His Worship the Mayor, Commissioner, and Council-

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my annual report, covering the activities of the Parks Department for the year 1927.

Owing to the setting aside of numerous areas for parks purposes during recent years, the City of Calgary has now laid the foundation of an excellent system of parks, playgrounds, and boulevards. The City now has twenty-four parks, with a total area of 825.92 acres within the city limits with two parks outside the city with an area of 180 acres. There are eleven children's playgrounds and 329853.9 ft., (approximately 62½ Miles) of boulevards. With but few exceptions there is a park and playground area in every district. In addition the Department has numerous ornamental spaces of small size scattered throughout the city, making a total acreage of park lands, including the Exhibition Grounds of 1108.97.

More or less development work is taking place on many of these areas due to an insistent public demand, and, naturally the expense of maintenance is increasing correspondingly from year to year.

The maintenance work of the parks increases annually as the older areas reach full development and improvements are commenced on the newer ones, and the problem of properly maintaining the improvements made with the appropriation available is an increasingly difficult one.

The past year was the most successful in the history of the Department. The various activities and projects have all shown substantial growth. The recreational features deserve special mention as it is through the facilities for recreation that are provided that the Parks System is becoming better known and ever more useful to all classes of citizens.

The only lands definitely added to the system during the past year were an area of 4.7 acres for playground purposes at Ogden, and the low-lying land and slope of hillside in Roxborough Place.

Some thought might now well be given to the linking up of our numerous scattered parks by planting trees on main routes of travel between these areas. By making it possible to pass from one to another of the parks and other points of interest within the city along boulevarded and well kept streets, an extremely good impression will be made on the minds of those visiting our city, and a very pleasant tour of the city provided for the citizens themselves.

I would strongly recommend the setting aside for park purposes of all land that the city owns between the top of the bluff and the river bank on the north side of the Bow from Langevin to Centre Street Bridges and westwards to Fourth Street West, and the acquiring as rapidly as possible any that the city does not own. What remains of the trees and tangled growth of shrubbery on these hillsides, which is

rapidly being destroyed, should be preserved. The roadway along the river bank should be widened and developed, also the road at the top of the bluff from which elevation is to be obtained the finest view of the city possible from any point. If this driveway could be developed westwards together with the road that winds down the hillside from the end of Crescent Road to the foot of Tenth Street, from which point a splendid view of Riley Park is obtained, an exceedingly fine scenic driveway will be developed.

Weather.

The heavy snows of the winter of 1926-7 proved very beneficial, and there was very little winter killing of trees and shrubs and practically no loss of plant life during the winter. Very considerable damage was done, however, at the end of April by a reversion to below zero temperature after a comparatively mild period. Not only were many herbaceous plants in the open destroyed, but water services were frozen everywhere, and the frost was so severe and accompanied by such terrific gales that much havoc was wrought in greenhouses and hotbeds.

The spring continued cold, but this proved an advantage in retarding growth and prolonging the planting season, and enabled us to establish a record in this regard.

The summer was cool and very rainy, and, whilst the heavy rain storms and hail of July did an immense amount of damage the very wet season proved most conclusively that an abundance of moisture is very desirable, as the city never looked prettier than it did during the past summer, and, due to this abundance of moisture, growth was quite phenomenal.

The winter of 1927-8 started early and has so far been severe, but there has been considerably more snow even than during the previous winter. In fact, the snowfalls have been the heaviest on record, and there have been few chinooks so that I do not anticipate much damage unless the spring is again unpropitious.

Forestry

Trees on the Boulevards and certain of the parks still show the effect of the damage done by the snowstorms of September 1926, and much dead and splintered wood has again been removed.

Trees and shrubs in all parks, public gardens and boulevards have been pruned, thinned, and marked for transplanting where necessary.

There was very little trouble during the past year from insect pests and disease.

Floriculture.

The abundance of moisture that characterized the summer, resulted in most luxuriant growth, and, where not damaged by hail, the floral displays had a brilliance and effectiveness that was most pleasing.

