

ANNUAL REPORT 1935

To His Worship the Mayor, Commissioner, and City Council:

Gentlemen:

I beg to submit herewith my 23rd Annual Report dealing with the work of the Parks Department during the year 1935.

The gradual reduction from the more adequate appropriation of 1930 reached its lowest ebb last year. However, with the assistance obtained by way of relief labor, we were enabled not only to carry on several improvement projects previously started, but also to do a large amount of renovation, repair, and restoration work and to keep previously improved areas in a reasonably well maintained condition. A serious condition developed during the spring when there was a great shortage of labor, but this was remedied when the work-for-wages system was put into effect, as very many more hours of labor were available under this system.

The Department is suffering most in the matter of equipment. There has been little money for replacement though actually more tools are really required due to the larger number of workmen. Furthermore, due to the inexperience of many of these men, the wear and tear is greater. While, for obvious reasons, such as inexperienced and unaccustomed labor, work performed during unseasonable periods of weather, etc., the actual return value of the work performed, considered in conjunction with the amount of labor expended, is far below that which similar expenditures would produce under normal conditions and competent labor, as an emergency measure, the results have been satisfactory in so far as the Parks Department is concerned.

If there is one policy of the Department that has met with greater favor than others, it is the steady development of the various recreational facilities. All reasonable demands for these facilities have been responded to, to the extent that resources permitted.

Weather:

The weather was moderately cold during January except from the 15th to the 22nd, when intensely cold weather prevailed. February was unseasonably warm, whilst sub-zero temperatures prevailed during the early part of March. Much snow fell during the first week in April with normal temperatures throughout the rest of the month. May was a particularly cold month with considerable rainfall. June also was rather a rainy month, whilst precipitation during July and August was also reasonably heavy, August being an unusual cold month. September and October were rather dry with normal temperatures till the last week in October, when the thermometer dropped below the zero mark for several successive nights. The first snow fell on September 18th and there was quite a heavy fall on the 5th of October which did much damage to street trees. This snow quickly melted. The weather was normal during the first part of November, unseasonably mild at the end of the month. The first blizzard of the season occurred on December 9th followed by very mild weather till the 24th, after which it was somewhat colder till the end of the year.

Whilst the cold, moist spring and early summer retarded growth, it greatly prolonged the planting season, and the plentiful moisture of May, June, and July was particularly favourable to the floral displays and the establishment of newly planted stock. The mild periods such as those experienced during February, November, and December are always more or less injurious to tree and shrub growth, the extent of the damage depending on the length of the mild spell, the rapidity of temperature fluctuations and the kind of weather that follows.

Arboriculture:

During the winter of 1934-35 it was possible to complete pruning of trees and shrubs on only about half the park areas, no work of this nature being done on the north side of the Bow River. 27,535 trees, and 25,105 shrubs were pruned. This winter pruning was started where it was previously discontinued, but the indications are that it will be far from complete by the end of the season. Until last year it had always been possible to complete this work. This is very convincing evidence of the expansion of the work of the Department,

1,854 trees, 3,055 shrubs, and 58 vines were permanently planted during the season. For several years past a large stock of trees and shrubs of a suitable size for planting have been available from our civic nurseries. Owing to the extensive planting programmes of the last two or three years this stock is being depleted much faster than it can be replaced, though all space in the nurseries is re-stocked as it is cleared. The indications are that less planting will be possible for a few years until the young stock has attained to suitable size. This is somewhat unfortunate as there are a number of areas that are ready for planting.

Floriculture:

The following material was used for floral displays:- 29,459 perennials, 84,023 annuals, and 6,328 bulbs, all of which, with the exception of the bulbs, was produced by the Department.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND PARK

There were more than the usual number of picnics last year, and it was at times difficult to accommodate all who came. The picnic grounds are constantly gaining in demand and patronage, and the work of keeping them in condition at all times and providing the reasonably necessary facilities of proper control, and the elimination of undesirable and commercial elements, entails constant vigilance. To avoid misunderstanding, it is proposed to re-arrange the grouping of the picnic tables, making a plan of same to be kept in the office, and allot the tables according to this plan, to organizations and groups in order of precedence. More picnic tables are required.

On the occasion of the Concert given by the Kitsilano Girls' Band from Vancouver, close to 1,000 cars had to be accommodated. There is a great demand in certain quarters for extension of the parking area. I am opposed to any extension of parking space being made, or, eventually the whole Island will become one huge parking ground.

Four new flower beds were made during the fall. 531 perennials and 11,374 annuals were used for floral display.

Five hundred and eighty-one trees and shrubs were planted from nursery stock, and 400 spruce trees that were donated to us.

Considerable underbrush and dead wood was cut during the winter months.

A levee, 20 feet wide, has been raised completely around the east end of the Island from a point opposite the west end of the Zoo to the north bridge, this levee being as high as eight feet at its highest point. The cost of this was borne by the Federal Government and was done as a precaution against floods. The experience of this winter as a result of ice jams has shown that it will be necessary to treat the north road extending from the west end of the Zoo to the ^{north} south bridge in a similar manner before we can be entirely safe as regards floods. It was possible to transplant only 18 trees and 40 shrubs from the site of this levee, all others being destroyed.

The river embankment on the south side of the Island from the south bridge was rip-rapped with heavy stone work for a distance of 1,310 lineal feet, the cost being borne by the Federal Government. The embankment was covered with four inches of black loam and seeded with Brome grass.

A woven wire fence 12 feet in height and 5,900 feet in length was erected around the Island, leaving the main driveway from the south to the north bridge open, but completely enclosing the rest of the Island. The cost of this fence was borne by the Zoological Society.

Rustic fencing was built as follows:- Around wading pool, 50 yards; alongside of driveway, 342 yards; between deer pens, 94 yards; alongside river bank on south road, 54 yards; making a total of 550 yards. There are now 1,107 lineal yards of rustic fencing in this park.

An ornamental fountain of limestone, 12 feet in height, was constructed near the Zoo, the cost being borne in part by the Zoological Society. Ornamental pillars, built of limestone, were also erected opposite the north end of the south bridge, and equipped with wrought iron gates.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND PARK (CONT'D)

Two rustic summer houses were placed in suitable locations and equipped with tables.

A lean-to shed was added to the picnic kitchen to provide a storage place for tools.

The ditch leading from the river to the pool in the bird sanctuary was widened and deepened.

A football field was levelled and equipped in the east end of the Island.

The well beneath the caretaker's house was cribbed with concrete.

Buildings of all kinds in this park are badly in need of painting.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND ZOO

The caretaker of the Zoo reports as follows:-

Specimens have remained in excellent health and losses have been light. While the number of specimens added during the year has not been large, yet they have been of an interesting character. Foremost amongst these were:- a male cougar, female peccary, and additional monkeys, doves, and ornamental pheasants.

Specimens added by natural increase include:- a baby spiker monkey, fallow deer, ringtail cats, timber wolves, and a blue peafowl.

