2013 & 2014 Business Plans and Budget Adjustments Engagement Phase 1 - June 2012

Executive Summary

On 2011 November 29, Council approved the 2012-2014 business plans and budgets. This was accomplished thanks to over 23,000 Calgarians who took the opportunity to learn more about The City's plans, how we use our revenues and thoughtfully shared with us their ideas on what priorities we should consider from 2012 to 2014.

To honour The City's commitment to Calgarians, we created a micro site, calgary.ca/ourfuture, to enable The City to continue its conversation with Calgarians. The site was launched on June 12, 2012, and contained information and links designed to give Calgarians information regarding the approved 2012 – 2014 business plans and budgets so they could become more informed on what The City is focusing its efforts towards, how we are spending tax and capital dollars and to give them a forum to talk directly with The City and each other.

The priority for citizen engagement at this time was to discover if Calgarians' priorities had changed since Council deliberation in 2011, if outside events had changed or shifted (e.g.. economic conditions) from their perspective, and if The City was doing a good job in meeting the expectations laid out in the 2012 – 2014 business plans and budgets.

Information presented in this report was gathered from an online survey that ran from 2012 June 12-30, along with comment boxes that are available on every page of the micro site. Web metrics for the time the site has been active are also supplied in this report, along with the link to the citizen engagement completed as part of the 2012-2014 business planning and budgeting program.

Citizens and City employees were made aware of this micro site, and the opportunity to continue our conversation through multiple means. The City used the citynews blog, facebook, twitter, Google ads, calgary.ca ads and digital displays to reach Calgarians as well as internal use of myCity and partnership with community groups to share the site with their audiences. Digital mediums were used to continue the conversation following the recommendations made through the 2012 – 2014 Business Planning and Budgeting report.

Our commitment to citizens through the entire 2013 & 2014 Adjustments period is to:

- Reflect a strong focus on <u>transforming government</u>, including transparency, accountability and engagement as reflected in Council's Fiscal Plan for Calgary.
- Ensure that the transformational approach to engaging citizens that began as part of *Our City. Our Budget. Our Future.* is continued.
- Focus on what has changed over the past several months rather than a re-opening of the discussion about the approved 2012-2014 business plans and budgets.

Survey Results

Over 2800 people visited the micro site while the survey was open, the majority from direct traffic to calgary.ca/ourfuture. We also have a mobile app for this site, through which 488 citizens visited. 232 respondents completed the survey, many providing clear and specific comments. Highlights of the survey results are:

- Slightly more than three-quarters of respondents feel The City is doing a good job of providing the services it said it would provide in the 2012 - 2014 Business Plans and Budget.
- Respondents who do not think The City is doing a good job of providing the services reported that The City could improve in this area by not over-spending and/or improperly spending money, providing more funding/support to CPS, Fire and EMS, and improving Transportation planning.
- Two-thirds of respondents reported that since the 2012 2014 Business Plans and Budget were approved last November, nothing changed or shifted that The City should consider for the adjustments process and in their priorities.
- Among the respondents, the most preferred way of informing them is via the "Our City.
 Our Budget. Our Future." website. The City of Calgary's Calgary City News Blog
 www.calgarycitynews.com) is the second most preferred medium.

Many respondents provided comments on what has potentially changed or shifted since Council deliberations in 2011 along with their ideas on what priorities The City should focus on. Those unaltered responses are in Appendix A of the survey results report, and are sorted into categories of general, specific departmental comments, and employees. Generally, respondents commented about such external factors as the new Provincial government, recreation centre funding, a Calgary economy that is heating up, and that additional services will be need for the influx of people moving to Calgary for work.

How The City will use the 2013 & 2014 Adjustments Engagement results

The information contained in this report is being provided to citizens via the calgary.ca/ourfuture micro site. It is also being sent to the Mayor and members of Council, the City of Calgary City Manager and General Managers, and is also being placed on myCity for internal use by business planners, departmental adjustments process leads, and all City of Calgary staff who are part of the adjustments process or simply interested in the results and go forwards of this engagement.

