His Worship the Mayor, Commissioners, and Council:-

Gentlemen:-

I beg to submit my 9th annual Report covering briefly the work pertaining to the maintenance of the Calgary Parks System.

The past year has been a trying one in many respects. Besides being confronted with the task of doing the work with a greatly reduced appropriation, we were also again handicapped by an excessively dry summer, the precipitation, as recorded at the Cemetery being only 15.28 inches. This made the task of preserving the lawns, flowers etc a very arduous one, and was also favourable to the increase of insect pests. The plague of grasshoppers did immense damage to the grass areas, and, though every effort was made to combat this pest, the fight was a losing one from the start for there were always millions of these insects migrating into the city to take the place of those destroyed.

Very little has been possible beyond the ordinary necessary care of the various parks, such as keeping the drives and walks in order, maintaining, as far as possible, the freshness and beauty of the plantings and lawns, grass cutting, weeding, watering, snow removal etc., and providing the usual play and athletic facilities. Special attention was given, however, to the thinning out, pruning, spraying and dressing of the trees on all the parks.

The gross revenue earned by the Department was \$25984.90, \$23569.70 of which was paid to the general funds of the city, and the balance credited to appropriation, thus making the net expenditure for the year \$42,753.27. It is worthy of note, particularly at this period of unemployment, that, of the total expenditure of the department \$53460.30 or 70% was paid to citizens for labour.

The actual cost per capita for all parks services during the past year was 61 1/6 ¢, which means that for this small sum, opportunity for outdoor rest and recreation in a hundred different ways was afforded the 65,000 citizens of Calgary. That these opportunities were fully appreciated and taken advantage of was clearly demonstrated to any person who might be sufficiently interested to take notice of the large number who enjoyed the floral displays, rest, and quiet afforded by the parks or indulged according to their fancy in any one of the many forms of sport for which facilities are provided.

CENTRAL PARK.

The sprinkler system was extended by 800 feet, 268 feet of wooden curbing was placed at the lawn edges. One serious objection to cinder walks in parks is that people will gradually encroach on the grass to avoid the cinders, making an irregular edging and an untidy appearance. This wooden curbing obviates this to some extent. Paths were resurfaced with 79 loads of cinders, twenty-one loads of refuse were removed. Twenty-one trees and 1460 perennials were planted, and 16974 flower-plants were used for the regular floral display that is

annually made in this park. In planning colour effects for a public park such as this, where pleasure has to be given to a large number of people possessed of varied tastes and multifarious likes and dislikes, this scheme of bedding out is necessary in preference to the natural herbaceous border. The people require masses of colour and brilliancy which cannot be obtained in any other way.

Three war trophies in the form of German guns were placed in front of the bandstand. It is intended to provide these guns, together with those placed in other parks with cement bases, to which they can be securely anchored.

Six band concerts were given by the Salvation Army Band. No charge was made for these concerts, the Band being permitted to make a collection on each occasion. ✓

Mowata Park.

Some grading and levelling was done on the area south and southwest of the Armouries, resulting in a very much neater and tidier appearance and also making it possible to extend the area of the football field and the skating rink. Preparation was made for fencing on the south side and considerable repairs were made to the fence along the river. This fence is getting into a very dilapidated condition and should be rebuilt. The Military have practically commandeered the area used at one time by the Calgary Gun Club and are using it as a riding school. Otherwise I had hoped to be able to construct tennis courts on this site.

RILEY PARK.

One German gun was placed in this park. Six hundred and seven trees, 286 shrubs, 65 perennials, and 6400 annuals were planted. Grading of the new road on the south side of the park was completed, and gravelling was commenced. A further attempt was made to level the area at the west entrance but this work had to be quickly abandoned through lack of money to continue it. Forty-five loads of cinders were used in road building, 30 loads of refuse removed, 26 loads of loam used for lawn renovation, 33 loads of gravel used on the roads. A dry cobblestone wall was constructed to hold up the cutbank on the north side road, 31 loads of rock being used. ✓

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND.

