CITY OF CALGARY PARKS DEPARTMENT. ANNUAL REPORT 1917.

To His Worship the Mayor, Commissioners and Council.

City Hall. Calgary.

Gentlemen:

I neg to submit my 5th annual report covering the work of the Parks Department for the year 1917.

Practically nothing was done in the way of further development of the Parks System during the year, and much of the maintenance work was curtailed in conformity with the policy of retrenchment affecting all civic work. The activities of the Department were diverted largely into other directions, principally of an agricultural and truck gardening nature. In fact, so diversified have become the activities of the department that the title "Parks Department" seems now almost a misnomer.

The season was an unusually dry one, the total precipitation for the year being only 10165" as compared with 17.10" in 1916. This was not favourable to the above mentioned class of work, but results were fairly gratifying taking these conditions into consideration.

Summary of planting for the season exclusive of greenhouse grown plants and nursery propogation is as follows:

Trees - 2,171. Shrubs - 3,284 Vines - 138

Perennials - 10,336 Bulbs - 11,318

Sales of such horticultural requisites as manure, loam, trees, plants, etc., were very greatly increased this season. Disposal of the vegetables grown also added considerably to this department of our work.

The gross revenue of the Department totalled a little over \$18,000.00 an increase over 1916 of about \$6,000.00.

The opinion expressed in my 1916 report that the Cemetery would soon be self-supporting was more than realized. The expenditure was

than self-suggressing so far as maintenance is concerned, - the revenue being \$540.37 more than maintenance expenditure. The sum of \$951.43 was, however, spent on improvements during 1917.

This report as in previous years deals somewhat in detail with the work and statistics of the Department. This is unavoidable in carrying out the design of the report's usefulness to others. Parks Reports are received from some 150 cities and it is an act of common courtesy to send a copy of this Report in return. Unless the information as stated above is given in its present form it loses it's usefulness to these cities. I may here, perhaps, be permitted to say that letters were received from a number of cities commenting very favourably on the completence. detail of the 1916 report of the Calgary Perks Department.

annuals were planted, and the flower seeds were sown on borders.

75 hop roots were planted the of bandstand and these greatly improved the appearance of the structure during the summer. A tree was provided for planting by the Rotary Club on Arbor Day. As the

result of natural increase it was possible to transfer 413 roots of shrubs, perennials, and vines from this park to St. George's Island.

Grass cutting was commenced on May 7th, a motor mower being used for the first time with much saving of labor, greater expedition, and very satisfactory results.

MEWATA PARK. Two rinks (one for hockey only) were maintained during the winter of 1915 - 16 and a large sheet of ice has again been prepared. A small toboggan slide was erected.

Some Spruce trees that would otherwise have been destroyed by building operations in connection with the Armory, were transplanted to other parts of the park and to the Cemetery.

4 1/5 tons of hay made and delivered to Stables.

RILEY PARK. 35 trees, 339 shrubs, and 1128 perennials planted. 14.7 tons of hay cut and delivered to Stables.

One of the small buildings used during the construction of Centre Street Bridge was moved to this park and reconstructed as a playground shelter.

HILLHURST ATHLETIC GROUNDS. Large sheets of ice for hockey and for general skating have been made and maintained each winter. The revenue derived from the Checking koom privilege was \$\phi 84.00\$ with an average daily attendance of approximately 100.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND PARK. The Playground Apparatus needed considerable overhauling during the season to keep it in a safe condition.

A large quantity of manure was prepared and used on the Bridgeland Farm.

61 trees, 971 shrubs, 2880 bulbs, 2013 perennicls, and 2900 annuals were planted.

The old bandstand, previously used as a shelter for the children's

playground, was moved to a site under the shade of the trees and reconstructed for the use of the band, light installed and the whole structure painted. One of the old refreshment booths which was so located as to have a very unsightly appearance was also placed amongst. the trees adjacent to the children's playground and converted into a very much more suitable shelter than the building previously mentioned had been.

Volley and basket ball apparatus was provided. *
Playground and driveways were frequently watered.

The bridge on the north side of the Island was re-floored.

