Gentlemen: -

I beg to submit my 7th. Annual Report dealing with the work of the Parks Department for 1919, with suggestions and recommendations for 1920.

The extreme drought that prevailed during the summer had a very serious effect on the Parks, and emphasized the need for a considerable extention of the watering system, and adoption of more up-to-date methods of sprinkling and irrigating. The severe weather that was experienced in the fall, when the temperature fell considerably below zero on several eccasions, was also a serious blow to the work of the Department, particularly as regards its farming activities. Winter came a menth before its usual time, but it is impossible to guard against the damage and loss eccasioned by these vagaries of the climate. The precipitation for the year was follows:

Each year brings its changes and extensions to the work of the Department. This year has seen a tremendous revival in Athletics, and the activities of the Department have been absorbed to a very great extent in developing and adding to the existing facilities for games.

The activities of the Department both as regards maintenance and improvement are shown in detail at the end of this report together with a statement of cost. The more salient features are given particular mention in the report itself.

During the past year this Department has werked under the Comptreller's new Work Order System. This has not effected the work of the Department to any appreciable extentand, therefore has been neither an advantage nor a disadvantage It has had the apparent effect of making possible the earlier issuing of the Comptroller's Menthly Statements, but, as these have, in most instances, been incomplete, it has failed in the principle advantage that was claimed for it, namely, that it would prevent ever expenditures, and, if ever-expenditures have been aveided, this is entirely due to the careful carrying out of instructions received by the head of the Department at the beginning of the year and is in no way due to the Work Order System, as at present operated.

CENTRAL PARK. The Department was very severely criticised during the early part of the summer, because of the bad effect the drought was having on this Park, though all the watering that was possible with the facilities available was being done. A specially designed automatic sprinkler system was installed as rapidly as possible, but finances only permitted of a pertian of the Park being so treated. I strongly recommend that this be installed throughout the Park this year:

Rustic arches were made over several of the entrances. These will eventually be clashed with vines. The ugly affect of the arbors was, to see extent, climinated, by replacing at

pipe construction, in part, by rustic work. This work should be completed this year.

The Annual Commemorative Service was held in Sept. and was even a greater success than in 1918. The Parks Department made and placed on the Monument 15 large Floral Designs valued at \$300.00. Floral tributes from other sources were very numerous.

The usual floral display was maintained, and as in former years was much appreciated by the public, many of whom were most enthusiastic with regard to it. A new perennial border was made along the north side. This will eventually contain specimens of all herbaceous plants hardy here, and will be a novel and interesting feature.

It is unfortunate that there is no lighting system in this Park. It could be cheaply and effectively lighted by the use of four high-power lamps placed on the Library and bandstand.

MEWATA PARK. A large sum was expended in improvements to the Baseball & Football Grounds, and a considerable addition was made to the seating accomplation. There was a record attendance of 10,000 people at the opening Baseball Game and the patronage was good throughout the season. That the facilities provided were appreciated is evidenced by a letter received from the President of the Baseball League. Copy of which is appended:

Dec. 20, 1919.

Dear Sir:-

In view of the thoroughly efficient and highly satisfactory manner in which the parks department handled the athletic grounds this year. I feel that it would be only fitting that I should convey to you the appreciation of those in Calgary who are interested in athletic recreation. The baseball grounds provided at Hewata Park and the accompanying equipment are the best I believe in Canada in so far as municipal playgrounds are concerned. The diamond there was kept in the very best of shape all season, and the crowds who attended were given excellent acconclation. . . e figure that between 60,000 and 75,000 persons abvended the Calgary City League games during the season, and we believe that this attendance will be increased next year even in the face of the competition of professional baseball. We had an average attendance of more than 1,330 persons, and at some of the games the attendance and ran to nearly 3,600. The attendance at the opening game was estimated at 10,000and was the greatest growd ever present at a baseball game in Calgary. W.J. Oliver, the photographer, has a panoramic picture of the crowd at that game taken from the roof of the Armories and I believe it would be only fitting to have that photograph reproduced in the civic records as evidence of what the City of Calgary accomplished in 1919. Twenty-eight additional bleachers were erected; 141 Base-Ball, and S7 Football matches were played during the season, and the grounds were in use for practice every day.

