His Worshitp the Mayor, Commissioner, and Council:-

Gentlemen:-

I herewith submit my 12th Annual Report covering Park, Playground, Boulevard, Golf and Cemetery work carried out under your direction during 1925.

With the limited appropriation it is possible to make for Parks purposes under existing circumstances, the matter of permanent improvement becomes wholly a question of a very limited selection from a long list of very fine possibilities that this city has.

Each year as it passes establishes a new record in the use of Calgary's recreational facilities, and the people take more and more advantage of the opportunities that are afforded them by this Department. Throughout the school vacation period the playgrounds were used to full advantage and those centres under supervision were very popular judging by their crowded conditions throughout the season. The Golf Course was also crowded whenever weather was suitable for play and every cricket, football, and baseball ground was in active use at all times. During the winter months the skating rinks were seenes of great activity and it was found quite impossible to accommodate the large number of hockey teams on the several rinks.

The Department now has under its care 807.97 acres of

The Department now has under its care 807.97 acres of park and cemetery lands about 130 of which are under intensive cultivation, with trees, shrubbery, lawns, flowerbeds, drives and walks requiring the same attention as private grounds. In addition to the regular care of these, 1 golf course, 5 football fields, 4 cricket pitches, 3 baseball diamonds, 7 tennis courts and 17 children's playgrounds are being maintained and we have found these facilities all too few for the demand for outdoor sport.

Plans for the near future should contemplate the creation of at least one park of considerable area. In a park of a hundred or more acres a large part could be left in its natural state, thus preserving within the city a bit of the country as nature planned it. The cost of maintenance of such a tract is of course very small compared with the more intensively cultivated small parks, whilst the charm of such an area increases as the city grows.

The increased public interest shown in the beautifying of the City has been very gratifying. This has been particularly evidenced in the activities of the several Community Service Clubs and other organizations. In this connection I would particularly mention the work of the Kiwanis Club. The Department continues to co-operate in every way possible with citizens in their efforts to beautify their home surroundings and thereby improve the city as a whole aesthetically. To make a City beautifyl we are undoubtedly dependent on private effort on the part of the individuals that compose the City on the one hand and the City in its corporate capacity on the other. Each individual citizen that shows an interest in improving his own surroundings has indirect influence by the simple power of suggestion on all passers-

The season from a horticultural standpoint ppened favourably. Trees, shrubs and perennials came through the winter 1923-1924 in excellent condition, and there was very little winter killing. There was sufficient moisture in the soil to give growth a good start in the early spring. The past season, however, demonstrated very forcibly the climatic changes it is possible to experience in this part of Canada. A severe hailstorm immediately after plants had been set out for the summer display did very considerable damage, the trees being stripped of their foliage and the young wood badly bruised, and plants were damaged to such an extent in those parks that were near the centre of the storm area that the floral display was ruined for the season. The month of august was cool which resulted in slow development of the annual plants, so that the display of blossom was far from being up to the usual standard. The heavy wet snow that fell almost continuously for five days in September, whilst the trees were still in full foliage, played havoc with the larger street trees. Many of them, are in such condition, as a result of that storm, that they must receive immediate attention in the matter of tree surgery if they are to be saved. Many of them will show the effects for a number of years to come even though they receive the best of attention.

CENTRAL PARK

After considering sites in several parts of the city it was finally decided that a location north of the Public Library in Central Park was the most suitable for the Cairn offered by the Historic Sites Monument Board of Canada to, "Commemorate the arrival in August 1875 of Troop "F" of the North West Mounted Police under Inspector E.A. Brisebois and the establishment of the Post, Fort Calgary, on the West bank of the Elbow River at its junction with the Bow River within the limits of the City of Calgary." This memorial was unveiled on July 11th 1925.

Five lighting standards were installed along the south side of the park and were so arranged as to form a first unit of a complete lighting scheme, the idea being eventually to place five along the north side and others east and west of the S. African Memorial. The Park should then be adequately lighted. Those already installed gave excellent service and are a much needed improvement. Some further painting of the bandstand was done but there is still much of this building to do.

More trees were removed from the border immediately west of the Library, and all the poplars in the park headed back heavily, to avoid further damage from snow.