The backwater between St. Patrick's and St. George's Islands was cleaned out and shed built as a dressing room for swimmers, but this did not prove very satisfactory. The several bathing fatalities amongst children, that occurred during the summer, emphasized, however, the great need there is for the provision of properly constructed and supervised bathing facilities.

85,815 children made use of the playgrounds during the year.
837 picnics were held.

A new Refreshment Building has been erected by the concessionaire under an arrangement whereby the city eventually becomes the owner. It is regrettable that the design of this building, with its high square front on which a glaring sign is displayed, its narrowly projecting eaves and its general lack of artistic treatment is more after the order of a mining town general store than a park refreshment booth. It is an absolute disfigurement to the park in its present condition.

As gravel and sand are being regularly removed from between St. George's and St. Patrick's Islands, andnes this removal results in cutting off access to St. Patrick's Island for a longer period each summer I recommend that the Nursery be abandoned.

Wild driving and speeding is still being indulged in on the Island particularly late at night, but it is hoped that strict enforcement of the new Bylaw will remedy this.

VICTORIA PARK. The shrub border on the north side of the park was further extended by the planting of 78 trees and shrubs.

The usual cultivation of borders was done, and services in connection with the Exhibition given.

A rink is being maintained in the sunken garden for use of the troops and general public.

TUXEDO PARK. 112 leads of manure were placed on the east end of the park and this area turned over to the Public Works Department for the growing of a crop of green feed.

BOWNESS PARK. Park furniture and buildings were repaired and some grading done on driveways. On May 28th the tools and equipment belonging to the Parks Department were removed and the park turned ever the Street Railway Department for management and control.

SHOULDICE P.EU. The weeds that have been lying in piles throughout this park during the winter were burned and the park surveyed for the purpose of leasing the land. The broken area was leased in three blocks for agricultural purposes.

SHAGANAPPI PARK. The course was opened for play on March 10th.

The park was burned over on March 29th.

Mr. Thompson, professional of the Banff Course was engaged to re-plan the course. His plan provided for an almost complete reconstruction of the course with many features, such as bunkers and pot-holes added. A very detailed topographical survey was made of the park for the purpose of having the proposed improvements correcting and permanently recorded.

Considerable progress was made during the season with the construction work connected with the new plan, and the new fairways and most of the new greens are now in use. 3 bunkers and 2 pot-holes have also been made.

Attached is a copy of the rules governing the Braid Hill Golf Course, Edinburgh, probably the oldest and best conducted Municipal Course in the world. I would strongly recommend that similiar rules and penalties be adopted. Until the breaking of certain rules is made a penal offence, it will be very difficult to enforce them.

BRAID HILLS GOLF COURSE.

RULES for the Regulation of the Game of Golf, made by the M gistrates and Council under an in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by the Edinburgh Improvement and Tramways Act., 1896.

- 1. Before commencing to play, every player shall personally obtain a ticket from the Park or other Officer stationed at or near the teeing ground, which ticket shall have a number and the date of issue thereon, and shall be available only on the day of issue and for one round of the game. A charge of threepence shall be made for each such ticket.
- 2. Before obtaining such ticket, each player shall sign his name in a book which shall be kept by the P.rk or other Officer for that purpose, the numbers on the tickets corresponding with the number opposite the names in the book.
 - 3. No players under twelve years of age, single players, three or

four-ball matches, shall be allowed on public holidays or Saturdays.

- 4. No person shall be allowed to play unless he has a ticket, but the possession of a ticket shall not entitle the holder to play on the course unless his name appears in the Officer's book opposite the corresponding number.
- 5. No person shall be entitled to take out a new ticket until after the number on the ticket taken by him in the first instance shall have been called by the Park or other Officer, nor until he has finished the first round.
- 6. Every player shall, when required by the Park or other Officer or Person authorized by the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council, exhibit and produce the ticket held by such player as aforesaid.
- 7. Every player shall start at the teeing ground for the first hole only, and in rotation in the order of the number on the ticket.
- B. N.B. -- (1) Where two, three, or four persons intent playing together, it may be permitted for one of the party to obtain the tickets and enterthe names of his co-partners in the book as above provided, but no person shall receive more than four tickets.