Several large trees that had to be removed from building sites in the city were transferred partly to Mowata and partly to Riley Parks, and these will be useful as screens to buildings that are not very artistic in appearance.

ings that are not very artistic in appearance.

Better skaving facilities have been provided this winter than ever before. These include a good hockey rink and a

dressing room.

The excavation south of the armory has been filled in. I recommend that this be levelled and seeded without delay and the space utilized for tennis courts. I would further recommend that the whole park be properly fenced and that trees and shrubbery be planted on the inside of this fence and at the back of the bleachers.

One hundred and twenty nine loads of shale were used in resurfacing the Baseball Diamonds and 36 loads of loam on the Foot Football Ground.

Early in the spring, the grass in Riley Park was mulched with stable manure, about 2/3 of the acreage being covered. The benefit of this was seen in the green grass of the early summer.

Some maples from 1st. Street W. and 6th Ave. being in the way of building operations, were replanted around the cricket club-house and the playground, very early in the season. Necessity thus causing transplanting in the wrong season, the trees did not show as rapid a recovery as desirable. However, vigorous pruning probably helped, and as there is still life in the trunks, a recovery may be looked for next year.

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About the 1st. May, we started to remove the manuse from the gress and beds, and to sultivate the beds and border.

All the beds were cultivated two or three times throughout the season and vacant spaces filled in with annuals and perennial flowering plants. The border was cultivated once during the season, and in the spring it was thinned out a little where the shrubbery was getting too thick.

The work on the border was delayed in the spring, partly on account of not having help till the lst. May, and partly because every available man was put to work on the criclet pitches, to rush that work to a finish in time for the opening of the cricket season. Thile this did no real harm to the border, the delay thus caused made the cultivating of it a much more laborious job — and a longer one — after the shrubs had burst into leaf.

Two cricket sitches were constructed, and proved quite an attraction to the park during the season bringing many visitors there for the first time. When the bods were in bloom, later in the season, visitors to the cricket matches were very appreciative. Cars were parked on the main drive, during the

matches, being kept strictly off the grass. A Club-house was built in the centre of the park, convenient to both pitches, for the use of the cricketers, and made to satisfy Although somewhat of an experiment, the cricket both clubs. privaleges did nothing to detract from the general purposes of the park; and comments, both verbal and in the press, showed that the experiment had been a success.

To make the pitches, 59 leads of clay and 106 leads of loam were used as it was necessary to fill in part of a walk. The actual pitches were accurately measured off, the turf removed, excavated, filled in with ashes, surfaced with clay and rolled -- a process which gave satisfaction to the Some difficulty was experienced when the steam players. roller -- which was too heavy for the work -- started rolling the eastern pitch. The ground here was originally low lying being graded and filled in, in 1911-2. Some frost was still in the ground; above the frost was very soft clay; the ashes did not bind and when the roller passed over, the surface buckled. Part of the ashes were removed; gravel was placed in the bottom of the soft spot, and it was re-rolled successfully. Turf was lifted around the pitch, re-graded and relaid, and part of a path was filled in, graded, and turfed over with what was removed from the pitches. Very little work was needed thr ughout the season to keep the pitches in good shape. A practice pitch was also made and nets provided. Very great appreciation, for the facilities thus provided, was expressed by the oricketers.

The small gate entering from 12th. Street was removed further south, to prevent the school children making a puth across the grass. The gates on the south and west sides were finished off with rustic trellis work and hors planted. The hops did not do much the first year, but will probably be more lumuriant next season. This work served a double purpose: it was an improvement to the appearance of these entrances, and kept visitors - especially children - from

taking short-outs through the border to the gives.
The pipes along the fence, inside the border were lifted and relaid on the outside of the border -- which proved much more convenient. In the S.W. corner of the border, a spraying system was installed — by means of which spraying could be accomplished by simply turning on the water. The pipes were all taken down in the fall, drained, and put away till next spring. In July, everything was so dry — grass included that the fall of th that the large hose was used for about 10 days to water beds, border, and grass; and in the summer, the lake was kept flooded — a great attraction to the children, who made fall use of it.

