Gentlemen:

I beg respectfully to submit my report of the work of this Dept for 1915 with recommendations for the ensuing year.

The revenue earned by the department amounted to \$11,633.70, details are attached herewith.

The season being an exceedingly wet one has been very favorable to growth, but the unusually heavy frost of early September, with growth still very soft, the drying winds that followed, and the generally dry conditions of the winter thus far, has done considerable injury.

In compliance with instructions received I am confining this to the barest possible statement of work accomplished and the future needs of the department as I understand them.

The summary of the season's planting exclusive of nursery and bedding is as follows:-

Trees 3,305, Shrubs 183, perennials 11,109. This is 2,876 fewer trees and 4,900 fewer shrubs than in 1914.

It has not been possible to date to start the work of treating trees for boring insects and diseases, and very little pruning has been done. If our young trees are to survive and continue to develop they must have this attention.

It has also been impossible to continue the work of doctoring the older trees throughout the park system. It is unfortunate that the tremendously important nature of this work is not more generally understood. To neglect this work is to court disaster.

Owing to the unusually heavy precipitation of moisture throughout the season the growth of grass and weeds was abnormal. It was impossible to cope with this growth with the available staff and the lawn areas in several of the parks and boulevards had at times a very unkempt appearance. In certain areas mowing was entirely abandoned and a crop of hay taken.

Throughout the season the working force has been below what was needed for proper maintenance, but the parks, as regards the routine work of refuse removal, mowing grass, watering, cultivating, care of roads and walks, and patrolling have been kept in as good condition as circumstances permitted and a detailed record of the cost of this work has been kept,

An addition to the Park lands has been made by the acquisition of the ~~gere~~ on 17th Avenue West. This is to be known as Tompkins Gardens. If time permits a plan for the permanent improvement of this site will be prepared this winter. *

It has been my aim during the past year to systemize and standardize all work, reports and accounts to the greatest possible degree. The time sheet signed by each employee has proved very satisfactory. This sheet gives the hours worked, location, rate, and character of work. We thus have a record of location, Classification, and cost of all work. With the curtailed office staff, however, it will in future be impossible to properly tabulate these records.

A good deal of constructional work that could not otherwise have been done, such as erecting Light standards at St. George's Is, bridge building, erecting buildings at Bowness, laying concrete walks and making lawn and tennis court at Police Station, was made possible by the utilizing of the Government unemployed grant. Boulevard construction was financed by a system of working out taxes and Comfort Stations by special Bylaw. The ground improvements at the General Hospital were paid for out of the Hospital Appropriation. *

Many inspections of complaints regarding gardening troubles were made in private gardens. Some hundreds of enquiries were also received by telephone and personal calls at the Parks office. These related chiefly to tree culture. The Department could give excellent service in this direction by the periodical issue of pamphlets.

Calgary is probably unique amongst all other larger cities on this continent in having its parks and Cemetery ~~in having its parks~~ at all times accessible to the public. I am not sure that this is a desirable condition. It is

customary elsewhere for the Parks (which are usually properly fenced) to be closed at a certain hour at night and remain closed till the next morning.

As the existing Parks Bylaw, owing to changes already made, and to altered conditions, is somewhat inadequate and ambiguous, I respectfully recommend that this be revised.

Owing to present financial conditions I hesitate at this time to make many recommendations. There are many features of park development however, that should be considered, if only for the purpose of keeping them in the public mind to awaken and maintain interest.

CENTRAL PARK. The only improvement made was the placing of wooden curbing and construction of road and path back of bandstand. The loam removed was used for boulevard construction in the locality. 4,000 bulbs were planted in the spring. Thanks to the enthusiasm of some public spirited citizens, who co-operated with this Department, Calgary's first * Municipal Christmas Tree was lighted last year. This Park is unfortunately wrongly designed for a "Passing through" park and there is constant friction between the staff and the public owing to the habit of the latter of taking short cuts. The whole central area should be remodelled, but this has not been possible to date on account of the cost. Winnipeg has a number of parks approximating in size to Central Park, which are closed entirely during the winter.

MEWATA PARK. The manure collected and prepared in this and several other parks last winter proved of great service to the Department and also to citizens. Considerable improvements were made to the surface of the * baseball grounds. The football ground was moved to a more westerly location. 74 trees were planted. In accordance with my recommendation the children's playground was moved to the east end of the park. A wading pool would add to the attractiveness of this playground. Some further grading was done in preparation for tennis courts. I strongly recommend that this work be completed this season. A comfort station was erected and the fencing of river completed.