 (2) An Officer regulating the start at the first tee shall call the numbers and names of each successive party in the order in which they appear in the Park Officer's book. Failing the appearance of any member of the party at the proper time, the others may elect either to proceed without him or to assume the next single player who is willing to play with them on the register to make up the match.

 (3) Tickets shall be issued from 5 a.m. during the months of April.

 May, June, July, and August.

PEMLITY.

Every player contravening any of the foregoing Rules shall be liable, for every breach of any prohibition under the said Rules, in a penalty not exceeding Forty Shillings, and in default in payment to Imprisonment.

CITY HALL AND TOMPKIN'S GARDENS. Nothing but the most necessary work was done on these gardens during the season

2132 annuals were planted in the City Hall gardens.

CHILDREN'S PLAYCROUNDS. The apparatus in all of these was regularly overhauled and kept in repair.

Additional equipment was made and placed in Riley, Mewata, Tuxedo, and St. George's Island parks.

A model playground was made and placed on exhibition at the Knox Church during "Baby Welfare" week

This makes a total of 28 playgrounds now in operation in the city.

The equipment placed at the Separate schools was paid for by the Separate School Board.

Assistance was given in conducting the Day Nursery at Victoria Park during Exhibition week.

Exhibitions of dancing, drills, and games were given at St.George's Island under the supervision of the Playground's Association of which body your Superintendent is a member.

BANDS. 8 band concerts were given during July, 4 at Central Park and 4 at St. George's Island.

BOULEVARDS. Trees were given as much attention in the way of pruning, spraying, dressing, cultivating, staking, etc., as finances permitted. It is regrettable that it is not possible to do this work thoroughly as these trees will be a considerable asset to this city in the years to

come.

1150 replacements of dead trees were made in the central parts of the city.

Streets planted 3 years ago presented a beautiful appearance this this season. The heavy snowstorm at the end of October did considerabl damage, however, many limbs being broken down by the weight of snow.

These were removed and wounds cleaned and dressed.

No further extension of the improvements made in 1916 on the Bow River Boulevard was made during the past season, except the planting of 1,914 trees and shrubs.

Though the appropriation for Boulevards was almost fully spent, the work of caring for the grass and trees was only half done. It would be of immense assistance to the work of this Department if citizens generally could be induced to cut the grass and water the trees on the boulevards. This would be a small matter to the individual, but constitutes a large item of expenditure as a whele. The very modest sum provided for the care of the 52 miles of boulevard in this city could then be used mainly for the planting and care of trees, which would require expert handling and is more satisfactory done by the Municipalithan by individual effort.

Trees should have prime consideration in the work of park and boulevard development, and they should be the last to be abandoned to neglect in this class of work when financial difficulties come.

A tree planted on a city street is surrounded by unnatural condition which means a more or less severe struggle for existence. It may be planted on a street where the grade has been established by either a cut or a fill. In either case the water table has probably been serious interfered with. Other improvements such as paving, sidewalks, sewer, water, and gas pipes, mean that air and water supply are cut off and roots periodically interfered with and damaged. Above the ground the

tree has to contend with injuries from horses, automobiles, malicious persons, overhead wires, noxious gases and oily and otherwise injurious dust. Then as the number of trees increase there seems to be an ever increasing number of insects and diseases to pregupon them. These conditions mean that if street trees are to survive under these adverse with they must be cared for unremittingly, and with all diligence and care.

is pleasing to note the increasing interest that is being taken in the welfare of the street trees in certain residential sections of the city. If a tree becomes loosened or a stake broken, our office is notified within a few hours, in most cases.

I large area of a suitable nature should be obtained and this could be used for agricultural purposes until such time as it was needed for the purposes of a It is to be sincerely hoped, however, that in choosing a new site some thought will be given to landscape possibilities, also the it will be so regulated as to prevent it becoming a merely closely packed burial ground or a museum of currosities in stone. cemetery should not look like a pleasure park, the evidences of death ought not to be allowed to be repulsive, and the cemetery a place to be shunned, and, though there should be no attempt to make it appear what it is not, it can at least be made a monument, in its entirety. to those whose bodies are placed in it.