The female black-handed spider monkey gave birth to a baby on February 8th, which, up to date, has flourished well and has of course, been a source of great interest to the general public.

The raising by the semi-tropical ringtail cats of two young, is also of some interest as, although born late in the season, they appear to be wintering well in outside quarters.

Eight blue peafowl have been raised, and if these birds can be brought on to lay earlier in the year, I have no doubt that even better results may be obtained.

A big proportion of the relief labor allotted to the Zoo during 1935 has been used in connection with the erection of a fence around the Island, work indirectly connected with the new dyke, work on model of dinosaur, etc.

The following is a list of improvements completed during the year:-

Wiring of pens south and west of new tropical building. Removing and rebuilding of original bear pen. Painting new tropical building. Building open air fire-place. Building guard rail adjacent to tropical building. Building concrete forms for pens of new tropical building.

Feeding has been carried out in as economical a manner as possible. The foodstuffs purchased by the Parks Department amounted to \$472.28 and the approximate value of foodstuffs donated through the Zoological Society was \$620.00. In addition much valuable food such as lawn mowings, brush, hay, oats, etc. has been provided by the Department.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND ZOO (CONT'D)

The new tropical animal building completed in February functions well and the heating plant appears to act very well. This building was wired for electric light during the year.

Whilst the embankment that has been thrown up around the Island may be some protection from river water flowing over the surface, it does not prevent water from rising beneath the Island through the gravel subsoil. This fact makes it necessary to provide further protection as outlined below:-

1. Cementing and waterproofing of basement; water continually rises to within two inches of fire box of boiler.
2. Installing of valves or some system for "capping" sewers where water backs up.
3. Some action to attempt to prevent water being forced up through ditches and low spots and thus flooding adjoining parts of the Island.

During the year considerable effort has been made to group specimens according to their Zoological Order, and thus make the gardens more interesting and attractive. This work is being continued and before spring will be completed as far as is practical under the circumstances.

Signs have been sadly lacking, but I understand the Zoological Society has obtained a large number of a suitable type.

The following further improvements are recommended:-
Building of a larger lion den and pen.
Building of a winter building for waterfowl, thus relieving pressure on present tropical animal building.
Rehousing of birds of prey.
Such changes as are necessary to beaver pond and enclosure.
Painting of roof of new tropical animal building, etc.
An effort should also be made to obtain larger supplies of fruit and vegetables.

RILEY PARK

The peony garden was again a point of great attraction during the period the plants were blossoming, which they did most profusely last season. The flowering shrubs have also been a source of great attraction in this park in previous years. However, this year, the flowers were very sparse, due to the fact that the bushes had not recovered sufficiently from the severe killing back of the previous year.

Eight new flower beds, comprising 1,216 square feet in area, were prepared at the west end of the park.

4,286 square feet of turf was used in renovating the lawns.

86 lineal feet of wire fencing was erected at the west end of the park to prevent school children making trails across the lawns and flower beds.

CRESCENT PARK

The water service was extended sufficiently to make it possible to seed an additional three acres to lawn. The established lawn was heavily fertilized with manure, as also were the shrubbery borders.

The fence around this park has become very much decayed, and much of it had to be renovated.

SOUTH MOUNT ROYAL PARK

14 new flower beds were made, of a total area of 5,200 square feet. These were dug to a depth of two feet, the subsoil replaced with 40 cubic yards of loam and fertilizer.

325 square yards of pathway were excavated and 150 square yards gravelled, and 3,200 square feet ^{of turf} removed from new flower beds were shipped to, and used in Riley Park, and the Cemeteries.

441 square yards of turf were used at 26th Avenue 1st Street West street end.

The rustic shelter, which had become almost completely demolished by vandals, was entirely removed, and, as a building of some kind is absolutely essential on this park, it was replaced with the pavilion from the abandoned cricket ground at Inglewood Park. This building was repaired and remodelled, and large shrubs were planted around it to screen it as much as possible.

KILLARNEY PARK

The tree and shrub borders were cleaned and cultivated three times during the season, and grass and weeds cut on the outside of the fence.

The hockey rink, commenced in 1934, was completed and enclosed with a board fence, 185' x 85'. An area similar in size was also graded and prepared for a skating rink, 200 cubic yards of earth being excavated.

SUNALTA RAMP

Very little work was done on this area during the past year due to the fact that labor was not available. Some progress was made however, with the construction of the stone retaining wall on the west side. It is to be hoped that it will be possible to make greater progress during the coming year, as there is the possibility of a very fine development on this area.

TRIANGLE PARK

The flower bed in the centre of this park was enlarged, the soil on the extended area being removed and replaced with loam and fertilizer. Nine crowded trees were removed. Forty shrubs were planted, and 420 annuals used for the floral display.

SOUTH CALGARY PARK

326 trees were planted in this park. The border surrounding the park was again given to unemployed men living in the district for the purpose of growing vegetables, on condition that the whole of the border was kept free of weeds and properly cultivated. The rink was enlarged by excavating 30 cubic yards of loam.

ELBOW PARK SWIMMING POOL GROUNDS

This area was again thronged with both children and adults throughout the summer season.

In accordance with our usual practice booms were placed across the stream, but these are ignored by the great majority of the bathers. In fact there is no part of the Elbow River between the Dam and the 9th Avenue Bridge that is not crowded with bathers as long as warm weather continues. However, these booms do provide a safe bathing place for very small children.

The grounds around the dressing room were kept clean and tidy, and the necessary pruning, cultivating, and grass cutting done by the life-guards that were kept on duty here.

Quite a number of accidents occurred to bathers, first aid being rendered to no less than 70 individuals. The injuries were mainly in the form of cuts due to broken glass in the bed of the river.

All "swimming holes", playgrounds, etc. are equipped with a First Aid Kit at all times.

ROXBOROUGH PARK

Considerable broken branches, dead wood, and underbrush was removed, posts placed on either side of trail to prevent cars driving into the bush, and holes in trail filled in. The north end of this park, near the Elbow River is a favorite spot for bathers. We find difficulty in preventing these bathers from lighting fires in the bush, which practice is apt to do considerable damage.

MOUNT PLEASANT PARK

The gravel paths were resurfaced, borders fertilized and dug, bank on south side graded, and 325 tree holes dug on this bank in readiness for planting next spring.

A pathway, 630 yards in length was constructed, extending from the north end of Centre Street bridge along the hillside eastwards to the summit of the cutbank at 2nd Avenue and 3rd Street East. This has proved a very popular route for pedestrians desiring to reach Mount Pleasant district.

ELBOW BOULEVARD PARK

A number of the flower beds were trenched and replanted, and several trees on the river bank removed for the purpose of opening up vistas.

MEMORIAL PARK

The floral display in this park surpassed anything of previous years. Eight small flower beds were prepared for the planting of special flowering plants, and two others were enlarged. All flower beds were dug and fertilized in the fall in readiness for spring planting.

The slope at the north west corner of the park was re-turfed.

The beds in the vicinity of the Cenotaph were planted with bulbs in the fall.

