fair play and sportsmanship.

## Report of J. W. Quinney, Killarney Park.

The playground opened on July 17th and the day was spent receiving equipment, and organizing the different departments of the work.

I was very fortunate in securing some excellent leaders for the boys and girls work. We were able to secure teams for all sections of the softball and basketball leagues. Volleyball was not at all popular and consequently we could not raise a team for All our teams made fairly good showings. The Junior this game. Girls Softball team won the cup, beating the Riverside girls two out of three games. The Intermediate Girls Basketball team lost out to Riley Park girls in the finals. The Junior Boys Softball team, lost out to Victoria in the finals. The Juvenile boys lost to St. George's Island in the finals.

Unfortunately due to poor accommodation, we could not make a showing in raffia and basket work or sewing cards.

Besides the activities mentioned we spent many pleasant afternoons with the younger children relating and reading stories, our attendances running from ten to twenty children each afternoon.

Altogether the park was opened on 39 days, only 4 days being spoiled by wet weather. We had an attendance of 2,229 boys and 1,430 girls, with an average attendance of 57 boys and 36 girls.

The swimming at the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. was much enjoyed

by our boys and girls, with an average attendance of 25 boys and 20 girls.

On behalf of the boys and girls I would express our deep appreciation and thanks to the management of these Institutions for their kindness in allowing us the use of the pools, and also our sincere thanks to Messrs. Sykes and Holland for their help and

assistance in the swimming lessons.

The season altogether has been one of great enjoyment and instruction to all the boys and girls and they are deeply appreciative of the time and effort that has been spent by all concerned and especially the members of the staff in assisting to make the long summer holidays so delightful and instructive. I have received the personal thanks and appreciation from many of the parents, who are looking forward with pleasure to a more successful season next year.

Unfortunately we lost four baseball, and one bat was

taken away by the Victoria Junior boys, and one pail stolen.

I would like to suggest, if possible, we have a covered shelter and a good place for storing the equipment next year. What with the heavy winds and loose soil around the park, it was impossible to do either raffia work or dewing cards without getting covered with dust. We also sadly missed a drinking fountain during the hot afternoons.

With regard to the swimming gala, this was a decided success,

and I hope will be repeated next year.

The Field Day and sports I do not think could have been Everything passed off smoothly and the boys and girls improved. had a most enjoyable and entertaining day. We wore successful in gathering in eleven points and were well satisfied.

Due to poor accommodation interest in the First Aid Classes seemed to lag, and we did not have large attendances at any of the

lectures.

Finally I would like to express my deep appreciation for the kind cooperation and assistance we received from the Department This is a wonderful work and I feel the citizens at all times. of Calgary do not yet fully appreciate what this work means to those children and parents who are unable to spend the holiday season out of the city. To see the children enter into the various activities and receive so much enjoyment and instruction, is well worth the cost expended I am sure. I sincerely hope this excellent work will be continued for many years to come and I am quite sure the good results obtained will amply repay the time, effort, and expense incurred in the years to come.

#### Report of H. E. Sadler, Mewata Park.

The Mewata Playground activities for the summer season of 1933 were quite successful though the children did not win any trophies. Two of the Baseball teams, the Junior Girls and Intermediate Boys reached the semi-finals, while the Senior Girls ranked third in their section.

Two Sport Badges were won during the season and more children would have won them if they had been able to swim.

The First Aid Classes had an average attendance of 15, We expect 5 of the children to try the which included 5 adults. test for their certificates.

The average swimming attendance was 20 boys and 15 girls

per week.

The Industrial work under the direction of Mrs. Sadler was very successful, both from the standpoint of quality and quantity of the work. Approximately 45 articles were made, and thirty of these were on display at our home on the afternoon and evening of September 16th. Commissioner Riley and Alderman Miss Pue were able to attend the exhibition. Many of the children, with their parents and friends attended and showed much enthusiasm in the work and hope it will be continued next year. The children themselves were so interested that they bought between them an additional eight dollars (\$8.00) worth of reed.