CEMETERY NURSERY. Propogating was carried on so far as time and the sum appropriated permitted.

In view of the possible shortage of vegetable seeds the Department might well take up the growing of such seeds as its previous experiments have demonstrated can be readily grown here.

VICTORIA PARK NURSERY. Very little was done in this nursery except cultivating to destroy weeds.

ST. PATRICK'S ISLAND NURSERY. This nursery had to be almost abandoned for the greater part of the season. An effort was made, however, in the fall to clean up the rank growth of weeds that had taken possession.

The immediate future policy regarding the greenhouses has received considerable thought and the subject has been frequently discussed. I have no desire to repeat the experiment of last year, namely, to sell all the choicest of the plants grown and use the culls and rubbish for the embellishment of the Parks.

It was decided finally to devote them almost entirely to the production of such crops as lettuce, and tomatoes, and as far as possible make them self-supporting.

end 28 trees and 75 shrubs were planted. 400 perennials and 100 annuals were also supplied.

WATER. The water supply in all parks was metered this year. This has effected a considerable saving to the Department as the following figures show:

weeds again reverted to this Department in 1917.

Considerable weed cutting was done in the outlying districts on both public and private property.

During the cutting of weeds, and grass that was found of a suitable nature was cut and hauled to the City Stables.

Weeds were also cut where necessary in the centre of the city particularly where they had proved troublesome on the space between property line and sidewalk.

Plants, trees, etc., supplied to Mrs. McArthur on account of property damages.

Plants supplied to Fire Halls.

Teams hired to Waterworks Department for construction work at Reservoir. Teams have frequently been hired to other Departments for short periods.

The work of removing manure from the City S-lbles has been done in part by this department.

BRIDGELAND FARM. Considerable work was required in the way of clearing. burning over and levelling this land, and removing refuse, to get it in condition for caltivation.

85 loses of stones and other debris were collecting and removed. 175 asats of manure used.

The fencing enclosing the hospital grounds was taken down, the boundaries being carefully marked and the whole area surveyed.

The building that was originally erected as a pavilion for athlet was moved to a convenient position to be used as a tool shed.

A number of native shrubs that were growing on the land and would etherwise have been destroyed were transplanted to the improved portion of the Bow Boulevard.

The land was harrowed, after being ploughed and disced by the Public Works Department. Such portions of the land as could not be reached by plough were cleaned and dug.

The planting of potatoes was commenced on May 8th, and completed on May 29th, 20 acres being planted with 300 bushels. There was considerable delay with this work on account of wet weather and the teams and implements being loaned to other organizations to get in their crops. The plot of land immediately adjacent to the hospital was planted with a mixed crop of vegetables.

weeds were very troublesome throughout the season due to years of weed growth and seeding having rendered the land very foul.

A flower border was made round the government station, 929 perennials being used for this purpose.

The crops were grown entirely without irrigation.

Conditions were not ideal for an undertaking of this kind on account of the rough condition of the land, the fact that the crops had to be planted on a new breaking, and the exceptionally dry season.

However, the results were very satisfactory taking these circumstances into consideration and the yield of potatoes in particular was very good as compared with crops in other localities in the city.

The bad weather experienced during the latter part of October very.

much hampered the harvesting of the crops remaining on the ground at
that time, and this, of necessity, added to the cost of handling these.

Just at harvest time too, when the farmer usually augments his staff
ours was considerably curtailed thus prolonginf the harvesting of crops.

The total upon being by the department was to.ly moves.

In supplying the Hospital we were in competition with Chinamen who were continually cutting prices, and we were given to understand that we must come down to these prices if we wished to keep the business.

Appended are statements showing crop results and details of expenditure and revenue. These statements cover only the work of this Department.

