His Worship the Mayor, Commissioner, and City Council:

Gentlemen:

I beg to submit herewith my 22nd Annual Report dealing with the work accomplished by the Parks Department during the year 1934.

Whilst this report will give some account of the visible work performed in the development of our parks areas(and the improvement in the appearance of our City as a result of this development is plainly visible to all), it is very difficult to set forth the important work that is being accomplished in so far as the health, recreation and happiness of the people is concerned. The improved health of the people as a result of the provision and use of athletic facilities is well known to all, but we are apt to overlook the aesthetic aspect, and to forget that beautiful parks do undoubtedly create a love for natural beauty and arouse a new love and pride in our city, and in so doing stimulate the emotions and imaginations, and so help to build a finer cultural background.

A major problem that is facing Calgary as it is every other city in Canada at the present time is that associated with providing proper recreational facilities and leadership for the unemployed that their too abundant leasure time may be spent in a healthy and wholesome manner.

This is, of course, largely a matter for private effort and could well have the earnest consideration of the many organizations that are already in existence in this city. Some cities have already done a great deal in this direction, notably Hamilton and Montreal. There is certainly a great opportunity for similar work in Calgary.

There has been considerable expansion of this Department in recent years by the addition of many new park areas, the improvement of these areas, and by many new activities that were not in existence previously, so that the value of the land alone is estimated to be over \$2,000,000.00, more than half of which has been donated to the city. Thus Calgary has a tremendous asset in her parks, an asset well worth maintaining at its greatest value. It will be readily understood that a large force of employees is necessary to maintain the standard of our parks. During the years 1930-33 we were very fortunate in that we had an abundance of relief labour to not only carry on the maintenance work, but also to execute many improvements.

The drastically reduced appropriation for 1934 made it impossible to employ any additional labour during the year, and the time of the skeleton permanent staff, in other words, those men on the payroll, was required almost in its intiraty to supervise the direct relief labour. The expenditure for the past year was

\$58,174.95, a reduction from that of 1930 of \$70,099.88. all essential costs were deducted, such as wages for permanent staff, water, light, auto depreciation and expenditures on material for revenue-producing activities only \$14,710.74 was available. Notwithstanding this very limited sum, however, we were not only able to carry on maintenance work reasonably satisfactorily on all improved areas (except during the early summer months) but we were able to develop several new areas and greatly improve older ones because of the labour furnished by the Relief Department. This labour totalled 343,200 man-power hours in 1932, 432,108 in 1933 and 329,147 in 1934. It will be noticed that the hours worked in 1934 were considerably less than those of 1933. This was due to the fact that, last year, the hours required to be worked by those on relief were greatly reduced, with the result that there was very far from sufficient men available during the summer months to properly maintain our parks. It is unfortunate too, that the man-power hours supplied to this Department through the Relief Department, cannot be allowed, to some extent, to accumulate during the winter months, when much of the work that is done, has to be carried on under the worst conditions. If the time required to be worked could be allowed to accumulate at that season so that more men were available during the summer season it would be very much to the advantage of this Department.

The permanent staff of the Department holds bi-monthly meetings at which there is a general discussion of the affairs of the Department and the problems and requirements of each individual considered. We all find these meetings very helpful in the more efficient carrying on of our work.

ADDITIONS TO PARK AREAS:

Area 100' x 75' on the west side of 15th Street between 16th and 17th Avenues was reserved for a playground site.

Calgary Water Power Company has granted the use of its property located on the north side of 1st Avenue between 5th and 6th Streets West, 68.634 square feet in extent, pending its exchange for other property.

The Island on the Bow River known as Williams' Island, formerly under the control of the Waterworks Department was transferred to this Department, and a portion has been leased to the Calgary Archer's Club.

An area, 400 feet square, at the north east corner of the intersection of 19th Street and 66th Avenue East, was reserved for playground and athletic purposes at the request of the Millican Community Club.

An area, 80 acres in extent, at the south-west corner of Section 7 was reserved for park purposes at the request of the Killarney Ratepayers Association.

Lots 1,2,3, Block 3, Plan 4992 A.C. Rideau Road were reserved for park purposes.

Blocks 2 and 5, Plan 96 A.M. Section 10, Adjoining St.Mary's Roman Catholic Cemetery, were reserved to be developed as an extension of that Cemetery, and to be controlled and operated by the Parks Department under the same regulations as apply to the Protestant Cemeteries, except that Roman Catholics only would be buried therein.

Lots 21-40 Block 2, Plan 2767 A.D. Section 36 C.S. has been reserved for park purposes at the request of the Valleyfield Community Club.

WEATHER

The summer of 1934 was phenomenal for sunshine and dry weather, with the result that the public took every advantage of these weather conditions and the parks and recreational grounds were often crowded. The drought of the late spring and early summer was very serious from the horticultural standpoint. Where watering facilities were non-existant or inadequate, serious damage was done, and even where an abundance of water was available, it was often impossible to irrigate adequately due to shortage of labour.

ARBORICULTURE:

Every endeavour was made to continue the planting of new trees and shrubs, replanting where losses had been sustained and transplanting where there was overcrowding.

The stock used was almost entirely from our own nursories, with the result that stocks of trees, shrubs, etc. of a size suitable for permanent planting are becoming depleted and it may be necessary to reduce our planting programme for a few years until the large quantities of small plants we have had sufficient time to grow to suitable size. Much planting stock is of course now being derived from the established borders in the several parks, as these develop and thinning becomes necessary.

