To His Worship the Mayor, Commissioner, and Council.

Gentlemen:

Herewith I beg to submit my annual report of the activities of the Department for the year 1931.

The past year has seen greater progress in the development of our park areas than ever before, and the maintenance of the previously developed areas has been of a higher standard than at any time in the history of the Department, due to the almost unlimited amount of labor that was available. Whilst progress cannot but give rise to a feeling of great satisfaction to those in charge of any public work, yet this feeling is tinged in this case with regret that it was made possible through the misfortunes of others, for this high standard of achievement was made possible only because of the large army of men who were working on relief.

Weather weather conditions during the year were far from favorable. The winter weather of 1930-31 was dry and open with unusually high temperatures and many chinooks. Such weather, excellent though it is for making progress with seasonal work, such as pruning, etc. is in itself most unfavorable for vegetation in these altitudes. Succeeding, as it did, a very dry summer, it proved most disastrous to plant life last year; trees and shrubs being killed back more than for many years past.

The whole season of 1931--spring summer and autumn--was

The whole season of 1931-spring summer, and autumn-was exceedingly dry, Calgary having the unenviable distinction of being the district with the lowest recorded precipitation of any point in the Dominion, the total for the year being only 13 inches. Whilst the drought could be counteracted in parks where there was an adequate water supply, partly because of the large amount of relief labor available, those in which no sprinkling system had been installed suffered badly. The fairways at the Municipal Golf Course in particular were in an exceedingly poor condition towards the close of the season, and the grass on newly seeded boulevards and other areas where water was not available failed to germinate. This winter there has been more snewfall than for some years past, and it is hoped that this may be a procursor of greater precipitation during the coming summer.

Additions to Park System
The following areas have been added to those previously under the control of the department; --6.34 acres in Manchester Subdivision for a football field and skating rink; 3 acres for a similar purpose in Parkhill; a plot .7 of an acre; on Tallon Avenue, which was developed as a sunken rock garden; an area for a rink on

14th Street and 23rd Avenue Mount Royal; an area for a similar purpose on Bowness Road; and two in Bankview; 80 acres of prairie land on Richmond Road for future development; and 2.8 acres at Valleyfield for recreation purposes. The park at Ogden was extended so that it now comprises 4.7 acres.

Suggested Additional Features.
In the interests of educational, experimental, and demonstration work and also with a view to preserving native flora, many park systems are now developing arborotums and wild flower gardens. Possibly in no part of the continent would such features be as useful as here and they would add immensely to the interest of our system, be of much educational value, and could be developed at small cost. The difficulty at the present time is the finding of a suitable site for such a development. It might be possible to utilize pertions of the Union Cometery eventually, the only objection being the possible projudice there might be in the minds of some poople against the use of this area for such a purpose.

Bridle Trails
Some slight amount of grading and clearing was done on an old trail extending through Elboya and Brittania, the purpose in so doing being to encourage the use of this as a bridle path, which, it is hoped may be considerably extended in the near future.

Floriculture
The floral displays in the several parks were excellent notwithstanding het dry weather conditions and much wind; the spring bulbs (tulips and narcissus) roses and gladieli being the outstanding features.

Several packets of seeds recently collected in the remote alpine regions of Burmah and Tibet by the Frost Expedition and quite new to horticulture were kindly sent to us to test in this climate by Mr. Ingwersen of Sussex, England. Fifteen packets of seeds were also received from Lady Byng.

Floriculture (Contid)

A large quantity of surplus seeds of our own collecting were sout to the Dominion Government Land Settlement Branch for distribution amongst now settlers.

Arboriculture
In addition to the routine work of tree and shrub
maintenance a large number of trees have been removed for various
reasons, but chiefly because of trouble from roots in sewers.

The transplanting of trees and shrubs in the parks as shown above was necessitated by overcrowding. In most cases these trees and shrubs were transplanted to other areas in the same locality. The term "surgically treated" used above refers to the cleaning and dressing of wounds and cuts on trees.
The heading back of trees on the boulevards was necessitated mainly because of coming into contact with overhead wires and in many cases unfortunately necessitated bad mutilation and disfigurement. Trees destroyed include those in parks that were overcrowded and too large to transplant, and those on boulevards that were dangerously obstructing vision at intersections, and those whose roots were blocking sewers.

The floral display on the Island was exceptionally good, and the roses in the four new bods gave a quite remarkable display for newly planted stock, the gladioli interspersed in these bods maintaining a display of color till destroyed by frost. The large

nowly planted peony bed made good progress and should be very effective next year.

Three additional flower beds were propared last fall intention being to gradually extend the floral display in this park ever those areas which cannot be used for sports, also excluding, of course, those areas where the natural woodland and shrubbery has been preserved and where such development would be incongruent. preserved and where such development would be incongruous.

A group of coniferous trees and shrubs was planted as a screen in front of the animal pens.

The driveways were scarified, patched with crushed rock, and treated with calcium chloride twice.

Lawns were in splondid condition as a result of fertilizing where water could be applied, but in these areas that were beyond the reach of water the grass was completely destroyed.

The water service was improved by substituting a l_2 in service pipe for the l in that extended from the main entrance to the parking ground.