MEWATA PARK

This Park was again intensively used throughout the season for baseball, football and other games. 30 Senior League Baseball games were played and six with out of town teams, also 24 Intermediate and 24 Junior games and the diamonds were occupied by other teams every day when weather permitted. Lacrosse was played twice a week. The football ground was not used till late in the season when the school teams made use of it each evening, and all the High School Rugby games were played in this park.

Considerable improvement was made to the main baseball diamond by resurfacing with 57 loads of earth, and fences, bleachers etc., were repaired. Some levelling was also done to the south diamond. The Baseball League expressed great satisfaction with these improvements and have informed me that they had a most successful season.

The bleacher seats are in an advanced state of decay and are becoming dangerous and a new fence is badly needed along the east side of the park.

RILEY PARK

A portion of the pool side was lined with cobblestones to prevent the wearing and washing down of the banks. This was done by way of experiment but so eminently satisfactory has it proved that it is proposed to not only complete the banks but to line the bottom in the same manner.

The floral display in this park was exceedingly poor as compared with previous years, due to the fact that many annuals were completely destroyed and the perennials so battered as to destroy all possibility of them flowering that season by the severe hailstorm of early June.

ST.GEORGE'S ISLAND

The model of Fort Calgary used in the Jubilee parade has been placed in St.George's Island to remain there permanently.

Numerous offers of gifts of native animals and birds have been received and have, in most cases, had to be regretfully declined owing to lack of facilities or the means to provide for them.

Due to showery weather during the summer there were fewer picnics than usual.

The Dominion Day and Labour Day Festivities were held at St. George's Island as usual and were a great success.

The refreshment building was refloored and the roof

shingled and painted.

The old bridge on the south road which was so decayed as to be very dangerous was removed and the water course filled in at this point, a 24 inch culvert being placed there to take care of the water during floods.

The roof of the picnic kitchen was reshingled and the whole

painted. The animal shelters in Zoo were also painted.

Some patching of the main driveway was done but this driveway is in very bad condition at the present time.

1160 ft. of 3", 700 ft. of 2", 60 ft. of 15" water service pipe was laid with 8 additional taps. This was all old pipe, the 3" being obtained from the bridge where it was replaced by a 4" main to increase the pressure which has never been adequate since the new comfort stations were built.

A good deal of brush was cut at the Auto Camp to provide additional facilities for camping, also to make it safer for traffic

at the bridge approaches.

The flood tide of golf that has swept over the country during the past decade has not only brought about a higher standard of play but has also developed a very much higher degree of artistic design in the courses themselves, so that, at the present time it is not sufficient to have a course that merely provides facilities to play the game or even elaborate clubhouses but the course must be designed in such a way as to preserve and enhance any natural beauty there may be, each hole and bunker to have individuality and character, yet to fit naturally into its environment. This is now the aim at the Municipal Golf Course, particularly with reference to the additional land recently acquired, and as a first step towards this end a certain amount of planting of trees and shrubs is annually being done to beautify that area.

The past season was a very satisfactory one financially the revenue exceeding that estimated by \$299.25 and also exceeding expenditures as shown at the commencement of this report.

One of the most important activities of the Department during the past year, in so far as development work was concerned, was the commencement of improvements to the 40 acres of land added to the Golf Course, whilst the need for extending the course has been very keenly felt, this was not possible till the City took possession of this land. It will take several years yet to properly develop the whole of this area, but we can now confidently look forward to the time when the capacity of the course will be greatly increased with time when the capacity of the course will be greatly increased, with added comfort and convenience to the players.

Six tees were furnished with mats, greens resurfaced twice during the season, 22 loads of rock removed from fairways and Nos.1 and 2 Friways extended on to the new land, lengthening these by

173 and 222 yards respectively.

GOLF COURSE (CONTID)

Trees and shrubs were planted, the painting of shelters and equipment was completed, the lockers were rearranged in the club house to improve the lighting of the locker room, a new counter was built and the main hall painted.

ELBOW BOULENARD PARK The development of this strip along the bank of the Elbow River emphatically demonstrates the desirability of making adequate provision of similar areas at various locations on our river frontages for small parks and neighbourhood open spaces which a growing population will require.