RILEY PARK. 232 loads of gravel were removed from bank to lake site for concreting. One acre of grass seeded down and the border strip completed 200 lbs of seed used. 21,530 lbs of excellent hay was delivered to City Stables. A crop of potatoes was grown on a very weedy area and this land is now clean and in condition for seeding. 426 trees, 140 shrubs, 455 perennials, and 7,000 bulbs were planted. Loam was removed from 2201 yds of road and path site and replaced with gravel, the loam being used in construction of boulevards in district. This effected a very great saving on cost of this work. 200 loads of manure have been collected, prepared, and is being used as required. A comfort station with necessary sewer and water connections has been constructed and the sewer and water extended to pool.

HILLHURST PARK. Large rinks were maintained here as long as weather permitted. The clubhouse was opened and heated for checking, the fees collected meeting the cost. Between 30 and 40 matches were played on the hockey rink. 50 loads of earth were used to fill in hollows on football ground. Damage done to roof of Grand Stand by lightning was repaired. The popularity of Hillhurst Park is shown by the fact that of 102a games played in the three athletic parks, 41 were played at Hillhurst.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND. The light standards were erected and light installed pavilion converted into residence for caretaker, water and sewer connections made to comfort stations. Terrace built and seeded around pavilion, new roads made and others improved, a new bridge built to connect St. Patrick's Island (This was carried away by flood), a footbridge built at east end of island, and other bridges improved by giving rustic treatment. The big flood in July inundated almost the whole of the island, threatened the two main bridges and did very considerable damage generally. A strip of shore varying in width from 10 to 20 ft, and many large trees, were swept away along the south shore. In this connection I would respectfully repeat the warning contained in my two previous reports that

irreparable damage is being done by erosion, which could be avoided by proper shore protection. The big events of the season were the Traveller's Picnic (when 17,000 people visited the park), the Shriner's Picnic, and a military camp. The innovation in the form of a daily Pierrot entertainment proved popular. 48,440 children visited the playground during the season, 625 picnics were held.

VICTORIA PARK. The remodelling of the football fence was completed and considerable improvements made to the ground by filling and steam-rolling. A lacrosse ground was laid out within the race track. There was considerable resentment on occasion regarding the collection by the City of 20% of gate receipts, and in some instances it was refused absolutely. I would therefore recommend that permits be issued at a regular fixed charge for the use of the athletic grounds when a gate is to be taken and that the grounds be free when no gate is taken.

FOXEDO PARK. A large portion of the west end of the park was graded, the area around the bandstand levelled, seeded and some trees planted, the east end was fenced and planted with a crop of potatoes.

SHOULDICE PARK. The 80 acres prepared last year were cropped with potatoes and turnips, these crops helping much towards cleaning the land. A crop of hay was taken from the unbroken portion. I beg to recommend that part of this land be cropped for green feed and that portion still foul with couch grass fallowed.

BOWNESS PARK. Considerable brush cutting and opening up of paths was done last winter. All the old buildings were torn down and wood given to Associated Charities. A large shelter, kitchen and stable was built, also a bridge to connect with small island. The athletic field was equipped with goal posts etc. The main driveway was graded and improved. This park was very popular throughout the season as a picnic and camping resort. I am of the opinion that it could be made still more popular for camping purposes if the Department had on hand tents for hire. 36,891 people

visited the Park between April 1st and September 30th.

SHAGANAPPI PARK. In accordance with my recommendation of last year an 18 hole Golf Course was constructed on this Park. This course, besides being particularly "sporty" is very picturesque. It will take a great deal of work yet for its full development, but is perhaps the most popular undertaking of the Department this year. 2,153 persons passed over the first tee between August 7th, date of opening, and November 30th when it was closed for the winter. Number of members 60, total cash receipts \$419.80. A comprehensive set of Rules for the governance of the Course is very essential, and it is also most important that the relations between the city and the Golf Club (if such is to be recognised) and the jurisdiction of each be clearly defined.

CITY HALL. 4068 plants were used for the gardens and the usual display of pot plants and window boxes were maintained inside. Cement walks and driveway, lawns and tennis court was constructed on the space adjoining the Police building.