Two German guns were placed on either side of the Pavillion. Two new flower borders were made extending the present scheme west along the main driveway and north towards the refreshment pavilion. Two thousand two hundred perennials and 2500 annual flowering plants were used on this park. One hundred and twenty loads of cinders were used in resurfacing the roads.

The lawns, except for a small area around the pavilion, were ruined through drought. It is impossible to do any adequate watering with the meagre supply at present available. This supply could be considerably increased at a comparatively small expenditure.

By special arrangement with the Calgary Auto Club, a permanent bridge was erected connecting St. Patrick's with the main Island and this small Island was equipped as a Tourist Camping Ground for which purpose it is splendidly adapted. A water supply, shelters, tables, seats, and fireplaces were provided, and a caretaker placed in charge at the expense of the Club. The facilities thus provided were very well patronized and much appreciated by tourists from all parts of the continent.

The Salvation Army Band gave a number of bandconcerts.

The Parks Superintendent was given authority to make arrangements for the holding of public meetings on this park as applications were made. Several of these meetings were held during the season under conditions that seemed quite satisfactory to all parties concerned

and which did not disturb or, in any way, inconvenience picnic parties and others making use of the park. A great many more Lodge, Sunday School, and other large picnics of that nature were held than in previous years.

The two Mule Deer are still in a thriving condition, and are a never-ending source of interest to the visitors to the park. I would very much like to see this feature extended by the addition of other harmless and easily tamed native fauna. Such animals can be kept practically without cost, and add considerably to the interest of such a park as St. Georges's Island which is ideal for such a purpose.

A small pool similar to that at Riley Park could be constructed in this Park at very small cost and would undoubtedly prove a great boom to the young folks.

VICTORIA PARK.

One German gun was placed in this Park but was afterwards removed to No. 1 firehall.

SHAGANAPPI PARK, MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE.

The past year was the most successful in the history of the Course, due to some extent, no doubt, to the increasing popularity of the game of golf, but in great measure also due to improvements made to the Course more particularly in providing oil and sand greens. There had been continuous complaint with regard to the condition of the greens in previous years. This year they gave general satisfaction.

The expenditure on the Course was \$4400.34. Gross revenue \$5712.50, surplus of revenue over expenditure \$1312.16.

The Clubhouse was opened on April 10th and closed on November 30th. Play on the course has, however continued all winter in favourable weather. 17297 persons signed the register. This does not by any means represent the total number of players, for it seems practically impossible to get the signatures of all those using the course. Clubhouse open 235 days. Greatest number of players in one day 227 on the 24th May. Daily average 74.

Season tickets sold: Gents 146, Ladies 60, Children 6.

Half-season tickets sold: Gents 9, Ladies 10, Children 1.

Green Fees:- 9575

Lockers rented:- 115.

Rocks were taken from front of Green No. 3, and the holes filled with clay. Driving Tees were all relaid twice during the season. A new Tee made at No. 14. Fairway No. 14 was extended fifty yards. The fairways were kept mowed during the season with the horse mower. The fairways were all pegged out indicating distances, direction flags were also placed. Gophers were destroyed by poison, and their burrows filled up with clay. All bunkers were raked and weeded during the season, fifty-eight loads of sand were used on greens. A new net was erected for driving practice. A seat was placed at each tee for the convenience of players. Considerable fencing was done with the result that very little damage has been done so far this winter by straying cattle and horses.

The internal arrangements of the Clubhouse were changed to some extent by converting the Visitors' Room into a Ladies' Locker Room and adding what was originally the Ladies' Locker Room on to the caretakers quarters. These quarters were also lathed and plastered, and the experiment of having the caretaker remain there all winter was tried. The building is, however, not in any way suitable for winter

Habitation particularly for a man with a large family of young children, and I would advise against a repetition of this experiment.

It is proposed to provide the following by way of improved facilities for the coming season:- A golf ball marker to be kept in Pavilion, A ball rack on No. 1 Tee. Small shelters at Nos. 8, 14, & 18 Tees. Enlarging of all tees so that there is less wear on one particular spot.

