### Getting ready for back-to-school parking

Across Calgary, many renters face challenges finding housing that allows pets, sometimes leading to difficult decisions, including surrendering animals. This campaign raises awareness of the benefits of pet-friendly housing and provides practical tools to support both landlords and renters.

Through a shared resource hub, landlords can access templates and guidance to reduce risk, while renters can find tools to strengthen their applications. The campaign also highlights research showing pet owners are often reliable, long-term tenants.

By supporting more pet-inclusive housing, the City and Calgary Humane Society are working to reduce avoidable pet surrenders and build more inclusive, compassionate communities for all Calgarians.

### Summer gardening made easy

The City of Calgary's YardSmart program offers tips to keep your yard thriving, rain or shine.

1. **Make the most out of rainy days.** Plants prefer rainwater over water from the hose. Collect water with a rain barrel and use it to water your yard. Point downspouts towards your lawn or garden, so they soak up every drop.
2. **Mow less often.** Keep your grass 2 to 3 inches high to shade the soil and leave clippings on your lawn.
3. **Add mulch to garden beds.** Mulch helps prevent water evaporation and reduces weeds. Use 2 to 4 inches of mulch on top of garden beds, leaving an inch around the base of plants.
4. **Water plants at the roots – low and slow, allowing the soil to fully absorb the water.** Hand watering with a watering can, using drip irrigation or using soaker hoses are all effective ways to water plants at the roots. If you're watering with a sprinkler or irrigation system, remember to water on your scheduled days. ### Designs for nine Green Line LRT stations complete

Construction is underway on the southeast segment of the Green Line LRT, with visible progress along the route. Bridges and elevated guideways are taking shape, and work on stations is coming next.

Nine new LRT stations will be built between Shepard (near 130 Avenue S.E.) and Ramsay/Inglewood, serving communities including Ogden, Lynnwood/Millican, Quarry Park and Douglas Glen.

Station design is now complete. Contracts for station construction are expected to be awarded later in 2026, with construction anticipated to begin in 2027, subject to contractors' schedules.

The new stations will look different from many of Calgary Transit's existing stations. The Green Line will use low-floor trains, which allow for simpler, more accessible station designs that fit better into surrounding communities. This means stations will be smaller and more open than some of the large LRT stations Calgarians may be familiar with.

Each station will include canopies for weather protection, heated shelters, bike racks, and improved walking and wheeling connections. Many stations will also feature public plazas and links to nearby pathways.

### Safe disposal of smoking materials prevents fires

Careless disposal of smoking materials, such as cigarettes, is a leading cause of fires in Calgary. Citizens can take small but important steps to reduce fire risk and help keep everyone safe.

Remember that planters and lawns aren't ashtrays. Soil contains combustible materials that can easily ignite. You aren't smothering your smoking product with dirt, you are fueling a fire.

Dispose of smoking materials safely by extinguishing butts and ash with water prior to putting in the trash. Ashtrays should be made from metal and filled partially with sand or water.

Use extreme caution if smoking in natural areas and green spaces in the city. Dry vegetation provides combustible fuel if an ignition source is applied.

Don't store propane tanks, firewood or yard waste next to your house and assess potential fire hazards around your home.

Working smoke alarms save lives – more than one third of all fire fatalities are associated with having no smoke alarm.

### **Washroom Attendant Program keeps parks clean, safe and welcoming**

Access to clean, safe public washrooms is a basic service that helps make parks welcoming for everyone. That's why The City continues to invest in the Washroom Attendant Program that supports safety, cleanliness and dignity in some of Calgary's busiest public spaces.

Year-round washroom attendant services are now available at Central Memorial Park, Century Gardens and Devonian Gardens with more locations to come! In the first three months of 2026 alone, these locations recorded over 60,000 visits, a significant increase from the same period last year. The rise suggests growing public confidence that downtown park washrooms are safe, clean and available when people need them.

Washroom attendants do much more than clean. Working in pairs, attendants remain onsite throughout the day to maintain washroom conditions, manage traffic flow and respond to a wide range of situations. They are trained in deescalation, first aid and naloxone administration and work closely with community partners such as the HELP Team, onsite security, emergency services and law enforcement when needed.

The Washroom Attendant Program also supports inclusive employment in our community. The program is delivered by Hiregood Services, a local social enterprise that prioritizes employment opportunities for people who face barriers to work.

Attendants help keep washrooms open more consistently and reduce costly closures for repairs—something that disproportionately affects seniors, families with young children, people with health conditions and those without access to private washrooms.