Due to much assistance from relief workers it was possible to give the Island a thorough cleaning, all dead wood and debris being removed from woodlands and shrubbery. A path on the river bank was constructed around part of the shores and it is intended to extend this path during the coming year to completely encircle the Island.

Notwithstanding a considerable extension of the parking area last year there was considerable conjection of ears all the season and this question of parking is one of the most difficult problems we are faced with.

The St. John's Ambulance Corp was in regular attendance on Sundays and helidays and did much useful work. A large number of cases received first aid treatment. The nature of the injuries varied from cuts, lacerations, and bruises, to broken collar bones, and included a tractured nose, heatstrokes, and fainting.

The expenditure made by the Department on the Zoo was \$2,225.31, mainly for care takers salary, and food. This was in addition to the \$800.00 grant made to the Zoological Society and which, together with other funds raised by the Society was expended in improvements, extensions, and new specimens. In addition a

considerable number of men working on relief have been employed at the Zoo throughout the year.

The Zoo Caretaker reports as follows:- "The following statements indicate that great progress has been made during the year. An increase of from 66 varieties (293 specimens) to 129

varieties (445 specimens) shows the progress made.

"Stray dogs and cats are a problem and any effort we could make to have dogs kept on a lead would be helpful.

"A certain amount of feeding of wild birds has been done

but hord again cats are a problem.
"A complaint re noises by coyotes at night was received.

Oars on the Island at night tend to aggrave to this trouble.
"With regard to the smell from the bears I believe resurfacing of the floors of their dens would eliminate this trouble

to a great extent.
"The health of all specimens was very good, there was no sign of any disease throughout the year, despite cramped quarters

and far from claborate feeding.

"The work entailed is now very great, the frequent arrival of now specimens and the lack of large buildings causing extra work and worry. The acclimatizing of new specimens is a big task in itself. As a rule I have 80 sections to feed, water, and clean out, the watering being a big item in fall and spring. Answering questions, contact with visitors, and the numerous jobs around the pens also absorb much time. Another task is the collecting of donated foodstuffs.

oultivated so that scarcely a weed was to be seen all season.

A large number of seedling herbaceous perennials were planted, and these should prove very effective in the coming season.

The rockery is now well furnished with plants, and is proving by far the most interesting feature to most of those who

visit the park.

The driveway was completely gravelled, the low portions first being filled in with subsoil removed from pool. We were fortunate in being able to secure very suitable gravel for surfacing with the result that this driveway is in better condition than ever before, and should last for some years. All paths should receive

the same treatment during the coming year.

The pool has at last been concreted, the most easterly portion being first deepened to form a swimming pool, the central portion as a shallow wading pool for small children, the west end teing retained in its original condition, to be developed as an

aquatic gardon.

ORESCENT PARK

All the borders were thoroughly dug; trees and shrubs transplanted from positions where they were crowded to the more open parts of the borders; and 750 feet of Caragana hedge planted at entrances.

Two hundred and seventeen loads of soil removed in the course of boulevard construction in the district were used for grading in this park, and the central area, 7 acres in extent, ploughed and disced.

SOUTH MOUNT ROYAL PARK

The old rink site was graded in to conform with the general contour of the park. 232 cu. yards of fertilizer spread and the whole area surfaced with 4 inches of loam, 3,975 cu. yards being used; 11,800 square feet of pathway graded in readiness for gravelling; and 71 trees and 192 shrubs planted.

MOUNT PLEASANT PARK

2,700 square feet of new walk was graded, durbed, and surfaced with 8 yards of crushed brick. 17 thads of loam and 25 lbs. of grass seed was used in lawn improvement. The steps and walk leading up to this park from Centre Street were entirely remodelled and the grade reduced considerably by following a winding instead of direct course, thus, not only easing the grade considerably, but also improving the general appearance immensely. The banks on south and south-west sides were graded and covered with fertilizer. The cut bank on the west side was also topdressed, resected, and several thougand shrub outlines plantages. thousand shrub outtings planted on at.

ELBOW BOULEVARD PARK

Throc new Meds were made and planted with roses.

The lawns were renovated where necessary.

A foot-path was opened up along the river bank and steps constructed to give access to same.

MHMORIAL PARK

There was but one Service held at the Cenotaph during the past year; that on November 11th; when about 6,000 people were in attendance.

The boulevard strip on 4th Street West, in front of the Cenotaph was remade.

The wooden curbing throughout the park was almost completely replaced. A quantity of crushed brick has been placed in the park in readiness for surfacing the paths in the spring.

Saxty caraganas were severely headed back in readiness for removal from the borders next planting season; to be replaced with choicer material. Nine of the big poplars were completely removed.

A new 8-foot driveway was paved in front of the Cenotaph. The area around the South African War Memorial was also paved.