ST, GEORGE'S ISLAND PARK

The Island is ever becoming increasingly popular as a picnic resort, not only by citizens, but also by people from country points who come in in large numbers for the specific purpose of holding picnics. On Sundays during the season the facilities are always used to full capacity.

Four log picnic tables with seats attached were made from large trees that had to be cut down. These accommodate about ten persons and are very popular for small parties, and many more of these could be used to advantage.

841 trees and 642 shrubs were planted and 910 holes have been prepared for planting this year.

396 perennials and 9,764 annuals were used in the flower beds. A new flower bed was made on the east side of the carataker's residence.

The water service was extended 200 feet.

The driveways were resurfaced with 152 cu. yards of gravel. In addition to this relief men were employed the greater part of the season patching these driveways with gravel hauled from the river banks by handcart. Considerable more gravel will be required on that portion of the road that was raised to form a levee before a good surface could be made.

Two additional horseshoe pitches were constructed.

The rustic fence was extended 400 feet along the driveway as suitable material became available.

The parking space continues to be inadequate, but I hesitate to recommend its extension, or, eventually the greater part of the island will become one huge parking ground.

Due to the fact that the pending law-suit with a former concessionaire has not yet been sattled the pavilion remained closed all season. When this suit is sattled, I am of the opinion that this very delapide ted building should be torn down and a shelter of some kind built from the materials. This is something that is urgently needed at St. George's Island.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND zoo

While financial reasons have provented any elaborate enlargement to the zoo during 1934, steady progress can be reported.

No disease of any kind has occurred and the general health of all specimens has remained good throughout the year. Losses have again been light, deaths for the year amounting to only 17 or approximately 4 per cent. Exchanges were undertaken on a small scale, notable specimens received being a Japanese door from Toronto, a mule deer from Benff, and antelope from Brooks. Natural increases were few in number but included a fallow deer, mink, pair of peafowl, and a number of fancy pheasants.

Every economy has been used in fe ding and both foodstuffs purchased by the city and foodstuffs done ted have been used to the best advantage.

The following is a list of new structures and additions to existing ones:-

New phoseant aviary 30 feet long and 20 feet deep divided into 6 sections. Meterial supplied by Zoological Society and labour approximately 50% Zoological Society and 50% Relief.

New guard fence 360 feet long in front of rodent, small carnivors, and monkey pens. Material supplied by Zoological Society,

City Rolief labour used.

Renovations and improvements to "Calgary's First House". Material supplied by Zoological Society and City Rolief labour used.

Renovations and improvements to "Model of Fort Calgary". The old Fort was built to scale and canvas background painted,

models crived and other items of interest added. Relief labour used.

Cementing of waterfowl pend. Material supplied by
Zoological Society and labour by Parks Department.

New winter quarters building, 54 x 14 with basement and hot water system. Labour and material supplied by Zoological Society. This now winter quarter building fills a long felt want and besides coring for our present specimens will enable us to add from time to time such small tropical specimens as can be obtained and fed cheaply.

Attendance at the zoo has been very great and except during the very severe weather was continuous throughout the year.

This being the second year without either summer or winter floods, a far better display has been possible and the prospects for the future therefore are much better.

Several losses have occurred due to the depredations of cats and dogs.

Seven now flower beds were made and four of the old herbaccous borders widened.

Fifteen large poplar track ware removed and thirty trees of other kinds transplanted. A group of very unhealthy poplar near the north-west corner of the park was removed and the site converted into a bed for perennial flowers.

2,000 square feet of sod was laid in the vicinity of the main cricket pavilion.

The boulevard at the west end was dug up and completely filled with trees and shrubs.

1000 feet of wooden curbing was laid.

A wire fence was built just inside the west entrance to prevent school children short-cutting across this part of the park.

The old dressing room for bathers that was formerly at the west end of the Pool and was a very unsightly structure in that position was moved to a central position on the south side of the Pool and immediately behind the main cricket pavilion. It was completely remodelled and whilst continuing to serve the purpose for which it was originally built, was made an integral part of the pavilion so that now there is one building of uniform design throughout. The whole structure was re-roofed and painted.

The cricket pavilion and dressing rooms were re-modelled and painted.

CRESCENT PEK

The water service was extended, making it possible to seed an additional one acre of lawn. Another two acres have been graded and prepared for seeding. 322 trees and 412 shrubs were planted.

SOUTH MOUNT ROY L PARK

The Amazon Statue that was originally in front of the Public Library in Memorial Park had to be removed from that site when the I.O.D.E. War Memorial was erected. It was kept in storage for some time avaiting a suitable site for its re-erection and means of providing a base. Some Tindall stone left over after the creation of the new Post Office was given to this Department by the contractors when that building was completed, and during the winter a piece of this stone was modelled into a suitable base by one of the regular employees experienced in that class of work. South Mount Royal Park provided the site and this statue has now been placed in a central position there and proves very suitable as an adornment for the park.

900 lineal feet of paths have been excavated and gravelled and 1,080 feet have been excavated in readiness for gravelling.

A four inch mater connection was made to the main for the purpose of providing an adequate water supply.

96 trees and 238 shrubs were pruned.

Forty-three loads of manure were used on this park.

KILL RNEY PARK

Forty trees and 120 shrubs were planted.

The construction of a new site for a rink was commenced on the south end of the park, 250 cubic yards of soil being removed and an enclosed hockey rink 180° x 90° was provided.