To my knowledge the shack in which the equipment was kept was broken into twice during the season which accounts for two baseballs being stolen, two others were lost in the river, and three disappeared during the games.

In closing I would like to make the following suggestions

for the 1934 season:-

- 1. That the boys be supplied with a football and a schedule made for games. This would save much abuse to the Valleyball and basket ball, and give the boys an opportunity of doing something worthwhile.
- 2. That the Mewata district be divided in two by 17th Avenue West, the north half to be centered as at present at Mewata Park; and the south half centered at the Technical High School grounds, 6th Street & 17th Avenue West. By so doing, a large group of children from Mount Royal and Elbow Park, who are very interested in playground work would have a centre for activities. At present, they do not attend any ground, as Mowata is their nearest and is a good 15 or 20 minutes walk from home.

## Report of W. Garnett" Rotary Recreation Ground.

After a poor start at Balmoral School I was moved to take charge of the boys at Rotary Recreation Ground. This is a well charge of the boys at Rotary Recreation Ground. This is a Well equipped park with a very large attendance. After getting acquainted with the boys it was soon evident that baseball was the favorite game and it was possible to organize 6 teams. One senior, two intermediate, two junior, and one juvenile. The baseball season was fairly successful, the senior boys finished second in their section with the other teams winning about fifty percent of their games.

I would like to suggest that next season the possibility of forming a Valleyball league be dealt with. It seems that several boys are unable to play baseball dwing to some physical handsap and would be able to form teams in this particular line of sport which is

would be able to form teams in this particular line of sport which is becoming very popular. Under the present organization the volley ball game seems to loose its interest owing to the fact that there is no competition, therefore the game becomes dead after the first week or two. If such a league cannot be formed it would be advisable to eliminate the velleyball equipment and supply a football for the younger boys to kick around and thus work of some surplus onergy.

A very helpful side of the work was the classes in First Aid. Though a very few finished the course I think the work was very beneficial and should be continued in the future.

The athletic badges created some interestiduring the season, and I think were a very good thing to keep up the interest and activity, although some recognition should be made of the cripples and those not connected with the sport side of the playground.
might be possible to award some such thing to them for regular

attendance and industry shown during the season.

Rotary Park took a very active interest in the Annual Sport Day held at the Stadium, making a good showing for a practically new centre. Unfortunately, there is no track available or road long enough to prepare for these events. On the west side of the park a piece of land suitable for this purpose is not in use and couldn't be graded this winter would be very assiuloin future sport days.

On August 26th we held a picnic and sport day at Bowness h was a decided success. The business firms of the Park, which was a decided success. district were convessed and very kindly donnted prizes for the events, also refreshments. The transportation of the children presented a problem, but this was overcome by making a charge of ten cents, which covered car fare, two soft drinks and two ice cream cones. About 170 took this opportunity for a days outing and all enjoyed themselves.

This year the supervision was supplied for each side of the playground, namely boys and girls. The equipment was mixed by both using the same room, and at times this system used to clash.

I think it would be advisable to have one supervisor, a

man of outstanding character to take charge, even if it ment a little

extra cost on account of the additional work. Failing this it would be better to have a lady to supervise the girls side with the man having complete charge of the whole ground.

## Report of J. T. Wright, Victoria School Playground.

This year Victoria Playground was able to get away to a fine start because of a good attendance which lasted on the average all season in spite of children coming and going on their vacations. From 50 to 60 children attended in the afternoon and 100 to 110 in the evening. On an actual count 53 were under the age of 12; 37 between 12 to 18; and only 9 over 18. So on the whole the playground was

attended most by the smaller children.

Within two weeks five baseball teams were organized. They were the Senior, Intermediate, Junior, and Juvenile boys, and the Senior Girls. The Senior boys found it difficult to secure new material to replace those who were continually dropping out and soon disbanded: The other 4 however finished the season. The Juveniles were not very successful but the other three went as far as the finals and there it seemed luck was against them. The Intermediates lost the cup to Riverside; the Junior boys lost their to Riverside, and the Senior Girls lost to Riley Park. On the whole Victoria enjoyed

a very fine baseball year.