I understand that vegetables are used by the school authorities in their domestic science classes. It might be advantageous if the school Board's requirements in this direction were filled by the Parks Dept. In fact, a similiar arrangement could well be made with all public institutions needing vegetables. This would in a sense, keep money in the city's coffers and it would also tend to lessen the risk of produce being spoiled through lack of market. I beg to recommend that this activity be further extended and developed. I am confident that the results would be greater from year to year as the land was got into better condition and the department better equipped to hendle this work.

AGRICULTURAL WORK. (GRNDRAL) In January and February a complete survey of the city was made for the purpose of seeing what vacant land there was in large blocks that would be suitable for agricultural purposes.

Bow River Boulevard. The Street sweepings that had been deposited on this land during the winter were spread and a large quantity of refuseremoved. After having been ploughed by the Public Works Department the unimproved portion was fenced and leased:

Sunnyside Boulevard. Brush was cut, grass burned, some levelling done, 40 loads of refuse removed, and after being ploughed by the Public Works Defartment the land was staked off in 50 ft. plots and allotted to residents in Sunnyside for cultivation.

Potatoes. Off the carload of potatoes purchased by the Department, 564 bushels were sold to the Returned Veteran's Club, 51½ bushels to the Business Women's National Service Corps, and 79 bushels to the Children's Shelter. The balance were used at the Bridgeland Farm together with those that had been stored from the previous year's crop. Those taken by the Veteran's were sold at a price of \$1.50 as fixed by the Council, which did not cover the cost of shipping and handling. Thus the Department lost money on this transaction. This brought the cost of those used by the Department up to approximately \$2.00 per bushel.

Manure. The work of preparing manure at the various dumping stations was continued throughout the winter months: 607 loads have been sold during the year. The several piles were regularly sprayed to prevent breeding of flies.

As the expenditure in connection with growing crops of green feed was almost wholly borne by the Public Works Department the creidts for this are not included in this statement.

GENERAL. 258.39 was realized by the Department when it co-operated with the Horticultural Society and the Vacant Lots Garden Club in a three days sale of trees, shrubs, and plants at the Public Market.

The total weight of hay gathered from all sources by the department and delivered to the City Stables was 26 tons.

I think the matter of bird protection and one uragement on cur parks is one worthy of consideration, not only because birds make the parks more interesting, but also from an economic standpoint. rative birds are one of the country's most valuable assets, and it is the duty, and should be the pleasure, of every citizen to de all in his new er to pretect them. If there were no birds insects would in a short time multiply to such an extant as to make it impossible to raise crops. The more agricultural and horticultural production is axtended in our midst, so much the more shall we need birds, to protect us from those posts of which they are the petural en mies. offer in themselves ideal conditions for bird life. The carrying of firearms is ferbidden, so that their only serious enemy, against whem they need to be pretected, is the wilful or thoughtless boy. birds could be encouraged by the establishment of feeding stations during the winter, and of nosting boxes in the summer time. The scheels and local societies interested might be induced to take up this work, and could probably accomplish much in transofrming the small boy from a destroyer to a protector of the birds.

Conclusion. During the past five years approximately \$345,000,000 has been spent in this city on Parks and Boulevard development. It would be most regrettable if sufficient was not provided annually to at least prevent these improvements from deteriorating. I suppose none but the professional who is intimately acquainted with this class of work realizes to what an extent money spent in this way can be wasted afterwards by neglect, as for instance, trees dying from infestations that could be prevented by spraying; by canker developing in old wounds; the result of killing back; by insufficient moisture; by want of proper projection from injury; by weedy and course grasses dispossessing the fixer varieties through improverishments of the soil or irregular cutting, and not on.

It has been the endeaver of the department to the greatest extent of its powers to have the parks ready for the use of the public at all times. Their comfort has been considered and provided for, and special requests have received attention and been granted if they did not interfere with the rights of others.

Records of temperature, rainfall, etc., have been kept as usual throughout the year, these records now covering a period of several means. Applications for these meteorological records are frequently private. Juding was done by your Superintendent at 8 horticultural applications and in 5 garden competitions in the city and Province.

It is with the deepest regret that I here record the loss of the collect employee of the Department and one of the city's most loyal and faithful servants. I refer to the death of Mr. 2. Curtis, general recommendation of the department, which took place at the end of the year.
