## SMOKE SEPARATION USING UNRATED WALLS

Reference: Sentence 3.3.1.4.(3) and Sentence 9.10.9.15.(2) and Appendix D-2.3.11.

**Sentence 3.3.1.4.(3)**"If a storey is sprinklered throughout, no fire-resistance rating is required for a fire separation between a public corridor and the remainder of the storey provided the corridor does not serve a care or detention occupancy or a residential occupancy. (See A-3.1.8.1.(1)(b) in Appendix A.)"

**Sentence 9.10.9.15.(2)**"In other than residential occupancies, no fire-resistance rating is required for fire separations between a public corridor and the remainder of the building if

- a) the floor area is sprinklered,
- b) the sprinkler system is electrically supervised in conformance with Sentence 3.2.4.9.(2), and
- c) the operation of the sprinkler system will cause a signal to be transmitted to the fire department in conformance with **Sentence 3.2.4.7.(4)**."

Appendix D-2.3.11. "Ceiling Membrane Openings – Noncombustible Construction"

## **Commentary / Relevant Facts / Conclusion:**

This Regs Bulletin sets out requirements for smoke separation of public corridors.

Zero-rated fire separations for public corridors and other locations shall meet the following requirements:

- a) Ceilings of tile and T-bar type shall have hold down clips to prevent lifting due to pressure differentials.
- b) If return air openings are provided in corridor ceiling membranes, they should be provided with fire stop flaps.
- c) Openings for supply air into the public corridors shall be ducted and shall conform to **D-2.3.11**.,
- d) These requirements may also be applied for other situations where only smoke separation is necessary between adjoining fire compartments.
