PROJECT BACKGROUND

PROJECT CONCEPTION

- The 4th Avenue Flyover project emerged with the creation of a Task Force by the Bridgeland Riverside Community Association Planning Committee
- The Task Force is made up of young professionals with expertise in the areas of development. planning, art and design
- The goal for the project is to design an enjoyable public environment in this "left-over" space, but also to create a gateway into the community of Bridgeland Riverside



PROJECT SITE M-C2 FLYOVER PARCEL

PROJECT LOCATION + ZONING

- Located at the prominent corner of Memorial Dr and Edmonton Trail
- Zoning: Parts of the site are zoned M-C2; the remaining area is

part of the flyover's parcel

- Permitted use classification: M-C2: Park
- The site is currently city-owned and used by Remington for construction purposes
- The Remington lease expires December 31, 2018



PROJECT PROCESS

PROJECT GOALS

- The ultimate goal is to generate support for the project from the City of Calgary and the community
- This will require engaging with the City and the community through stakeholder engagement in a series of phases; today is a preliminary stakeholder engagement phase
- Another major challenge for this project will be securing funding either through the City, fund raising or third-party sponsorship.

2. ANALYSIS

- · Preliminary project research
- Conceptual development
- Site analysis
- Precedent research
- STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT 01: site perception + initial project response
- STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT 02: solicit feedback from nearby residents

3. DESIGN

- Drawings + renders realizing the project concept
- Inclusion of artwork: suggested locations + high level types and subject matter in support of project concept
- STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT 03: present design + solicit input from Planning Committee + Ward Council
- STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT 04: open house @ the BRCA for the community

4. BUY-IN + APPROVAL

- This stage will require additional research to determine how the Task Force will engage with the City of Calgary to generate support for the project from the City level
- This stage will include research into funding + fund raising opportunities as well as preliminary budget analysis

5. BUILD IT!

- Once the project has received support and approval from the City, we assume the next stage would be for the City (potentially with engagement from the BRCA) to create and issue a Project Request for Proposal, or similar process for soliciting consultant services to award design and construct the project
- Funding may or may not be approved at this stage, depending on the proposed method for project delivery
- Art commission to be awarded either during or after construction of the park
- We envision the BRCA and 4th Ave FlyoverTask Force to become a committee to engage with a consultant throughout this phase

PROJECT ANALYSIS

SITE ANALYSIS

- The demographic of the neighbourhood and surrounding area includes a diverse group of people, ranging in age from young children to seniors and a variety of denominations
- The prominent context surrounding the site can be summarized into three major conditions: residential, Bow River corridor + retail/business employment
- The Task Force will continue to study the environmental qualities of the site, including sun patterns, noise, existing lighting conditions, zoning + bylaw requirements



EXISTING CONDITIONS

- "Left Over" public space
- Poor quality public environment with lack of lighting, street furniture and engaging public atmosphere
- Sense of unsafe environment due to lack of lighting
- Currently used as a transition space for pedestrians from Riverside to Memorial Dr.




Creating Pedestrian Connections Analysis

PROJECT CONCEPT

PUBLIC SPACE AS MOVEMENT + CONNECTION

- Space to function primarily as a means to move pedestrians and non-motorized transportation through the space; less about destination and more about movement
- Two prominent means of movement:
 - Fast-paced
 - Slow-paced
- Create a connection between the three types of environments: residential, Bow River corridor + retail/business employment

PUBLIC REALM ENHANCING DAILY LIFE


- The park should be inclusive for the community, residents of Calgary and visitors alike
- The park should offer more than just a means to get from point A to point B
- To us, this means offer spontaneous engagement for the public, bringing delight in relaxation and recreational opportunities for all ages and all seasons
- We see this as an opportunity to embed unique programming and art along transitional corridors. To us, this isn't about separation of activities but about bringing experiences together to create a diverse, vibrant, active space