OGDEN PARK

With the exception of Mewata Park greater development has taken place on this park; in proportion to its size than on any other park area during the past year. Farly in the year I was interviewed a number of times by the officials of the Ogden Community Club with regard to the possibility and desirability of planning the park in such a manner as to include a number of athletic features. Seeing no objection to the park being developed in this way I prepared a plan of the area including hockey and skating rink facilities; soccer; football; and baseball fields; quarter-mile running track; tennis courts, and childrens playground. This plan created tremendous enthusiasm; with the result that; through the cooperation of the Club and the C.P.R., together with the use of a large number of local men working on relief; considerable progress was made in the development of the plan; and this park has already developed into a most popular athletic centre; constituting one of the most outstanding improvements to recreation parks made in 1931; so that we now have in Ogden Park an area of 13½ acres enclosed by a strong fence; and within this enclosure there is practically all that is desired for a recreation park; a quarter-mile race track; two baseball diamonds; one for the senior and one for the junior children, the senior diamond being 290 by 320 feet; a prepared site for a tennis court; and a properly enclosed hockey rink with a sheet of ice; 90 yards by 175 yards. Within the rink enclosure are dressing rooms and wash places for teams. The fans are not overlooked in-as-much as we have faised platforms for them to see the games. In addition to the above mentioned improvements about 500 treesholes have been dug within the fence line to form a border planting for the purpose of beautifying the park.

SUNALTA PARK

The City having acquired the property adjoining this park and occupied by the Calgary Tonnis Club, this Department took over jurisdiction early in the year. After due consideration it was decided that for the present it would be advisable to grant the request of that club and lease the property to them on an annual basis. Accordingly this was done, and, so far, the arrangement has worked very satisfactorily.

The extreme west corner of the property, which was not required by the club, was added to the outer area of the park by changing the location of the fence, and a new fence was extended to the extreme western end of that portion of the park. This was the only improvement effected with the exception of the painting of the alubhouse

of the clubhouse.

CAPITOL HILL PARK

The borders were deeply dug in the springtime, and cultivated and watered as necessary throughout the season.

A new fence was creeted on the south side of the park, and the border extended and planted the full length of this fence, 160 shrubs and 60 trees being used.

This park is becoming a very popular baseball centre for the district and the facilities provided are greatly appreciated by the community.

ROSEVALE PARK

Thirtoen loads of manure was used on the borders and all shrubbery weeded and cultivated during the season.

A new border 150 feet long by 10 feet wide was prepared

for tree and shrub planting along the north side of the tennis courts.

Some levelling was done to the football ground and 150 cu. yards of fill was placed in the depression on the north side of the park.

SUNDRY SMALL PLOTS

These include, besides those dealt with elsewhere, ornamental plots in Bankview, Upper Sunalta, Hillhurst, and Rosedale Orescent. These all recoived any attention that was required.

TUXEDO PARK

A motered water service was installed by the Water Works Department.

SOUTH CALGARY PARK

A strip 30 feet wide was ploughed, disked, and harrowed completely round the park and graded where necessary in readiness for planting.

Trails were fenced.

A large area near the east end was graded and soccer goal - 14 posts erected.

TALLON AVENUE GARDEN

The sloping sides of this area were graded, leamed, and a rockery built, this rockery being extended here and there into the lower level, and the whole of the remaining area covered with four inches of leam, 652 cu. yards of leam and 30 leads of rock being used. The intention is to develope this plot into a sunken rock garden with lawn areas.

MISSION PARK

During the fall and winter of 1930-31 a new readway was cut through from the lower to the higher level of this park this being actually an extension of 4th Street West and giving direct access to the residents of Park Hill to Mission Bridge. Considerable grading of the steep slopes and perpendicular faces of bare earth was also done, green brush and prunings of various kinds being buried as the work proceeded. Not only did this brush act as binding material but much of it grew, so that the disturbed areas have every appearance, at the present time, of becoming quickly afforested. As there was considerable complaint regarding dust blown from this area during windy periods, all of the bare surfaces were coated with strawy manure during the summer, and coarse grasses sown on this manure and by the end of the season, a fine verdure had developed.

BANKVIEW GARDEN

The trees and shrubbery in this small plot made very rapid progress last year.

TOMPKINS GARDENS

A water supply was installed.

TRIANGLE PARK

This park was surfaced with leam four inches doop; 1,086 cu. yards being used. Considerable grading preceded the spreading of this leam.

MILLIOAN PARK

The dam and bridge was reconstructed, making bathing again possible during the summer months. A very fine rink was also provided for the community by levelling a piece of property in the vicinity of 57th Avenue and 16th Street East.

KILLARNEY PARK

Considerable levelling and some additional planting was done.

ISLANDS AT INTERSECTIONS Sth STREET; MOUNT ROYAL

These had regular attention during the season. That on 20th Avenue from which the shrubbery was removed last year was planted with Aquilegias and these were most effective when in blossom.

OUT BANK, 34th AVENUE & 8th STREET WEST

This cut bank was graded, the whole surface dug and sown with coarse grass seed. Trees and shrubs were planted at the bottom of the grade.

RIVERDALE AVENUE PLOT

This small shrubbery plot was manured; dug, and kept cultivated during the season.

ROYAL NORTH-WEST MOUNTED POLICE MEMORIAL

The fence here is in a very decayed condition and should be renotated.

GARDEN ORESCENT

Considerable heading back of big trees and thinning of shrubbery was done by request of residents.

BRIDGE APPROACHES

Considerable grading was done at the north-east corner of Hillhurst Bridge and the area surfaced with sofil removed from boulevards in the vicinity. The approach to the old bridge on the north-west corner was excavated to a depth of nine inches in readiness for laming and seeding.