The rustic fence in the rear of the Library was painted.

The following is a summary of the planting done in this park:- 156 shrubs, 24 vines, 15,719 annuals, 320 perennials, and 3,120 bulbs.

The service building in this park is badly in need of painting.

TOMKINS GARDENS

A relief worker was delegated to care for the plot during the summer season. This man took considerable interest in the work and did all that was necessary, regulating his hours of work throughout the month in accordance with work required to be done on the plot.

ROSEVALE PARK

The grading of this park was completed, 900 yards of earth being moved. 240 yards of surplus soil was used for filling at the Kiwanis Garden on 11th Street and 14th Avenue West, 136 yards on the Memorial Driveway, 14 yards in the Cemeteries, 6 yards at the street end at 4th Street and 38th Avenue West, and 122 yards were used by the Public Works Department.

The graded surface was mulched to prevent dust.

TUXEDO PARK

A wading pool was donated to this park by the Kiwanis Club, the Parks Department assisting with the construction of this. The shelter was renovated, paths gravelled, and tree borders cultivated. The grading of the east end of this park was commenced.

CAPITOL HILL PARK

A relief worker, living in the vicinity of this park had charge of it throughout the season and did very excellent work in keeping it in first class condition.

RICHMOND PARK

A local organization petitioned for 40 acres of this park to be fenced off and developed as an athletic field. It was eventually decided that 10 acres would be sufficient to begin with. This was accordingly fenced and some playground apparatus placed on it.

SUNALTA PARK


This park was cut and cleaned twice during the season, 7 loads of rock and other debris being removed.

A commencement was made to grade off the raw edges of the cutbanks with a view to eventually getting them grassed over.

A shrubbery border 120'x 20' was prepared across the west end of the park. 208 holes were prepared for the planting of trees and shrubs next spring.

RIDEAU PARK

A path was constructed over the hillside, connecting Parkhill with Rideau School. This path is 1,000 feet in length and entailed the construction of three rustic bridges of a total length of 64 feet. The path was surfaced with crushed gravel.

CLIFF PARK

An area at the highest point on this park could be graded and improved with advantage, and it is hoped to be able to proceed with this work during the coming season.

KIWANIS GARDEN

Considerable progress was made with the improvement of this area. A donation of One Hundred Dollars from the Kiwanis Club made it possible for us to fence the west side. A temporary fence 260 feet in length was also placed along the lane on the south side.

The remainder of the gravel, 1,042 cubic yards, was removed, 762 cubic yards of fill and loam placed on the plot, 485 trees and shrubs planted. Three hundred lineal feet of pathway intersecting the plot was curbed with 2"x 4" wooden curbing and gravelled.

RIDEAU ROAD GARDEN

This plot, planted in 1934, made remarkable progress, and the flowers that were planted this year gave it a very attractive appearance.

GARDEN CRESCENT

Seven large trees were removed, 110 shrubs planted, and the whole surface dug and cultivated.

TALLON AVENUE PLOT

The rockery in this sunken garden had become badly infested with couch grass and other weeds that were impossible of eradication by ordinary means. It was thus necessary to reconstruct the rockery. This work was commenced, and about one-half the area reconstructed. It is the intention to complete this work in the early spring.

ROYAL NORTH WEST MOUNTED POLICE PLOT

The rustic fence is constantly being damaged by automobiles and was repaired repeatedly.

CITY HALL GARDENS

Four new flower beds were made, and assistance given the Electric Light Department in installing new light standards. 1,064 annuals were used for floral display in the beds and borders.

BANKVIEW PLOT

Twenty six trees and shrubs were transplanted, and 372 were pruned.

WARD PLOT

A connection to the main, and a water service extension were installed to serve this plot. 75 trees and 61 shrubs were pruned.

ELBOW DRIVE PLOT

This particular plot attracted more attention this year than any other area of a similar kind in the city, due to a very pleasing floral display. 3,208 plants were used in the flower beds for the summer display, and 400 bulbs were planted for flowering next spring.

CLIFF TRIANGLE

An experiment in various types of fertilizers was carried out on this area. 22 trees and 108 shrubs were planted. Three new flower beds were made, and 650 bulbs planted in the fall.

BALMORAL CIRCUS

Eight loads of fertilizer were used for topdressing the grass areas, 18 flower beds made, and paths reconstructed.

ELBOW PARK CAR LOOP

A connection was made with the main and the water service installed to serve this plot. The central bed was enlarged.

RIDEAU ISLAND BIRD SANCTUARY

The one hundred spruce trees, donated by Mrs. Wm. Pearce, to be planted as a memorial to her late husband, and planted on this Island in 1934, thrive amazingly, one only dying.

BRIDGE APPROACHES

Louise: The lawns were topdressed with fertilizer and loam. 464 annuals planted in the flower beds, and 67 shrubs pruned.

BRIDGE APPROACHES (CONT'D)

Langevin: 20 trees and 152 shrubs were pruned, grass mowed, and necessary watering and cultivating done.

The fence at the north east corner of the bridge was re-constructed. The pathway that intersects this area was also fenced on both sides, and the pathway itself graded and gravelled, 6 cubic yards of gravel being used.

ISLAND PLOTS AT STREET INTERSECTIONS

Plots on 8th Street Mt. Royal were cultivated and cleaned, and nine large trees that were intercepting the vision of motorists were removed.

Some perennial flowering plants were placed in the plot on Rosedale Crescent.

The rockeries on Scarborough Avenue were reconstructed and re-planted, 180 plants being used.

At the intersection of Kensington Avenue and Bowness Road a plot, 435 square feet in area, was excavated, gravel removed and replaced with loam, the area seeded to grass and a flower bed made and planted in the centre.

STREET ENDS

38th Avenue and 4th Street West.

Fifty feet of rustic fence was built.

Four hundred square feet of border was cleared, dug, and fertilized, and planted with trees, shrubs, and perennial flowers.

36th Avenue and 5th Street West.

Similar work was done here as in the previously mentioned location.

26th Avenue and 1st Street West.

130 feet of rustic fence was constructed, and an area 6,420 square feet in extent, was cleared, trenched, and fertilized. 3,970 square feet of this area was sodded, the remainder being left for flower beds.

18th Avenue and 1st Street East.

A rustic fence, 6 feet high and 30 feet long, was built at this street end, and 55 trees and shrubs planted.

32nd Avenue and 8th Street West.

Trees and shrubs, removed from Rosevale Park, because of overcrowding, were planted here.

WESTMOUNT BOULEVARD

Considerable cleaning and thinning of the brush along the river bank was done, and a pathway, 1,025 lineal yards in length was constructed from the vicinity of Louise Bridge to 17th Street W.

MEMORIAL DRIVE

The 8,089 trees and 857 shrubs on this driveway were pruned.

Bridgeland Section:

15,000 square feet was graded and seeded to grass, 75 lbs. of grass seed being used.

