All flower beds made a creditable showing during the season. Some comparatively new species and varieties used in Memorial Park attracted considerable attention.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND PARK: 4th Calgary Troop (Elks) Boy Scouts who held St. John's Ambulance certificates were in attendance at the Island each Sunday and holiday using, as their headquarters "Calgary's First House". Twenty-six cases ranging from epilepsy and sunstroke to minor cuts received first aid. Service was also rendered in the case of missing children and lost property.

Four Band Concerts were held.

Six hundred cubic yards of soil delivered to Island by a contractor was used partly to level football field and partly to fill between stone work on river bank and south driveway. The Public Works Department also acceeded to our request to

dump all street sweepings collected in the east end of the city
in this depression.

The west end of the north driveway raised to a higher level as a further protection from floods. Not possible to gravel the new surface with result roads in very bad condition all season, and had to be closed in wet weather. 850 yards gravel excavated from Dinoseur Garden placed on driveways this winter.

Several large, two small, picnic tables made, and necessary seats. Tables arranged in groups, permanently fixed, groups numbered and charted. This greatly facilitated allotment of space to the greatly increased number of picnic parties.

Baseball backstop built.

One hundred yards rustic fence built, and all fencing

stained.

Twenty-five pounds grass seed used in reconditioning lawn.

Barricade built across driveway at west end.
Six hundred and eighty-five perennial flowering plants,
453 trees, and 628 shrubs planted. 1,750 trees and shrubs pruned.
Parking of cars continues to be the most difficult problem that we have to deal with. The congestion will be greatly
relieved as soon as the old refreshment building is removed. We
are still awaiting decision of the Council regarding this proposal.

An additional rustic summer house was built and placed on the Island, making three in all.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND ZOO: The construction of a "Dinosaur Garden", an area on which life-size models of prehistoric animals constructed in reinforced concrete, is in course of development at the west end of the island, this being a project of the Calgary Zoological Society. The area is being landscaped by this Department to, as near as possible, resemble the supposed appearance of the habitat of these animals at the time they were in existence. To date three of these animals have been built on the site, one specimen of Triceratops billi, and a group of two Ceratosaurus nasicornis. During the winter specimens small enough to be transported to the Island, are being made under cover--such as turtles, two-toed horses, etc.

Specimens have remained in excellent health and the death rate has remained low throughout the year. While additions during the year have not been numerous, yet they have been of an interesting description. From the San Diego Zoo were received a fine collection of birds and monkeys, and antelope, pelicans, cranes, etc. were received from various Canadian points. Natural increase was again fairly satisfactory, including as it did, fallow deer, silver foxes, wolves, encomistles, etc. Nine blue peafowl were raised. As in previous years these birds did not commence to lay till late in the year. However, the fine weather experienced in the fall of this year was all in their favour.

Feeding has been carried out as economically as possible. In addition, we have utilized lawn mowings, hay, greenstuff of various kinds, tree prunings, etc., as they have been available from the several parks, and these have provided valuable foodstuffs and helped to keep the cost of feeding to a minimum.

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Attendance at the Park and Zoo during the year was very heavy, and the various improvements carried out during 1935 appeared to meet with general approval. The year was notable for the large number of school classes that were conducted through the Zoo.

Every effort was made to co-operate with the teachers and thus make the time spent at the Zoo both interesting and instructive.

The following improvements made during the year:Raising of heating plant in Tropical Animal House above flood level.

Fencing repaired, balance of old cedar posts that were beginning to rot replaced with steel posts.

Signs on pens replaced with standard type giving common name, Latin name, and habitat of bird or animal.

Construction of model buildings for white rat colony. Painting of all buildings.

New 4-section pond for pelicans, cranes, and waterfowl is now under construction.

Calgary's first house replastered on the inside and fitted up as a First Aid Station and Office.

While the Tropical Animal Building constructed last year functions well, yet through lack of other accommodation it has become overcrowded. The caretaker has submitted a plan for a new building which is urgently needed. It is proposed to proceed with the construction of this building as soon as permission has been granted to demolish the old refreshment building that the material from that building may be utilized. The new building will be built east of the present winter building, and will provide for the storage of hay, straw, meat, etc., winter quarters for pelicans, cranes, and all waterfowl, and any other specimens that require little artificial heat. As suggested, the building would be similar in appearance to the other building constructed last year, it will have no floor but contain a well and pump with small pond for waterfowl. A simple heating apparatus can be constructed by the Parks Department itself at small cost.
