

Report Back: What we Heard - July 28, 2017

Project overview

This is my neighbourhood was created to provide an opportunity for residents to partner with The City of Calgary to identify ways to help make their neighbourhood an even better place to live, work and play.

In 2016, The City of Calgary delivered more than 100 programs, services and small-scale improvement projects to a first group of 14 neighbourhoods.

In 2017, The City of Calgary is working with a new group of 14 neighbourhood. The City will work with the neighbourhoods to first, identify a neighbourhood vision. From that vision, participants working with City staff, will create ideas (programs, services and small-scale infrastructure improvements) that support their neighbourhood vision as identified in the engagement. In 2018 those programs, services and infrastructure projects will be implemented.

Engagement overview

This report back covers what we heard during the visioning for Millican-Ogden. This is the first step in the engagement for the This is my neighbourhood program.

What we asked

Residents in Millican-Ogden were asked:

What would make Millican-Ogden a better place to live, work and play? They were then asked to choose their top three vision words from a list, see below, or to add their own and explain why they chose that word.

How we connected

There were three different ways that citizens could provide feedback:

- 1. Everyone in the neighbourhood was mailed a postcard with vision question and could drop it off at Millican-Ogden community association. The postcards were sent to 3,757 residents.
- 2. The vision survey was available online through the http://engage.calgary.ca/myNeighbourhood/millicanogden portal page from April 7, 2017 until July 7, 2017. The survey was promoted on neighbourhood bold signs, through Facebook, Tim Horton's TV, and recreation facilities as well as on Millican-Ogden community association website and newsletter. We received 300 ideas in Millican-Ogden through online engagement.
- 3. City staff attended various community events to gather feedback. We received 281 ideas through in person engagement. The table below summarizes the events we attended, and how many people attended each event.

What we heard

Millican-Ogden residents that participated in the vision exercise value a safe community. Specifically, this was emphasized by identifying a concern for vehicles speeding and high volumes of traffic that make it difficult for people that are crossing streets, and feeling safe on sidewalks and pathways that are maintained. Many people identified specific street crossing as dangerous and may require more patrol or pedestrian signals.

In addition, participants expressed a desire for an active community that has numerous options including formal recreation infrastructure and passive opportunities through maintained parks and pathways. The vision word beautiful was identified as a priority of having well maintained parks and recreation spaces which aligns with being active. As well, the vision words of beautiful and clean represented residents that

desire home owners to take care of their properties. It was also expressed that the neighbourhood has some problems with garbage in public spaces and would like residents to care about their property and getting rid of their garbage in the proper way.

Vision Word: SAFE

Selected - 102 times. Answers to "why" below

- Stop light on Ogden Road at Glenmore Inn, we have wanted one at 76 for years, where the 7-11 store is, much safer and used a lot more.
- Traffic, lights @ 76th Ave/ Ogden Rd.
- More police presence on Ogden Rd. for speeders
- People speed in the childrens zones
- [no comment]
- I see many trucks racing down 66 Ave.
- I see bushes where kids hide where I see underwear (+ bottles) (20A str + lynwwod Dr / south of 71 Ave SE; corner hill up top at the (gopher) hill park), (also taboggoning hill).
- There are areas where children walk and also people walk dogs and that have waste and look like homeless people (have) live(d) there = not safe
- Peak off hill on 18th st. traffic travelling north, unsafe trying to cross.
- To slow heavy traffic in residential from Glenmore Tr. To 62 Ave. SE [speed bumps on 18 St]
- speed limites should be lowered, I see many seniors with walkers and parents with strollers who have a hard time crossing streets.
- This place is pretty safe if we could have people clean up. Better houses their houses would make it better.

- Sometimes people steal bikes
- Can we ensure that people follow rule
- Too much traffic on 18A!! Not safe for kids
- Community bus stops with solar powered lights inside bus shelter
- Street lights
- I'd like to see more benches/shelters on the 24 & 72 bus routes
- Wene I wolk home
- The area is pretty quite and not lots going on
- it feels safe and calm
- Not many gang
- the neighborhood isn't the safest
- Not that many problems with feeling unsafe always able to walk anywhere and no be afraid
- The roads are not busy and people are careful around kid zones
- helping with crosswalk everyones mostly follows the rules
- It is very hard to cross Ogden Rd.
 Especially during rush hour
- There needs to be traffic lights at the corner of Ogden Road & 76th Avenue S.E. to enable safely crossing Ogden Rd traffic speeds there
- Many children play at playgrounds drivers speed through zones



- Need lights at 75th & Ogden Rd; It is a nightmare to try and cross Ogden Rd in the morning & evenings
- Please coordinate with City Planning and Infrastructure to address the lack of proper Pedestrian walkway along the cul-de-sacs located within Olympia Drive and Olympia Crescent. It is very dangerous for kids and adults and senior ciizens living in these cul-de-sacs to walk to and from their homes during Winter as there are no elevated sidewalks.
- A wide range of people for all cultures and ages can afford to live in the community with many housing options including apartments, homes, condo's. All people can interact and feel safe in the community without fears of any type of repression, or discrimination of culture or age. All groups of people and families are accepted from young to old.
- There are multiple abandoned properties in the neighbourhood that are unsafe and an eyesore. Some of the retail areas could really use some new asphalt. And what the heck is going on with the old legion?
- Many vehicles speed on 18 st and use it as a shortcut to Ogden road. Speed bumps or some traffic calming devices might help. Or an education program about the new 24 st route to Ogden road from Riverbend.
- (Make Ogden Road not a thorough fare for the deep SE travelling downtown and back home.) There is way too much traffic!!! It is not safe!!! Maybe cement barriers, or a round about?
- "Safe for all ages, 1 to 100 need to have safe environment. 18 st, 19 st, 20a St and Ogden Road have drastic increase in