OITY HALL GARDENS

A strong iron fence was erected to enclose the several

A strong iron fence was erected to enclose the several plots and this proved most effective, the floral display being very much better than for some years past due to the fact that it was protected from the depredations of children and dogs.

During the fall the sod was stripped and 100 loads of soil removed for the purpose of completely lowering the lawn.

Previously it was much too high and therefore very difficult to keep irrigated. A further benefit that will result from this work will be the elimination to some extent of dandelions. Re-sodding will be the elimination to some extent of dandelions. Re-sodding will be undertaken next spring.

ELBOW PARK SWIMMING POOL GROUNDS

Borders were manured and lawns renovated. Much needed comfort stations were constructed at the rear of the dressing rooms.

A most delightful walk was opened up through the trees and shrubbery on the river bank extending from this plot to the

vicinity of 5th Street West.

The popularity of this area, both for swimming in summer and skating in winter, is constantly increasing.

MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE

Due to the remarkably mild dry winter of 1930-31 the course was in use almost every day, and 250 persons played over it on January 31st.

The course again practically broke even as regards expenditure and revenue, the total cost of maintenance etc. being \$9,080.39, and the total receipts \$9,701.75.

Tees Six new coconut mats were laid. All old mats that were not completely worn out were used to replace other tee mats and the mats on all tees that were not replaced were lifted and relaid. entirely new style of rubber mat was introduced and placed on Numbers 1 and 10 tees, this is the first occasion on which this style of mat has been used on a Golf Course, and so far has proved entirely satisfactory. The particular advantage is its great

durability.

216 feet of creosoted 2'x 4' was used for cribbing on tees; the area around tees were filled in with clay and surfaced

with crushed brick.

Starters' stand and seats were moved to the back of the practice green away from Number 1 tee, to eliminate congestion. Olub rack and other equipment was painted.

Fairways All loose stones were gathered from the entire area of the course, 18 loads of rocks and refuse being removed. Fairway posts were reset so that players could not remove them. The fairways were kept regularly moved and the rough was cut onecor twice during the season to speed up play. 150 yards, 70 yards wide, on each of fairways 3,4,6,9, and 18, were spread with decayed manure as a top dressing which was floated and harrowed in.

The fairways on the new land were kept regularly cut during the season and all woods on this part of the course were

cut; raked up and burned.

Groons
The entire body of the oiled sand on groons was lifted, screened, and relaid twice during the season. The greens were resurfaced twice during the season and renovated with oiled sand weekly. The odges of all greens were cut and trimmed. New flags and mats with iron handles were made for all

groons.

Bunkors Turf was cut around bunkers and traps. The sod being used to fill in ditch on Number 1 fairway.

Roads The main road to the Clubhouse was graded and levelled.

This was a very necessary improvement and now makes access to the course possible in any kind of weather.

The parking space was filled in, the refuse removed from course being used for this purpose. This was coated with clay taken out of the basement, followed by a 1 inch surface of crushed rock, and finished with the ciled sand removed from greens. This formed are every large space is now raised. an excellent asphalt surface. This parking space is now raised above the surrounding level and therefore quickly dries after rains instead of being converted into a quagmire as was the case previously.

738 lineal feet of cedar poles were placed on posts 12

inches above the surface of the ground to serve as bumpers for cars.

Clubhouse The kitchen was enlarged to twice its former size by removal of partition. Whorever necessary the interior walls were removated with plaster board and all walls were cleaned and kalscrined. The old dugout was enlarged considerably and lined with coment walls, thus converting it into a regular basement suitable for the storage of food and other supplies. A new entrance to the basement from the perch with properly constructed steps was made. The hot water tank and gas stove was removed to the basement and hot and cold water services installed there.

New Course Fight greens were cut out and the material removed was used together with other refuse to form a dam across the hollow on Number 5 fairway; the intention being to eventually make this a water hazard.

General 1,000 holes were dug in various parts of the old and new courses in readiness for the planting of trees and shrubs next The ground around the trees and shrubs east of Number 1 green was dug; the sod being removed; the groups at the back of bunkers on 11 and 18 being similarly treated. It is now possible to keep these plots regularly cultivated and no doubt growth will be greatly advanced as a result. The ditch on Number 1 fairway and various other areas on the course were disked, harrowed, and sown with grass seed.

MUNICIPAL COLF COURSE (CONTID)

A two inch water service was laid below frost line from the main on 11th Avenue to the Clubhouse, thus providing a year round water supply. A hydrant was installed for fire protection and the necessary equipment for fire fighting was provided in close vicinity to this hydrant. This change of water service made 400 feet of one inch pipe (the original service line) available for other purposes. Advantage was taken during the installation of the new service line to install taps for irrigation purposes on the course.

All fences were repaired wherever necessary and new mats

furnished.

Flag pole, seats, and other equipment was re-painted. A constant warfare was waged on gophers by poisoning.

MEWATA PARK

Very considerable levelling was done on the area west of the new Stadium and south of the Armories. A large quantity of gravel was removed from this plot and replaced with approximately 1,500 cu. yards of loam.

A fence was erected on the north side. A shrubbery has already been planted along the north and east sides, it is intended to develope a flower border along the south side next season. This plot 400 by 120 feet in extent will then be available for use for tennis or lawn bowling as may later be determined.