SUNALTA RAVINE

On those portions of the tennis courts where there had been a large amount of fill made during the provious year, there was considerable settlement, as was to be expected, and 324 yards of dirt were used in bringing the courts to the proper level. The dirt for this purpose was obtained in part by grading the bank west of the courts to provide for a retaining wall, and in part from the quarry. The courts were surfaced with three inches of shale obtained from the west side of the quarry together with 40 yards of cinders supplied by the Community Club. A ten foot high fence, close boarded at the bottom and with wire netting above, was erected, the material being supplied by the Community Club. A retaining wall 600 feet long was partly constructed on the west side of these tennis courts to hold the cut bank.

The playground, where considerable settling had also taken place, was brought to a level by the use of 200 yards of dirt, and the surface was coated with 30 yards of cinders. Two horse-shoe pitches were made on this playground.

Considerable grading was done on the east and west sides of the quarry, 5,024 cubic yards of dirt being removed and used to cover up the debris in the bottom of the quarry, to grade paths, etc. 900 lineal feet of stone paths were constructed, including a walk around the pool site at the east end of the quarry, these paths being provided with necessary stone steps, rockery, rotaining walls, etc. About 260 tons of rock was used in the construction of these paths and rockeries, all being obtained on the site.

Three hundred feet of wire fencing was erected at the summit of the quarry on the west side, as a protection to children who insist on playing on this area at considerable risk.

A path is in course of construction from the north side of the tennis courts along the west side of the quarry to Seventeenth Avenue.

Trees and shrubs were planted on the steep slope extending from Seventeenth Avenue to the bottom of the quarry.

TRIANGLE PARK

A new flower bed was made and planted with 112 annuals.

65 trees and 20 shrubs were pruned and 14 over-crowded trees transplanted to the Loyal Sunalta Recreation Grounds.

The lawn was top-dressed with 20 loads of fertiliser.

The water service was extended.

SOUTH CALGARY PARK

Four hundred and seven trees were planted and seven hundred and seventy-three tries were pruned.

The broken land was again allotted to the unemployed of the district for the growing of vegetable crops on condition that the whole of the land was kept clean.

ELBOW SWIMMING POOL GROUNDS

A watchman was kept on duty throughout the bathing season.

A comfort station was provided, dressing room floors covered with rubberoid, and drinking fountain provided. A large quantity of big boulders was removed from the river bed, booms and rafts provided for use of bathers.

The grass area was removated and a number of over-crowded trees and shrubs trans-planted.

102 troos and 314 shrubs were pruned, and 14 trees headed back.

Eight loads of fortilizer were used on the lawns.

ROXBOROUGH P.RK

Paths at different levels were graded along the hillside, rustic bridges constructed where necessary, seats provided, and a rustic arch delineating the name of the park erected at the Mission Road entrance. There are now 2,126 yards of this pathway and 33 feet of bridge. One hundred and eleven posts were sunk into the ground on either side of the driveway to prevent cars from leaving this driveway and destroying the undergrowth by driving through it. Considerable underbrushing was done and all dead wood removed.

Caves excavated by children on the hillside and which had become dangerous because of the loose nature of the soil were filled in.

The construction of the tennis courts was completed and trees and shrubs planted on the boulevard strip.

A site was graded for a hockey rink.

70 shrubs were planted at the tennis courts.

MOUNT PLEASANT PARK

Twolve new flower beds were made bordering the main walk mainly for the purpose of compelling pedestrians to keep to the walk.

KLBOW BOULEVARD PARK

A number of the perennial flower beds in this park that had become very much overgrown were deeply trenched, fortilized, and planted with new stock. Two new flower beds were made. A number of over-crowded shrubs were transplanted. The boulevard strip was renovated and pathway gravelled. The trellis work erected to support the vines at the end of the suspension bridge was repaired and painted.

Thirty-one leads of manure were used on this park.

MEMORIAL PARK

The floral display was the finest on record and was much admired by the public. Seven small beds were made for specimen groups of choice perennials.

A Cotoneaster hedge was planted across the west end of the park and one of Berberis at the east end.

184 trees and 557 shrubs were pruned.

The lawn on the south side of the library was equipped with a sprinkler. Three hundred and fifty feet of piping, no longer required, was removed and used elsewhere.

Wire notting was placed on the Library Building to support the vines.

42 loads of manure was used on lawns and flower beds.

The old and very delapidated wire fence to the west of the library was removed and replaced with 272 feet of rustic fencing and three rustic arches.

A band concert was given by the Kitsilano Boy's Band during their stay in the city and was much appreciated by the public.

TOMKINS GARDENS

The lawn was top-dressed with nine loads of fertiliser, the perennials removed from the flower beds and replaced with annuals, Nicotiana being used to a large extent. This was greatly admired because of its beauty and fragrance during the evening.

37 trees and 112 shrubs were pruned.

ROSEVALE PARK

The levelling of this park was commenced, 833 cubic yards of earth being moved in the process. The portion from which the sod was stripped was covered with manure to prevent dust blowing from this surface.

The Calgary Ski Club was granted the use of a portion of the park, and assistance was given in the erection of a ski jump.

Eight loads of manure were used on the lawns.

TUXEDO PARK

130 trees and 70 shrubs were planted, and 50 feet of rustic fence denstructed.

The Tuxedo Athletic Association constructed an entirely new dressing room, 30 x 14 , the Parks Department providing all material.

OAPITOL HILL PARK

Fifteen trees and 200 shrubs were planted on the west border.