Sunnyside Section:

3,947 square yards of boulevard was graded and seeded to grass, and another 13,600 square yards graded in readiness for seeding next season. 132 cubic yards of earth was used for fill, and 64 cubic yards of loam used for topdressing.

ATHLETIC ACTIVITIES

Recreation activities are increasing and becoming of greater importance in this city as each year passes. This is clearly shown by the demands pouring in from all parts for greater facilities, and also by the more active participation of a greater number of both adults and children, ~~and~~ an ever widening range of sports.

MEWATA PARK

During the summer season the park was practically useless except for the area used for softball, due to the fact that the river protection work was in progress, and the machinery and material required for this work was scattered practically all over the park. In the late fall when this work was completed ~~and~~ debris was cleaned up and removed, and a commencement made to grade the park from the west end, about one-third of the area being completed to date. As a result of this work this park is now well on the way to being developed as a very attractive piece of park property, which can hardly be claimed for it in the past. The old building previously used as a tool shed was demolished, and the old bandstand was also demolished because of its dangerous condition. A woven wire fence extending along the river bank from the west end of the park to Louise Bridge, 2,450 lineal feet in length, was erected by the Federal Government, and the bank cleaned and loamed after the piling was completed. The Parks Department then extended its own fence at 11th Street at the north end to unite with that erected by the Federal Government.

MEWATA STADIUM

Despite the fact that we had a very wet season the gate receipts from the Stadium compared very favorably with that of last year. The grounds were used very considerably, and sports of some kind took place practically every night when the weather permitted. We were unfortunate as regards weather conditions when the principal rugby games were played, and considerable labor was entailed in removing snow from the in-field. However, it was found possible to have the field in condition for each occasion, so that none of

MEWATA STADIUM (CONT'D)

the principal games had to be abandoned. I am afraid this removal of the snow will, however, have a detrimental effect on the turf.

A picket fence was built along the side of the track extending the full length of the grandstand and the track.

622 cubic yards of surplus soil were removed at the north end of the track, the area filled in with 75 loads of street sweepings; and the surplus soil replaced, 547 cubic yards of gravel were removed from the area behind the grandstand and used as fill in the north east corner of the ball ground. The area from which this gravel was removed was filled with an equal quantity of black loam and seeded to grass. 26 cubic yards of fertilizer was used on the in-field. A rock retaining wall was built along the base of the west fence. New dressing rooms 24'x 12' were provided under the grandstand.

The Stadium is in great demand throughout the season. Constant use means considerable wear and tear, which, if continued, is liable to bring about a rapid deterioration of the splendid turf which is, at the present time, its most desirable feature. A large area at 24th Avenue and 4th Street N.W. has been reserved for development as an athletic field at some future date. If a portion of this was got into condition during the coming season it could be used in 1936. Then, if Hillhurst Park could be closed until a sod was established there, this would place two additional fields at our disposal, which would not only relieve pressure on the Stadium, but would enable us to periodically rest the other fields and give them an opportunity to recuperate. No athletic field with a grass surface can stand up under constant use in this climate.

MEWATA BASEBALL GROUNDS

These grounds were not used for hardball to the same extent as they were in the previous season, but softball largely took its place. The attendance at these games however, was very poor.

42 loads of refuse was placed in the depression at the north east corner as well as the 350 cubic yards of gravel already mentioned. The filling of this depression is now almost completed.

Owing to frequent removal, many of the bleachers are becoming very much the worse for wear, and should be replaced.

HILLHURST PARK

Whilst this park is in almost constant use for association football; it is mainly practice games that are played here, and as a result there is practically no revenue derived from it. However, it does answer a useful purpose as a practice ground, and furthermore; it provides one of our most popular rinks during the winter season. Tennis is played on the hockey rink site during the summer.

45 trees and 64 shrubs were planted on the inside of the fence.

BRIDGMAN AND ATHLETIC GROUNDS

Considerable work was done on this area during the past year. 1,412 hours of relief labor being utilized, mainly in grading and levelling. The area to be used for skating and hockey was completed, and considerable progress was made with the baseball and football field fields.

MILLICAN ATHLETIC GROUNDS

The area set aside the previous year at the request of the local Community Club was further developed, mainly for skating and hockey, and the shelter and playground apparatus previously on the picnic grounds was moved to this ground at the request of the same organization.

OGDEN PARK

Considerable further progress was made in the development of this athletic ground, mainly by community effort, relief labor being used. The tennis courts were completed and fenced and trees planted outside this fence. The border planting was extended considerably, a capacious community hall erected and other improvements made. New walks were excavated and gravelled.

ROYAL SUNALTA RECREATION GROUNDS

Considerable work was done during 1933-34 on this area by the Parks Department, so that the possibility of the establishment of first class athletic grounds were provided. Immediately on completion of the work by the Parks Department, a local delegation sought and obtained permission to lease the property for a nominal sum and take over its management. Nothing has been done by this organization, however, except to establish a skating rink (which is maintained by labor supplied by the Parks Department) and the grounds have deteriorated considerably.

VALLEYFIELD PARK

The rink was enlarged to regulation size 180'x 80', a rustic fence was built around the rink, and a community hall 40'x 20' erected, the material being supplied by the Community Club.

PARKHILL ATHLETIC GROUNDS

Further levelling and grading of the softball field was done, and a shelter moved to the site for the use of players.

RECREATION GROUND, 16th AVENUE & 11th STREET WEST.

Considerable progress has been made with the grading of this area during the present winter, 470 cubic yards of gravel and soil having been dug, up to December 31st.

ELBOYA BOYS' CRICKET GROUND.

Further levelling and improvements were carried on on this field.

SOUTH CALGARY CRICKET GROUNDS

The area surrounding the cricket pitch was re-turfed, 144 square feet of sod being used. Considerable levelling was done to the outfield.

EAU CLAIRE RECREATION GROUND

An area, 275'x 250', was graded and levelled. This entailed considerable labor as the area had been used as a dump, and debris of all kinds had been deposited there. In all, 2,095 cubic yards of refuse was moved. The grading of this area is now almost completed.

ROXBOROUGH RECREATION GROUND

The tennis courts were resurfaced with shale, fences repaired, and an area graded for hockey rink.

EARL GREY RECREATION GROUND

These were maintained by relief labor throughout the season.

The revenue of the past season was less than that of 1934, due to unfavourable weather, particularly at week ends. There were actually sixteen wet week ends.

I would recommend that these be simplified.

It might help the revenue of the course if advertisements were placed on street cars and in other public places.

The following work has been done on the course during the past year:-

Twelve new wooden mat frames were made and 8 new rubber mats purchased and placed on tees. The mens' course is now completely equipped with this type of mat, and part of the womens' course.

Many of the water boxes had to be completely renovated.

All loose stones, etc. on fairways were removed and the rough between fairways burnt off.

All fairway posts were re-stencilled.

The approaches to nine greens were completely excavated, 238 cubic yards of earth removed and used to fill in trails and to level up uneven surfaces throughout the course. The areas excavated were filled in with loam and sodded, 567 square yards of sod being used.