The grass was out all over the park, three times with the horse mover, and twice with the motor mover.

A tool horse was built on the S.B; corner from old

lumber and the whole shingled over.

The gravel hole along the western fence was partly filled in and graded. Although this is not yet completed, it made a great improvement to what formerly was the chief draw pack to the appearance of the ork. The manure used for mulching last spring, was reused partly in this fill, and partly in grading a low place on the north side of the park. Some thousands of plants many of them annuals, were used in the early part of the season to fill in the becs. These

annuals made an extraordinaryly good showing and there was a

profusion of bloom right up to the time of the first frost of quite the best the park has had. The beck were all mulched again this fall.

150' X 300', and 98' X 205', respectively, have been established and are being well patronized: Twelve highpower lamps are used to light these rinks. The grounds were used during the summer months for 68 Soccer and 23 Rugby matches and many practice games. Fifteen sets of bleachers have been placed on the morth side of the playing field. The large gates were permanently closed by request of the football authorities.

in the year was required and assembled at considerable expense and after a good deal of trouble got into running order. It was thus late in the season before any revenue sould be realized from this source. The indications are, however, that, a full season's operation will result in considerable earnings.

323 leads of cinders were used on criveways.

As it seemed impossible to properly control automobile traffic, the privelege of driving being abused by speeding and by driving into the shrubbery. It was eventually decided to close the Island to vehicular traffic except from bridge to bridge. A clearing was made just off this portion of the driveway for parking.

A very dangerous condition with regard to the heating of the paretaker's residence was discovered, and a brick

chimmey was immediately built.

The deer proved a great attraction. Features of this nature might be increased with considerable advantage for they certainly made the parks more interesting to the public.

I beg to recommend that a year-round water supply be installed here. This can be done at comparatively small cost.

A good roomy shelter, and more public conveniences are also urgently needed.

I would also recommend that the work of developing a lake for boating ind bathing in coordance with the plans prepared by the City Engineer be commenced during the commenced season.

TUXEDO P.R. As the result of very emphatic requests from residents in the neighbourhood of this Park, some improvements were made here. These improvements consisted of planting trees and shrubbery around the band-stand and on the bank at the west end of the Park. I recommend that these improvements be extended.

Executive, several changes were made to the bunkers and heserde.

and improvements made to greens and tees, the locations in several instances being changed. In making these changes 57 loads of clay and 48 of loam were moved, 21 loads of sand, 7 of rock, and 42 loads of refuse were also moved during the season.

Four new bunkers were made, two new drop ways made on greens Nos. 15, 16; and three old bunkers remodeled. A fence was built on west side of course, which proved very satisfactory until the Banff road was closed, This diverted all traffic right through the course, destroying No. 1 green, also leaving gate open for cattle to come through. Number 18 was prepared for a grass green. All Tees were relaid at the beginning of the season, and 13 for a second time before the championship games were played. Six driving mats were laid which proved very satisfactory.

About 100 trees were destroyed in the bush by boys who

used this park for a camping ground.

Very considerable camage is being done to bunkers, greens and tees, by cattle and horses, roaming on the course. This must be stopped, for it is impossible to keep greens in good playing condition, under these circumstances during the summer, and the cost of repairs when the season opens in the spring is tremendous.

The numbering of the greens and tees was changed and this relieved the congestion to some extent.

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TOMPKINS GARDENS. The building operations commenced by the Imperial Oil Co., made considerable disturbance on this plot, but as the city now owns the whole area, there cannot be any recurrance of this trouble. The excavation is being gradually filled during the winter months, as material is available.

R.N.W.M.P. MEMORIAL. This plot was planted and seeded during the season.