This information is being provided at this time so that it can inform any adjustments being proposed by the departments of The City of Calgary. The City will report back to citizens on how the information gathered as part of this engagement process informed and was utilized when making their adjustments recommendations, and if the information gathered was not able to inform the process that will be shared as well.

Phase II and Phase III Adjustments Engagement

Communication and engagement plans are being developed for Phase II and Phase III of the Adjustments engagement process, and will be fully completed over the summer of 2012. Analysis of the engagement information, web trends and metrics, comments and feedback will be done to aid in the development of further engagement.

The proposed adjustments and explanations will be posted on calgary.ca/ourfuture in 2012 November in a manner similar to what was used during BPBC3. Comment boxes on the site will remain active and monitored, and we will work to provide stronger links and information to financial and project information. We will also conduct another survey in November to be used to give Calgary City Council further information from Calgarians on the proposed adjustment recommendations that may help Council inform their decision during deliberations.

During Phase II, multiple marketing tactics will again be used to invite Calgarians to participate in the process, along with a Report to Calgarians, traditional media, social media and further interaction with community groups.

Once Council deliberations are complete, we will post to calgary.ca/ourfuture the 2013 – 2014 Approved Adjustments to complete Phase III.

Introduction


In preparation for the 2013 & 2014 Business Plans and Budget Adjustments process, the Chief Financial Officer's Department (CFOD) conducted an online survey from June 12 until June 30, 2012. The survey was conducted using the online survey tool, *FluidSurveys*, with a link being posted on a City website dedicated to the topic of the 2013 & 2014 Business Plans and Budget Adjustments process. The survey was open to anyone, including both citizens and City employees, interested in participating.

As a result of the "open link" survey methodology used (as opposed to a random sample methodology), the survey results are not representative of the Calgary population nor are they representative of any population subgroups. The results are indicative only of the respondents who chose to complete the online survey.

Results









Q4a. Would you like The City to inform you about the upcoming 2013 & 2014 Business Plans and Budget Adjustments in November? (asked of all 232 respondents)






Q5a. Would you like to continue to provide The City with your comments and feedback on the proposed budget adjustments? (asked of all 232 respondents)





Demographics


In which quadrant of The City do you reside?

Q3b. What has changed or shifted and why? Please be as specific as possible.

General

"New provincial government - implications on provincial direction re: municipalities growth pressures beginning to grow in Alberta again - low unemployment, more construction, rising housing prices, etc."

"- addition of curb side pickup of compost.- there's been no use of zero-balance budgeting.- we should not be landscaping St. Patrick's Island, as it is outside of the TIFF zone."

"Since I originally filled out the survey, I have gained a great appreciation for The City's system of parks and pathways. In my opinion, further money should be provided to:1) Create sufficient links for an uninterrupted pathway from the far end of Bowness Park in the Northwest to downtown Calgary. Right now, there is a missing link through Shouldice Athletic Park (where I understand there is a proposed pathway) and a missing link parallel to 52nd Street NW between Home Road and Bowness Road, NW - an area that would be perfect for a barriered bike lane.2) Similarly, the gaps in the Southwest network between the Glenmore Reservoir and Downtown should be filled, though I confess that I am not familiar enough with that network to give a complete list.3) Further resources should be put into patrolling, maintaining, and clearing snow on the regional pathways. In particular, problems exist with bicyclists riding far in excess of the speed limit. East of Downtown and in the evenings, portions of the pathway become unfriendly, as they are too often utilized by drunken vagrants. I believe that people should be able to feel as safe on the pathways as they do in their own cars.4) I would also recommend maintenance work be performed on the Douglas Fir Trail."

"Roads maintenance, street lighting, and public artworks could benefit from better funding and/or assessment."

"The City should be mindful of larger economic forces. The City is not an island that is immune to other events happening in the global economy and financial markets."

"Stronger provincial government leadership with a different attitude and set of priorities; may be better or not. Electricity, natural gas futures and regulations. European financial/political crisis unresolved and deepening."

"There's new areas to live in and I don't see supporting services getting to them. I'm in Sagehill."