Basketball: Although three or four girls played basketball on the grounds no team was organized because they were recognized league players. However some fine games were played between the boys.

Volleyball: At the beginning of the year this game seemed to be scorned; but during August ten to twelve boys played every night and if a league had been formed some fine games could have been played with the other playgrounds.

Quoits and Horseshoes: During the hot days of July and August these two games were played in the shade every afternoon.

August these two games were played in the shade every afternoon; Generally the smaller boys favored the quoits and the older ones the horseshoes.

Games: The games played in the evening were one of the most popular events on the playground. Night after night 30 youngsters between the ages of 6 and 13 played dodgeball. Another game played with untiring frequency was "Beg". Other games which proved popular were "Red Light", "Run Sheep Run", "Pom Pom Pull Away", and "Farmers in the Dell".

Swimming: The Saturday swim for the boys and girls was very much appreciated by them and proved a splendid playground event. The attendance for the boys was regularily between 40 and 45, and the girls between 30 and 40. In the Gala Swim at the Crystal, Victoria was well represented and succeeded in winning 8 prizes.

Story Telling: Every Tuesday afternoon a dozen youngsters gathered around the story teller, a fifteen year old girl, to hear their weekly story. This event proved very entertaining and was appreciated by the younger children.

First Aid: When the first lecture on this subject was given some 25 enthusiastic boys and girls attended; but, later only 10 to 12 attended regularily. The only fault though, is that it was a fresh group of faces for each lecture, thus making it difficult to award certificates on such a basis. However, 6 will secure their certificates which is well worth the maintenance of this playground exert. At this point I feel that Mr. Exley should be complimented on his efforts by making First Aid so successful at Victoria.

## REPORTS OF PLAYGROUND SUPERVISORS (CONTID)

On August 30th a fine pienic was held at St. George's Island attended by some 200 children from Riverside, Tuxedo, St. George's, and Victoria Playgrounds, combined. Prizes were given at the races along with ice cream, drinks, and peanuts. The rain rather specified an otherwise fine event.

Field Day: Although Victoria entered 24 of the 34 events at the Sports day the returns were rather poor. Only 9 points were secured. But the training for this event gave to the children on the playground an opportunity to demonstrate their ability in athletics, resulting in fairly keen rivalry to represent Victoria

at the Sports Meet.

Efficiency Badges:

About 17 boys and girls tried to quality for the badge but only three were successful. Two reasons for this are:

(1) Many of them completed all the tests on the playground and then could not swim. (2) Because I failed to show them the type of badge they were to secure the incention with the incention. they were to secure, the incentive was lacking to try to pass all tests.

This event on the playground was the In dustrial Work: most successful of all. Nearly every day of the term about 20 boys and 20 girls came to the grounds to do sewing cards and reed and raffia work. When the cards gave out we made them and bought cotton. Very fine cards were done by children only 3 and 4 years old. The reed work done too was very successful. Among the pieces collected for the exhibit were 3 trays, 4 flower baskets, 1 wastepaper basket, 5 basket vases, 2 reed and raffia baskets, a raffia purse, and two raffia picture frames. The worse fault was that we were not able to supply the demands of the children. Only small baskets were made illustrating the simple in and out weave.

In conclusion I wish to state that the discipline and

conduct of the children on the grounds was excellent, and that we

had a very happy year.

Comments and suggestions for next year:-From a survey of the basket work of the playsrounds I find raffiz work too difficult for children and hence would suggest that all reed be bought instead of raffia.

2. I would recommend that a definite understanding be formed with regard to the elimination of entrants into the various athletic events sponsored by the playgrounds. To do this would recommend that at the first meeting the supervisors draw up a permanent constitution

covering all points arising in playground activities.