GARDEN CRESCENT. For several years considerable complaint has been made regarding the growth of dandelions on this area. This has now been remedied by digging up the whole lawn area and planting with trees and shrubbery.

PLAYGROUNDS. By request of the Calgary Playground Assn. the sum of \$1500.00 was allotted as salaries for playground supervisors and this money was expended during the holiday months of July and August. The supervision was very successful while it lasted, but I am more than ever convinced that these spasmodic efforts for short periods are, to a large extent, waste of money and energy, and that playground supervision will never be really successful until it is carried on throughout the year. I would strongly recommend that a properly qualified person be added to the permanent staff of this Department to organize and carry on this work.

It was suggested, at the beginning of the season, that the Parks Department assume control of the Playgrounds, and relieve the playground Assn. of this work, but as the Parks

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Department has always provided, controlled, maintained, and financed these playgrounds, it is difficult to understand to what greater extent it could take over their management. Up to the present time, the Playground Assn., has acted purely in an advisory capacity. It has been of creat assistance in this way, and it is sincerely he ed that this assistance may be continued. The report of Miss Carlyle, who was in charge of the supervisors is appended:

Dear Sir:

I have the honor to submit herewith the following report of the work of the Calgary Playground Association for the season 1919.

The season opened with the conduct of a day nursery during Calgary Exhibition. During Exhibition week a very large attendance of children at the nursery was evidence of the great appreciation of this feature of the season's work. The association is indebted to the Union Milk Company for the donation of a liberal supply of milk for the children at the Day Nursery during Exhibition Week.

Play centres were maintained at: Western Canada College; Victoria School; Ramsay School; St. George's Island Riverside School; Crescent Heights School; Riley Park and

Mewata Park, making eight centres in all.

Very much credit for the success of the work of this season is due to the ladies in charge of these centres for their faithful and painstaking efforts in the conduct of the various centres to which they were assigned.

During the first few weeks the work was greatly handicalled owing to the lack of complete equipment, and the success of the work would have been very much greater had there been better equipment at the various centres. It is impossible to hold attention and interest of children in their play, unless there is sufficient amount of equipment so that all can take part in the various play and exercises.

It was very evident from the beginning, that the centres which were provided with shade trees and other natural attractions were much more popular and were more regularly attended by the children, than was the case in the centres where these things were not available. This was particularly noticeable in the cases of Riley Park and St. George's Island.

The most popular games were the more highly organized ones such as: Baseball, Volley ball, Basket ball, Dodge ball, Captain Ball, Tennis, and Relays, all of which require team work. It seems to me that these should be encouraged since some of the beneficial results to be obtained from maintaining playground centres, will be found in the intimate association of the children with each other and their dependance on each other in these organized games.

RINKS. Sixty three rinks have been constructed to date, with requests for others still being received.

under the several park headings, some assistance was given the Tennis Players on Prince's Island, a toboggan slide was maintained during the winter months on 11th. St. Ht. Royal; Crounds for football were cleared, levelled with 35 loads of clay, steam rolled, and equipped at Victoria Park, and some improvements made to football and cricket grounds at Western Canada College.

Considerable dissatisfaction was expressed from time to time by the Soccer Football players regarding condition of the grounds. Frequent consultations were held with them and their suggestions put into effect, but it seemed quite impossible to provide conditions to meet their requirements though every effort was made to do so.

Tennis Courts: What tremendous impetus is given to a certain class of athletic sport, (when the Municipality provides facilities, was evidenced last year in the game of cricket. For the past 3 or 4 years I have advocated Municipal Tennis Courts but the amount of the Parks Appropriation has not warranted their construction.) This year there is going to be a very emphatic demand for facilities from the patrons of this gams. I have therefore again included items in Estimates for A this work.

BAND CONCERTS. Several concerts were held during the season and were well patronized. The Bandstands in several of the Parks are becoming very delapidated, and were not very desirable at any time from an aesthetic standpoint. A number of cities are now using portable bandstands which they find very satisfactory, as they can be used in they locality inside the parks. Such a bandstand could be constructed for approximately \$500.00 and would be an exceedingly useful piece of equipment.