BRIDGE APPROACHES

Rideau Read: The approach to the suspension bridge was graded, underbrush thinhed, and some troes and shrubs planted on the open areas.

Langevin Bridge: her loads of fertilizer were used, 33 trees and 35 shrubs prured.

HILLHURST TRIANGLE

Three hundred lineal feet of boulevard strip were graded and prepared for seeding and thirty shrubs transplanted.

GARDEN CRESCENT

Nineteen large poplar trees were removed and the shrubbery considerably thinned.

74 trees and 150 shrubs were pruned, and 19 trees removed and transplanted.

TALLON AVENUE GARDENS

The extension of the water service made it possible to keep this plot in a very much better condition than previously and the floral display on the rockery was much admired.

The lawn was topdressed with 12 loads of fertilizer.

ROYAL NORTH WEST MOUNTED POLICE PLOT

The lawn was top-dressed and 5 trees and 36 shrubs pruned.

CITY HALL GARDENS

The lawns were top-dressed with three loads of fertilizer, a more adequate water service installed, and wire supports for vines were placed on the building.

BANKYIEW PLOT

Three loads of fortilizer were used on this plot. 145 additional shrubs were planted, and 225 shrubs and 108 trees pruned.

WARD PLOT

This plot was fertilized, the caragana hedge on Seventeenth Avenue removed, 50 additional shrubs planted and 61 shrubs and 75 trees pruned.

RIDEAU ROAD GARDEN

This is the area at the south west corner of the intersection of Rigeau Road and 5th Street This area was deeply trenched, heavily fertilized, graded and planted with trees, shrubs, and perennial flowering plants, a strip four feet wide on the front edge being sout to grass. The adjoining boulevard was also graded and seeded.

15 trees and 50 shrubs were planted.

RIVERDALE AVENUE PLOT

Two 20 ft. spruce trees, donated by a resident in the vicinity were planted in this plot.

SCOTLAND STREET TRIANGLE

This area was trenched two feet deep, 25 yards of large boulders and 10 yards of gravel removed and replaced with soil, 50 spruce and 114 shrubs planted, on the central area, a four-foot margin being left for a grass border.

ST. STEPHEN'S GARDENS

Work was commenced on this plot in May, but had to be abandoned because of the strike of relief workers. During the time work was in progress 500 cubic yards of gravel were excavated.

INGLEWOOD PARK

Four relief workers were employed throughout the season on the baseball diamond improvement it and keeping it in condition.

HILLCREST PARK

Rustic paths were graded along the hillside extending a length of 1,359 yards, including 63 feet of rustic bridge from Hillcrest Avenue to 8th Street. The gulleys that intersect the hillside were bridged where necessary. Heavy log seats were built and placed at intervals along this pathway.

ELBOW DRIVE PLOT

This is the plot of ground at the north-west corner of the intersection of 5th Street and Elbow Drive. The refuse was removed from this site, the ground deeply trenched, water installed, a path gravelled through its centre, and the back portion planted with trees, shrubs, and perennial flowering plants. The front portion was seeded to lawn and three flower beds made. Three loads of fertilizer were used on the lawn areas.

CLIFF TRIANGLE

This area was graded, seeded, and a good lawn established, 22 trees were planted, and new flower beds made.

EARL GREY COMMUNITY CENTRE

46 trees and 158 shrubs were planted on the steep banks surrounding this Recreation Ground.

BALMORAL CIRCUS

Three of the sections of this Circle, comprising 15,000 superficial yards, were deeply trenched, levelled, fertilized and seeded to lawn.

ELBOW PARK CAR LOOP

The plot in the centre of this loop was made bright by the planting of a number of Coltness Dahlias and annual flowering plants. The grass was heavily fortilized and renovated.

KENSINGTON AVENUE PLOT

Fifty yards of gravel were removed from this plot and replaced with loam. Wooden curbing was laid, and the whole area seeded to grass. A water service was denoted and installed by a local business concern.

RIDEAU ISLAND BIRD SANCTUARY

One hundred nursery-grown spruce trees were denated to this Department by Mrs. William Pearce to be planted as a memorial to her husband recently deceased and who was a resident of this City for some forty years. These trees were planted on this Island.

HILLHURST PARK

125 trees and 121 shrubs were planted wherever space was still available on the inside of the fence. These plantations are now developing rapidly and hide the ugly board fence to a quite considerable extent, thereby improving the appearance of the park immensely.

OGDEN PARK

New tennis courts and horse-shoe pitches were constructed, a baseball diamond laid out, repairs made to playground apparatus, water service extended, a large number of trees and shrubs planted and the tree borders cultivated. A large skating rink was maintained during the winter. All this was done by relief labour, the total number of relief hours worked being 2326.

The wading pool donated by the Calgary Kiwanis Club the previous year, proved exceedingly popular.

MILLICAN PARK

A building created as a dressing room for bathers at the bathing pool on the creek, was removed to the rink by request of the local residents. The rink site was levelled and extended and a water connection installed, the total number of relief hours used being 2604.

VALLEYFIELD

A number of trees and shrubs were planted in the sod in 1934; the areas in which these were planted were dug up last year, the whole area enclosed with a fonce and the rink site levelled. A Community building was erected by local residents. The total number of relief hours used on this Park was 2516.