- "1. The ballooning cost of the West Leg LRT.2. The potential for a rapidly expanding economy in Alberta / Calgary (oil sands development, US softening on Keystone pipeline position) in the near future coupled with the potential for the European economic crisis to have significant downward pressure on the price of oil.3. Changes to Employment Insurance that might increase interprovincial migration to Alberta."
- "1) A new Premier and new government, may make certain funding assumptions more risky.2) Oil and gas jobs seem to be coming back. Were the growth forecasts accurate?"

"Police budget..always the same thing every time its negotiation time...stall tactics."

"Let's make sure Enmax gets ride of all above ground wires in a underground area let Woodbine. Why we have paid extra taxes for 25 years."

"Service needs. Population growth."

"Something on future planning on a new stadium or venue."

"The public art mish mash. Waffling about LRT parking fees. Increasingly regular C-train breakdowns that backup service everywhere."

"World economy has shifted, this dominos down to everyone placing more pressure on those already considered at risk and furthers limits them from participating at any sort of level in this city."

Corporate Administration

"I don't think that the allocations for certain infrastructure allocations are accurate. I also do not think that the city manager has accounted for where the funding is going."

"Things are just getting to expensive for the average family, we need to control all costs and spending. Artwork, bridges etc. should come second to ensuring Calgarians can afford to remain Calgarians."

"Property taxes - way too much!"

"Lack of funding from federal and provincial govt. _ policing, leisure centres, etc."

"Cost overruns."

"The price of crude oil has dropped off and natural gas futures are not looking good either. In a resource dependent province we have to keep our eyes open and realize that the money Calgary receives from the federal and provincial government may be on the decline in the near future."

"Stop the hidden taxes like local access fee on an enmax bill."

"Increased funding is required for the relief of the increasingly strained Finance/Financial Services Department. Constantly increasing heavy workloads, including the lack of vacation coverage, are reducing the quality and timeliness of completing financial and managerial reports. In some cases, important tasks and/or reports are not being completed due to limited human resources and/or budget resources. This consequently reduces an operational business unit's efficiency and its capability to achieve optimal performance."

Community Services & Protective Services

"Need more money for parks. Parks are essential to the quality of life in Calgary. But the parks and service levels are starting to deteriorate."

"When the city approved the budget they spent more money on cutting the grass then all of the fcss spending."

"Need to find funds to keep our park infrastructure vibrant and maintained."

"Less focus on social programs.... programs for families and working Calgarians!!! And less for the lazy who just want hand outs."

"Please keep our city clean, as a good neighbour we all clean up our yards and take care of our weeds. A look at the city property and the city is a poor neighbour - wait till this years weed seeds over run us next year."

"The city has never looked worse than it does now. There are so many weeds it is embarrassing."

"I believe that having mandatory spending on art as part of new development projects, is an unreasonable waste of tax payers dollars. Any spending on art should have to be passed by vote in city council, on a case by case basis."

"Rec centers are important but I think we are starting to spend a disproportionate amount of money on them."

"I would like to see a little bit more emphasis on diversity - both internally within the City of Calgary employee base and externally in terms of supporting our diverse communities. The reason is that as the largest local employer and a public serving organization, we need to demonstrate accountability in serving all Calgarians, regardless of their income levels, geography, learning styles, physical or mental ability, age, gender, religion, race, colour or ethnicity. I know the City is doing a great job on the community side, but it needs to be written down and highlighted more often for all Calgarians to see and to support. We also need to be more proactive in attracting and retaining a talented diverse workforce if we want Calgary to be a magnet for talent."

"I was not aware that we spend so much on the arts, namely painting of utility boxes and downtown artwork. I feel this is frivolous spending in these times when there are other areas that are in need of more funding."

"Recreation centers in the south and the SE leg of the LRT needs to be expedited in order to minimize the traffic congestion on Deerfoot and other feeders."

"The loss of P3 funding for our new Rec centers was a major Blow to the City and we are extremely short of space for Recreational Activities already, and in our ever growing city this shortage is only going to get worse before it gets better. I believe this lack of Recreational Facilities needs to be addressed sooner rather than later."

"Less citizen facing projects were included. We need community services."

