





Encouraging Active & Safe School Travel:

Don't forget to bring something to write with to check them off as you go!</p>										
	<p>Student Made Signs: What better way to get your messages across than from the ones who are impacted most? Have students create signs that encourage people to make better choices. This is an easy and engaging activity that nudges behavior change in the right direction. Example topics include:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Discouraging idling, U Turns and/or jaywalking Blocking crosswalks and/or corners with cars Safe street crossing behavior (ie: stop, look, listen) 										
	<p>Map and Explore your 2.4: Most school jurisdictions specify a radius ranging from 1.6 to 2.4km, depending on grade configuration in the school, as the “walk zone”. Identifying drop off/pick up locations in the walk zone that are near the school can be a helpful way to avoid traffic congestion at pick up and drop off times. Keeping Crosswalks Clear: sometimes during pick up and drop off, people driving park too close to or in crosswalks. This makes it very difficult for students trying to cross to see and be seen by oncoming traffic. Some strategically placed orange traffic cones can help deter people driving from parking too close, leaving crosswalks clear and visible. However: cones cannot be left unattended in the street and are required to be removed and stored during times outside of pickup and drop off.