The old football ground west of the Stadium which has never been very satisfactory, due to the fact that coarse gravel and boulders are constantly working through the surface, was graded to a true level, all stones near the surface being removed in the process. It is intended to surface this with nine inches or a foot of loam, after which it should be in first class condition for use as an athletic field. The area improved was 2.3 acres in extent and 65 loads of rocks were removed. The levelling of this area also effected a considerable improvement as far as rink construction was concerned.

During the early part of the year 35 loads of fertilizer were spread on the lawns, the fence was repaired its full length along the banks of the river and the fence on the east side was equipped with now ornamontal gates.

Movata Stadium What might be considered the greatest development of the Parks Department took place during 1931. A grandstand 200 feet by 54 feet with seating capacity for 2,000 people, and with dressing room and office accommodation beneath, together with showers, comfort stations, store rooms, and other necessary facilities, was erected at a cost to date of approximately \$10,000.00. Installation of plumbing and painting has yet to be done. A gas service has been extended to this building for the purpose of heating. It has also been equipped with press boxes, which can be utilized for breadcasting if necessary.

breadcasting if necessary. Bleacher accommodation for 600 spectators have also been ecnstructed.

MEWATA PARK (CONTID)

Mewata Stadium

The quarter-mile running track was built 640 cu. yards of loam and shale being used. By way of experiment this was surfaced with 129 cu. yards of crushed brick.

The centre-field was again top-dressed with 100 loads of fertilizer and re-seeded. As a result the sod showed a marked improvement during the season, notwithstanding the inroads of cut-

worm and other pests.

A two inch water service was extended from 11th Street along the south side of the grounds, just within the fence to a point near the main entrance at the south west corner. From this main a one inch service was extended northwards along the east and west sides of the center-field.

A building was erected in the south west corner near the main entrance for the purpose of storing equipment, eventually to

be used in part as a ticket office.

The total expenditure to date on the Stadium since the commencement of construction work in the early part of 1929 has been \$18,121.86.

In Mewata Park now that it has been equipped with this stadium enclosure we have an athletic park whick we can well be proud of, for in this park is accommodation for sporting facilities of all kinds, and the equal of which can be found nowhere else in We storm Canada. As already stated, in the south east corner is an area that can be eventually utilized for bowling or tennis. an area that can be eventually utilized for bowling or tennis. To the west of the Stadium enclosure is a space that can be used for baseball, rugby, soccer, or lacrosse as the need arises, and this area can be and is utilized for hockey and skating during the winter months. Incidentally the hockey rink on this park is the most popular of any maintained by the Department as it is here that the school leagues play their principle league games.

The rink for general skating is quite extensive and is much patronized during the winter for the staging of skating parties of various kinds. A caretaker is on duty all the time

parties of various kinds. A caretaker is on duty all the time in charge of a warming and checking room, and is provided with equipment for giving first aid in case of accidents. Stadium proper is enclosed with an eight foot high board fence and has three exits that large crowds may be easily dispersed. There is a regular quarter mile running track, 20 feet wide, this track being enclosed with a strong wooden fence. The space within this track has been converted into a splendid turfed area which can be used for rugby, football, or lacrosse, or, in the event of a field day, for the regular track and field events.

a field day, for the regular track and field ovents.

The grandstand and bleacher accommodation together with the slope on the west side of the grounds, and the space provided outside the running track completely around the field, will easily

accomodato 30,000 spectators.

An initial meet was held on September 16th on these grounds, consisting of 33 track and field events for men and women, for which there were 330 entries, the contestents coming from eleven contros, in addition to those from Calgary. There were about 1,500 spectators present on this occasion and Mr. W. L. Ross, the Sceretary of the Central Sports Association makes the following comments on this moot.

MEWATA PARK (CONTID)

"The weather was ideal for an event of this nature and the park, while still in course of construction, was in the very best possible condition under the circumstances. The turf in the centre of the field was in good shape and, with a year or two's growth; should be a fine pitch. The track showed its newness by loosening up after two or three heats were run, but time alone can remedy this condition. Many were the complimentary remarks that were passed on the choice of so fine a situation, and the general condition of the park in view of the very short space of time that has clapsed since work was commonced. There is no doubt that there will be a very great demand for the facilities provided during the coming year."

The children have not been overlooked in the equipment of this park, for, in the north east cornor playground equipment in the form of swings, tootors, slides, giant strides, sandppiles, etc. are provided, together with facilities for the playing of junior baseball, basketball, etc. There are also four areas that are rogularly used for softball.

HILLHURST PARK

The mild weather in February last year brought the skating season to an unusually early close, and made it possible to open the football season much earlier than for some years. As a matter

the football season much earlier than for some years. As a matter of fact the first Soccer game was played on April 1st.

Factowing is a list of games played during the season:

Soccer, 26 First Division; 30 Second Division; 2 Visiting Teams;

Inter. City. Rugby, 24(English) Junior; 4(English) Senior; 23 High School; 1 Visiting Team. Baseball, 4 Games.

It was a rush season for the park with one; two, and occasionally three games per day. The field was in exceptionally good condition all through the summer in spite of this hard wear.

