

#### **Budget 2022 Capital Plan Highlights**

Government's Budget 2022 Capital Plan invests \$20.2 billion over the next three years, of which \$7.3 billion has been allocated to Alberta



\$96,000

#### Capital Plan Break Down

- Budget 2022 invests \$7.3 billion over three years in Transportation's Capital Plan to support strong transportation infrastructure.
  - \$1.6 billion for planning, design and construction of roads and bridges;
  - \$1.6 billion in Capital Maintenance and Renewal for smaller bridge construction projects and major highway and bridge rehabilitation projects;
  - \$570.0 million for Water Management and Flood Recovery;
     and
  - \$3.5 billion for Capital Grants to support Municipal Infrastructure.

#### **Economic Corridors**

- We see key economic corridors as critical parts of bringing goods to market and supporting economic growth by providing safe and efficient highway connections.
- In 2022/23 Transportation and Economic Corridors made significant capital investments in Economic Corridors.
  - Over \$615 million is invested on Roads and Bridges projects to grow economic corridors.
  - Over \$380 million is invested on Capital Maintenance and Renewal projects to enhance existing economic corridors.
- 70% of Budget 2022 was allocated to economic corridors.



# **Procurement Updates**

#### **Construction Tenders**

 Based on actual tenders from September 1<sup>st</sup> of the previous year to August 31<sup>st</sup> of each construction year.



#### **Construction Services**

- The majority of work for Transportation and Economic Corridors is procured through traditional Design-Bid-Build.
- For more complex construction projects, the Department may prequalify contractors prior to proceeding to the tender phase.
- Early contractor involvement models
  - Construction Consultant General Contractor (CCGC)
  - Integrated Project Delivery
  - Progressive Design Build
  - Alliance
- Not a one size fits all approach



#### Consulting Services

- For consulting engineering services, the department consultants in the following categories:
  - Planning
  - Grading
  - Asphalt Concrete Pavement
  - Standard Bridge and Culvert
  - Major Bridge
- Consulting engineers are evaluated annually on specific projects.
- The scores are then used in upcoming procurements and typically account for 30% of the overall proposal score.

The average annual awarded amount over the last 5 years is \$64 million.

- The Department consistently meets with industry and discusses topics of interest and relevance, with the intention of working together to find mutually agreeable solutions.

#### Partnering Opportunities

- Building a safer and more efficient, vehicle friendly road network in Alberta
- LRT and rail link between Calgary International Airport, downtown Calgary and Canmore/Banff
- Expansion and improvement of major highways and roadways in the greater Calgary area, including Deerfoot Trail
- Establish reliable, regular aviation service from Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat to Calgary and Edmonton.



#### **Cost Escalation**

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- Discussion with US and Canadian counterparts indicated an anticipated 30 to 35 per cent increase cost in 2022 highway construction.
  - Average 2022 ACP pricing is \$100 per tonne 33 per cent higher compared to expected
  - Average 2022 gravel pricing is \$33.00 per tonne 22 per cent higher compared to expected
  - Average 2022 grading pricing is \$8.40 m3 44 per cent higher compared to expected
- Unit prices for key bid items are not increasing at same rate as they were in 2022.

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## **Increasing Costs**

- Department is aware of concerns about increasing costs, in particular related to steel and asphalt pricing.
- We are looking into this issue to see how cost increases may impact delivery of our construction program.
- We are working with contractors on possible design exceptions if supply of materials becomes an issue.
- Our contracts do include a risk sharing mechanism for diesel fuel costs on projects with significant grading and asphalt quantities.
- The Department has posted updated average unit pricing on our website to more accurately reflect and keep informed of current pricing trends.

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# **Grants and Major Projects**



#### Capital Grants – Calgary

- Calgary Green Line LRT
  - \$1.5 billion towards the construction of an 18km LRT from Eau
     Claire to 16 Ave North

- City of Calgary
  - \$41 million through the Relief for Shortfalls for Transit Operators (RESTOR) grant



#### Capital Grants – Calgary Region

- Calgary Region
  - \$86 million through RESTOR
  - \$43.5 million through the Green Transit Incentives Program (GreenTrip)
- Okotoks-Foothills Waterline
  - \$15.5 million through the Alberta Municipal Water Wastewater Program and an additional \$5.8 million through Investing in Canada Program



#### Calgary and Area Major Projects

- Deerfoot Trail Improvements
- Calgary Ring Road
- Springbank Off-Stream Reservoir (SR1)
- Highway 1A and Highway 22 interchange at Cochrane
- Highway 1A widening