CALGARY TENNIS GROUNDS

The grounds were kept in first class condition by the club that has them lessed. No progress was made, however, with the renovation of the fencing, the sum required by the terms of the lease to be spent on improvements being expended on improvements to the clubhouse. The plans for those were submitted to me and received my approval, and all other conditions of the lease were complied with.

ELBOY. CRICKET GROUNDS

The outfield at the Elboya Cricket Ground was greatly improved by putting four days' work on it with a blade grader and roller.

SOUTH CALGARY CRICKET GROUNDS

The pitch was renovated at these grounds and holes on the outfield filled in $\ensuremath{\bullet}$

BO INESS ROAD BOWLING GREENS

The boulevard strip adjoining the Bowness Road Bowling Greens was graded and prepared for seeding.

ROYAL SUNALTA RECREATION GROUNDS

The grading work at the centre was completed, 1,200 cubic yards of earth being removed. Ten loads of mulch were spread on the hillside to prevent drifting. Fourteen poplar trees were planted. This project has taken two years to complete and now makes an excellent recreation ground. On its completion a community organization asked to be allowed to lease the property and this was granted.

SHAGANAPPI PARK MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE

Another very successful season was had at the Golf Course. The gross receipts were \$ 10,732.70, and gross expenditures \$ 9.156.27.

Weather conditions (a very important factor) were very favourable, and the season was a long one - from January 27th to December 21st, - with a few broaks due to bad weather. The figures horowith submitted are conclusive evidence as to the favourable weather during the season:-

Nine new wooden frames and rubber mats were placed on the mens' first nine. Mats at all other tees were lifted and relaid. Nine new frames and four new mats were still required to complete the mens' course. The stands for tee boxes were repaired and painted.

76 trees and 13 shrubs were planted to form shelter groups at the toes.

All stones that had worked to the surface were again removed from the fairways, holes filled, and the fairways regularly mown. The rough was burnt off in the fall.

All greens were re-laid twice during the season, 16 barrels of fuel oil, 9 barrels of crank-case oil, and 80 yards of sand being used for that purpose. The old sand removed from the greens was used to re-surface the bunkers.

The locations of two greens on the ladios course were changed.

The water service was extended by 200 feet and the road to the clubhouse was graded and considerably improved.

The large rustic entrance arch was completed and letters in suitable style designating the name of the park inserted in this arch.

The hallway leading to the locker rooms in the clubhouse was re-modelled so as to give separate access to mens' and womens' locker rooms from the one vestibule. This new vestibule and the womens' locker rooms were lathed and plastered. The lockers in the mens' room were re-arranged.

CITY OF CALGARY PARKS DEPARTMENT PLAYGROUNDS

Supervision:

The old system was to some extent reverted to last year, men and women being used as Supervisors.

Playgrounds were supervised as follows:-

Average number of days playgrounds were in session was 45. There was a total daily average of 1,212 children on the eight playgrounds.

It will be noticed that the attendance records for Rotary Recreation Grounds, Riley Park and St. George's Island are very much higher than for any other centres. This is probably due to some extent to the splendid way in which those grounds are equipped, and in the latter case to the swimming and wading pools that are a feature of these parks and attrict children from all parts of the city. So great was the attendance at the Rotary Grounds that it was found necessary to use two supervisors.

For the purpose of inter-playground contests, the city was divided into two sections. The winners of the Boys' Competitions in north section were: Senior, Riley; Intermediate, Riverside. In the south section they were: Senior, St. George's Island; Intermediate, Victoria: Junior, Victoria.

Winners of the Girls' Competitions in the north section were: Senior, Riley; Intermediate, Riverside; Junior, Riverside; and winners in the south section were: Senior, Victoria; Intermediate, St. George's Island; Junior, Victoria. All playgrounds entered teams in Senior, Intermediate and Junior Classes.

Playground Activities

So keen was the competition and the friendly rivalry between the several playgrounds, that great crowds of youngsters followed their respective teams from playground to playground to watch the League Games played.

Basketball: This game did not arouse so much interest as softball, but the competition was keen between those playgrounds that mustered teams. Several playgrounds were unable to organise regular teams to play in the league, but in these cases friendly games were organised whenever possible, and these games proved just as popular as the League games.

Hiking: This was another new activity that seemed to be greatly enjoyed by the children.

Swimming: Competitive swimming this season was also another attraction and has apparently taken a permanent place in the playground curriculum. In sormer years the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. kindly placed their respective pools at the disposal of the playground children for one day each week for swimming lessons. The same privilege was extended this year but on a larger scale, and the swimming holes on the Bow and Elbow were under the supervision of qualified swimmers appointed by this Department.

This year the organised swimming holds were increased to to as follows:

Mr. Holland and Mr. Davidson also acted as instructors at the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. Under the supervision of the above named men the boys and girls were well disciplined, thereby reducing a lot of the trouble experienced in former years.

On August 22nd a Gala was hold at Bowness Park; the Street Railway Department gave all the ninners Certificates, and 57 prizes were distributed. This event was a great success and was very well attended.

Handicraft Work: This is a recognised playground activity, and this year attained an even greater degree of popularity than previously on some playgrounds, whilst on others the interest was practically non-existant. A special supervisor, properly qualified, might well be appointed for this work to travel from playground to playground.

Horseshoes: A new feature on some of our playgrounds last season was the Horseshoe League. This form of sport is becoming increasingly popular, and is easily provided for with practically no expense for equipment.

Soccer: Several playgrounds were keen to form soccer teams last season indicating that this game is increasing in popularity. Unfortunately, only on a limited number of our playgrounds is there sufficient space for this game to be played.

