

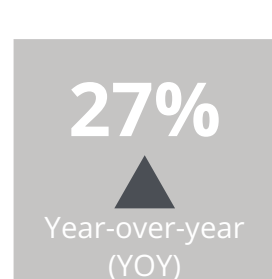
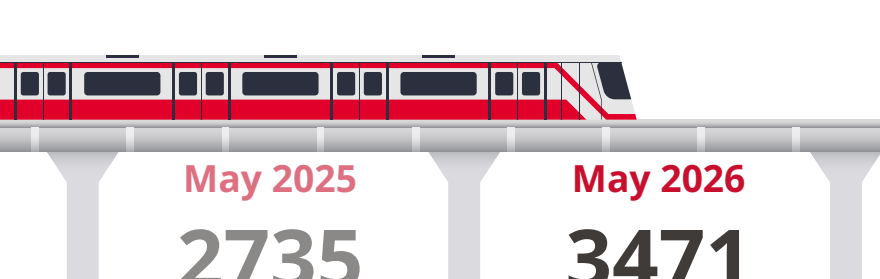

Number of monthly disorder reports originating from the public and Transit Public Safety officers city-wide.



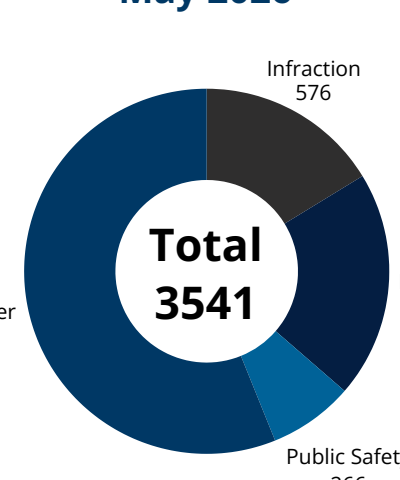
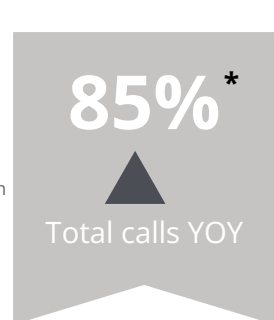
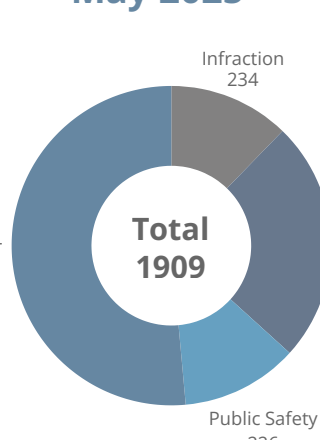
Social disorder includes welfare checks, social disturbances, drug use, impairment, and suspicious and/or unwanted persons

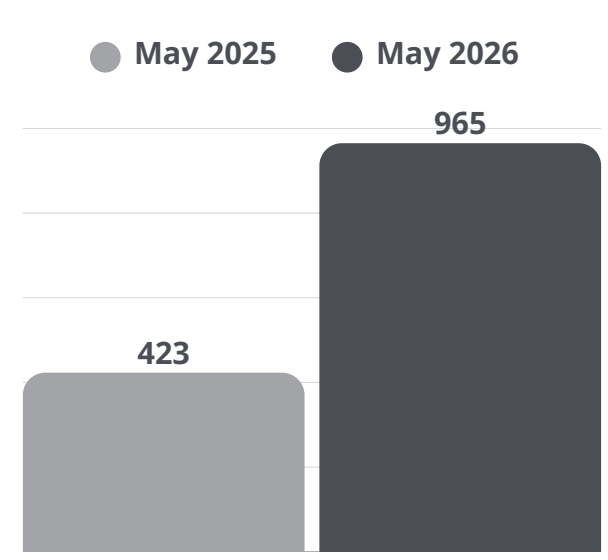

Calgary Fire Overdose Response

Calgary Fire Department (CFD) city-wide overdose response data.

CFD supports Alberta Health Services (AHS) Emergency Medical Services (EMS) by co-responding to life-threatening medical emergencies like drug poisonings.

If you suspect a drug overdose, please call 9-1-1 for assistance.



***Note:** The CFD is closely monitoring this recent rise in drug poisonings and noted this increase may be related to changes in street drug supply, toxicity, and composition.

Featured Program: Calgary Sexual Violence Crisis Response - Serving and Reaching out to Diverse Communities

CCASA provides an array of supports service to anyone who is impacted by sexual violence, including support people. People can access these services at any time throughout their healing journey. This project builds upon resources provided by CCASA with a focus on outreach to build relationships with services providers and community groups serving Indigenous, Black and other racialized communities.

Community Impact

This past year, the program delivered strong crisis response impact by providing rapid, specialized, and trauma-informed support to individuals affected by sexual violence, reaching 338 unique clients and responding to 1,345 crisis contacts with an average response time of under one minute, while achieving very high client-reported outcomes related to receiving relevant information, referrals, and crisis de-escalation.

With focused efforts, the program strengthened system coordination through sustained partnerships with health, police, justice, and community organizations, and expanded culturally responsive outreach to Indigenous, Black, and racialized communities, helping to reduce barriers to accessing support.

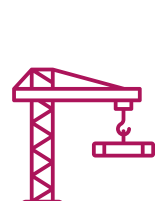

Calgary Housing launches its largest project in company history

Calgary Housing has broken ground on the largest development project in the company's history. A multi-phase development supported by funding from The City of Calgary, the Government of Alberta and the Government of Canada, Southview is expected to house more than 1,000 Calgarians when both phases are completed.

Southview will be operated as part of Calgary Housing's mixed income housing portfolio, offering a wide range of rents in a perpetually sustainable operating funding model. Rents just below market rates help to fund more deeply affordable rents and fund maintenance costs, eliminating the need for operating funding from governments.

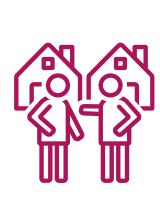

Enforcement and engagement efforts continue through Safer Calgary

In June, Calgary Police Service alongside its community safety partners, launched Safer Calgary - Operation Restore, and Safer Calgary - Operation Order. Focused operations targeting the East Village, Stephen Avenue, downtown Calgary as a whole and the surrounding areas through increased visibility, enforcement and connections to social supports.

Safer Calgary is a focused initiative aimed at enhancing public safety in priority areas through strategic patrols, focused enforcement, outreach and referrals to support services. While all Safer Calgary operations share common goals and are supported by strong partnerships across enforcement and community agencies, they are tailored in scope and deployment to respond to evolving needs. Tracking our Progress on Downtown Safety

The [Downtown Safety Leadership Table \(DSLTL\)](#) was a representative group of downtown leaders convened to help identify opportunities, solutions, and strategies to address safety issues in downtown Calgary. In March 2024, they released 28 recommendations to support safety and vibrancy in Calgary's downtown. We are pleased to say that work is already underway on all 28 recommendations in the timelines anticipated. The work is targeted to three key areas: great public spaces, wellbeing of people, and emergency response and enforcement.