"The amount of cyclist on the roads this year has increased dramatically from last year, and safety is becoming a big issue. More funds need to be allocated to address this in a quick manner."

Emergency Services (Calgary Police Services, Calgary Fire Department, EMS)

"The Calgary Police Service has squandered the massive budget increase they were given (example: using a police helicopter to track a pair of shoplifters across the city), demonstrating that it was unnecessary. Transfer some or all of it to the chronically-underfunded transit system."

"Security on LRT and parks as well as policing - more and more incidents most likely due to the lack of security officers on the street. I hear that the police are without a contract and have been for over a year."

"I fully support the excellent work being conducted by CPS."

"City growth - need more police and fire staff."

"The projected growth factor of the population and housing projects should raise the importance of emergency services in terms of addressing response times and adequate resources/deployment."

"I think that the City has to ensure it continues to support the Police Service so that it continues to be a safe city. This includes the HAWC helicopter program as it has proven itself in it's worth."

"More money for police, it is needed."

"Money has been taken from Police training budgets. Training is important in different investigative techniques so as to keep up to date with current best practice."

"More people, more crime, more drugs, more fights, more drunks, more intolerance and the courts are doing a lousy job. Need a bigger jail and need to go back to locking people up."

"The police budget should not be continued to be cut and drained. This causes stress on a resource that is important to public safety."

"I am concerned that the Mayor keeps questioning the way the Police run. There is a reason for the Police Commission and that is to keep the elected officials from getting too involved - or interfering."

"Maintain a focus on the police budget ensuring a safe and secure city."

"Increase emergency services budget."

"Find people that want to be a cop & are prepared to do the job that they swore an oath to and get rid of the dead wood that are just waiting around for a tax payer pension."

Planning, Development & Assessment

"There seems to be some trouble in the assessment office. Seems the staff are either unhappy, or something is going on, always getting bounced around."

"The hiring of the new City Planner will change how we look at population density."

"Fire everyone in the planning department and start again with new hires. We hear from contractors and trades people ALL THE TIME that permits and small developments are murderous in terms of red tape and craziness at City Hall. The bylaws need to be overhauled and clarified. If the food trucks can be figured out by [one person] single handedly while all previous efforts were mangled and denied due to fiefdom stupidnesses, perhaps you need to start again. Get rid of the people whose role has been to impede improvements and citizen engagement/participation and let's get on with things. I want to put a bike shelter in my front yard but can't for some stupid bylaw reason - please, fire everyone there and start again."

Transportation

"Calgary economy has heated up which will cause demand for transit to increase."

"We should not spend the un used snow budget on other areas when there is not a lot of snow. Overtime hours add up fast when the snow crews work. What is not used in each year or each area of the budget should be carried over to next year in case is worse."

"A lot of the population lives in suburbs, transit is absolutely horrific in many areas - this NEEDS to be a priority if the city wants to reduce the amount of people driving."

"The provincial talks on roads such as Deerfoot, if they are handed back to the city has this been factored into the budget process."

"It seems people are wanting a healthier lifestyle and more people appear to be cycling to work. You have made great strides in the bike pathways (pathways alongside deerfoot enhanced - thanks). Need more in the north and going east - west. Cuts down on vehicle traffic and improves health general population at the same time."

"The west leg of the LRT is poorly designed. The city also needs to have a west east leg of the LRT that does not cut through the downtown core."

"The west leg of the LRT is poorly designed. The city also needs to have a west east leg of the LRT that does not cut through the downtown core. The status of the SW Ring road."

"Transit use is climbing at rates greater than I believe the city has anticipated. This is a very good thing, but the city needs to dedicate greater funds to Calgary Transit for more transit hours and to speed up planned upgrades to transit infrastructure."

"South west ring road delays."

"The "tunnel" at the airport in the NE is costing us too much. We should be spending that money on increased transit options ... c-train lines, putting the 25th ave and Macleod train below ground, getting green carts going faster (how embarrassing that we're so far behind) or any of a number of significantly more worthy initiatives ..."