CENTRAL PARK

A further extension of the herbaceous perennial border that is being developed to take the place of the line of arbors removed two years ago was made, and 578 plants were used to fill the new border. A row of choice shrubs was planted at the back of this border.

Another section of the bandstand was painted, park seats were also repaired and painted.

By request of the Old Timer's Association, an oak tree that was planted some 40 years ago on a property on Sixth Avenue, and was in danger of being destroyed was carefully lifted and moved to the west end of the park.

Six new beds were made and planted with roses over a carpet of dwarf annuals. These roses did remarkably well and were a mass of bloom for quite a long season, one bed planted with roses of the dwarf polyantha type commencing to blossom on July 10th and continuing till October 25th. The rose beds were planted with tulips and narcissi during the Fall.

The Peonies presented to the City by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales were planted in a bed specially prepared for them in front of the Library.

A very delightful concert was given by the Band of the P.P.C.L.I. on the evening of August 26th, and thoroughly enjoyed by a very large concourse of citizens.

MEWATA PARK

Seventeen deciduous trees and 140 shrubs were planted at the south east corner of the park and 55 spruce were planted in border, fence repaired along riverside wherever necessary.

Three hundred feet of new fencing was built on the 11th St.W. side. This fence is attached to three inch posts set in concrete, and is not only very strong and durable but has a very neat and ornamental appearance. It is hoped that it will be possible to gradually extend this class of fencing completely around the park.

Park furniture was painted.

Considerable repairs were made to Baseball Diamonds and the whole areas resurfaced, 76 loads of clay being used. The bleachers were also repaired. The Basket Ball pitch and Children's Playground were also resurfaced and apparatus repaired.

All bleachers (built in 1914) are becoming very delapidated and should be thoroughly renovated.

Twenty-five Senior, 18 Junior, 12 Intermediate, and 20 Juvenile baseball matches were played, and 10 Lacrosse Matches, these latter teams also practicing three times each week.

Eighteen intermediate and 12 junior Rugby Matches, and five Soccer matches were played.

RILEY PARK

The cobblestone retaining wall at the Wading Pool, that have been in course of construction for several years were almost completed during the past season. When this is completed, it is hoped that it will be possible to surface the floor of the pool.

The posts at the main entrances were getting into a very bad condition due to the fact that the heavy iron gates were not properly supported, and were proving too great a strain on the posts. The posts were repaired and the entrances paved with concrete to prevent any further trouble of this kind.

RILEY PARK (CONT'D)

Damage by the heavy rains storms of July was very severe on this park and necessitated much repair of road and lawn surfaces. Considerable resodding of the cricket pitches was done during the fall. These had become badly worn due to much rainy weather.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND

The roads were frequently graded and dragged and oiled once during the season.

The interior of the Caretaker's residence was painted and redecorated and the well beneath the house deepened and re-cribbed.

The living quarters of the Refreshment Building was re-roofed and painted.

One hundred and twenty lineal feet of new picnic table was constructed with seats attached, picnic fireplaces were rebuilt and a number of rustic seats constructed.

Renovation of the Zoo fence was completed and several new pens built. The inmates now consist of 1 black bear, 1 black tailed deer, 1 mule deer, 1 whistling swan, 2 guinea fowl, 4 long-eared owls, 1 porcupine, and 2 heron.

Insignificant as it is, the Zoo is a very popular place, especially with the children, and this is the most frequented part of the park.

A very fine Wading Pool was constructed by the Kiwanis Club at a cost of \$1000.00. This was a splendid and much desired addition to the playground facilities and proved a great attraction to the children. This gift is very greatly appreciated by this Department and it is hoped that there will be a similar pool at each of our Play grounds in the near future.

A new metal flagpole was erected to take the place of the wooden one which was so badly decayed as to become dangerous and had to be removed.

A pump was installed over the well at the east end of the Island.