BOULEVARDS. 63,360 ft. (12 miles) of new boulevard has been constructed at a cost of \$14,262.40, approximately 22 $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ per foot. This is exactly half the cost of the work of the previous year, due largely to the saving effected on haulage of loam, this being obtainable in close proximity in each locality.

A commencement was made to collect data so that we might have on file in the office a plan of each street showing location, kind, condition etc., of each tree, this data to be arranged on a card system. Owing to curtailment of staff this work had to be abandoned. Many trees are being badly damaged by horses, vehicles, and mischievous children. This can only be prevented by placing guards to all trees. I recommend that this be done without further delay. Purely wanton damage is on the

increase and I beg to recommend that a standing reward be offered to citizens giving information leading to convictions for this offence.

There was considerable complaint at times of the infrequent and irregular cutting of the grass. This was unavoidable but was an unfortunate condition, for, apart from the untidy appearance, weeds are allowed to seed and increase and the turf becomes thin.

The practice of enclosing the boulevard space by certain citizens continues and no definite course of action regarding the prevention of this has been decided upon.

It is gradually being demonstrated that quite a number of species of trees, including some of the hardwoods, can be successfully grown here and I recommend that these be used. I am opposed to the too general planting of Russian or other species of Poplars on the streets. Though these trees are rapid growing and therefore appeal to citizens they have undesirable characteristics as fully developed trees and are short lived. They are desirable only as planted in reasonable proportion with other trees. The general planting of any one species of tree would have a monotonous effect. It would also be found that an epidemic or disease or pest attacking that particular species would be difficult to control under these conditions.

A beginning was made to improve the Bow River Boulevard, a portion * being graded, seeded, and trees planted at St. George's Island and Langevin Bridges.

I beg respectfully to again remind you of my previous recommendation that boulevard maintenance be paid for by frontage tax.

Average costs of the Principal Boulevard activities are given below. These figures are for labor and material:-

CEMETERY Only a small portion of new road was made this year, the loam being first removed. Wooden markers were replaced with cement in Sections A and G. 780 trees, 43 shrubs, and 600 perennials were planted. Very little was added to the road drainage system but I respectfully beg to point out the urgent need for this. The roads were frequently so badly washed out as to create a dangerous condition. About \$500.00 was spent for repairs. Much of this expense could have been avoided had there been an adequate drainage system. This was proved by the fact that very little damage was done to the drained roads. Grass cutting has been a very heavy item. A splendid crop of hay was taken from the open portion.

Orders for grave improvements and maintainance are steadily increasing. If these are to be accepted in the newer portion it is essential that the water service be extended. Owing to the unsatisfactory condition of the old Records many hours have been taken up in searching these in answer to inquiries. Considerable time is thus wasted both of the staff and the public and an impression of poor service is given. This condition could be remedied by having these transferred to a proper set of books and indexed and would be useful winter work, but the staff is inadequate for this.

Growth has been phenomenal. It has been possible to trim and set up some 20,000 of the cuttings inserted 2 yrs. ago. Many of these are now fully developed trees. Nothing whatever was spent last year on introduction of new stock. I recommend that a small sum be spent for this purpose next year. The work of introducing and testing out a few subjects (work that only need cost a few dollars annually) will have considerable economic value in the future.

It is an unquestionable fact that no money spent by the Department * is better appreciated than that spent on band concerts, as is evidenced by the attendance. ~

Bathing facilities were not provided as in 1914 owing to the flooded condition of the river. There was some demand at the latter end of the season, however, and I strongly recommend that permanent facilities for both bathing and boating be provided.

STORE AND REPAIR SHOP. Wastage and loss of tools and material has been largely eliminated this year under the arrangement that has been in force whereby a requisition signed by individuals needing material is required before being handed over by the store-keeper. Unfortunately the services of the storekeeper had to be dispensed with before the season had ended and the usefulness of the system was to some extent negated.

WEED CUTTING ON STREETS AND LANES. This was an extremely heavy and most unsatisfactory undertaking and though nearly \$2000.00 was spent the effect was scarcely perceptible owing to the rapid growth and very extensive area. With regard to weeds on private property I beg to recommend that an inspector be appointed to enforce the Bylaw recently passed.

POLICING. The Parks and Boulevards no longer have regular police supervision, the services of the one constable of the Department being dispensed with in October. Vandalism has increased considerably during the last few months.