A good piece of work was done on the north west corner of the park where gravel had previously been excavated; this being filled in with rocks; etc. and levelled off with loam from Riley Park Pool. 12 trees and 19 shrubs which had not thrived were replaced. replaced.

The fence on the north side was painted. The ten foot fence enclosing the park was not high enough to keep out some youths of the city; so on top of this was placed four strands of barbed wire on brackets.

Skating was started soon after the Football Season, the rink being opened on November 20th. The crowds which patronized it through the winter testified to the popularity of the good skating provided at Hillhurst Rink.

ROTARY RECREATION GROUNDS

Early in the year a committee was appointed by the Rotary Club of this city to consider and recommend on some major activity for the Club. This committee decided to recommend the construction of a model childrens' playground, and I was invited to attend the meetings in an advisory capacity. After considering a number of possible sites; that on the east side of the Contre Street Out in Mount Pleasant, was selected. I was requested to prepare a plan and

ROTARY RECREATION GROUNDS (CONT'D)

estimates of cost. The plan submitted was readily accepted by the committee and enthusiastically endorsed by the CLub membership and, after having first obtained the consent of the City Council, the Club requested me to proceed with the work.

The mound of earth extending north and south at the summit of the Centre Street Cut was first graded into shape and planted thickly with trees and shrubs to form a boundary planting and shelter belt on the west side of the grounds, 259 trees and 315 shrubs being used. The whole area was then roughly graded.

A concrete wading pool was constructed, water and sewer connections extended, paths graded, concrete curbing laid, three areas of sufficient size to be used for baseball, hockey, etc. levelled and fenced, loam stripped and piled in readiness for future use on the remaining area, and a great deal of finished grading done to this area. The boulevard on First Street East was graded and loamed the full length of the park. The cost of concrete work, fencing, water, and sewer extensions, and the initial breaking of the land was borne by the Rotary Club. The cost of

PLAYGROUNDS

The playground equipment was thoroughly overhauled and

made safe on all playgrounds.

The three-acre area in Barkview was levelled by removing the hill that existed on the west side and placing it in the depression on the east side. This entailed the removal of about 16,000 cu. yards of earth all of which work was done by using single unemployed wen with wheel barrows. There is now a nice level surface ready for development as a playground.

The playground shelter at Killarney and Ogden Parks were

painted.

New equipment sufficient to furnish six new playgrounds was purchased but has yet to be erected.

The usual playground activities were conducted during the

holiday months as in previous years.

PLAYGROUNDS (CONT!D) What might be termed the "Children's Learn to Swim" campaign was again made possible by the kind courtesy of the atthorities of the Y.M. and Y.W.C.A. The children took full advantage of the facilities provided and also made the fullest possible use of the "swimming hole" on the Elbow River. It is poped that by another year other similar natural bathing places will be available on the rivers, particularly the infiltration plant on the Bow River which, by that time will probably be abandoned for use for the purpose for which it was constructed.

abandoned for use for the purpose for which it was constructed.

The wading pool at St. George's Island continues to prove a great attraction, and we anticipate the same popularity for the new one constructed by the Rotary Club at Mount Pleasant. The former should have a larger feed and outlet pipe installed. It requires two whole days to change the water in this pool. The shelter is also in nedd of improvement and the surrounding area

needs loaming and seeding.

Through the very kind cooperation of the Y.M.C.A., young men specially trained attended the playgrounds and assisted the supervisors in athletic coaching. This was an innovation that proved immensely popular. This training for track events furnishes proved immensely popular. This training for track events furnishes the boys and girls with a clean, healthful outlet for surplus energy and adds immensely to the interest of the playground activities. The program consisted of short dashes, throwing for distance, relay races, etc.

Baseball teams were organized independently of the regular playground programme and season, being conducted throughout the summer. So successful was this that it is intended to organize regular Parks Department Boys and Girls Leagues during the coming

The Playground Sports Finals were held at St. George's Island at the close of the Playground Season and were very well attended.

There was a very gratifying degree of growth in attendance at the supervised playgrounds last season, particularly at the recently established centres at Killarney and Ogden. In fast I think this latter was our most successful playground last season, and the reason for this is indicated in the report of the supervisor, Miss Smith which I quote in part.

"There was quite an improvement in the general tone of the "There was quite an improvement in the general tone of the playground from that of the previous year. A marked improvement in team spirit and actual ability to play games was shown. This playground is really a community centre. The parents play games with the children in the evening. Many parents have given assistance in various ways, such as in supervision of games, coaching, lending of extra equipment, etc. The United Church Young People's Society have cooperated with the supervisor and helped to make the playground have cooperated with the supervisor and helped to make the playground most successful.

Many of the young people were among the unemployed. The activities of the playground provided them with wholesome recreation at no cost. Usually only smaller children come out in the afternoon. Last summer many young men and women spent the

afternoon on the playground. "

Mrs. Lawrence of Tuxedo Park in her report states that the outstanding feature of the summer so far as her playground is concerned was the care the children took of the equipment and the splendid spirit evinced on the playground. There was a marked improvement in the behavior of the children, both boys and girls, visiting this playground, and Mrs. Lawrence is of epinion that this was in some measure due to the new ruling "no commercial players on playground teams", and expresses the hope that this ruling will be adhered to in the future, thusggiving the less fortunate boys and

girls a chance, so that the Colgary playgrounds will be a real

benefit in the matter of citizenship.

