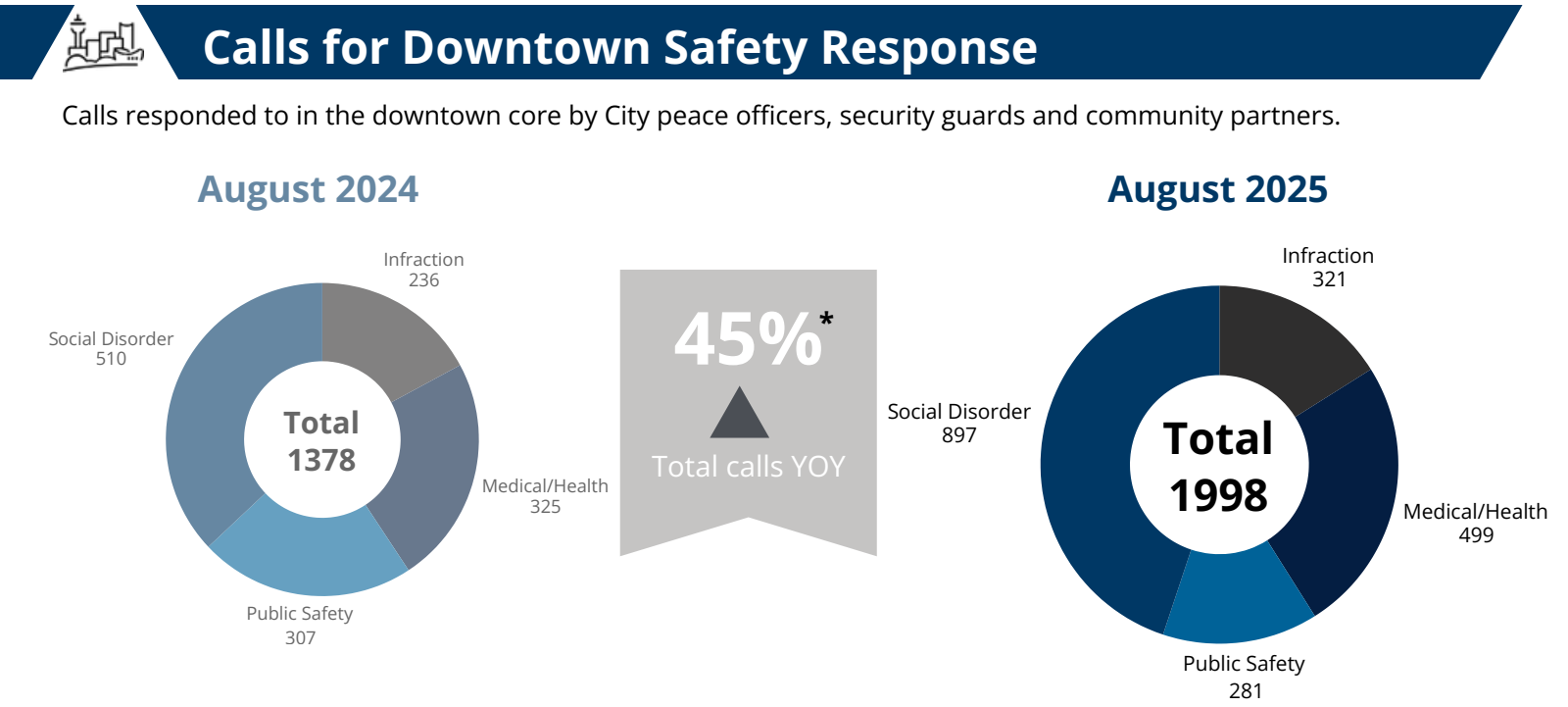
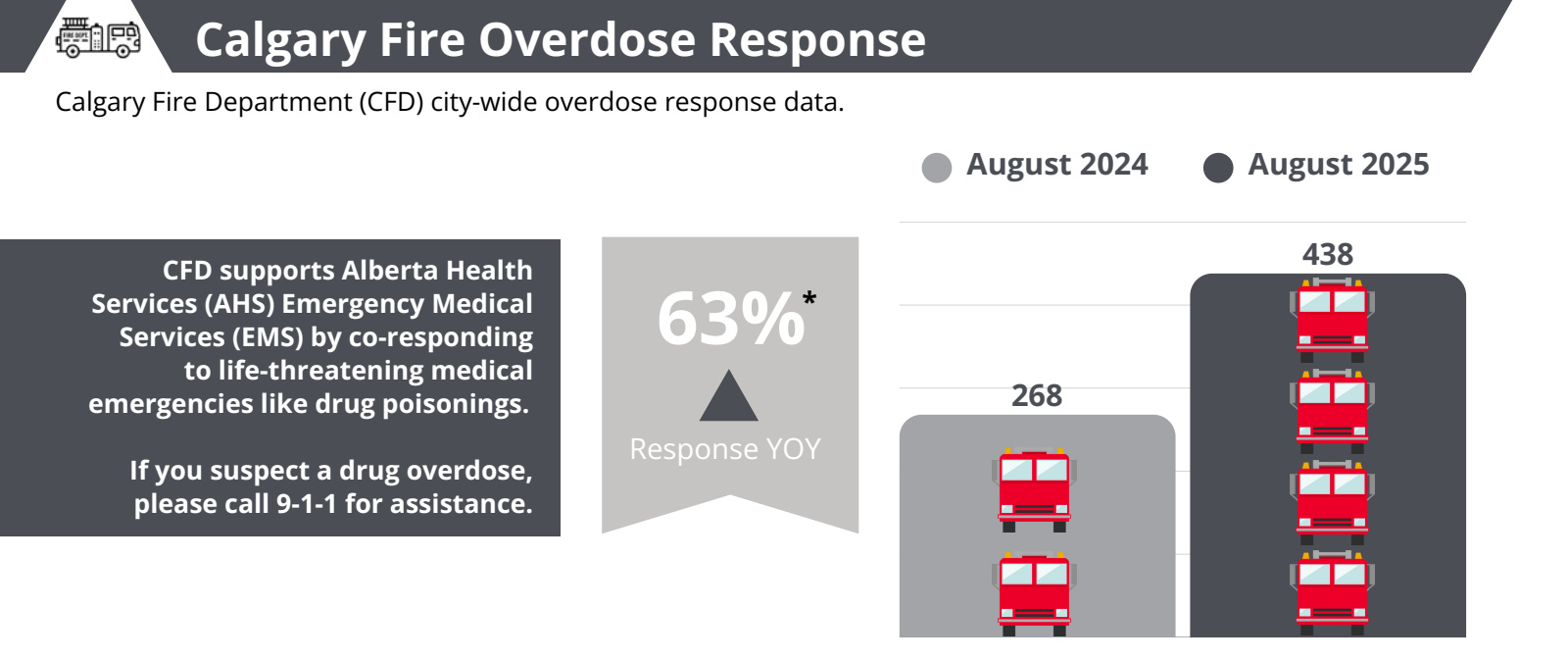