I would recommend that the efficiency badges be used as attendance badges, because they were looked upon by the majority, even the youngsters; as too cheap to be worth any effort.

## Report of W. C. Bell, Riverside Playground.

The following articles of equipment have been returned to the Parks Department: 5 Baseball bats, 1 baseball, 1 Basketball, 1 valleyball, 1 volleyball net, 2 jumping standards, 1 home plate, and 1 pail.

The shortages are accounted for as follows:- 2 bats were broken and discarded, 1 bat disappeared from the playground during a practice game, 4 baseballs were knocked to pieces by play and discarded, 1 was taken away by Victoria boys after a game, and one ball was stolen from the grounds.

The reed, raffia, sewing cards, and silkine were all used by the children during the two months of supervision.

This playground participated in the combined picnic with St. George's Island, Tuxedo Park, and Victoria, held at the Island on August 30th, when 307 children were given ice cream, soft drinks, candy, and peanuts, in addition to prizes for the various sport events.

With regard to baseball, the playground was successful in winning the Juvenile Boys championship from St. George's Island in two straight games. The Junior Boys eliminated the Victoria boys by winning the third game of their series, while the Intermediate Boys played three games with Victoria, the last one being called on account of darkness, and replayed at Victoria Park, when Riverside won a closely fought game in nine innings, giving us a total of three trophies. The Junior Girls Baseball Team were in the finals

and lost the third and deciding game to Killarney.

In connection with the Baseball and Basketball Leagues, may I offer the following suggestion for your consideration, that in addition to the cups which are presented each year to the winners, that are either kept in one of the schools or in the Parks Department office, that the individual players on each winning team be given a small bronze medal engraved "Calgary Parks Playgrounds Junior Champions" or whatever league they represent, and have crossed bats and a baseball in the centre. In the event that this would prove too costly to the city, I would suggest that the players be supplied with a badge similar to the efficiency badge which you now have on hand for distribution. This would give even more enthusiasm in these sports and make each one exert himself or herself to the utmost to remain on the team, and at the close of the year they would have something for themselves to remind them of the successful season just closed.

The plan followed this year in using both weight and ago in determining what class a player shall be placed, is to be heartily

endorsed as the season's play has shown in the evenness of the great majority of the games.

May I also suggest that another year if it is possible to supply equipment, that a football league also be included in the programme of inter-playground games. There is a decided leaning toward this sport in my district, and L learn from some of the other supervisors that they have found the same to apply in their respective districts.

In connection with Mr. Reader's suggestion with regard to hockey this winter, I will be pleased to give as much time as possible in encouraging this sport among the children,

## REPORTS OF PLAYGROUND SUPERVISORS (CONT'D)

In conversation with several other supervisors it was suggested that basketball be carried on during the winter months for the girls, and I am heartily in support of this suggestion. In concluding my report of the activities in my district,

I wish to state that the cooperation of the children themselves and the willingness with which they obeyed my instructions, should not go by unmentioned, and I have found it a pleasure to be among them this season.

#### Report of F. Barnes, Tuxedo Park.

I feel that the summer playground activities were a great success as far as the younger children were concerned. (By younger children I mean those of 12 to 14 and under) They did a great deal of industrial work and took an active part in games. The older ones came in few numbers however, and did not enter into any activities.

It was a very successful summer in so far as equipment and breakages were concerned. Practically all equipment was returned. There were no damages to the school or surrounding property, and no

accidents of any kind.

I would like to offer the following suggestions:That in the future the parks be let to no city or other league teams for use. This perhaps accounts for the little interest taken by the older ones in the park, when they were forced to give up their practise on this account many times a week.

If possible a rugby gall be provided for each park.

would be a great asset.

That the First Aid Classes be continued. Mr. Exley's work

this summer was very worthwhile I am sure.

4. That the playground Athletic Badge be made harder to attain-that the events be judged by city officials on an appointed day, and that a more worthwhile Badge be given.