All greens were topdressed with oiled sand periodically throughout the season and completely re-surfaced twice, 12 barrels of heavy oil, 5 barrels of crank case oil, and 80 cubic yards of sand being used for the purpose.

New bunkers were made as follows:-

On the right side of mens' number 1 fairway in rough, between mens' fairway number 9 and 18 in rough, 42 cubic yards of earth being excavated and used for filling in trails on course. The bank at the back of the bunker on mens' number 8 was removed and the area excavated to a depth of eight inches. The earth wall in the middle of the bunker on mens' number 10--72 cubic yards-- was removed.

SHAGANAPPI PARK MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE (CONT'D)

One hundred and ninety-four trees and 75 shrubs were planted, and the sod was dug in five of the existing clumps of trees.

All notice boards and signs were repainted, and a new set of notice boards were made to be placed at the corner of 17th Avenue and 26th Street West.

A garage, 18'x 20', was built for the tractor, in a clump of bushes on the northern slope, the idea being to keep this building as inconspicuous as possible. This building being on a sharp slope, the excavation from the new bunkers was used to level up the floor.

Two hundred pounds of grass seed was used in re-seeding the new course.

The dining room was repainted at the clubhouse, also all clubhouse furniture.

ROTARY RECREATION GROUNDS

Ninety-seven holes were dug in readiness for planting trees during the coming season.

Seventy cubic yards of loam was dug and stacked at the north end of the park, and this area graded in readiness for development for some activity, 265 lineal feet of pathway, 12 feet wide, was gravelled. The service building was moved to a more convenient location. An area was graded at the south end of the park in readiness for extending and enlarging the tennis courts.

RINKS

At the request of local residents a large rink was graded and enclosed at 35th Avenue and 19th Street West.

A large community rink was provided at 7th Street and 28th Avenue East. This rink was enclosed with a close board fence ten feet high, and equipped with dressing rooms, and all necessary conveniences for skating and hockey provided, the material being supplied by the local organization, and relief labor by this Department.

The rink at Bow Valley was enlarged.

The grading of the hockey rink site on Bankview Playground was completed, 244 cubic yards of earth being removed.

At Killarney the grading of a second rink site was completed, building repaired, and one rink enclosed for hockey playing. This rink is now 180'x 180' in extent.

The Community Club in charge of the Royal Sunalta Recreation Grounds was given the use of relief men for the purpose of maintaining and supervising their rink.

Three new full-sized hockey rinks were constructed in all, consisting of 10' - 12 foot side sections, 210 brackets, and 210 - 2 foot pegs. We now have 13 portable hockey rinks.

The rink on the Westmount Boulevard is, in relation to its capacity and the facilities it provides, the most costly rink we operate. I beg to recommend that all the equipment be moved to Hillhurst Park where it can be operated much more cheaply, and that an open childrens' rink only be maintained on the Boulevard.

PLAYGROUNDS (CONTINUED)

To some extent a standard programme of activities was planned, but local needs were the first consideration, and the supervisors were left free to promote such activities in their respective playgrounds, as, in their opinion, contributed most directly to the happiness and enjoyment of the children they had charge of.

For the purpose of competitive games the several playgrounds were organized into two classes, those north and those south of the Bow River, respectively. Through the courtesy of the local press, bi-weekly announcements of game results were published, and also a series of articles on playground development. These helped considerably in bringing the playground movement before the public. The experiment of appointing one of the supervisors as "press agent" proved a great success.

Playground Activities

Softball: This game continues to retain its popularity, and is, as a matter of fact, the most popular game featured on the playgrounds.

Basketball: For some reason this game does not seem to arouse a great deal of interest on all of the playgrounds. On those, however, where it was possible to organize teams, the games proved very popular.

Hiking: This activity, introduced in 1934, again proved very popular, and the several hikes that were organized were greatly enjoyed by the children.

Swimming: The Annual Swimming Gala introduced three years ago, has proved immensely popular. As a matter of fact swimming is one of the most popular forms of recreation during the summer months, and everything has been done to encourage this activity. It is most unfortunate we have not better facilities for this sport. If it were not for the courtesy of the Y.M. and Y.W.C.A. in allowing us the use of their pools, it would be almost impossible to carry on this activity.

The following is a report of the supervisor of these swimming classes:-

"All swimming classes were held at the pools at the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A., with an approximate seasonal attendance of 1,500 boys and girls. Instruction was given, and many took the opportunity to learn to swim.

I would very much like another season to get two days per week for the boys and girls at the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. At present the time is too short, and too many are in each class.

On August 7th, the Annual Swimming Gala was held at Bowness Park. It was well attended and successfully run off, the prizes, donated by a number of public spirited citizens, added considerable zest to each competition.

The swimming holes under my supervision were located at Victoria Park, C.N.R. at 9th Avenue East, Bonnybrook, Valleyfield, and Parkview, also all the swimming at the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A."

Handicraft Work: This is a very popular activity with the playgrounds, particularly with the smaller children, but in recent years we have been badly handicapped in carrying on to the extent that would seem desirable, due to the fact that funds did not permit of purchasing material to the extent required.

Horseshoes: This is another activity that was introduced in 1934, and is gaining immensely in popularity.

Association Football: This is a game that would, I believe, become very popular on our playgrounds were the grounds in every case adequate in area to provide for it.

Cricket: The remarks regarding football, apply to this game also. As a matter of fact many of the boys played improvised cricket with their baseballs and bats last season in preference to the game they were intended for.

Field Day: Assembled at the Stadium on August 29th were some three hundred picked athletes, representing their individual playgrounds in the junior, intermediate, and senior events of the annual track and field championships.

Coming to the difficulty experienced in past years in having the trophies returned by the winners of the previous season, it was decided to hold these permanently, and have them on display in the Parks Department offices, the winner's name being inscribed on each trophy from year to year.

The following are extracts from the Supervisors' Reports, having reference to their particular playgrounds:-

Rotary Recreation Ground: Report of Miss M. Irwin and W. C. Davidson.

The park is quite active in all ages and branches of sport activity. The youngest children find amusement on the swings, slides, etc., and on hot days the wading pool more than fills the demand made upon it. Among the older girls and boys the field of activity could very well be broadened considerably in that more baseball and basketball games could be arranged for on the schedule between the other parks.

Due to the fact that many children come and go through the playground all day it is rather difficult to say exactly the daily average attendance, but possibly between two and three hundred actually attend daily. The children come mostly from a good class of people and consequently are well-mannered and well-behaved. There were no serious accidents this year, and any who received minor cuts or bruises were rendered first aid by one of the supervisors. Not a great deal of industrial work was done, due to a lack of material. Raffia was not popular, and the reed was used up quickly. The sewing cards were for the small tots on hot days.

Baseball was the favorite sport among the boys at Rotary, although I believe that football and volleyball would prove popular if the necessary posts were put up.

A picnic for junior girls at Bowness, a hike for junior boys at Sandy Beach, and a corn roast at Shouldice for seniors helped to keep up the social interests at the park. The children seem to enjoy these social outings very much and they proved most popular.