"why SPEND MORE MONEY ON SNOW REMOVAL? HEY DUMMY YOU LIVE IN CANADA AND CALGARY TO BOOT, WHICH IS CLOSE TO MOUNTAINS...MORE SNOW! THE CITY WAS JUST FINE FOR THE LAST 30 YEARS AND NOW ALL OF A SUDDEN WE NEED MORE SNOW REMOVAL. WE ARE SHIFTED TO SPENDING MORE MONEY ON ART IN THE CITY WHICH MIGHT LOOK NICE BUT IS NOT FUNCTIONAL IN A BUDGET CRUNCH."

"The snow removal budget is a joke, we run 'over' every year? Last year was a 'light' year for snow, yet once again we are over? The department is completely mis-managed, we are out plowing at 8 am, when the snow is melting by noon....and on and on. Also the police budget needs to be increased, in order to keep with the growing city, and to keep us inline with other major cities....why is our ratio of officers to citizens so out of line?"

"Roads infrastructure. Some are falling apart. Too much focus on social needs of the few rather than the whole. I agree with assisting people with a hand up not a hand out (there are many who are taking advantage of this system and those that really need are falling through the cracks). Need to re-think our social giving policies."

"Calgary transit should be provided more funding to increase route frequency and more drivers overall."

"The amount of cyclist on the roads this year has increased dramatically from last year, and safety is becoming a big issue. More funds need to be allocated to address this in a quick manner."

Employees

"Once again there was talk about setting up a fitness room for the employees in the Municipal Building and once again it was nixed. I realize that council folded when the citizens of Calgary were incensed that employee's would have access to a fitness centre. What the citizens do not know, is that a lot of area offices, i.e. Water Centre, the N.E. office where 911 operators are, have fitness rooms available to them. As an employer I would hope that council will go ahead with a fitness facility within the municipal building. Now that the cafeteria will be closing that would be the perfect place for it. Remember, that we as employee's are also taxpayers, a lot of employee's already use the WOW fitness classes, they could be in this empty cafeteria space as well as fitness equipment. It would be a step in the right direction, the City will be employing more and more young people in the near future and it would be an attractive feature of employment. I am not asking for it to be free, but I believe it is free for other city of Calgary employees in those areas that have the fitness centres already available to them. As a supervisor within the City, what I have noticed, is that the employee's who do the WOW fitness classes take more than the hour allotted, with the length of the class and then having to change in washrooms and wash up at sinks. If there was a workout facility, you could ask the staff to manage their time better, and maybe make the workout classes after work to avoid the 1.5 hours of lunch that the staff take when they are going to the classes over their lunch hour. It would be a win/win situation. I am hoping that council takes another look at this situation, regards!"

"Nothing specific has changed, however employee engagement is poor and results in significant inefficiencies which, if addressed, could bring about large operational cost savings. We don't seem to make the connection very well between employee engagement and effectiveness relative to the bottom line. Nothing new."

"First, I think the "budget tightening" that has gone on was necessary as spending was a little out of control. Most importantly, however, I think the "change" in terms of the City's view towards training is faulty and will cost the City millions \$ in the future. It appears that "training" is a bad word in the Corporation now - it certainly seems that way in the Police Service. As a trainer I will be the first to say that there was a ton of inefficient, wasteful, unproductive training that has gone on. But to cut out training altogether is not the answer. Cut out the wasteful stuff and fix the required stuff and keep delivering it. The CORPORATION is PEOPLE. Training is an investment in YOUR PEOPLE. And you can not go wrong by investing in QUALITY training for your people."

"Our work place is worse then a prison camp right now and getting worse bye the day."

General

"I'm a little concerned with the wait times for non-emergency services. I reported a street light staying on 24 x 7 and it took approx 4 months before anyone came to fix it. I also called in a noise complaint to the CPS and had to wait hours for someone to attend. Not so much fun at 2:00am when you are trying to sleep!!"

"Keep up the great work...keep spending!!!!"

"The city spends more money on the bike lanes downtown than any available funding request to look after the youth of our society."

"Nenshi needs to become more practical and less confrontational with police."

"Always like to see more funding for police, social program, roads."