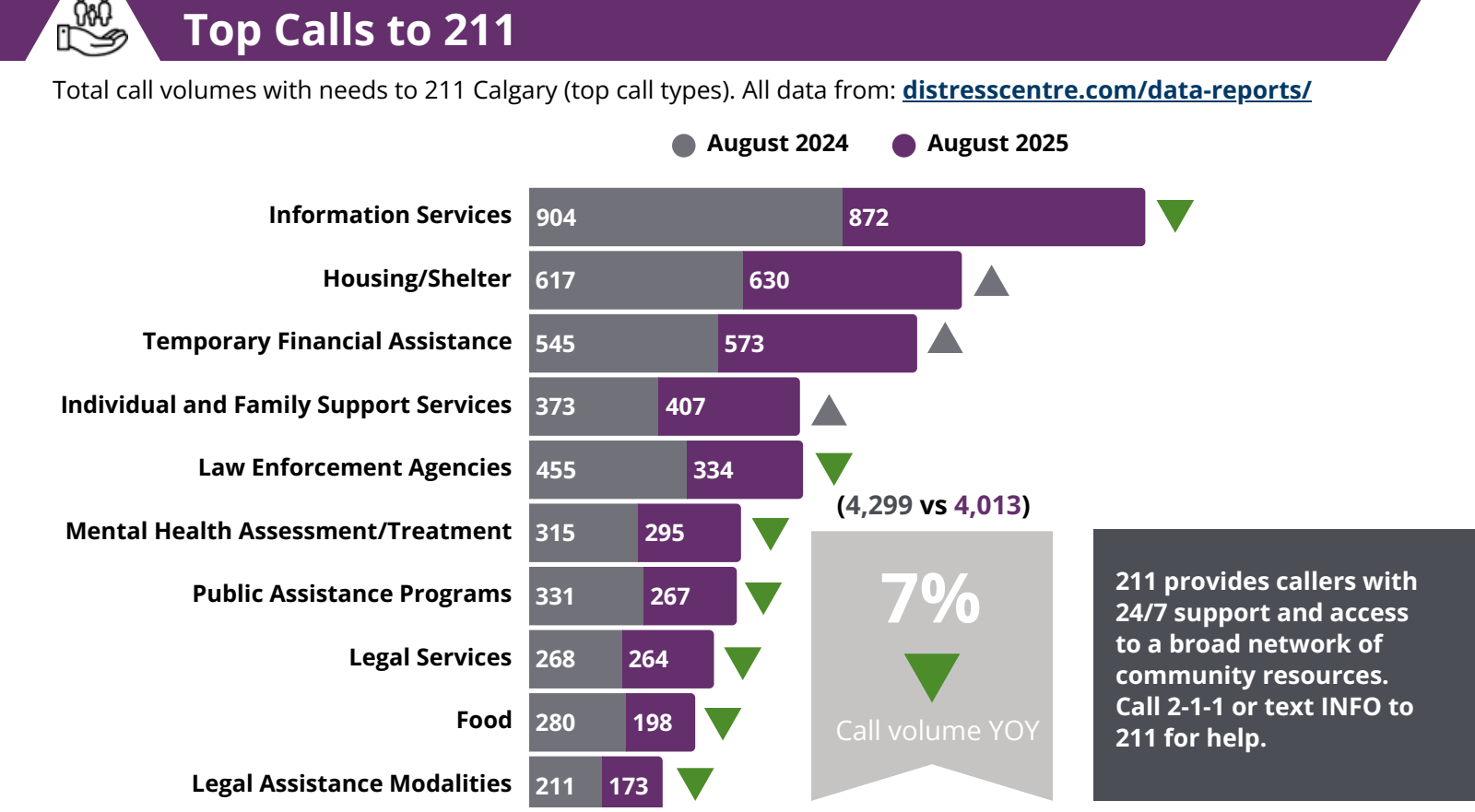
***Note:** To ensure consistency in data reporting, the Transit Public Safety team updated its definition of social disorder to align with the Calgary Police Service. Additionally, new data collection software was implemented in November 2024 which enhanced reporting capabilities. As a result, direct comparisons with data collected prior to this date should be made cautiously.