BOUNDVARDS. Complaints have been many during the past season that the boulevards have been neglected, both as regards watering and the cutting of the grass. These complaints were justified, for in some sections the grass was only cut once during the whole season. It was impossible, however, to give better services. The appropriation was inadequate in the fice insurance and much of it was used for other purposes, as for instance weedcutting. It cannot be denied, however, that these boulevards were at times a disgrace to the Department, and to the City as a whole, and, had the rainfall been normal, it is difficult to realize what their condition would have been.

weens or neglect and two extremely dry seasons have had the inevitable result of ruining the grass in many places, and leaving nothing but a growth of weeds. This cannot be remedied in any other way than digging them up and re-seeding, a rather costly undertaking, and a proof that rigid economy cannot be practised without deterioration.

I regret to say that mischievous damage has taken a new form during the past year, many limbs being broken from the larger trees by children climbing into them. This would be largely

prevented by tree guards.

I would again like to call attention to the conditions existing on the Boulevard on the north side of the Bow River, between Centre St., and the Langevic Bridges. This area was originally a piece of very pretty weedland but the trees which at one time covered it are fast disappearing and it is only a question of time before the area will be entirely denuded. A start should be made immediately to protect and preserve those that remain, and replace those lost by underplanting with new trees In order that whatever planting is now done may be permament, I would urgo that a comprehensive plan, such as I submitted recently, for the future development of this area be adopted. There is absolutely no doubt in my mind that this area will some day be an important unit and connecting link of our park and recreation system, and for this reason a permament plan is very essential that whatever money is spent here may be used to good purpose and not spent on developement work which, in the course of a few years, might have to be undone because of change of plans.

Requests from citizens for the construction of Boulevards are increating each year. In each case where these requests are

accededato, the work is charged for at cost.

The report of the Boulevard Foreman is appended:-

Pruning: Commencing January, trees were pruned on all the Streets and Avenues south of the track. Seventh Ave., north of the track was completed, and the west end of 6th. Ave., to 2nd. St., West. The trees were all cleaned out where effected by blight St., West. and tarred. The trees that were hard pruned last spring, are not so much infected with disease as those that were not pruned.

In the fall when the grass outting was completed, the trees were again looked over, and tied up to the stakes and pruned where necessary. All the Streets and Avenues on the south side of the track were again looked over. There trees did not requi There trees did not require very hard pruning this time, as they were well trimmed out last If it had been a wet season we should have seen far Spring.

better results from this pruning.

V Planting: The vacant places in all streets and Avenues in Elbow Park where trees had died were replanted with trees of the same species; namely Balm and Ash. Second St., West from 13th.

Ave., to 23rd Ave., was planted with Dakota Balms. These are
all living with the exception of two. I find that quite a number of these trees have been damaged, some of them having the tops broken off. Eighteenth Ave., from 5th St.W. to 2nd E., 19th. Ave from 5th St.W. to 2nd.W. were planted with Balms; 20th Ave., from 5th. St.W. to 2nd.W. with Cottonwood and Maple; 23rd. Ave., 2nd. to 5th. W., and 25th. Aves., from River to 5th. St.W. with Balms; and 26th. Ave., from River to 5th. St. W. with Balms and Maples. I find that quite a number of these trees did not servive owing to the dry season. Eighteenth Ave., fr to 9th. Sts. W. was filled in with Cottonwood and Balms. Eighteenth Ave., from 7th.

Nineteenth and 20th. Aves., from 7th. to 13th. Sts. W. were filled in with Balme, and Wolf Street, was planted with Dakota Balme. These are all thriving. I would like to mention here that the home grown trees are far superior to those purchased, as they have thrived in the dry season where the others have failed.