Corporate Administration

"City council is definitely on the right track with its budgeting process. Just remember that the loudest voices do not represent the majority. Many Calgarians are willing to pay for better service."

"I like the fact the City is being cautious with increasing expenditures in this period of economic uncertainty. Reality check however for all involved in this process: there is only one taxpayer. Whether the funding comes from property, provincial or federal levels the same taxpayer funds all 3 levels & any increases in one level without a corresponding decrease in another level means less income left over for the taxpayer. While it would be nice to have a couple of clones who pay my provincial & federal taxes while I pay only the municipal taxes, this is not reality. However, when listening to interviews of various public figures including economists from various think tanks the language used seems to imply that money from other levels of government are somehow not coming out of the taxpayer pocket.

Misleading & untrue. Add in the belief that a taxpayer in Cochrane, Airdrie, Okotoks is NOT funding Calgary expenditures & vice versa - also untrue. If we are receiving or paying towards any provincial or federal funds, we are paying something towards every public service provided in Canada no matter where we live."

"More scrutiny needs to be done of public spending."

"Several Business Units, such as Calgary Transit, are producing significant favourable financial variances that would permit feasible budget transfers to the Finance Department."

"STOP SPENDING MONEY ON NICE TO HAVE ART AND BRIDGES AND THE ZOO ISLAND REPAIRS. RIGHT NOW FOCUS ON THE PRIORITY ASPECTS LIKE POLICE FIRE THE STREETS CTRAIN(NOT THE SPACE AGE CTRAIN WASTE OF MONEY SPENT ON THE WEST EXPANSION, PLAIN AND SIMPLE"

Corporate Services

"I am very pleased to see the high level of citizen engagement and collaboration in the major decisions that are coming up (e.g. Parks vision, future public library). Excellent job!!! Please keep this up. By staying in touch with the public, you are encouraging them to also 'own up' to their responsibility as a caring citizen. If you walk the talk, you will have many supporters."

"I think sharing as much information as possible with the public is key. Sharing in, easy to understand, and highly accessible formats is key. I am huge fan of Mayor Nenshi's use of Facebook and the use of his Herald columns. Government needs to remain relevant and open to the population so that people don't see the government as a separate entity that they have no power to influence. When government is open and accountable and is not afraid to show that it can makes mistakes then we have an openness and an ability to do bigger and better things."

"How is it that the Calgary Blog and Facebook are preferred over the City of Calgary website?"

"Very nice initiative that should be the de facto role model for all Canadian cities! This team has done more in the past two years than I've ever seen before to foster citizen engagement; I'm looking forward to the next round of adjustment surveys! Nenshi, you've made a name for yourself by not only outlining a plan but DOING the plan! Keep on it; pedal to the metal!"

Community Services & Protective Services

"It is our Cities 100 Stampede and out city streets and "grass areas" all are over run by weeds. Come into Calgary on any road and see what a crappy job we are doing in trying to maintain a clean weed control city - NOT. If I let my yard go like that my neighbours and friends would all be pissed off at me. Come on Calgary clean up!"

"Revamp the 'art' requirement with all new contracts.....its nice to have an art piece with all new projects, but the amount is ridiculous...."

"High priority is safety (police), infrastructure (roads, pathways etc.) and family related issues (sport facilities and family programs like swimming, hockey, soccer programs)."

Planning, Development & Assessment

"Get rid of the the red tape for property develop permits. adding a roof to a existing balcony should note a federal case? lets get back regular building permits."

Transportation

"1) I am concerned about the Snow and Ice Control funding. Last winter wasn't all that bad. What happens if we get a particularly snowy winter. 2) In the Business Plan and Budget, Parks identifies efficiencies and subsequent savings in utilizing their vehicle fleet. There are other Business Units who should be looking at this as well."

"I briefly looked at the transportation section of it and everything seems reasonable. No overall change in cost is good and smart."