That a little more interest be taken in the children between the ages of 6 to 12. I think this important. Perhaps a picnic could be held for them or something of that sort earlier in the summer.

In closing I might say that it was discouraging at Tuxedo Park to try to work up any enthusiasm among the Intermediates and Seniors. For example I had about twelve names for the Track Meet, but none of them participated in the events.

#### Report of F. G. Holland, St. George's Island Park.

In making my report regarding the St.George's Island Playground I would like to suggest that the Sports Day be confined to just those boys and girls that attend the playgrounds, also that all those children who have taken part in any Provincial and Dominion Meet be barred from entry into the events. This will give the boys and girls regularly attending the playgrounds a better chance. I would also like to see classes for races for children nine years and under. I should like to suggest that the Field Day be made an all day event and that the parents be encouraged to attend. To make this day event and that the parents be encouraged to attend. To make this possible it should be suggested that the children and their parents bring basket lunches.

## REPORTS OF PLAYGROUND SUPERVISORS (CONT'D)

This season individual Field Days were held by the Riverside, Tuxedo. Victoria, and St. George's Island Playgrounds at their respective playgrounds. I would suggest that these be held at the same time and place as the Annual Field Day.

For the purpose of the individual Field Days mentioned above, Messrs. Bell, Barnes, Wright, and myself were able to secure a donation of 480 bottles of soft drinks, 7 gals. of ice

cream, and 27 prizes.

I would like to say a word of commendation for the excellent first aid instruction given by Mr. Exley. I understand that this was a new venture this year. It met with marked success and should be continued.

The Swimming Gala was certainly a great success, but I would recommend that the same regulations that I suggested for the track and field events be applied to this event, namely, only that Club members should be excluded. I would further suggest that one of the qualifications of a Supervisor should be his ability to teach swimming.

#### ROTARY RECREATION GROUNDS

The borders were cultivated and 180 shrubs planted. Three tennis courts were made on this park.

## RINKS (CONTINUED)

The season was the shortest of mecord .-- December 14th 1933 to February 8th 1934.

A shelter has been erected at the Victoria Playground

Rink.

Rinks were flooded periodically at the several Separate Schools, the cost of this work being paid by the School Board.

The grading of the rink site at the Roxborough Community

Certre was completed, and a water service installed.

A hockey enclosure was provided for the Killarney Purk Rink.

The Westmount Boulevard Community Club project, which was abandoned by the Club, was taken over by this Department and the Rink is being operated this winter with a view to making sufficient revenue to wipe out the indebtedness incurred by the Thub, but awing to the fact that free use of the rink has been granted to the Westmount Hockey Club, this will be very difficult of accomplishment. A sas line was installed to the main dressing room and heating apparatus installed.

Greding was commenced on Eau Claire Avenue for the purpose

of establishing a rink site.
The Bow Valley Rink was enlarged.
A shelter has been erected at the Taxedo Park rink. A site 200 x120 on 26th Avenue and 2nd Struct S.E. was levelled, fenced, and flooded for hockey and skating purposes, and the rink maintained throughout the season at the request of the Parkview Athletic Association.

Similar work was done at the southeast corner of the intersection of 17th Avenue and Centre Street at the request of the Hebrew Young People's Society. Both sites are on land owned by the

City.

The shelter on rink at 20th Avenue and 20th Street West, which was badly burnt, has been rebuilt.

A hockey rink 185 by 85 feet, was constructed at Valleyfield, and flood lights furnished. A shelter was also erected in

which skaters could change and check their clothing.

The shelter that was originally erected for the convenience of children near the swimming pool at Millican Park, was by request of the residents of the neighbourhood, moved up the hill to the rink site where it has proved very useful as a checking and warming room for skaters and hockey players. The rink site was enlarged to 180 by 80 feet. This rink has afforded an immense amount of pleasure

to the residents during the past winter.

The rink site at South Calgary was cleaned and levelled.

Areas on either side of 24th Avenue West between 1st and

2nd Street were graded.

