LIMITING DISTANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR CARPORTS

Reference: Sentence 9.10.14.2.(1), Sentence 9.10.15.2.(1), Article 9.35.1.2. and Article 9.35.1.2.

Sentence 9.10.14.2.(1) "The area of an exposing building face shall be
a) taken as the exterior wall area facing in one direction on any side of a building, and
b) calculated as
i) the total are measured from the finished ground level to the upper most ceiling, or
ii) the area for each fire compartment, where a building is divided into fire compartments by fire separations with fire-resistance ratings not less than 45 min."

Sentence 9.10.15.2.(1) text is identical to Sentence 9.10.14.2.(1)

Article 9.35.1.2." Construction Requirements"

Article 9.35.2.1. "Carport Considered to be Garage"

Question:

Should carports for residential buildings comply with the above requirements?

Commentary / Relevant Facts:

A carport typically consists of a roof supported by columns with completely open sides except where it is attached to the main building. The term "exposing building face" as stated in Sentence 9.10.14.2.(1) has no relevance to these open sides. If some of the sides of the carport (excluding those common with the main building) are partially or wholly covered so there are short walls on the sides, then the carport may be treated as an attached garage for the purpose of Sentence 9.10.14.2.(1) and 9.10.15.2.(1) and the applicable requirements will have to be enforced.

Conclusion:

The requirements of Sentence 9.10.14.2.(1). and Sentence 9.10.15.2.(1) are not applicable to completely open carports. Structural columns supporting only the carport structure should be ignored for this purpose.

However, where a roofed enclosure used for the storage or parking of motor vehicles has more than 60% of the total perimeter (including the perimeter common with the main building) enclosed by walls, doors or windows, then the enclosure shall be considered a garage and all the requirements of Sentences 9.10.14.2.(1) and 9.10.15.2.(1) would be applicable.