At the Swimming Gala, Rotary took thirteen prizes for first place, with Parkview second, taking eleven prizes, and Bowness third with nine prizes. At the Annual Field Day, Rotary was placed third with thirty points, Riley second with thirty-two, and Victoria first with thirty-eight points. None of the Rotary teams were fortunate to win any of the Baseball Cups, but put up some good games nevertheless.

Victoria Playground: Report of Mrs. L. Clarin.

In presenting my report as Supervisor of Victoria Playground for the season 1935, it is my pleasure to report a larger attendance, and more children all eager to participate in the various activities.

The attendance for the season was 9,912 children.

Baseball was the most popular game.

The teeter placed on the grounds for the season proved a great attraction to the children.

Horse-shoes were as popular as ever.

PLAYGROUNDS (CONT'D)

Victoria Playground: (Cont'd)

The jumping pit was a busy spot all summer, pole vaulting and the high jump being the most popular. No records were broken, but the boys and girls certainly enjoyed themselves.

A new game very popular with the boys this year was cricket--played with baseball bats--Basketball, volleyball, and dodgeball found great favor with all the boys and girls. The smaller children enjoyed the singing games and industrial work.

The swimming periods at the Y.W. and Y.M.C.A. were well attended.

In the baseball league games, Victoria junior girls won the Cup. The Intermediate and Junior Boys tied with Riley for the South Section.

In the Field Day Events, Victoria boys and girls secured the highest number of points, 43 winning the Senior Shield.

I would like to recommend that a Horse-shoe Tournament take the place of the open event; that Class A, be 18 years and under, and Class E, for children 10 years and under.

Owing to the constant danger of damage to windows and buildings, I would like to suggest that the playground at Victoria School be moved to Victoria Park, or some place where plenty of open space is available.

Tuxedo Park Playground: Report of Mrs. R. Hughes.

The majority of children who attended the playground lived in the immediate neighbourhood and spent a useful and happy time during the two months of activity.

The general conduct was excellent and I enjoyed the contact with the children.

About the second week in July a wading pool was installed through the kindness of the Kiwanis Club, which proved a great attraction for the juveniles and smaller children and put the rest of their activities in the shade for the remainder of the season.

Baseball was very popular throughout the entire season. A greater number engaged in athletics about ten days prior to the Sports Day.

Basket weaving and sewing cards were very popular while the material lasted.

Quoits found great popularity among the juvenile boys.

Basketball was not very popular beyond practice throwing for the baskets. There was not sufficient interest shown to form a team.

There was no interest taken whatsoever in volleyball.

Four swings were removed and re-installed on more solid foundations, these swings proved to be very popular amongst the small children.

The Saturday Swim at the Y.W. and Y.M.C.A. was most popular and well attended.

This park provides a very useful outlet for the activities of the children, as it is on the outskirts of the city and the children lack other attractions. I feel this playground fills a real need and should strongly recommend its continuation.

PLAYGROUNDS (CONT'D)

Mewata Playground: Report of Miss Haney.

At the beginning of the season the Mewata playground was in bad condition due to construction work along the river bank. The trees were cut down and the grounds covered with tar, and there was a great deal of traffic through the park. Towards the end of the season this was prohibited however.

All the various sports were promoted with the exception of volleyball. Basketball was especially popular among both the boys and girls.

The swings were extensively used by the children and were a great source of enjoyment to all concerned.

The swimming classes at the Y.M. and Y.W.C.A. were very popular with both boys and girls.

Baseball was particularly appealing, especially among the younger boys who showed great enthusiasm and were in the finals with Riverside Playground.

The older boys' interest seemed to be drawn from the playground to the city league games which are held in this park every evening.

Sewing cards and basket making were most fascinating to the small children.

Great enthusiasm was shown in the track meet, and many hours of practise was put in.

Riley Park Playground: Report of George Dann.

This summer at Riley Park there has been much interest shown, particularly by the boys, in the following games:- Cricket, baseball, football, horse-shoes, and basketball. We were successful in organizing four baseball teams for boys and one for girls. In all about 28 games were played with other playgrounds. The girls basketball team played all their games as scheduled with such teams as remained in the league.

It might be noted that there would have been little difficulty in organizing a boys basketball team.

At the beginning of the season there was great interest in basketwork while the reed lasted. In order to give as many as possible a share in the work no large baskets were made. Thirty-five to forty small ones were completed. The reed and raffia type of basket proved to be unsuitable, for the girls became impatient at the slow progress, and tended to give up the project before it was completed. The raffia supplied was used by the younger boys and girls for braiding. There was such a demand for this type of work that about one and one-half pounds of my own raffia was used along with that the Department contributed.

Two baseball teams, the intermediate and junior boys were successful in leading our section of the playground, while the junior boys won the cup for all the grounds. In the Annual Field Day Events, Riley was awarded the Junior Shield.

Killarney Playground: Report of John T. Wright.

The opening of Killarney Park as a supervised playground on July 2nd was the signal for the gathering of the boys and girls of the district to again take part in playground activities.

PLAYGROUNDS (CONT'D)

Killarney Playground: (Cont'd)

A noticeable feature of the commencement, however, was the absence of many of last year's attendants, their place being taken by newcomers who became almost day to day attendants at the park. The attendance in numbers was on the average of 30 to 50 in the afternoon, and 75 to 100 in the evening. All in all there were probably as many girls as boys.

The unfortunate death of a little girl from infantile paralysis caused a minor scare at the park, but the disquiet soon died down. Again the head-on collision of two cars at the entrance to the park caused the attendance, teams and all, to adjourn to the outside of the fence for two hours one Thursday afternoon. An organized golf one-club tournament provided keen competition for a week; also with the promise of much ice cream, there was a rather strenuous week of training for the Field Day at the Stadium, but the results augers ill for competitors next year.

These general remarks might be concluded with the statement that there was a very much and many voiced need for a football and a backstop.

There were five baseball teams organized; namely, Juvenile, Junior, Intermediate Boys, and Junior and Intermediate Girls.

Swimming proved a very popular feature for both girls and boys at the Y.M. and Y.W.C.A. There is an absence however, of good swimmers at this park.

Each afternoon boys and girls gathered together to use the reed and raffia and sewing cards. While the sewing cards lasted they were appreciated by the smaller children, but to satisfy them requires about one hundred a week. The older girls made flower baskets and the boys trays. The raffia was not much used, and some of it was exchanged for No. 1 reed.

Some twenty of the boys organized a golf tournament which was duly played and the winner suitably crowned.

The senior boys and girls went on a weiner roast which was keenly enjoyed, the scene of the activities being a huge bonfire at Silver Beach. The next Friday the youngsters trooped to the same spot and had a good time.

Riverside Playground: Report of Mr. J. Gerlitz.

The attendance at this playground this year was considerably increased, due to the fact that we had a senior men's softball team. Not only were the younger children interested, but the older folks as well. Great crowds attended these games.