Very much improved accommodation was provided for the hockey players at Hillhurst Park rink by providing and heating special dressing rooms for the teams.

#### BOULE VARDS

All boulevards were cut three times during the scason; the first cutting commenced on June 12th. This was not nearly frequent enough to keep them in tidy condition. They should at least have been cut once in every two weeks. The reason that this was not done was not because labor was not available, but due to a shortage of machines.

All trees were cultivated once, and those newly planted staked and watered as frequently as possible, though not as often All street trees and shrubs were pruned during as was desirable.

the winter months.

One hundred and forty-eight trees were severely headed back at the request of the Electric Light and Provincial Telephone

Departments, and the Calgary Power Company, respectively.

A large number of trees were removed for the following

causes; -- sewer trouble, heaving of pavements, injury to private lawns and gardens, and too dense shading of buildings.

The sod on the boulevards on 12th Street, Hillhurst, between 5th and 8th Streets (adjoining Riley Park) was removed. the surface dug and the wnole space planted thickly with trees and shrubs.

The work of lowering boulevards that were above the grade of the sidewalks was continued, the following locations receiving attention:-

A very bad condition that existed at the junction of Salem Avonue and Summit Street, where sand from a cut was being drifted over lawns and gardens in the neighbourhood by every wind storm, was remedied by giving the cut a reasonable slope and covering it with mulch, 102 cu. yards of dirt being removed.

## MEMORIAL DRIVE

Considerable work was done on all sections of this driveway, but particularly the Sunnyside Section. The whole of this section was ploughed, harrowed, all large stones removed. 300 c 300 cu. yards of fertilizer spread, considerable grading done where surface inequalities existed, 10 flower bods prepared and planted, and new water service installed. The material for these improvements was

provided by the residents on the boulevard.

The river bank from 42 Street West to Centre Street Bridge was cleaned up and weeds and refuse of all kinds removed.

The sod was dug in amongst the trees and shrubs previously planted on the section between Centre Street and Langevin Bridges, so that the whole surface can now be kept cultivated and will benefit accordingly.

## MEMORIAL DRIVE (CONTINUED)

The grass on the Bridgeland Section was kept in as good condition as possible, but great difficulty is experienced here, both as regards grass and trees in a dry season because of inadequate water supply.

The twelve groups of trees and shrubs provided by the Kiwanis Club and planted east of St. George's Island Bridge were kept regularly watered and cultivated and are now well established

and thriving.
The improvement of this area has demonstrated to our citizens the value of our river banks as a community asset, when properly improved, and has created considerable interest and enthusiasm for this phase of city beautification.

In this connection I would again like to call attention to the possibilities of beautification there are on the slope along the north bank of the Bow River. So much could be done here with the abundance of relief labor that is available at the present time, and the only thing necessary to make the work a success is an adequate water supply, which could be provided by the installation of a service line along the brow of the hill.

#### CEMETERIES

### UNION CEMETERY:

The gate post and turnstile on 2nd Street East at Section P was moved to line up with new fence; the grade of road

was raised; 60 feet of rock channel built at this point, and 200 square yards of gravel 6 inches deep spread.

A new fence, 1,140 feet in length, has been erected from the nursery to a point at Section R, Block LA, changing the boundary line on plan.

375 square yards of gravel 4 inches deep was spread on road at Section M, Block 1, and at vault.

All roads were scarified and large rocks hauled away.

128 square yards of gravel was spread on road at Section

M and G, 4 inches deep.

Pot holes in roads were filled during season with fine gravel.

1,080 square yards of fine gravel three inches deep was spread on sidewalk from Cemetery entrance as far as wood curb had

been laid.
All roads and channels were kept free of weeds, raked, and water courses kept clear.

A new culvert was put in at Section & at the last entrance to replace old one which had caved in.

Eight culverts on the east side of road are getting in bad condition and need replacing.