I am pleased to say that there was a splendid spirit of cooperation amongst the supergisors last year, the best in fact that I have experienced. The weekly meetings were a very helpful factor in this regard.

RINKS

The present winter has been the finest in many years for winter sports and the facilities provided have been most intensively used. The season opened unusually early and present indications are that it will continue till a much later date than usual, and the used. weather, throughout the winter, whilst cold enough to preserve good ice, has not been so intensely cold as to make outdoor exercise uncomfortable.

The people of the district helped considerably with the development of the rinks at Millican and Valleyfield, local men working on relief doing the levelling, 250 cu. yards of earth having to be moved in the latter case, and heated dressing rooms were pro-

vided in both cases by local effort.

The rink at Capitol Hill, formerly located in the park, where it was most unsatisfactory because of the difficulty of flooding and of the damage done to the borders, was moved to a location immediately south of the park, where a site 150 by 120 feet was levelled and a very excellent rink established.

has proved most popular.

Other sites that were carefully graded so that it was possible to make excellent rinks with very little difficulty were located at Balmoral, Roxboro, Killarney, and Riverside Playground sites, indeed the flooding of rinks was a much simpler and more expeditious process this year than on any previous occasion, due to the fact that it was possible to perfectly level all the sites in the fall by grading with relief labor.

Two very fine skating rinks and one hockey rink were

constructed at the Rotary Recreation Ground.

New hockey enclosures were made for Tuxedo Park, Rotary

Recreation Grounds, and Mewata Park.
Rinks have been flooded for the Separate School Board at St. Mary's, St. Joseph's, St. Anne's, and St. John's Schools, the department being reinbursed for the cost of this work.

Rinks have also been given initial flooding for several

community organizations.

ATHLETICS

The Parkhill Football Ground, though it has been in use for quite a number of years, has always been unsatisfactory and the cause of much complaint because of its uneven surface. The whole area was levelled last summer, a cut of as much as two feet being made on some portions, and a corresponding fill in others, and many hundreds of yards of earth being moved. Not only is there now a level surface, but the field can be played north and south as well as east and west.

ATHLETICS (CONTYL)

The Municipal Cricket Pitch in Riley Park, originally constructed with an asphalt base, coated with clay and surfaced with cinders, never had proved very satisfactory, and, due to wear, was in a deplorable condition. It was therefore entirely rebuilt with red shale, and the turf margins relaid, with the result that it is now as near perfection as it is possible to have it under our climatic and other circumstances.

An entirely new cricket pitch was also made of the same material at Inglewood Park and a small clubhouse built for use of the Siub Members.

A running track was graded for the Y.M.C.A.

A program of band concerts exactly similar to thetor

this being made necessary in many cases because of the damage done by the heavy wet snow storm of the autumn of 1930 when many limbs were broken. It was only by this heavy pruning that any form or symmetery could be restored. In other cases this heading back was made necessary because of interference with overhead wires or heading of interception of street lighting.

The question of damage to sewers by tree roots again became very acute during the past year and an investigation and report from all those departments concerned was requested by the Commissioners. As a result of these reports, a recommendation was made and approved by Council that Russian Poplar trees be gradually removed from the streets and that no more be planted. The matter aroused considerable public interest and many conflicting opinions were expressed, but there was a very strong sentiment in favor of preserving the trees. As has been pointed out in a previous annual report of this department, this is a difficult problem, because of the very restricted choice of material available here due to our climatic conditions. The difficulty gould be oversome of course by reconstructing ournsewers in such a way that they would be impervious to roots but this would be a very costly undertaking. In the meantime we are restricting our plantings the Birch, Green Ash, and Elm, though the complete hardiness of this latter tree in this district has not been yet prover.

The task of watering newly planted stock was again a very heavy one due to lack of precipitation.

All boulevards on 13th Avenue that were above the level of sidewalk and curb were levelled and reseeded. The sod and soil removed which was of excellent quality was made use of to top-

dress several new park areas.

The following boulevards, constructed during 1930, were seeded, and planted with trees and shrubs:-

MEMORIAL DRIVE

An area that was improved in 1930 was graded and seeded at the east end of the drive.

shrubs were planted by this Department, the Kiwanis Cla the Kiwanis Club again subscribing one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) towards the cost of this work and giving some assistance in the planting.

The plan of a double driveway prepared many years ago by myself and which, though it was enthusiastically received by many citizens at that time seemed a dream of a dim and distant future, because of its cost, materialized in part last year, the work being done as a relief measure. The western portion of the Drive extending through Sunnyside was paved so as to provide a double griveway with a regulation boulevard on the north side, a central boulevard strip and a wide expanse next the river on the south side. This improvement was extended through on the Hillhurst side as far as 14th Street so that this section can now well be considered a part of the Memorial Drive. On the wide expanse between paving and river in this section considerable grading was done and an area paraly prepared for use as tennis courts and lawn bowling greens.

CEMETERIES

Burnsland Cemetery

18,960 square feet of plots and 7,747 square feet of grassways were loamed and seeded.

7,206 square feet of sod was used for surfacing graves by request and for other special work, where sodding was more desirable than seeding.