The west end of 13th. and 14th. Aves., to 8th. Street W. were filled in with Russian Poplars, but owing to them being in a very dry condition when planted they did not survive the dry summer. Fifteenth Ave., was filled in with Balms; 12th. St., Hillhurst was filled in with Cottonwood, and portions of the Boulevards adjoining Riley Park were planted with shrubs removed from the Park Borders. (The number of these planted is shown in the tables at the end of this report)

There are quite a number of small holes on the boulevards that could be greatly improved if filled in with loam and seeded.

I find that very much damage is being done by the public also by teams and autos crossing the boulevards. I would like to call your attention to this as something should be done to stop this destruction.

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The Influenza epidemic has affected work in the Cemetery throughout the year, most noticeably in the large increase in the number of graves improved and cared for, and to a lesser extent in the number of disinterments and re-interments.

MEMORIAL PARK. There has been a movement started in the city to plant trees in memory of those citizens who made the supreme sacrifice in the Great War. The idea is a beautiful one, and quite practical, and would be a means of adding many trees to beautify our city. With all due respect to buildings, monuments, arches, and memorials of that nature, these are all artificial and so not mark the identity of the individuals they memorialize in a very pronounced way. A Memorial Park on the other hand would provide a tree for each individual soldier. In fact, it would be possible to go a step further, and provide a space around each tree which relatives could beautify with flowers. This might prove some solace to

those whose loved ones are buried in unknown graves in a strange country. Each tree should be properly dedicated to a soldier, and have tablet with name, age and other particulars. An area that could well be used for this purpose is the western slope at the approach of the Cemetery.

NUBSERIES. These are very well stocked at the present time. The trees we have, however, are small owing to constant demand for them, so soon as they are of sufficient size to trans-There is a large amount of shrubbery and plants available for immediate planting, and as space is badly needed for further propagation, I would recommend that, during the coming planting season, all other activities be stopped as far as passible, and the whole energies of the Department be devoted to this work whilst It is possible to do it. This planting time comes at the opening of the season, when the public usually begins to wake up to the need for improvements of various kinds and makes demands on the Commissioners accordingly. Much of the work so requested could, however, be done at any season, whereas the planting period is a very short one, and if allowed to pass is lost for the year.

A sprinkler system similar to that in Central Park was installed in a portion of the Nursery. This should be extended over the whole area without delay for it will repay its cost in a remarkably short time by the rapid growth and development of stock that will result, for trees of sufficient size for permamant planting can be grown in one half the time. If 5 or 10 acres of irrigated land could be placed at the disposal of the Department for this class of work, sufficient stock could be grown and sold to made possible, after a few years, the production of the Department's requirements without cost.

The demand of this and the greenhouse department for out flowers for public decorations, churches, bazears, etc., has grown enormously, and has been at times, almost beyond the capacity of the Department to meet.

Small purchases were made of hardy shrubbery and plants not already in stock, that they might be increased for future use. This introduction and propagation of new stock has proved one of the most useful features of our nursery work. That this work is worth while is proved by the fact that of trees introduced only 25% have failed to prove hardy, of shrubs, 30%, and of perennial flowering plants, 5%, and many of those species introduced successfully are now being generally grown.

(This winter 61,085 cuttings have been prepared to date.)

Besides the above, a quantity of jot plants has been maintained and cut flowers for winter, grown for decorative purposes.

In accordance with my suggestion of last year, a J HOSPITAL FARM. much smaller area was devoted to potatoes. This was fortunate as about 1/2rd of the crop was destroyed by frost, and had the area been greater, the loss would have been more serious in proportion. It is most unfortunate that drought and frost resulted in what was practically a crop failure, for the area was kept in much better condition than in any previous season, due to the fact that the comparatively large staff of 8 to 10 men was kept at work throughout the summer. These were men who had grown old in the city's service, and were transferred from the Street Cleaning Department, having outgrown their usefulness there. These men, were, of course, only about one half efficient, and, their employment, even under favourable weather conditions, would have mads it impossible in my opinion, to make the undertaking a profitable one. However, as the city is under some obligation to these men, I consider the arrangement fully justified for this reason, and it is probable to they could be of greater service when engaged in this work than in any other way. .. circunstance that seemed somewhat of an injustice to this undertaking was the fact that this Department had to bear the full cost of the holidays for each of these men, which they were entitled to by length of service, though working for the Parks Department only a few months. This amounted to over \$200.00.

of classing avai cobris, grading and improving the bands and termoss. \$1,728.58 were expinced on this work, 199 loads of refuse and gravel were removed and 307 loads of loam used.