SUNDRY PIOTS

The numerous small plots scattered through the city were maintained. Complaint was made by certain residents in the locality that the group of shrubbery at the intersection of 20th avenue and 8th St. W. created a dangerous condition for traffic at this point and a request was made that it be entirely removed. Other residents were opposed to its removal. A compromise was made by cutting down the shrubbery to a level below the line of vision of auto drivers.

A strip 172 X 380 across the north end of this park has been leased to the North Hill Community and Athletic association to be used for Curling, hockey and skating rinks and tennis courts.

We eds were cut on the park and trees and shrubs watered and

cultivated. A good deal of planting of trees and shrubs was also done by the Crescent Heights Horticultural Society.

ATHLE TICS

Baseball took a great stride in popularity this year. It is conservatively estimated that an average of 2.500 people witnessed the games played at Mewata Park.

At Hillhurst the football field was maintained for the soccer practices and Rugby Games, and building and fences repaired. School sports were held at Hillhurst Park this year, the ground being prepared for these events by the Parks Department. There were 2,500

in attendance on this occasion.

The Department assisted with the entertainment of the "All Black" New Zealand Footballers and the Rigley College Cricketers during their respective visits.

Assistance was also given in the maintenance of Crescent Heights athletic ground, City Hall Tennis and Volley Ball courts, South Calgary Athletic Ground and Toxedo Park Football ground. caretaker was stationed at the Elbow River Swimming Pool, but, owing to the high water during a considerable part of the season this was not used to the same extent as in previous seasons.

PLA YGROUNDS

The same number of playgrounds were maintained and supervissed as in 1924.

The record of our supervised playground activities as shown under Statistics, seems to indicate the most successful season yet. The teams all worked hard to better their team work, standard of play, and sportsmanship, and showed a marked improvement over other seasons. As a climax to the season's activities a general get together field day was held at hiley Park with an enjoyable programme of field events and awarding of trophies and prizes.

PLAYGROUNDS (CONT'D)

The successful operation of the playgrounds was in large pant due to the splendid co-aperation of the supervisors in charge. Their effective work in organizing teams, arranging games, and promoting play in all its aspects added materially to the usefulness of the playgrounds. They seemed to fully realize the importance and responsibilities connected with their position and displayed tact, patience and good judgement at all times.

RINKS Skating and hockey rinks have been constructed and maintained at Hillhurst and Meweta Parks and assistance given in the maintenance of rinks at Tuxedo Park and on the Elbow River and the Water Works Department has been paid by this Department for the flooding of Community Rinks at 6 other locations.

The annual childrens' skating races were held at Mewata

Park there being 24 events and 284 entries. There was alarge crowd of spectators on this occasion.

644 hockey games were played on Mewata & Hillhurst Rinks.

BOULEVARDS

Our street-tree work during the past year covered planting of new trees, the trimming of the older trees, which means the removal of all dead and unsightly wood, all low overhanging branches which interfered with the proper use of streets and sidewalks and those branches which were in contact with overhead wires. It also covered the removal of dead, dangerous or otherwise undersirable trees, the removal of roots that were lifting pavement or penetrating

sewers, and the necessary staking, cultivating and watering.
724 trees were planted, the grass raked and mowed twice during the season and renovating was done by request at 12th Ave. and 16th St. W., 25th Ave. and 2nd St. W. and 38th Ave. Elbow Park.

Under Local Improvement by-law, new boule vards were constructed as follows:-

3rd ave. N.E. from 2nd to 3rd Sts. 13th St. N.W. from Gladstone ave. to 5th ave. and 16th St. S.E. from 24th ave. to Lane were seeded and planted with trees. 32nd Ave. W. from 7th St. to lane and 10th St. N.W. from Centre Ave. to Gladstone Ave. were loamed and 18th Ave. E. from 9th St. to 11th St. was partly loamed.

As a lready mentioned in this report much damage was done to

street trees by the memorable snow storm of September. It was naturally the first aim of the Department to make the streets safe after the storm by removing hanging or broken limbs before starting general repair work. This latter is now well under way, one section of the City receiving treatment before starting on another. This work entails the cutting away of all splintered wood where limbs were torn off and the cutting of stubs close to the limb or trunk of the tree leaving scars smooth to shed water and sterilizing and waterproofing to prevent decay. We now have some 40,000 trees on the streets and in the parks. With that number to be gone over it is obvious that this work must be rushed as rapidly as possible if it is to be completed this winter.