"I have a concern regarding our City Roads snow removal and sanding department annual budget. It is my understanding that they are provided a specific operating budget for the year. If, as in this past year, the snowfall amount was less than in previous years, the department would not maintain or increase their budget unless all the resources are used to justify the given amount. I'm of the belief that this must be the case as I have witnessed on numerous occasions snow removal and sanding trucks on our city streets operating at times when it is laughable at the amount of snow on the road or they remove a layer of snow on packed snow causing a glistening sheen of ice making the road more dangerous than prior to the snowfall. If the committee is looking at plans & adjustments, maybe it should consider a floating budget for such areas as snow removal. Some years may use more funds than others, but if there's a surplus one season it shouldn't affect the budget the following year. Commonsense dictates that snow removal vehicles and equipment should be used as required, not because the budget needs to be used up to justify funding for next year."

"Lived in City only three years and have seen constant improvements with the road system & bike paths."

"Public transit needs to be bumped up. Buses usually overflowing. More express buses (i.e. route 64) needed. Daily office commuters downtown Calgary find using the milk run routes cumbersome and time consuming so take the car instead (i.e. route 3)."

"Calgary Transit has taken a couple of years and spent millions of dollars to introduce a very simple smart card payment system that's been in use - generally unchanged - around the world for decades. That's just stupid! Smart card readers were an available option on the very first c-trains purchased in the 1980s."

"It would be great to have more information about the proposed LRT and road projects. I can never find enough info about these issues on line. LRT issues are a major one for most Calgarians as a cheaper way to get to work is a must for most people."

"Transit points to the large percentage of their operating budget coming from user fees, rather than the public coffer, as a sign of efficiency, but what this really shows is how ridiculously underfunded they are.

<u>"</u>Meanwhile the Calgary Police Service has more money than they know what to do with. Stop playing politics and fund what needs to be funded!"

"Transit should be a priority in both inner city and the suburbs. I would love to stop driving in Calgary and start taking transit if it is more effective."

"Keep to the priorities of running the City. Our tendency is to beautify things that in essence do not matter; i.e.. the LRT line in the southwest. Do not know why this is such a priority at almost 10 million?"

"Public safety and active transportation are noted as critical priorities of the proposed budget and CTP. With the drastic increase in the amount of cyclist on the roads, more funds need to be allocated to addressing safety through the creation of additional bike lanes. The proposed expenditures for roads can be decreased to accommodate this as it is the lowest priority in the CTP."

"High priority is safety (police), infrastructure (roads, pathways etc.) and family related issues (sport facilities and family programs like swimming, hockey, soccer programs)."

"Encouraged to see the blue bins started."

"Quit cutting and analyzing our police services. They have helped our city tremendously and it shows. When I have people visit from out of town, they are amazed how safe they feel in our city. The police do a good job and should start to be rewarded for it, not always under a fine microscope. It seems like this is the most common theme in media. FNOUGH!"

"We have one of the lowest police officer to population ratios in the country... imagine what we could accomplish if we were on par or even close to it."

"I appreciate [the] city makes the well being and safety of citizens on fore front by supporting the Calgary Police Services."

"It's funny how City counsel approves a significant raise for them selves but will not allow the same for the police who have been without a contract for 1.5 yrs.

"Audit CPS"

"1) Adjust Public Safety Communications, and give the police, fire and ambulance services THEIR OWN individual dispatch centres back. Shut down the amalgamated PSC organization. 2)Stop charging increases in waste removal (i.e., the black bins). 3) have an accurate audit BEFORE you write the budget. 4) Stop building bridges to nowhere. 5)Cut politicians salaries. 6) Only increase taxes if there is a confirmed budgetary deficit. 7) If possible, try to allocate more funding for emergency services -if necessary, get money from the Province."

"Do not cut budgets from essential city services such as Police, Fire, EMS etc. There are other area's that can be cut if needed."

"Leave essential service budgets alone, let the fire department do their job, let EMS do their job, let CPS do their job. Take a fine look at the Public Safety Centre (PSC) and do a review of their practices. See how they are fiscally irresponsible, a safety hazard and failure. That should be a place to scrutinize the budget."

"We all support the emergency services and the excellent way the support and help our city. They all deserve whatever pay raise the city approves; and arguably more."

"Fire service is already using the City of Calgary Newsroom as a tool of advocating for their silly sprinkler proposals."

Employees