Sand and water boxes are being remodelled this winter and constructed in such a way that cattle cannot get access to the water.

CITY HALL GARDENS A sprinkler system, similar to that in use in Central Park and the Nurseries was installed. One thousand two hundred and eighty plants were used in the floral display. A number of the small flower beds were seeded down to grass.

Tompkins Gardens, R.N.W.M.P. Memorial plot, Mount Royal and Elbow Park Street Intersection Plots and the Bow and Elbow River Bridge Approaches were maintained throughout the season. Two thousand four hundred flowering plants were used in Tompkins Gardens.

PLAYGROUNDS.

The apparatus on the 27 playgrounds operated by the Department was kept in repair throughout the year. No new playgrounds were equipped and, for the first time in five years, no supervision was provided. Much as I regretted striking out this item from the year's estimates, it seemed to be the only method by which the appropriation could be reduced to the required extent. Considerable dissatisfaction was expressed in many quarters because no supervision was provided.

ATHLETICS. The resumption of civil life by many young men, who, through the war, had grown accustomed to an out-door life, has led to a very greatly increased demand for recreational space and facilities, which demand the Department, recognising that this must be one of its most important functions for the future, has, to the best of its ability, endeavoured to meet.

From this appropriation the three Soccer and Rugby fields at Mewata and Hillhurst, the two Baseball Diamonds at Mewata and three cricket pitches at Riley were maintained. Rent (amounting to \$2500.00) and general maintenance of buildings and grounds at Hillhurst were also provided for from this item. Tennis Courts and a general sports field was provided in Crescent Heights, further improvements made to tennis court at S. George's Island, a second cricket pavilion was provided at Riley, improvements to dressing room accommodation at Mewata, \$102.10 was spent in special preparation of buildings and grounds for Scottish All Star Football Match and assistance given in providing and preparing grounds for School Sports.

Baseball. The diamonds at Mewata were in use every night and on Wednesday afternoons throughout the summer.

Football, (Association) There was a match or practice game every night on the Mewata field. At Hillhurst 86 regular matches were played. Attendance approximately 23000. Record attendance, (Scottish Game) 6000.

Football, (Rugby). The new field immediately west of the Armouries proved very popular, five games being played each week during the season. Fifteen games were played at Hillhurst.

Cricket. The three cricket pitches at Riley Park were in continual use throughout the season. Seventy-one matches being played and practices held four evenings each week. Three matches were played for the Van Wart Cup Competition. Several outside Clubs were entertained. Attendance of spectators was greatly increased this season.

RINKS.

During the winter of 1920-21, fifty-eight rinks were provided. This winter twenty-five Public School, eight Separate School, forty-three Public and thirteen Private Rinks have been periodically flooded. Fees have been collected for the flooding of private rinks, also for checking and dressing-room privileges provided at Mewata and Hillhurst Parks after 6:30 p.m. These two latter rinks have been exceedingly popular, huge crowds congregating on them whenever the ice was in condition and weather favourable. Five hockey rinks have been provided as follows:- Mewata, 1. Hillhurst 2. Crescent Heights, 1. East Calgary, 1. This is two additional to last year but is still a long way from being a sufficient number to provide for all the hockey teams of the city. In allotting these rinks preference is given, as far as possible, to the junior teams. Receipts at Hillhurst Dressing Rooms, \$431.70.

It has been found necessary to enlarge considerably the dressing room accommodation at Mewata.

Five hundred and twenty nine permits for hockey games were issued.

A skating Meet was held at Mewata Park in January, at which some twenty events in championship races for boys and girls up to the age of 18 years were run off. Mr. J. Gordon was largely instrumental in promoting this Meet. There was a large attendance and very keen competition.

There was considerable overexpenditure of this item, due to the fact that the skating season opened much earlier than usual. The cold weather had the effect, however, of closing down other activities at an earlier date, so that there were sufficient unexpended balances to take care of this overexpenditure.

