Question 3

If none of the concepts caught your interest, why or why not? What in particular do you like/not like about the concepts presented?

- The proposed green burial is not green. I don't think it will be used.
- In general, the cemetery should also focus on security/ controlled access and not just on easy public access in order to prevent vandalism.
- After all the plots that form this property are privately owned. There should be a fine balance between restricted use and overly used.
- Adequate 24 hour lighting should be provided throughout in order to deter vandalism
- I particularly like the cremation gardens although as yet have not found the difference between formal and informal. My own personal wish is for a Garden of Remembrance, a rock garden with perennial plants, no inscriptions on the rocks, some park benches. My grandparent's ashes were scattered in such a garden in England 60 years ago. People are very transient these days, not everyone wants to visit a grave on a regular basis.(I also realize some do)Missing for me is any area for ethnic minorities who may have special requirements
- I was in Mexico, and they had gone to a cemetery at Xcaret Park, which was very clever. I've included the description, take it for what it is, the structure is brilliant, it saves space too... and there could be multiple. "This unique architectural work has a special significance that simulates a hill with seven levels, referring to the days of the week. On the outside you can find 365 graves that symbolize each day of the year, and finally at the main entrance is a staircase with 52 steps representing the weeks. Additionally, its spiral shape refers to a conch shell, as used in ancient times to communicate with the gods through their breath, the wind." I cannot attach a picture however but I think this is a very valuable resource.
- I would like to see more trees. The newer part of Queens Park Cemetery look very harsh with the lack of trees
- I like the walking paths in #1, but there would not need to be so much room between the path and the graves. #3 has too much planted buffer area there is plenty of 'wild' green area around the cemetery; don't need to lose space inside the grounds.
- Should develop more cremation plots than burial sites. Too much land used for burials!
- Cemeteries are a huge waste of land and resource. The idea that a person needs to take up land when they are dead is ridiculous and selfish. The City should be encouraging people to be cremated instead.
- Although I appreciate your acknowledgement of the prairie spaces, I think of standing out on the bald prairie and how unprotected, hot and windy it can be. One of the things I appreciate in a cemetery are shade trees that protect visitors, not ornamental trees lining the road/path way.
- Ensure primary focus is cemetery -- 'green' approach should not take over prime purpose. Related to that, City of Calgary needs to ask why it is even continuing in this "business" which is now well served by the private sector and faith communities.
- Concept 3 seems more of a 'hodgepodge'.
- It doesn't matter. As long as there is enough room to be buried.
- You seem to capture all the right things the only difference is aesthetics.
- Like the idea of celebration site, framing of mountains, etc.
- It seems that in the future land will be scarce and we should be using it for other uses like growing food.
- I like the radial concept.
- Of the concepts presented, only the looped concept allowed for traditional east-west alignment of gravesites. I would prefer that graves be aligned in this fashion where possible. The customs surrounding death and burial are often very influenced by customs, tradition and religion, and accordingly cemetery design should reflect this.

- This space presents a blank slate a huge opportunity to create something special and unique with a small scaled space. It should connect to RKP.
- All concepts similar, but preferred the overall characteristics of Concept 1: Radial
- I like that it incorporates all of the different options for burial/cremation in the one design, including the green burial areas. I also really like the treed roadway on all of the plans.
- I like the variety of spaces provided.
- Personally I do not want any green burials ... I don't think they belong in our society. It may be okay in another country and it is probably cheaper to wrap a body in cloth and put him in the soil but the concept is not pleasant to me. I want the whole cemetery to be 'pleasant'.
- I don't like the green cemetery. It looks un kept and I worry about the contamination of decomposing people into the wetland. (Even though you can't see it.)
- I like the diverse concepts--especially the more natural settings (really like that concept) and also the spaces for urns--also like the multi-use concept for the park
- I like the loop and it seemed to have variation and flow.
- Concept 1 was good, but seemed too formal, rigid and in-organic. Option 2 was way too structured, especially for being situated right next to a wetland. The heavily tree-lined roads of 1 and 2 will block the long sunrises and sunsets of Alberta and cut short the views in the cemetery.
- the looped design looks more accessible
- Difficult to see ultimate concept without a shadow plan of final development.
- To better understand the ultimate development a shadow plan of all lands is needed.
- Concepts 1 and 3 promote green burials beside the wetlands. How does this NOT contaminate the water sources and water tables for the folks living south of this site?
- Well structured
- Didn't like looped as it seems there is too many road ways within the cemetery.
- Not sure if the city owns all the land on all sides of the cemetery, I don't think so; so my point is, why
 not buy the landowners out so you aren't land locking them, making the land unusable. The City
 needs to stop being bullies to the little people! Buying the land would be a drop in the bucket for
 The City, and a huge relief for the landowners being isolated...I'm sure they aren't even being heard
 in this situation because they are ONE owner who doesn't have the funds to protect themselves (i.e.
 a developer).
- I am not Japanese however; I have seen many Japanese gardens. If I may suggest incorporating this style of design as it represents, peace, calm, tranquility, and most of all natural beauty which provokes people to reflect, watch, listen and learn. Adding rock gardens for color to brighten up the constant green would be nice. If this space is to be multi-functional, ensure the areas are functional. Meaning use nature for seating and tables and provide shaded areas for those people who cannot be in heat for extended periods. Functional areas need: wash-up area, washrooms, sinks disposals, phone for emergency, first aid, seating, tables and access to/from them.
- None of these concepts include parking. Due to the large size of the cemetery, it may be important to have two parking lots, one at either north or south end of the property.
- I would like to see some terracing, and potentially areas that have large head stones like they have in Paris.

Best of luck to the Parks team on figuring out how to best reflect these practices. In my view, however, the concept of a proper burial in a cemetery is fairly traditional, and I expect that individuals for whom this is not very important would likely not hold preferences to the same extent. I feel that a religious building, e.g. a multi-faith chapel, is an integral component of a cemetery and would want to see one included.
- This is a limited sized space for long term cemetery requirements. We need to be thinking of other sites as well or another Queen's Park sized site. We need to take a more holistic approach across the city rather than just focusing on this one site.
- I like the opportunity for green burial, as I would like to leave as little impact as possible.
- All designs appear very respectful of the natural areas surrounding the cemetery, which will provide a peaceful resting place for loved ones.