This is one of the most important parks as regards picnics, one or more taking place every fine day throughout the summer. Owing to much rainy weather, however, the picnics were fewer in number than for some years past. Fortunately good weather prevailed for the four big events -- Dominion Day, Labor Day, Nik's Public Picnics, and the School Sports held in September

MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE

One hundred and sixty-six trees and fifteen shrubs were planted along the main approach to the Golf House, and near the tees, these latter to eventually provide shelter and shade as well as to beautify the Course. The planting of trees along the boundary paralleling the main highway has also been commenced.

The main approach and parking space has been considerably improved by grading, and a portion has been gravelled.

All shelters were painted also much of the Course equipment. Very little was done towards developing the proposed addition, but it is hoped, now that the lease of the land has expired, and some money is available, that considerable progress may be made with this work during the coming season.

The exterior of the Golf House is in a very dilapidated condition and should be painted at once.

MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE (CONT'D)

Improvements to the area immediately in front of the Golf House were commenced late in the year. When these are complete it will add greatly to the appearance of this location.

New mats and wooden frames were placed on six tees and all other mats lifted, cleaned and relaid and the areas immediately surrounding the tees topdressed with brick dust. Fairways Nos. 1 and 2 were seeded with a grass and clover mixture. The work of grass cutting on the Course was exceedingly heavy during the past summer.

All greens were resurfaced and all the old cups replaced with new ones.

One hundred and twenty-five cedar posts were used in repairing fences.

Timothy grass seed was sown on that portion of the new land that was available.

A deep ditch was dug to convey that drainage water from the south east corner of the Course and thus prevent the flooding of No. 1 green.

The water supply both from the standpoint of use on the Course, in the Golf House, and for fire protection is very inadequate, and the hauling of a winter supply very expensive. It is hoped that this condition can be remedied in the near future.

The City Championship Tournament was held on this Course in May, and was a very successful and satisfactory event. The Course was in particularly good shape at the time, and not only evoked many flattering comments, but resulted in players continuing to use the course who had not previously done so.

ELBOW BOULEVARD PARK

Park furniture was repaired and the grading of the river-bank completed. The naturalization of common flowers on this bank has proved a great success and added much to the attractiveness of the park. Steps were built up this bank at the request of residents of Rideau Park for their convenience during the time that the river is frozen.

All paths were resurfaced.

The flower beds were planted with tulips.

The hail and floods of July completely ruined this park for the season.

ELBOW PARK SWIMMING POOL GROUNDS

Improvements were made to this area to the extent of ploughing and seeding to lawn all that portion east of the building, planting 141 trees and 222 shrubs along the strip bordering the street railway track, by planting 12 vines at the base of the building, by grading a portion of the river bank, and by erecting playground equipment at the west end.

X The 50 foot lot on the south side has now become city property and will be a valuable addition to this plot. This was cleaned up and the debris removed.

The dressing rooms were open for a period of three months and there were as many as 250 children in the river at one time on one occasion, but there was little bathing, owing to the cold and rainy weather, except on an occasional hot day, and the flooded condition of the river. Great difficulty was experienced in keeping booms in position because of these floods.

CRESCENT PARK

Considerable grading, planting, and preparation of borders for future planting was done, the established borders cultivated and the south side fenced.

MOUNT PLEASANT PARK

Planting of trees, shrubs and flowers on the new borders was continued, paths graded, curbed, and surfaced, old trails and other inequalities on the surface of the park levelled and the grass cut. Some tree and shrub planting was done on the cutbank on the south side of this park. If growth can be established here this area will be transformed from what now appears to be an ugly scar when viewed from the centre of the city into an object of real beauty.

CAPITOL HILL PARK

An additional area was ploughed and graded, more planting done and all planting fenced for protection. It is hoped that the football field can be moved eastwards this coming season and planting commenced at the west end.

TEXSDD PARK

The only work done on this park during the past year was the maintenance and supervision of the children's playground and maintenance of football ground.

GLENCOE PARK

This park was fenced in on three sides and 75 trees and 93 shrubs planted at the east end of the tennis courts.