WEED CUTTING. There seems to be an impression that the enforcement of the Provincial Weed Act and the Municipal Bylaw within the city limits is the work of this Department. If this is correct, it is quite unknown to the head of the Department. No appropriation was made for weed cutting in the 1919 Estimates, and what work was done on public property was charged to the Estimates.

I have not yet been able to discover a city on the whole

North American Continent that makes its Parks Department responsible
for this work, and it is difficult to understand why this should
be so in Calgary. The streets and lanes outside of the parking
strips that have been improved, are entirely in charge of the
Public Works Department, and the logical conclusion is that the
suppression of weeds on these areas should be the work of that
Department.

AUTOMOBILES. It was not found possible to comply with the request for a wruck made in my last report. As an alternative, truck bodies were made for my own and the general foremanic cours and these have been used for hauling light material as occasion, required. A considerable saving of horse labour was thus effected. For instance: my own car was used weekly to haul sand and water for tees at the Golf Course, this work, which had previously required a team for a day on each occasion thus being accompliant of a few hours. Plants for floral display in the several parks were also distributed by this method, some 80,000 being dislivered and planted in about two weeks, — a record time for the list work. This method has, however, only partly met the require, ments of the Department, and the service rendered and the shou at of work done by a one-ton truck in long distance hauling won 1d fully justify the expenditure.

Decorations made for visit of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales. Triumphal arch erected for 31st Batt., was decorated. Considerable work done at St. George's Island for Peace Day Celebration and exhibits made at various Flower Shows. Christmas tree was provided for the G.W.V.A. and Christmas decorations for the General Hospital.

ESTIMATES FOR 1920. These have received as careful thought and care in their preparation as in previous years, and are based on previous year's expenditures, making allowance where necessary, changed conditions. It has been suggested by the Comptroller that these Estimates should be more scientifically prepared, but, as there is a considerable element of uncertainty with regard to many of the activities of this Department; I do not see how this is possible. For instance, climatic conditions have a considerable influence on much of the work. It is impossible to scientifically prognosticate how many interments will take place or how many persons may require graves cared for; and these specific elements of uncertainty could be added to considerably. Therefore it is necessary to depend largely on the experience of previous years.

necessary to depend largely on the experience of previous years.

The Parks Estimates and Expenditures of Calgary are sometimes compared with those of other cities, but, unless due allowance is

made for the items included here, and which are so seldom a part of the Parks Department's work in other cities, such as the Cemetery, Weedcutting, Municipal Farm etc., these comparisons are very unfair.

CONCLUSION. I would like to call your attention to the fact that the enforcement of the Parks Bylaw is exceedingly lax at the present time. This Department is a believe the only Barks Department of its size that does not have a police force of its own to enforce its regulations.

I would repectfully recommend that the Annual Report of this Department be illustrated and printed. I receive reports from cities all over the North American conticent, all of which are printed, many of them quite works of art. Calgary is apparently the only city that distributes mimeographed copies, which looks decidedly cheap. This report could be made of some advertising value to the city, and might also prove a means of bringing to the attention of citizens, the recreation facilities provided by this Department. The expenditures on parks are necessarily a waste of money if they are not used and not only should the amusements be provided, but that fact should be made known to the public, that the people may be attracted to them.

In conclusion I would like to say that, though the year has been a trying one in many ways, the most exacting duties that

In conclusion I would like to say that, though the year has been a trying one in many ways, the most exacting duties that may fall to the lot of any official become comparatively easy when he feels that he has the confidence and co-operation of a large part of his employers, as represented by the public. This I gratefully feel I have.