Trees and shrubs were planted from south end at Section X to north end, all tree borders on boulevards were forked over and trees and shrubs watered, the fire hose being used for this on two occasions. Much watering was done during the evenings with smaller hose.

### CEMETERIES (CONTINUED)

UNION CEMETERY (Continued)

Twenty-six new tree and shrub beds were planted on west Replacements were made on tree borders and beds, and all slope. vacant spots filled in with shrubs.

All trees and shrubs were pruned in borders, beds, and on

private plots.

The pipes for irregation placed on the steeply sloping borders in 1932 were filled with water at intervals, and proved a great help\_during the season.

Trees and shrubs on private plots were edged round and

cultivated.

The tree bed at Section G. Block 23, was enlarged and tree holes dug for spring planting.

A new flower bed was prepared and planted with Petunia on the main drive at Section F, Block 1. new flower bed has been prepared for spring planting on the west side of vault.

The grass border on the east side of cemetery was lined up, edged off, and surplus turf used for repairing bad spots on maintenance plots.

Seven plots were loamed and seeded. Six hundred and thirty-three sunken graves were filled in and re-seeded.

Fifty-eight graves were re-turfed.

The whole of Section M has been levelled off, manure spread in readiness for topdressing with loam and seed.

Manure was spread over the whole of Sections G,A,F,R,X,P, and N, and raked in to stimulate the grass.

All flower beds on plots for which maintenance was provided were planted, watered, and cultivated during the season.

Flags were placed on all Veterans' graves for the Decoration Day Ceremonies. The Cemeteries were looking particularly well at that time and were very favorably commented on by the many visitors.

The interior of the cottage was decorated and a room set aside, and office fixtures built for the purpose of keeping records. Electric light and gas was installed. A doorway was cut through the wall of basement, this providing a full sized basement which will provide space that was badly needed for the storage of come tery equipment.

The interior of the vault was decorated, a large mat laid on floor from doorway to where lowering device is set up, and six new seats were made.

Two rustic seats were put at entrance to Section P. and two at the main entrance.

Payment has been made by the Royal North West Mounted Police Authorities for the improvement of the plot belonging to the Force and this work will be undertaken early in the year.

### CEMETERIES (CONTINUED)

BURNSLAND CEMETERY:

Finely screened gravel was spread on driveway from Section F, Block 1, to Section H, Block 8, 1,080 square yards, 4 inches deep used.

Driveway at Sections D and A were resurfaced, 75 square

yards, 6 inches deep used.

All roads were scarified and large rocks removed.

Beds All trees and shrubs in beds and borders were pruned. and borders forked over in spring, and cultivated and watered during Replacements were made where required.

All trees and shrubs on plots for which maintenance was

paid were pruned, and the plots edged and cultivated.

New grass borders were made at Section P and G, east side,

2,880 square feet,

The boulevard extending north from the main entrance past the Chinese Market Garden was graded and planted with trees and shrubs, making a very desirable improvement.

Fifty-one graves were returfed.

Three hundred and forty-five plots were loamed and seeded. Three hundred and fourteen sunken graves were filled and re-seeded.

7.326 square feet of new grassways were made.
3,240 square feet of land was dug and prepared for seeding. New blocks of plots laid out were as follows, -- Section H, l block; Section K, l block; and Section F; 3 blocks.

New flower beds were cut out in Section C and poppies

planted.

A new flower bed was cut out, trenched, and Coltness

Hybrid Dahlias planted on Section A.

The land at lower end of Section H, being much below grade, the loam was first removed over an area of 8,100 square feet, filled to a depth of 2 feet with subsoil, and the loam returned to the surface.

New section signs were placed on all sections. All graves on Section F, Blocks 4,5, and 6, were levelled

off and refuse cleaned away.

A new gate was placed at the south entrance. This proved a great convenience during winter months, funerals for Burnsland using this entrance almost exclusively.

New regulations were adopted by the Trustees of the Field of Honour, and these were approved by the Department.