100 cu. yards of fertilizer was used for renovating

lawn areas. Two new blocks of 4'x 10' and one new block of 8'x 10' plots were surveyed and marked, 1,000 lot markers being used.

1,504 square yards of driveway were resurfaced with

gravel, 3 inches deep.

A new road extending from the S.W. corner, along the South and East sides of the Cemetery, was surveyed, graded and gravelled, 4,040 superficial yards being gravelled to a depth of 8 inches, this gravel being removed from the borders during the 8 inches, this graves being removed from course of preparation, and replaced with loam.

A new border was trenched the full length of Section "F" on the east side to a depth of 18 inches, and inferior soil, where necessary replaced with manure and loam.

The total area of new borders prepared in this cemetery, was 69,600 square feet, the whole being trenched to a depth of 18 inches.

The turf removed from the City Hall, was used to form the grass verges to these borders so far as it extended.

The nursery extension formed some years ago in the undeveloped portion of this cemetery, was enlarged by 15,420 square feet, the area thus prepared, being used for the planting of tree

cuttings and small seedling trans-plants.

The planting of the boulevard on the Macleod Trail, was completed the full length of the cemetery, this boulevard being treated so as to form a close shrub and tree border without grass. This will not only have a lower maintenance cost, but will act as a screen for the cemetery.

CEMETERIES (CONT'D)

Burnsland Cemetery

Many thousands of yards of gravel having been removed during the past year from the gravel pit for use in the various parks and cemeteries a good part of this pit has become exhausted. The exhausted portions were filled with surplus earth obtained from various sources, but principally from the new water-main ditch, extending along the Madleod Trail. It will now be possible to utilize this land for other purposes.

Considerable levelling has been done on those portions of the gravel pit where the gravel was not in sufficient quantities, or was not of sufficiently good quality to be worth working.

Union Cemetery

1,264 square feet of plots, loamed and seeded.
16,229 square feet prepared for loaming and seeding, during the coming season. 94,600 square feet prepared during 1930, was loamed and seeded. (These two latter figures apply to the older areas of the cemetery that had never been improved).

200 cu. yards fertilizer used for renovating lawn areas. 230 sunken graves in the Free Section were levelled and

the whole area loamed and seeded.

The main driveway was scarified, graded, surfaced with

screened gravel, and coated with dust preventive.

The driveway between sections "L" and "M" wes reconstructed for the purpose of decreasing the grade and is in readiness for gravelling during the coming season.

The driveway at Section "X" was widened by moving back the grass verge on either side, which also necessitated the removal of

trees and shrubs.

4,796 square yards of road surface that had not been previously properly constructed, was surfaced with 3 inches of gravel.

All gravel pathways were resurfaced.

18,736 square feet of unsatisfactory sode situated on the slope immediately west of the Chapel which was very unsatisfactory, and difficult to maintain on account of its steepness, was entirely removed and the area planted thickly with trees and shrubs.

5 new tree groups were established on the Western Slope.

A group of shrubs at the sharp hairpin-turn on the main

road, which had begun to obstruct the view, was removed, and the area replanted with Peonies.

The boulevard on Second Street East was planted from the main entrance to a point opposite 27th Avenue.

Replacements were made where necessary, in all beds and borders.

Two new rose beds were established on the Western Slope. A number of tree holes were dug along the summit of the bank which forms the northern limit of the Cemetery in readiness for planting, to form a shelter belt, and a new fence was erected

246 superficial yards of rock wall was constructed in various parts of the Cemetery where cut banks existed.

3,460 trees and shrubs were transplanted. 37,123 perennials raised from seed.

150 lbs. of Caragana seed collected and harvested.

Sprinkler system was extended by 825 feet.

A new store room for seeds was constructed.

TOOLS, PLANT, AND EQUIPMENT

A spiked roller was purchased early in the year and was used on all lawn areas throughout the park system. It roved most beneficial by breaking up the hard surfaces and permitting the penetration of moisture and fertilizer.

Two power mowers, an "Atco" and a "Toro" were also added to

our equipment and gave good service.

A "Pcerloss" gover grinder and a motor bench grinder were installed in the workshop and were of immense benefit in keeping equipment in good working order.

A localing platform and an implement shed were built at the

rear of the workshop.

Six hundred spruce fence posts were peeled and dipped in readiness for fence repairs wherever they may be required during the coming season. 32.

POLICING

Notwithstanding the fact that the one lone patrolman of this Department has an immense amount of territory to cover and no adequate means of transportation, yet there was a marked improvement in conditions last year as a result of his work. These improved conditions were effected to some extent in an indirect way by organizing the lads into baseball teams in those districts where, previously, we had had a good deal of trouble. The patrolman did the organizing work and the Department supplied equipment, and it was found that it was effort and money well expended, for, by giving these lads an interest in properly conducted recreation, they not only did no mishhief themselves but acted as a restraining influence on others.

There was much improvement with regard to damage to boulevards, building contractors being checked up very closely.

Frequently during the summer it was found necessary to warn campers off Shouldice Park, and the "jungle land" that developed on the south bank of the Bow river opposite St. George's Island was completely cleaned up towards the end of the year.

During the winter months the skating rinks were under close supervision, particularly the dressing rooms where complaints had been made in the past of unruliness and obscene language.