***Note:** Some of this increase can be attributed to more proactive responses, and adjustments in data collection methodology.



***Note:** The CFD is closely monitoring this rise in drug poisonings and noted this increase may be related to changes in street drug supply or composition. Despite this increase, overdose data indicate an overall downward trend since 2023.

Community Impact

The FamJam Program has had a significant positive impact on newcomer women and their families this past year, supporting over 200 individuals by:

- Reducing Social Isolation** – Moving to a new community can be overwhelming, especially for women and their families. The program provided a welcoming space where participants can meet others in similar situations, fostering a sense of belonging.
- Building Strong Support Networks** – By connecting with fellow newcomers and community members, participants formed friendships, share experiences, and offer mutual support, which is essential for emotional well-being.
- Accessing Essential Resources** – Newcomers often face challenges navigating services such as healthcare, education, employment, and childcare. The program helped them access crucial information and connect with available resources.
- Strengthening Family Bonds** – Adjusting to a new culture can sometimes create family tensions. The program's focused on nurturing positive relationships within households, providing guidance and activities that promote communication, understanding, and cohesion among family members.

Historic Petro Fina office building brings 103 new homes for Calgarians

A historic office building in the heart of the city has started its next chapter as the Petro Fina office-residential conversion with 103 new residential suites, including accessible, affordable and below market units.

This conversion, located at 736 8 Ave S.W., has transformed 140,000 square feet of office space into new housing. It is supported by the Downtown Calgary Development Incentive which offers eligible projects up to \$75 per square foot converted, encouraging redevelopment that improves housing supply, property values, tax revenue and economic activity and supports a safer downtown community. The City of Calgary opens new Fair Entry and Calgary Transit location

The City of Calgary is expanding access to Fair Entry services with the opening of a third location in Shawnessy (333 Shawville Blvd. S.E.) on Sept. 8, 2025. The new site will provide residents in the city's south with more convenient access to affordable programs and services.

Fair Entry opens doors for Calgarians to fully participate in our city. It's a one-stop application process that allows eligible Calgarians living with low income to apply once a year for multiple subsidies. These include discounted transit passes, reduced-cost recreation opportunities and other fee assistance programs that help people live, move and thrive in their communities. Record-high fatal collisions prompt joint response from the Calgary Police Service and the City of Calgary

Last year, 29 Calgarians lost their lives in fatal traffic collisions, a 10-year record high. So far this year, an additional 27 people have died on Calgary roads.

Together, the Calgary Police Service and the City of Calgary are expressing deep concern regarding road safety and road-user behaviour. As families continue to navigate the busy back-to-school season, there are more motorist, pedestrians, cyclists and on the roads, creating a crucial need for everyone to look out for each other.

Tracking our Progress on Downtown Safety

The [Downtown Safety Leadership Table \(DSLTL\)](#) was a representative group of downtown leaders convened to help identify opportunities, solutions, and strategies to address safety issues in downtown Calgary. In March 2024, they released 28 recommendations to support safety and vibrancy in Calgary's downtown. We are pleased to say that work is already underway on all 28 recommendations in the timelines anticipated. The work is targeted to three key areas: great public spaces, wellbeing of people, and emergency response and enforcement.