St. George's Island: This playground differs from any of the others that are supervised because of the large number of transient children that make use of the playground, many of them even coming from points outside the city. There were children on this playground during the past season from Red Deer, Alberta, Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, Selkirk, Manitoba, and even from places as far distant as Toronto, Ontario and Fernie, B.C. These circumstances, of course, make it difficult for the supervisor to organise and operate the playground in just the same way that the others are operated.

There was a daily attendance in this playground of approximately two hundred, the parents in many cases accompanying the children.

<u>Victoria Playground</u>: Softball was by far the most popular activity at this playground, five teams being entered in the Leagues.

Mewata Playground: One of the great drawbacks to the Mewata Park Playground is lack of shade, which makes the attendance during the afternoons very poor on hot days.

Rotary Playground: So popular is this playground, and so large the attendance that it has been found necessary to have two supervisors. Whilst the Rotary Playground did not make a very good showing at the Swimming Gala, its successes at the Field Meet were outstanding, as it won both shields with a total of 88½ points. Sport badges were awarded to twenty children who successfully passed the tests.

Picnics were held at Bowness and Sandy Beach. These were very popular with the children.

The experiment of having a man and a woman at Rotary proved a success in my estimation, Miss Irwin specialising in Industrial work and supervision of the girls, while Mr. Merritt supervised the boys and all activities in general.

Tuxodo Park Playground: The attendance was small during the first two weeks of July but gradually increased from that time. Baseball was the predominating sport. This playground entered teams in the Senior, Intermediate, and Junior Sections and came very close to winning the championship in the North Division. Some 25 boys and 15 girls participated in the swimming lessons. Tuxedo Playground was not well represented in the Field Day Events but there was much enthusiasm on the playground itself in High Jump, Long Jump, Relay Race, and similar competitions. Hikes were organised periodically. The small children were keenly interested in the handicraft work.

(CONT'D) PLAYGROUNDS

Killarney Park Playground: In no district in the city is the provision of a supervised playground more greatly appreciated by both children and perents then in Killerney. There was keen participation in all the activities. Baseball teams were organised in all the sections. The Senior girls reached the finals. The home games played at the park proved a great attraction to the adults. Horseshoes and quoits were very popular. About 50 children joined the swimming classes, girls predominating. Some very fine handicraft work was produced by this playground.

Bridgeland Playground: The attendance at this playground was largely comprised of young children who took a great interest in reed and raffic work, sewing eards, etc. However, many of the older girls took part in the reed work, the boys participating in dodge ball, soft ball and basketball. Several hikes and picnics were organised by the supervisor. A boys' softball team was entered in each of the four divisions, two girls' softball teams for Junior and Senior, and one basketball team in the Intermediate class. There were also 18 entered in the Horseshop towns. were also 18 entered in the Horseshoe teams.

Riley Park Playground: As usual this was a well attended playground. As a matter of fact this particular playground approaches the nearest of any to the ideal in this city. It has a fine pool suitable for wading and swimming, is equipped with excellent apparatus, has fine lawn areas for the carrying on of games and has a very beautiful setting in the park itself.

Maintenance and Development Work

The playground equipment in the Elbow Swimming Pool Grounds were overhauled and improved.

Considerable improvement by way of grading was done on

the boys' cricket ground in Elboya.

Planting of trees and shrubs and other improvements

were carried out at the Earl Grey Community Centre.

Additional equipment was placed on Victoria Playground.

The grading of a new playground site at 13th Avenue and 6th Street East was commenced.

Very considerable and necessary repairs were made to the playground apparatus at Mewata Park.

The development of a playground site on 1st Avenue between 5th and 6th Streets West was commenced.

The playground apparatus at Riley Park was repaired and improved.

The season was undoubtedly one of the most successful in the history of playgrounds in this city, supervisors and children alike being woll satisfied with the outcome, and all are eagerly looking forward with plansurable anticipation to next season's activities. In the success of the season the loyal co-operation and faithful work of each of the supervisors was the chief factor.

Maintenance and Development Work (Cont'd)

The parents of the children attending the playgrounds especially the mothers of the younger ones, are showing a growing interest in these activities, by accompanying their children and sometimes even participating in their games.

A feature that might well be introduced into the playground work is that of promoting a campaign to prevent accidents, by having a qualified person give instruction on this subject. Good work could also be done by a qualified Health Supervisor to conduct health educational propaganda.

Considerable improvements were made to the play-ground area and equipment at Tuxedo Park.

A good deal of progress was made in the further development of the Rotary Recreation Ground, principally by way of grading the undeveloped areas.

A comprehensive athletic and recreational area is in course of development in Bridgeland, also at Millican, Ogden and Valleyfield Parks.

An outdoor checker board was provided for the playground at the Elbow Park Swimming Pool and this innovation proved a very popular feature.

In response to very urgent and frequently repeated requests from people resident in the South Mount Royal District for a playground to be provided in that neighbourhood, grading work was commenced on Block 75 for that purpose, but was later abandoned as a result of very emphatic protests of those living in the immediate vicinity.

1,130 lineal feet of concrete curbing was laid at Rotary Recreation Grounds, the costs being borne by the Rotary Club.
100 cubic yards of black loam were removed from

the south end of the grounds and 200 cubic yards of loam stripped from the surface at the north end.

Two new flower beds were made on either side of the flagpole and planted with 50 peonies denated by Mr. E. L. Richardson.