BOULEVARDS.

The effort made by frequent public appeal to induce citizens to take some interest in maintaining a tidy and pleasing appearance on the streets by cutting and watering the boulevards met with very little response. I beg therefore to recommend that a larger appropriation be made so as to enable the Department to do this work regularly, which, after all, is the most efficient and economical method. It is more desirable in every way for these boulevards to be regularly cut and a neat appearance maintained than to have them in a most disreputable and unkempt condition all through the best part of the season and finally have to cut them because of the weeds that are maturing on them.

All trees have been cultivated, pruned, wounds have been cleaned and dressed, and staking and tying regularly attended to. The pests that proved most troublesome during the past season were red spider, aphides, and borers. Trees were sprayed with kerosene emulsion for the former, and carbon bisulphide injected into the borings of the latter. All trees throughout the City became badly infested with red spider early in June, which for a time threatened to completely defoliate them. Spraying with water being the best remedial measure for this pest, this was done to the greatest extent possible, but so generally distributed was the pest that our efforts proved quite inadequate to cope with the situation. Fortunately a succession of heavy rain storms cleaned the trees before serious damage was done. Six hundred and eighty-seven new trees were planted. Three hundred and twenty-six loads of refuse were removed. Considerable repairs were made to the Bow River Boulevard fences, and the fence extended by 250 feet at the St. George's Island end.

As the street trees grow there is an ever increasing interference with their proper development from overhead wires. Trees on the streets of a prairie city should be far too valuable to be mutilated and eventually destroyed because of these wires which should either be underground or in back lanes.

Automobiles skidding into small trees has been a source of considerable damage and annoyance in some parts of the city.

During the year a list was made of all property owners who had enclosed a portion of the boulevard for the purpose of making it a part of their private gardens, and these people were required to pay a nominal rent and sign an agreement protecting the city's interests. I beg to recommend that a bylaw be passed absolutely prohibiting such enclosures in the future.

An additional charge of \$5.00 has been made during the last year for Sunday burials. It was thought that this might have the effect of eliminating many of them, but the extra charge seems to have had little effect.

NURSERY.

The nursery has received careful attention and a great amount of work has been done in propagating, pruning and shaping young trees in readiness for street planting.

Every effort is being made to increase the nursery stock not only to meet the requirements of the Department but to be able to meet the demand of private citizens who are coming in ever increasing numbers to make purchases.

Chrysanthemums and Carnations for cutting and winter flowering pot plants have been grown during the winter for supplying the Hospitals, Libraries, etc.

STABLES.

The only remaining horse of the four teams originally owned by the Department was transferred to the Public Works Department, the motor truck being able to take the place of these teams to some extent.

AUTOS.

It was found necessary, for economic and satisfactory running to equip the old motor truck belonging to the Department with a Smith Form-a-truck body. While this resulted in a slight overexpenditure of this item, the expenditure would have been even greater for repairs on account of the heavy loads that had to be hauled.

WEEDCUTTING.

\$249.93 was spent in cutting weeds on streets, lanes, unimproved boulevards, etc., and \$1533.36 on private property. 1115 locations being cut over.

✓ GENERAL. The Department co-operated with the Board of Trade and the Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs in their Tree Planting Campaign and assisted with the sale which proved a great success, and undoubtedly aroused considerable interest in the planting in the city.

A plan of the city on which suggested park areas are marked has been prepared for the Rental Agent, that he may make reservations for this purpose as these lands come into possession of the city. Detailed studies of possibilities in the way of developing these parks, parkways and boulevards at some future time are being prepared as opportunity occurs. A strong argument in favour of the provision of adequate park space is that it prevents the over crowding of the parks, which over-crowding results in deterioration of lawn and plantation areas and a high cost of maintenance.

Before closing this report I would like to speak of the cordial spirit of co-operation exhibited towards this Department by all the other branches of the city's service, which has not only been a source of satisfaction and gratification to myself but has been most helpful to the work of the Department.