The sand box was also well looked after, with as many as thirty or forty children trying to play at one time.

The sewing cards along with the reed and raffia work received much attention from the children. Riverside this year used up practically every bit of reed and raffia that was supplied. Sewing cards were all used up at the end of July.

Other sports such as football and basketball were also great entertainers. We staged horse-shoe tournaments and volleyball tournaments. These tournaments caused a great deal of interest and were well followed.

The following Riverside teams represented the eastern playgrounds in the finals, having won out in our division:- Junior girls, Juvenile boys, Junior boys, Intermediate boys, and Senior boys. The following teams won championships:- Riverside Juvenile Boys, Intermediate Boys, and Senior Boys.

PLAYGROUNDS (CONT'D)

These extracts from the reports of the individual supervisors indicate what a fine spirit of cooperation and loyalty was displayed by all, and shows how earnest was the desire of the supervisors, especially those new to the work to attain to the greatest possible efficiency in the work.

Maintenance work on the playgrounds consisted of the following:-

Manchester: New swings were erected on this playground.

Bankview: The site for a hockey rink, the grading of which was commenced the previous year, was completed.

16th Avenue, 11th Street West: This site is being graded at the present time.

13th Avenue, 6th Street East: The area at the back of the Parks Department workshop, 1.38 acres in extent, which for many years has been a dumping ground for refuse, has now been cleaned and levelled, and it is hoped that it will be possible to develop this area into a really attractive playground in the near future. There is possibly no locality anywhere in the city where a playground is as badly needed as in this district.

Mowata Park: The apparatus in this park had to be completely overhauled as it had been badly damaged during the period that river protection work was going on in this park.

New jumping pits were constructed.

Sunnyside: As the result of a largely signed petition, a vacant area 4,116 square yards in extent, at the corner of 9A Street on the boulevard, was reserved by the City Council for playground purposes. This area was graded, levelled, and seeded, and forty trees and thirty-nine shrubs planted on the boundaries. A fence was erected along the north side.

Rotary Recreation Ground: The work of developing this park was continued so as to bring the whole area into use. Paths were extended and gravelled. The service building was moved to a new location. The tennis courts extended so as to provide for two more courts.

The expenditure made by the City of Calgary on playground work in 1935 was \$1,232.67. The school population of this city is 14,871. It is fair to say that the average child spends at least fifty cents per month on the movies. The net cost of the operation of the playgrounds per child is eight cents per year, and the net cost of the operation of the entire parks and recreation system of the city, providing recreation for young and old, is fifty cents per capita of total population.

The Chief Warden of the Sing Sing Penal Institution is credited with the statement that 90% of the prisoners that pass through his hands were never taught how to spend their leisure time in wholesome recreation during their boyhood. This would indicate that adequately supervised playgrounds will do far more than jails to prevent the youth of our city from entering the criminal class. It is certainly much easier to prepare a boy for useful citizenship than it is to reform him after he has started on the wrong road.

BOULEVARDS

The usual work of pruning, and treating and renovating boulevard trees was carried on to the extent that labor was available for the purpose. The heavy wet snow storm of September did much damage to the trees, and 60 truck loads of broken branches had to be removed after the storm.

Ninety-eight trees were removed because of sewer trouble. All cotton-producing trees were marked for the purpose of avoiding propagating from these trees. Very few trees were planted, and these were all replacements made at the request of property owners.

All stakes and ties were examined once during the season and the necessary attention given to them.

The following statistics give particulars as to the extent of work done on boulevards during the year.

OFFICE

2,283 pieces of mail were received and 3,397 despatched during the year.

Four hundred and fifty-four Cemetery Certificates were issued.

There were 3,315 telephone calls received and 720 out calls made.

Counter enquiries amounted to 883.

Plans showing proposed development of the following areas were made:- Triangle Park, East End Playground, Kiwanis Garden, Balmoral Circus, Cliff Triangle, Tallon Avenue Garden, and the Roman Catholic Cemetery Extension.

At the request of the authorities in charge of the Men's Home at Ogden, a plan showing suggested development of grounds was made. No charge was made for this work.

A plan was also made at the request of the Roxborough Community Club, showing area and possible uses as an athletic ground of Blocks 61 and 62, Roxborough.

CEMETERIES

UNION CEMETERY:

Thirty seven large poplar trees that were overcrowding other growth were removed.

The fence line having been changed on the 2nd Street East slope, re-arrangement of the planting was made necessary, smaller growing shrubs being brought to the front.

Discarded 8 inch tile drain pipes were sunk vertically into steeply sloping banks and periodically filled with water. This has proved to be an excellent method of irrigating these steep banks.

One hundred and sixty feet of fencing was erected eastwards from the chapel to the east end of Block 1, Section M, to prevent people taking short cuts into the shrubbery.

Four hundred and twenty lineal feet of fencing was erected to enclose the newly planted area at the north east corner of the Cemetery. An ornamental rustic entrance was built at this point.

During the fall a large number of tree holes were dug in readiness for spring planting.

A number of ash trees alternated with shrubbery was planted on the boulevard space on the east side of 2nd Street East, the idea being to improve the appearance of this side of the street, and also to balance the growth as far as possible with that on the west side.

Nine loads of mulch were placed on the high and very steep cut bank on the north side of the Union Cemetery for the purpose of establishing vegetation on this bank.

Sixty-three Perpetual Care markers were made and placed.

Blocks 10 to 18 inclusive, on section M were graded, surfaced with loam, and seeded to grass, the total area so improved being 10,000 square yards. 702 cubic yards of loam and 250 pounds of grass seed were used. A very good sod was established by the fall. This completes the improvement of this section of the cemetery.

A grass verge, 600 square feet in area, on the north side of the main driveway at sections A and F, which has been for a long time in a very unsatisfactory condition was levelled and relaid; fresh soil being placed beneath the sod.

The surface inequalities at blocks 1 to 6 inclusive, on section C, were levelled off, the plots graded, topdressed, and seeded, the area improved being 1,500 square yards. 150 cubic yards of loam and 9 loads of manure were used. It is hoped to be able to continue this kind of improvement throughout section D during the coming season.

The poppy beds on the Veterans' plots were enlarged. A new bed for peonies was prepared on Block 19, Section G.

Sixty lineal feet of cobble stone gutter was re-constructed.

A wooden curb was built around the rose bed at the intersection of sections M and A.

The turf border at Block 1, Section M was reduced and the road widened to make a better approach to the chapel.

The main driveway, particularly at the hairpin bend, had to be repeatedly raked, scarified, and topdressed throughout the season. This turn should be paved.

All driveways were topdressed with fine gravel as needed.

CEMETERIES (CONT'D)

UNION CEMETERY:

Thirty-seven square yards of stone walks were made near the cemetery cottage.

Six hundred and thirty-nine lineal feet of wooden curbing was laid on the main driveway. 900 square feet of turf was laid within this curb to renovate the grass verge.

The rock retaining wall at section G, 60 feet in length and 8 feet in height, having become badly infested with weeds, was rebuilt and replanted.