### Rain barrel rebates are still available

Hot, dry summer weather can increase outdoor water use. A rain barrel is a simple way to collect rainwater from your roof and use it later on trees, shrubs and flowers. Using rainwater first can help reduce how much treated city water you use outdoors. Rain barrels can also help reduce stormwater runoff to creeks and rivers.

The City of Calgary's 2026 Rain Barrel Rebate is still available through Green Calgary. Eligible Calgary households can receive \$50 back per eligible rain barrel, up to 3 rebates per household, while funding lasts. Applications are open until Oct. 31, 2026, or until funding is fully allocated. Up to 3,500 rebates are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

The rebate applies to the rain barrel storage container only. Accessories and add-ons are not eligible, and rain barrels must be an original sale (not resale). Receipts must be dated within 12 months of the date you apply. For full eligibility, required documents and the application link, visit [calgary.ca/rainbarrel](http://calgary.ca/rainbarrel).

### Calgary's lawn and landscape watering schedule – know your days and times

Let's take turns watering our lawns and landscapes to protect Calgary's water supply. Calgary's Lawn and landscape watering schedule is a year-round schedule that sets regular days and times for outdoor watering across Calgary.

Water with a sprinkler or irrigation system up to three days per week based on the last number of your street address:

- Even street address (ending in 0,2,4,6,8) – Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays
- Odd street address (ending in 1,3,5,7,9) – Wednesdays, Fridays, Sundays

Water before 10 a.m. and after 7 p.m. on your assigned days to reduce evaporation and keep more water where it's needed.

The following activities are allowed any day, anytime:

- Hand watering landscapes (excluding grass) with a hose connected to a spring-loaded nozzle or watering can
- Watering newly planted grass, trees or shrubs
- Watering fruits and vegetables
- Filling pools, hot tubs and fountains
- Washing windows, decks, fences and siding
- Running through sprinklers

### Village Square Leisure Centre closing Aug. 31: services and program updates

Village Square Leisure Centre will undergo major repairs and upgrades beginning **Aug. 31, 2026**, with reopening expected at the end of 2027.

This work is focused on replacing aging mechanical and electrical systems that are past their useful life. These upgrades are essential to keep the facility safe, reliable and available for the community, while reducing the risk of unexpected closures and lowering long-term operating costs.

Here's what to expect for other services and spaces at the site:

#### Open during construction:

- Calgary Public Library, Fair Entry and the Alberta Health Services Community Health Centre will remain open and continue to serve the community. They will have a short closure period during construction. Timing will be confirmed soon.
- The arenas will remain open until March 2027, then close for construction. They are expected to reopen in mid-September 2027.

#### Moving, changing or pausing:

- Calgary Transit customer service location will permanently close on Aug. 17. A temporary location has been set up at Bow Parkade (234 7 Ave. S.W.) Visit [calgarytransit.com](https://calgarytransit.com) to learn more.
- Centre for Newcomers is closed during this time. You can visit their location at [#125 565 36 St. N.E.](#)
- The Village Square Community Hub and Pineridge Community Social Worker will serve these communities from local spaces in Pineridge, Rundle, Temple and Whitehorn.

### Help cyclists get home safely this summer

Seven people have been killed and more than 1,700 cyclists injured in Calgary over the past decade, underscoring the risks as more people use pathways and roads during the summer months.

Many of these incidents are preventable and often come down to speed, spacing, and predictability on shared pathways. Riders are reminded to keep right, yield to pedestrians, and adjust their speed to suit conditions. While the posted pathway speed limit is 20 km/h, cyclists are expected to slow further in crowded areas, on corners, and near underpasses where sightlines are reduced.

Safe passing remains a key focus. Riders should signal early using a bell or voice, leave at least one metre of space, and wait for a clear opportunity to pass. Passing in tight spaces or on blind corners increases the risk of collisions, especially as children, pets, and groups can move unpredictably.

Please use extra caution while using shared e-bikes and e-scooters. Their added speed, weight, and quiet operation can reduce reaction time for others, requiring earlier slowing and clearer signaling.

On roadways, cyclists have the same rights and responsibilities as drivers but are more vulnerable. Motorists are required to leave at least one metre when passing at lower speeds and 1.5 metres at higher speeds, and to check carefully before turning, opening doors, or pulling away from the curb.

Consistent, predictable behaviour from all users is key to reducing injuries and preventing further loss of life. Learn how you can keep our pathways safe [calgary.ca/besafe](https://calgary.ca/besafe).