CITY HALL GARDENS

The floral display in the beds at the City Hall was very much better than it had been in any year since the fence was removed, owing to the fact of the dog quarantine. Notwithstanding this, a good deal of damage was done, and I am convinced that this will continue until a fence is again erected.

TOMPKINS GARDENS

Two new flower beds were made and these together with the central bed were planted with perennials. Twenty-nine trees were planted at 25 feet intervals along the north and south sides, and two groups of Spruce planted.

MOUNT ROYAL INTERSECTIONS.

Owing to obstruction of the line of vision of drivers of cars by a portion of the shrubbery in the northern-most of these plots it has been decided to reduce this plot to one-half its present size.

THE R.N.W.M.P. Plot, GARDEN CRESCENT

These and other small areas have been maintained throughout the year.

BRIDGE APPROACHES

The work of improving the areas on the west side of the north and south approaches of Louise Bridge was completed.

Considerable additional improvements were also made to the Langevin Bridge Approaches, this being financed in part by the Kiwanis Club.

The area within the car loop at the end of the Elbow Park Car line was levelled and seeded.

SUNALTA PARK

Dead trees were replaced on this park and the grass cut twice during the season.

TRIANGLE PARK

This park was graded, 3,000 cubic yards of earth being moved, a quantity of loam placed on the site, water service installed and a rink established.

SHOULDICE PARK

The lease on this park was renewed for a further period of three years.

PLAYGROUNDS

This year as in the past, has been marked by a steadily increasing demand for facilities.

Apparatus was repaired at the following Playgrounds:- Mewata Park, Riley Park, Tuxedo Park, St. George's Island, Park Road, Glencoe Park, and Elbow Swimming Pool.

The Playground Supervision season opened on July 4th, with seven playgrounds in operation, viz.- Glencoe Park, Victoria School, Mewata Park, Riley Park, Crescent Heights School, Tuxedo Park, and Riverside School.

Organization of teams of boys and girls and practicing of games commenced at once, so that by the time the Interplayground and Tournament Games commenced each playground was well organized and had teams prepared to enter for the several events.

The general activities of the Playgrounds are:- baseball, volleyball, soccer, swimming, raffia, reed work, and sewing.

The attendance at all the grounds was very good, with the exception of Glencoe, but this was an entirely new centre and therefore the past season's attendance cannot be taken as a criterion as to its ultimate success. There was a further handicap in that there was no shelter on the park. The building erected for skating during the present winter will, of course, be available another season.

Eighteen one-half hour lessons were given for girls at the Y.W.C.A. with an average attendance of 21, and 30 lessons were given for boys at the Y.M.C.A. with an average attendance of 48. The thanks of the Department are due to these Institutions for providing these facilities. Both girls and boys were also taken periodically to the Swimming Pool on the Elbow River, each playground attending once each week. The average attendance was, boys 60, girls 48.

The season closed with a Field Day at Riley Park attended by some 2500 children. There were 422 contestants in 37 events, and these sports had to be finished under electric light. The competition between the several playgrounds was very keen and close, Victoria eventually proving the victors with Riley Park and Crescent Heights close second and third.

The exhibition of industrial work was a revelation of the educational value of the Playgrounds to the younger children.

RINKS

On November 28th a Skating Rink 252 feet by 375 feet, and a Hockey Rink 93 feet by 252 feet were opened at Hillhurst Athletic Park; and on November 28th a Skating Rink 300 feet by 350 feet, and a Hockey Rink 80 feet by 188 feet were opened at Mewata Park.

An area 125 feet by 75 feet was flooded in the Sunken Garden in Victoria Park, but as this did not prove satisfactory owing to continuous drifting of snow, it was abandoned and an area 140 feet by 80 feet flooded near the Race Track.

A Hockey Rink 125 feet by 70 feet, and a Skating Rink 200 feet by 200 feet were also flooded on Glencoe Park. These rinks are being maintained by the Elbow Park Community Club. This club acting jointly with the Tennis and Skating Clubs and the City, erected a very substantial and capacious building of good appearance on this park, to be used as a dressing room, shelter and community house, and to be the property of the city. The city provided only a small percentage of the cost of erection, but has been given title to the building.