The area from which gravel had been removed was filled

with surplus earth, dug, and heavily fertilized to a depth of two feet, graded and made ready for planting. The area thus reclaimed is 3,286 square yards.

One hundred and eight cubit yards of sod was stacked for

future uso.

#### GENERAL:

The work of opening up the roads after heavy snow storms during the winter season received considerable attention, and only on one occasion was any difficulty experienced by funerals, that particular occasion being during a very bad blizzard. This has been accomplished by having the entire labour force immediately available at the time of a storm.



#### BURNSLAND GRAVEL PIT

Loam was stripped from the surface and a new pit opened at the south end. This loam was used in the cemeteries during the season.

Gravel was screened, loaded, and sent to the following locations for the construction and resurfacing of roads and paths:-

#### NURSERIES

The stock used from the Nurseries for permanent planting consisted of 1,538 trees, 9,666 shrubs, 12 vines, 41,087 perennials, and 755 bulbs, distributed as shown on pages 3 and 6.

15,484 trees and shrub cuttings were made and planted.
1,360 perennial flowering plants were propagated by division.
13,063 perennial flowering plants were raised from seed. 5,344 trees and shrubs were raised from seed.

2,741 shrubs were transplanted.

Considerable quantities of seed of perennial flowering plants, trees, and shrubs were exchanged with other nurseries and owners of private gardens.

50,000, 24year old Caragana plants were received from the Alberta Government Forestry Department free of cost, except for express charges.

304 lineal feet of Frost wire Fencing was erected on the north and west sides of the Nursery.

The duties of these men were to see that children did not enter the river for bathing at dangerous points, (notices were also posted warning bathers not to enter the river at these dangerous points), to render first aid when necessary, to see that bathers were properly clothed, and to prevent the lighting of fires on the river banks where growth of any kind would be destroyed: In certain suitable locations these patrolmen were also used as swimming instructors. Notwithstanding all these precautions there was one drowning fatality in the Bow

The Cemetery was regularly patrolled for the purpose of preventing stealing of ribbons, flowers, and plants, from graves, and to prevent damage by careless driving of automobiles.

St. George's Island Park was patrolled mainly for the purpose of checking automobiles with regard to infractions of bylaws.

The two areas where the greatest vandalism has been perpetrated during the past season are, -- the Rotary Recreation Grounds, where the playground apparatus has been wantonly damaged, and at S.Mt.Royal Park, where considerable damage has been done to trees, shrubs, and park equipment.

A number of people were warned with regard to private hedges

encroaching on sidewalks.

Some trouble was experienced with regard to the picking of flowers in the parks.

Quite a number of warnings had to be issued to persons placing refuse on the boulevards.

On July 2nd a certain organization held a picnic at St. George's Island in which ice cream and soft drinks were sold. This organization was prosecuted under Section 30 of Bylaw 1517.

### GENERAL

During the early springtime a survey of the whole city was made at the request of the Relief Committee, and all vacant city owned lands in plots of one acre or more in extent listed; advice was given as to their suitability for cultivation and whether water was available. Estimates of cost of breaking unbroken land, seed, tools, etc. were also furnished; this in connection with the vegetable growing scheme that was launched as a self help project by the unemployed.

### GENERAL (CONTINUED)

Having prepared and submitted this data, the scheme was then taken over by committees of the unemployed themselves.

The Calgary Horticultural Society endeavoured to have certain suggestions with regard to the enclosing of boulevards and planting of hedges on streets put into effect. So far, no definite action has been taken with regard to these suggestions.

The Bow Walley Ratepayer's Association having withdrawn their application to leage a portion of the Westmount Boulevard, this Department took over the control of this area, together with the improvements made thereon by the Association.

Permission was granted to Calgary Council Workers'

Sports to develope athletic grounds on Bow Bend Park at their own

expense, but no work was done by them.

The lease of the City Greenhouses was again granted to Mr. W. Stark, this time for a period of five years, he undertaking to make much needed repairs and improvements at his own expense.

Trees were pruned on all School Grounds for the Public