A rock retaining wall was built and planted on the south side of Section M, 94 lineal feet in length and 1 foot 6 inches in height.

A rock retaining wall 30 feet long and 1 foot 6 inches in height was built on section L at the south side of the cottage.

The usual arrangements were made and assistance given for the several Decoration Days held throughout the year, in the case of Citizens' Memorial Day all soldiers' graves being marked with flags.

Rustic seats were placed in front of the cemetery cottage.

Improvements to the west slope were continued, rough spots being levelled and toppedressed with loam. 7,744 square yards were improved during the season. 400 square feet of turf was laid as a verge at the summit of this slope.

BURNSLAND CEMETERY:

Forty crowded shrubs were removed from borders and transplanted elsewhere.

The Poppy beds on the Field of Honor were widened and replanted.

Six hundred and one square yards of grass verges were loamed and seeded.

2,880 square feet of sod was laid on the grassways on the east side of section G.

2,448 square feet of grassways were graded and prepared for seeding.

The area set aside for ceremonial purposes in the Field of Honor, Burnsland Cemetery, was cleaned, dug, graded, and loamed in readiness for seeding.

The boulevard space along the McLeod Trail was toppedressed with loam and seeded to grass.

Five hundred square feet of sod was supplied to other parks for lawn renovation.

Fifty-two graves were returfed.

Concrete curbs were built around beds at intersections of sections G and F, and D and A, respectively.

Eight rustic seats were made and placed in the Cemetery.

All traffic and section signs were repaired and repainted.

Blocks 15 to 18 inclusive, on section F were surveyed, plotted, and markers placed.

CEMETERIES (CONT'D)

ROMAN CATHOLIC CEMETERY:

Grading work was carried on throughout the year whenever men were available, 1,620 square yards of soil being moved. The area was surveyed and a woven wire fence and gates erected, the posts of which were painted white.

The driveway was surveyed and excavated to a depth of six inches, the surface soil being removed over an area of 1,265 square yards.

One hundred and eighty-one plots were surveyed and marked, provision being made for all the usual sizes required, namely, from one to ten-grave plots.

Interments commenced in this Cemetery on July 11th. There had been requests for burials prior to that date, so bodies were placed in the vault until the improvements were sufficiently advanced to permit of burials being made.

A 20 foot border is being trenched 2 feet deep, on the inside of the boundary fence, in readiness for the planting of trees and shrubs next spring. This border has a superficial area of 1,071 square yards.

CHINESE CEMETERY:

This cemetery was improved, the cost being borne by the Chinese Cemetery Authorities. The work done consisted of removing the weeds and refuse, grading and levelling the whole area, loaming, seeding, and constructing paths and steps.

GLENMORE NURSERY

A tract of ground was ploughed and prepared for planting on land adjoining the Glenmore Dam by the Water Works Department and planted by the Parks Department with nursery stock as follows:- 260 trees; 1,600 shrubs; 22,210 tree cuttings.

CEMETERY NURSERY

7,655 tree and shrub cuttings were made and planted. The total number of cuttings planted in both nurseries being 29,875. 2,225 perennial flowering plants were propagated by division.

57,863 perennials were raised from seed and cuttings on hotbeds.

2,434 trees and shrubs were transplanted.

The following nursery stock was used for permanent planting in the various parks and cemeteries:- 6,049 trees and shrubs; 20,763 perennials; 54 vines. At the present time there are 37,746 seedling plants in stock in frames.

A considerable amount of grading in the form of terraces was done in the frame yard; approximately 485 cubic yards of soil was removed giving an area of 936 square feet for cold frames and hotbeds.

CEMETERY NURSERY (CONT'D)

Retaining walls of rock totalling 124 lineal yards in length and averaging three feet in height were built to hold up the terraces.

All plant frames were renovated and some new ones made.

Five hundred lineal feet of wire fencing was erected on two sides of the frame yard, and on the west side 60 lineal feet of rustic fencing.

Approximately 900 feet of stony land was reclaimed and made suitable for planting.

The boulevard strip outside the nursery was widened.

216 lineal feet of rock water-channel was laid.

Quantities of tree and shrub seed was collected.

Value of stock in Nurseries at present time - \$ 13,643.07.

POLICING

The playgrounds, parks, cemeteries, skating and hockey rinks, and swimming holes were patrolled during the year. In practically all locations relief men acted as watchmen under supervision of the patrolman employed by the Department.

Warnings were issued for,--playing football in restricted areas, cutting trees, playing golf in parks, driving over boulevards, racing bicycles through cemetery, crossing graves, leaving refuse on boulevards, picking flowers in parks, dogs running at large, taking sand without permission, and rough play in the parks. Only in four cases was it necessary to prosecute.

A number of tools were stolen but some of these were recovered. Complaints were received regarding thefts of plants from the cemeteries, after which a strict watch was kept.

Supervision at the swimming holes by relief men was much appreciated by both children and parents. In addition to being taught to swim, the children were also taught life saving. There is no doubt that this supervision of the rivers by our men resulted, directly and indirectly, in saving quite a number of lives.

WORKSHOP

The new motor mower purchased in 1935 was used in the Burnsland Cemetery and proved very satisfactory. We now have a fleet of nine motor mowers. There is still need of another machine of this type for St. George's Island and Riley Park. In both these parks there is enough grass to keep a machine steadily working. Furthermore, it is expensive and entails a certain amount of risk and wear and tear to transport these machines from place to place.

Nine new hand mowers were purchased, but these were not nearly sufficient to replace those that were worn out. Every mower that we have is in continuous use during the summer season so that whenever there is a breakdown the work is tied up to that extent.

We are greatly in need of extended storage room for equipment at the workshop.

Three thousand feet of new hose had to be purchased.

In addition to this new equipment, all tools and implements were repaired as necessary, also playground apparatus.

MISCELLANEOUS

Isolation Hospital:

Trees and shrubs were pruned, grass cut, and grounds kept in order throughout the season.

Red Cross Hospital:

These grounds were cleaned up, and all necessary work done on trees and shrubs.

Coste House:

It is unfortunate that the grounds at this residence had been neglected so long that many of the choicer trees and shrubs were ruined, and most of the perennials had disappeared when this Department was instructed to put the grounds in order. This entailed considerable work to remove the refuse and rank growth of weeds alone.

Museum:

During the month of September the Museum was closed and all specimens removed to a most unsuitable building at St. George's Island. An inspection of these specimens in November revealed to me the fact that, if they remained there, many of them would be completely ruined by the spring. Consequently, arrangements were made with the School Board to house all entomological and botanical specimens at the Crescent Heights High School. These were consequently moved, catalogued, and lists filed with the City Clerk. Arrangements are being made to remove the zoological specimens to Western Canada School.

Floral Displays:

Floral displays were made at the Stampede, for the Baden Powell Reception, and at the several Flower Shows.

Assistance was given at the Bonspiel, and to Sunshine and the Salvation Army in delivering Christmas gifts.