80 feet of chain link fence, purchased by the

Rotary Club, was erected at the north west corner, thus completing the fence on the north side.

RINKS

The weather during the present winter has been far from ideal for outdoor skating, and the shortage of labour due to the strike of relief workers, lasting twelve weeks from November 1st to January 25th was also a great handicap in keeping the rinks in condition.

Hockey has obtained a wonderful foothold throughout the city with both senior and junior participants, due mainly to the facilities provided by this Department.

The Westmount Bouleverd Hockey Rink was utilised almost exclusively by the Juvenile and Midget Hockey Leagues.

The rink on South Calgary Park was graded.

As the residents in Parkhill desired to have a new location for their rink, city-owned lots on 38th Avenue were graded. A considerable quantity of loam of good quality had to be removed to provide a level surface. This loam was used in the Cemeteries.

The hockey rink at Manchester was enclosed with a close board fence and a substantial dressing room built, the material with the exception of fence posts being furnished by the community.

The new rink site was levelled and constructed at 4th Street West and 20th Avenue.

The graded area at the Mission Community Rink on 24th Avenue West was extended.

A rink site was graded on the Eau Claire property, 2nd Avenue and 5th Street West, 533 cubic yards of debris being removed. The rink was enclosed with a fence and light provided.

Work was commenced on a rink site in Bankview but the strike prevented its completion. 118 cubic yards of earth was moved.

Two new rink sites were graded at Killarney Park.

BOULEVARDS

Very few trees were planted last season, and only when property owners requested them. The planting was confined to American Elm, Native Birch and Green Ash, no Poplars of any variety being planted.

In recent years it has been found impossible to purchase, in any quantity, trees of a suitable size for permanent planting. The only stock acquired has been what is known as lining-out stock, and small seedlings for nursery planting.

A good deal of surgery work was done on many of the larger trees where decayed areas were showing. All trees and shrubs were cultivated.

One hundred and two large trees were removed because of sewer trouble or for other reasons. All tree stakes where no longer required, were removed.

A large number of trees were severely headed back at the request of the Alberta Telephone Department.

The following is a statement of tree and shrub work:-

The grass was cut three times only during the season.

2,838 lineal feet of boulevard have been lowered and renovated in various parts of the city, 168 cubic yards of earth being removed and replaced with 73 cubic yards of loam.

CEMETERI ES

UNION CEMETERY:

All flower borders were regularly cultivated and watered and annuals planted. Perennial growths were cleaned off in the fall and the borders mulched.

Annuals were planted on grave plots as ordered by owners and the plots watered and cultivated throughout the season as necessary.

All rock walls were watered and cultivated as far as possible but, owing to inexperienced labour, these were much below the standard of previous years.

All tree and shrub borders and beds were pruned,

All tree and shrub borders and beds were pruned, watered, forked over and kept cultivated throughout the season. Much forking was done again in the fall to conserve moisture. Replacements were made where required. 8,878 trees and 8,151 shrubs were pruned.

Tree holes were dug in readiness for planting on the west side of 2nd Street East from 29th to 32nd Avenues. Growing trees will greatly add to the appearance of this approach to the city and will also tend to balance with the planting already done on the east side! A large number of shrubs were also planted on the west side of the Macleod Trail for the same purpose!

The unsightly cutbank at the north east corner of the Union Cometery was graded off, trees and shrubs planted, the whole area forked over, and a gravel walk was made from the turnstile in the old fence to the main road, 40 yards of gravel three inches deep being used. Tree holes were dug on the north side of the road adjoining the C. N. R. track at this point.

Eight large trees were removed from the west slope because of overcrowding.

Specimen trees and shrubs were planted on the Free Grave Section.

Two large spruce trees were transplanted from plots in Section N to borders by request of owners.

Four large spruce trees were removed from the Van Wart Plot and the plot re-sodded.

255 sunken graves were levelled, but there are still many to be done,

14,264 square feet of grave plots and 4,264 square feet of grassways were loamed and seeded.

The R.N.W.M.P Plot, 420 square yards in area was dug, graded and reseeded.

Blocks 8, 9, and 10 Section M. were topdressed and seeded. It is hoped that it will be possible to complete the renovation work on this section during the coming season.

47 grave plots were re-turfed.
All grass borders bordering driveways were edged.
Four loads of broken bottles, tin cans, etc. were

removed from grave plots.

Sections A, B, K, L, N and W, and a portion of the west slope were topdressed with fertilizer, 270 cubic yards being used.

All roads and gutters were kept free of weeds during the summer and snow removed during the winter.

UNION CEMETERY

A side-walk was made on 2nd Street East along the west side of the cemetery, 236 yards of gravel and 15,000 feet of wooden curb being used.

The rock gutter at the hairpin turn on the main driveway was taken up and moved out from the verge to provide side-

walk space at this point.

New iron culverts, 30 feet in length, were used to replace the wooden ones that had rotted away on the east driveway. There are nothers that must be replaced during the coming season. 465 yeards of gravel were used in resurfacing driveways.

130 yards of rock guttpr were laid at Section B. The basement at the cottage was excavated to the full extent of the building; and concrete walls and floor constructed. This basement now makes excellent quarters for storage purposes and for carrying on repair work, something that was very badly needed at the Union Cemetery. The verandah supports having decayed, these were replaced, cement footings put under stops, and the steps themsolves rebuilt.

A concrete menhole and cover was installed at the cottage for the purpose of providing a winter water supply.