Due to the cold weather of November and December the rinks were ready a month earlier than usual, but owing to heavy falls and much drifting of snow, and intensely cold weather, the rinks were not only exceedingly expensive to maintain during the first few weeks after construction but were very poorly patronized. There was a great change, however, as soon as conditions improved, there having been as many as 2500 people on Mewata Rink at one time.

The operation of the rinks enables us to ensure a continuity of employment to a number of men whose services are of value to the Department during the summer season.

HILLHURST ATHLETIC PARK

Trees and shrubs were planted on three sides of the park just within the fence to screen the fence and give a more park-like appearance to this area.

The old Grandstand was removed and a new one erected, with a seating capacity of 500 and with very comfortable and convenient dressing rooms beneath. This Grandstand is built as a unit that can be added to and extended as found necessary.

The new building is set back about eight feet from the street line. It is proposed to leave this space open to the street and plant with shrubbery and flowers, also to group shrubbery at each end of the building.

HILLHURST ATHLETIC PARK (CONT'D)

Considerable progress has been made with the reconstruction of the fence. This fence is being very strongly and substantially built and has been raised to a height of eight feet. The whole of the 12th ~~Street~~ side has been completed and has greatly improved the appearance on this side of the park. The urgent need for this work was demonstrated when, on two occasions during the past year the greater part of this fence was blown down during gales, on one occasion narrowly missing children on their way to school.

Considerable resurfacing of the centre field used for Soccer and Rugby Football has been done, and the ground regularly marked and kept in the best possible condition for the matches.

ATHLETICS

From this appropriation, improvements and maintenance work has been done to the City Hall Tennis Courts, South Calgary Athletic Grounds, Elbow Park Swimming Pool (placing booms in river, caretaking, etc.), Tuxedo Park Football Ground, Western Canada and Inglewood Cricket Grounds, and Park Hill Football Grounds.

BAND CONCERTS

BOULEVARDS

Grass was mown twice during the season, commencing on May 25th. By June 10th grass was so far advanced that scythes had to be used.

Five hundred and thirty trees were replaced, all trees pruned, and all trees, shrubs, and hedges on private property overhanging sidewalks below a height of seven feet were cut back to the property line, \$480.00 being expended on this work and the whole city covered.

The four miles of boulevard constructed in 1926 was planted with trees and shrubs.

All street trees throughout the city were cultivated.

During the past two years 39,470 feet (approximately 7½ miles) of boulevard, representing 79 blocks has been added for maintenance.

The following figures show how our Boulevards and Street Trees have increased out of all proportion to the increase in the appropriation for their maintenance.

MEMORIAL DRIVE

Four hundred and fifty trees were provided and planted by the Kiwanis Club, and \$170.11 paid to this Department for the watering and maintenance of these trees. An additional 52 trees and 83 shrubs were planted by the Department. 28,750 square feet was levelled and seeded to grass and a good lawn established. It is proposed to seed down a similar area each year till the whole is completed.

Weeds were kept cut on the uncultivated portions during the season.

Fence and trees were removed near the St. George's Island bridge for the purpose of widening the road for traffic.

The major part of the expenditure both by the Kiwanis Club and the City has been made on the east end of this Driveway. It is hoped that it will soon be possible to begin development work on the west (Sunnyside) end.

There are now 896 deciduous trees, 424 evergreen trees, and 165 shrubs on the Bridgeland end of the Driveway, and 379 deciduous trees at the Sunnyside end, making a total 1699 trees and 165 shrubs.

CEMETERIES

Very considerable damage was done in both Cemeteries by the heavy rain storms of July and the heavy snowfalls of November and December that were constantly drifting, made an immense amount of work, as the full length of roadway in the cemeteries had at all times to be kept open.

There is a considerable difference in the cost of perpetual care as between the two Cemeteries and this is a matter that should be adjusted.

CEMETERIES (CONT'D)

Union Cemetery

Signs marking all Sections in the Cemeteries were placed for the guidance of those visiting particular burial places.

