



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1.1 Guiding Principles




- Collective Vision: Build a more welcoming and inclusive Calgary

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3.1. Children & Youth of Immigrant Families: Research

- In 2011: 47% of children and 43% of youth were a part of an immigrant family
- 1 in 4 public school students are learning English as an Additional Language
- In 2005: Children of newcomer families had a 42% lowincome

Children and Youth represent the future of our City



3.1. Children & Youth of Immigrant Families: Strategies & Potential Actions

Strengthen or build community resources to support families

• Develop and support place-based initiatives such as community hubs

Coordinate and create awareness of community services.

• Map current resources



3.1. Children & Youth of Immigrant Families: Strategies & Potential Actions (Cont.)

Strengthen the Cultural Competency of Services and Systems

• Strengthen access to translation and interpretation services across systems

Support English Language Learning

• Promote linguistic diversity and multilingual resources



3.2. Social and Civic Participation: Research

- 75% of newcomers access integration support through their informal systems
- Newcomers are least likely to participate in neighborhood/community associations
- Experiences of racism and discrimination increase the longer one lives in Canada



3.2. Social and Civic Participation: Strategies & Potential Actions

Increase cultural and social resources across communities in Calgary

- Promote place-based and neighborhood-based services
- Engage seniors as leaders and mentors

Promote the strengths and contributions of a diverse Calgary

 Support public education campaigns and opportunities for cultural exchange



3.2. Social and Civic Participation: Strategies & Potential Actions (cont.)

Support multi-cultural events and initiatives celebrating diversity

• Increase visibility of diverse cultures in public celebrations

Support participation in civic and political decisionmaking

• Disseminate multilingual information about civic and political rights



3.3. Economic Well-being: Research

- Immigrants are more highly educated than Canadian-born workers
- The higher the education the more likely an immigrant is underemployed and underpaid





3.3. Economic Well-being: Strategies & Potential Actions

Support coordination to match skills to labor needs

- Develop common intake for employment assessment
- Increase awareness and recognition of transferable skills

Encourage entrepreneurship & support for immigrant owned businesses

• Work with financial institutions to encourage immigrant owned businesses



3.3. Economic Well-being: Strategies & Potential Actions (cont.)

Enhance economic well-being for newcomers and immigrants

- Develop and promote job and career fairs
- Strengthen networking and mentorship opportunities

Increase diverse forms of employment and develop policies

Connect employers with immigrant-serving agencies
and cultural resources
