Passages

Artist – Peter Von Tiesenhausen

The Project

Passages by Alberta artist Peter Von Tiesenhausen kicked off Celebration of the Bow River on June 12, 2010 at Douglasbank Park in southeast Calgary. Von Tiesenhausen was joined by community members who released 100 hand-carved wooden boats into the Bow River.



Von Tiesenhausen considered connections among life and water cycles, stewardship, consciousness and spirit by launching the wooden boats into the river. The journey downstream highlighted our connection to the Bow, its upstream and downstream watershed and the life forms supported it. Each boat captured the spirit of a human figure that drew on ideas of the cycle of life and death, and the journey through one's existence.



The project culminated in September 2010 during Culture Month with an event featuring a print exhibition and an artist's talk on the project and how the Bow River connects us to our landscape and each other.

The Artist

Peter Von Tiesenhausen is well-known on the national art scene with his inventive and widely-praised environmental and site-specific works, carved wood sculptures, drawings and videos.

With his use of primarily organic materials and his frequent practice of abandoning his outdoor sculptures to the forces of nature, his work

is frequently read as eco-art. This is only partly the case, since his themes probe the intrinsic relationship between humans and nature.