The roads were oiled once.

Veteran's Plot,--The poppy beds that were originally at the foot of the graves were removed to form a continuous line at the bases of the monuments, this reducing the cost of upkeep considerably.

Gravel to the depth of four inches was placed on 2660 square yards of road surface. All roads were regularly graded, weeded, and cleaned.

Seven hundred and thirty-seven feet of rock guttering was laid on road between Sections N and S, and four wooden culverts placed.

Fencing was repaired as necessary and Caretaker's cottage painted externally.

A turn for cars was made at the extreme south end of Section X by re-modelling the shrubbery borders and grassways.

A commencement was made in planting the very unsightly cut-bank on Second Street, East.

Many trees and shrubs were transplanted from borders that were becoming over-crowded.

Eighty-seven plots, and 1,450 square yards of grassway were dug and re-seeded.

Burnsland Cemetery

A metal flag pole was erected near the Field of Honor.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in dealing with drainage water collecting on the Macleod Trail and then flowing into this Cemetery.

Four inches of gravel was placed on 51,430 square yards of road surface.

The whole of the fence on the west and south side was renewed and turnstyles painted.

2,811 trees and shrubs were planted. All tree and shrubbery beds and borders were cultivated and tulips planted in a number of these.

Nine new blocks of grave lots were surveyed and plotted.

Seven hundred and eighty lots and 1,968 square yards of grassway were dug and seeded.

NURSERIES

Considerable inconvenience and damage resulted from the inundation of portions of the Nurseries and the frequent flooding of the offices and greenhouse basement by water flowing from the hill on Second Street East. This trouble could be eliminated by the construction of a gutter sufficient to convey this water past the Nurseries and main entrance.

4,623 trees, 2386 shrubs, 25,525 perennial flowering plants were propagated during the year.

3,501 trees, 7,477 shrubs, 15,432 perennial flowering plants shipped for permanent planting or sale.

Lifting of trees and shrubs commenced on April 20th, and was discontinued on May 31st.

Expenditure 1927 - \$3001.29. Value of Nursery Stock used in Parks, etc. - \$4519.15, Sold - \$538.79, Total - \$5057.94. The value of stock in Nursery at the present time is \$13,869.70.

TOOLS, PLANT, AND EQUIPMENT

A new motor mower was purchased and did splendid service in the Cemeteries. The grass area is now becoming so large in the Cemeteries, however, that two of these machines could be kept constantly working. In fact, the Department should have several of these machines to properly maintain the several park areas, particularly in view of the gradual increase in the number of these areas to be maintained.

The truck transferred from the Public Works Department proved a real boon during the busy period of the year.

MISCELLANEOUS

A large number of trees were donated to the Salvation Army Home and assistance given in the planting of these.

Assistance was also given to the Tree Planting Campaign Committee during the two-day sale arranged by that Committee.

The usual preparations were made, and Central Park and the Cemeteries patrolled by a number of the staff during the Memorial Day Celebrations on August 28th.

Considerable assistance was also given in the matter of the Dominion Day Celebration.

As a result of emphatic protests, the further extension of the fill at Centre Street Bridge, and the resultant destruction of the natural growth that at present beautifies the spot was discontinued. The Department removed the fill from the bases of a few of the finest trees in an effort to save them.

Floral displays were made in several of the Fair Buildings at Victoria Park during the Stampede, also at the several Flower Shows held in the City.

Assistance was given "Sunshine" in the preparation and distribution of its Christmas parcels.

Before closing this report I would like to pay tribute to the work of the faithful and efficient staff of employees that serve this Department. The public hardly realise how much interest and personal effort many of the men give,--especially those who have been many years in the employ of the Parks Department--aside from the merely perfunctory performance of their task and the drawing of their pay. The park Caretakers in particular take a very keen interest each in his particular park and try to improve and beautify it. If it were not for the personal interest and good will of the regular staff it would not be possible for your Superintendent to accomplish what he has done in the development of the several park areas.