The concrete floor at the entrance to the chapel,

which was in a deplorable condition was relaid.

Six now sents were made for the chapel and gas

installed.

The fencing was completed on the east side of the

cemetery, 160 feet of Page wire fencing being used.

Fire hose had to be frequently used to maintain the turf in reasonable condition, the water pressure through the ordinary services still being far from adequate, particularly at the south end of the cemetery.

The usual assistance was given on Citizens' Decoration Day, all soldiers' graves being marked with flags and platforms and barricades erected, etc.

Special Decoration Days for their own Orders were held by the Elks and Oddfellows Clubs.

CEMETERIES (CONT'D)

BURNSLAND CEMETERY

The flower borders received the usual attention in the matter of planting, watering, cultivating, etc. Owing to a shortage of hose, the whole available supply was required on the grave plots and watering of flower borders could only be done at night.

The tree and shrub borders and beds were forked, cultivated, watered and pruned, and replacements made where necessary.

1,848 trees and 4,659 shrubs were pruned. Groups of shrubbing were planted at the ends of

sections where space was available.

56 trees were planted on plots owned by the city. 72 yards of fortilizer were used to topdress grass

arcas.

34 graves were re-sodded.

Blocks 7 and 8 in Section F. were graded, leamed

and socded.

A one-foot grass strip, 2,400 feet long, was laid along the main driveway on the south side of the Cometery.

The boulevard on the Maclood Trail was extended ... northwards, the complete length of the Chinese Market Gardon, and southwards to the end of the cemetery, the surface being first graded and then trees and shrubs planted. The outer strip on this boulevard for the full length was surfaced with leam and grass seed sown. The boulevard strip on the south side of the cometery was trenched two feet deep and 16 feet wide.

19,240 square feet of grave plots and 10,976 square feet of grassways were loamed and seeded.

116 sunken graves were levelled.

The grass nursery in this cometery supplied 940 square feet of turf for use in other parks.

Seven new blocks were plotted and marked, 547 markers

word used.

Three loads of bottles and tin cans were removed from grave plots.

The driveways were kept free of weeds and snow and 1,240 yards of gravel used in re-surfacing.

A rustic summer house was erected on the triangle at the intersection of sections K and H. Seats were placed at the south entrance for the convenience of visitors to the cemetery whilst waiting for cars.

MEMORIAL DRIVE, SUNNYDIDE SECTION

Considerable improvements were made on this section of the Memorial Drive. The area from 9A. Street to 7th Street was graded, filled where necessary, and seeded to grass, the total area thus improved, being about $2\frac{1}{3}$ acres. Wherever there were gravel outcrops these were removed and re-placed with soil. The gravel thus removed was used for the formation of paths along the river bank. 1200 lineal feet of path was completed. 150 yards of fill and 100 yards of loam were used.

BURNSLAND GRAVEL PIT

A gang of relief workers were employed in this gravel pit during the winter months to excavate and screen sand and gravel, and the following quantities were used:-

The portion of the gravel pit from which the gravel had been completely exhausted and where it had been possible to refill with soil was refilled and its use given to a number of relief workers for the growing of vegetable crops.

NURSERIES

The stock used from the Nurseries for permanent planting consisted of 7,339 trees, 5,898 shrubs, 35 vines and 22,568 perennials.

14,132 tree and shrub cuttings were planted.

Seed of 59 kinds and varieties were transplanted.

204 feet of new Frost Fence was erected on the east boundary of the nursery.

A gate was placed at the entrance to the nursery.

PATROLLING

During the year all parks, playgrounds and cemeteries were regularly patrolled. Whilst convictions for violations were not so numerous as 1933, the warnings were more frequent. South Mount Royal District this year was by far the worst for van dalism and the violation of the Parks Bylaw. Some thirty warnings were issued in this district alone. Quite sorious damage was done to the monument in the park and a thorough investigation was conducted, but it was not possible to effect a conviction! The conditions at St. Goorge's Island, where, in previous years there has been a lot of trouble, were much improved, there being no damage reported. Frequent warnings had to be issued with reference to fast driving on the island roads. A little more trouble was experienced at the Rotary Park this year than usual. This was possibly due to the fact that children from all districts are being attracted to this playground because of the excellent apparatus with which it is equipped. At Riley Park very few flowers were stolen as compared with other years, and golf playing was eliminated at this park. On the South Calgary and Rosevele Parks some trouble was experienced with roaming cattle and horses. At Sunalta Triangle children were frequently warned regarding playing ball on the park. There was pilfering of plants etc., at the Cemeteries, but this was less than in previous years. Regular visits were made to the Golf Course during the summer, and the ravines received particular attention. As in 1933 the different "swimming holes" were patrolled, complaints were reduced to a minimum and the conduct in general was good. The selection of experienced swimmers and life-savers from amongst the relief workers to act as supervisors was a great help and a number of boys and girls were taught life saving and swimming.

MAINTENANCE OF TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT

. . .

The two first Jacobsen motor mowers are getting very much the worse for wear but will probably last out another season.

Twelve "Perfection" hand mowers were repaired and put into

service again.

A senond-hand Fordson tractor and four new cutting units were purchased for the Golf Course.

Our stock of rubber hose pipe is getting greatly depleted due to the fact that very little has been purchased for several years.

All the tools and equipment of the Department is carefully branded, and the foreman in charge of any gang of men signs for all tools taken from our shop and is held responsible for the same until they are returned or accounted for in some other way.