Memorial Driveway

200 trees were planted by the Kiwanis Club and 347 by the parks Department and the club members cultivated all trees on the Driveway twice during the season.

CEMETERIES

The steady expansion of the area to be cared for naturally increases the cost of maintenance annually, without taking into consideration improvements to the sections as they are added, such as road building, water extension etc. Then, in recent years there have been more or less extraneous costs, such as the Annual Memorial Ceremony, and improvements to the Hebrew Cemetery, this latter as a result of a very just demand on the part of the trustees of that Cemetery, but, none the less an added expense to the Department, Then the Field of Honour which the City has obligated itself to

maintain is steadily increasing in area.

The heavy snows of last winter entailed a vast amount of work during the early months of the year, and it was difficult at

times to keep the cemetery roads open for traffic.

Union Cemetery

The burial place of Col. Macleod, Commissioner of the R.N.W.M.P. in the Union Cemetery has been made historic by the fact that it was Col. Macleod that gave Calgary its name and 1925 being the 50th Anniverdary of the establishment of "Fort Calgary", it was thought fitting that this spot should be renovated and marked in some distinctive manner. Accordingly the monument was relettered, the plot reseeded and placed under perpetual care, a flagstaff erected and a large slob of provide was reletted and a large slab of granite quartzite in its natural condition, placed near the plot. On this slab it is intended to place a bronze tablet at some future date. I would suggest the following wording as being suitable for this bronze tablet:-

> "Near this spot is interred the remains of Col. James Farquarson Macleod, Commissioner of the R.N.W.M.P., who gave Calgary its name."

30 lots in this Cemetery have come under perpetual care during the past year.

The main drive was surfaced with 4" of gravel for a distance of 280 yards, also the road between sections "P" and "R".

430 yards of rock guttering was laid. 6 culverts were installed to convey drainage water

across the east road.

75 superficial yards of rock retaining wall was erected and planted.

A permenent flag pole was erected on the G.W.V.A. Plot. The provision of dignified and appropriate entrance gates and fencing is a matter that I have, on several previous occasions called attention to as being desirable and expedient.

Burnsland Cemetery

Neat white posts and chain were placed at the angles
of roads where there was an inclination to cut corners.

A culvert and deep ditch was made to prevent flooding
of graves in section "H" from water draining from the Macleod trail.

955 ft. of 1" pipe and 12 taps were installed in

The loaming and seeding of plots in the perpetual care sections was followed up as closely as possible and all weeds and rough grass cut at intervals on the unused areas.

There is need for a flag pole for the Field of Honour, also park seats and refuse baskets in this Cemetery.

NURSERIES

A record was established in 1925 over all seasons in the matter of permanent planting of trees, shrubs etc., and of stock shipped from the nurseries. I think the reason for this was that the early part of April was warm with the result that frost left the ground rapidly and the digging of stock was possible at a much earlier date than usual together with the fact that cooler weather intervened, keeping stock dormant and thus prolonging the planting season. The planting season opened April 17th and closed the last week in May. 2275 shrubs and 1750 herbaceous perennials were disposed

of at the Annual Tree sale held under the suspices of the Board of

Trade, Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs on arbour Pay.

10 trees and 600 shrubs valued at \$81.00 were donated to the Crescent Heights Horticultural Society for planting in Crescent Park and 62 trees and 550 shrubs to the General Hospital. The Department was put to no expense in the matter of planting in either case.

GENERA L

Assistance was given the several Horticultural Societies in the matter of displays, equipment, judging etc.

Auto camps were equipped and maintained on the north bank of the Bow Kiver and in Koxborough Place during the high tide of tourist traffic.

64,646 plants were supplied from the City greenhouses and used in the floral displays of the several parks and gardens. In addition pot plants were also furnished from time to time for decoration of various kinds by Mr. Stark who now leases these greenhouses.

During the past year other departments of the City have co-operated in a most helpful and cordial manner with the Parks
Department. Certain phases of the work of this Department are specialized in by other departments and your Superintendent has sought technical advice of these departments in problems concerning light, water and buildings and planning of streets in relation to boulevard construction, engineering etc., and has always received most helpful advice from the heads of these departments.