- traffic. It is next to impossible to walk across intersections on these roads. Traffic is endless and too much speeding in residential areas and playground/school zones. There is Far too much traffic cutting through on 18st, 19 st, 20a st.. There needs to be traffic calming devices on these roads. Sooner rather than later.
- Safe environement. Too many homeless people have been pushed out of the down town area and now habit the trees around Millican-Ogden area. These have to be cleaned out and have homeless people moved into accessible housing somewhere or into areas not frequented by young children."
- On occasion we feel unsafe. We have witnessed fights outside Partners bar in daytime hours. No one should have to fear this.
- "I don't feel safe walking or biking near/around George Moss park.
- People are allowing their dogs to run freely in the park.
- Its not a good feeling when you realize a dog is running directly towards you and you have no where to go."
- It is important to feel safe in the community we live in. Overall I would say it is safe here - but it could be better
- Street lights repaired. Lighting along green spaces and through school yard behind Safeway. Ensure safety of walking traffic once Green Line has been put into motion.
- Trying to cross 18th Street at Lysander Drive SE (at a marked cross walk) is ridiculous. I have almost been hit twice this year alone. Drivers are not paying attention and speeding through our neighbourhood to save a couple minutes



- on their commute. I would like to see a light, a speed bump, better signage, just something to slow people down.
- No one should feel afraid to walk alone in this community, and children should be able to play outside safely. Crime and speeding/racing cars should not be tolerated.
- The path on Lynnwood ridge has been a point of contention between cyclists and pedestrians. Large groups of walkers or people with uncontrolled dogs have endangered cyclists in the area. A larger path or separate bike or pedestrian path would be a viable solution
- Trim trees 6 ft up
- There are a lot of non-functioning street lights in our neighbourhood. It makes it really hard to see pedestrians at night time. It also makes you feel safer when walking at night if you can see your surroundings. Hopefully the ones we have could be repaired.
- I do not feel safe walking alone at night.
- (More police patrol at crosswalks) I have been in a crosswalks waiting to cross and nobody stop for you, they pretend they don't see you unless you have a kid in your arm or your pushing a stroller!
- It would be nice to see the pathway behind the Scotia bank cleared of snow and ice on a regular basis in the winter. There are lots of people using it daily. I am still suffering from a torn Achilles tendon. It's been over a year.
- Still some seedy happenings in the community - more lighting and active spaces will ensure it's family friendly ,safe and accessbile when green line comes.

- Walking north up the hill from Glenmore Square on 18th Street SE in the winter is very unsafe. The sidewalks (on both sides of the street) are covered in ice and slippery. Where is a person suppose to walk? How is an elderly person suppose to get up the hill? Again, ridiculous! Who is responsible to maintain the sidewalks?
- If you have kids you want then to feel safe and not get hurt.
- Comforting to know your safe in your neighbourhood
- Easy to walk around
- We can walk around
- I know pretty everyone in the neighbourhood.
- Better street lighting in some areas for safety. Improved traffic control at some intersections. (4 way stops at 76 Ave and 20A St SE and 69 Ave and 18 St SE) Increased traffic monitoring and police patrols. Neighbourhood watch or similar program. Security awareness programs through the community association.
- Ogden is not know as a safe community. Parks and pathways aren't not always maintained and can seem very dark and secluded at night. Beaverdam Flats has not been properly maintained since the floods. I don't walk a night.
- Radar in the park areas we have a lot of speeders out there or maybe consider putting in speed bumps, that will slow them down
- Add some lighting along the pathway at the top of the river
- During the spring melt, the stretch of sidewalk encompassing the church and the former Ogden School (76 avenue) gets particularly icy. I believe this is partly due



- to the grade of the earth/grass along either side of the sidewalk. Over the years sections have built up. Either regrade the earth/ grass to slightly below the sidewalk level (so that melt drains from the sidewalk) or redo/build up the sidewalk.
- Crosswalk signals all over the community
- We need safe places for recreation like a Skateboard park/ fit park. That is right in our backyard.
- I have lived here for 30 years and have never felt unsafe walking out pathways and streets.
- We have many families with children, pets, many seniors and generally active people in this community. We also have schools and playgrounds, during rush hour the speed in the playground zones is not followed and many people speed through making our streets unsafe for children to bike home or people to walk home even on the sidewalk.
- Safe community. Could use a block parent.
- More bylaw/enforcement officer presence can help with litter, vandalism and general bad behaviour.
- Continued improvement needs to be made to feel safe in this neighbourhood. It's coming along but has to still work on it's reputation. There are some run-down and unsafe parts.
- Lots of speeders along 18th street near the schools. Makes me nervous about letting my kids walk to school.
- The amount of traffic coming through riverbend and Douglasdale. There are many that speed through 18th street and the play ground zones that are on 18 street

- Worries about theft and break-ins.
- With parks, paths, green space and of course schools and daycares/day homes in the area- the intersection in particular at 66th AVE SE & 18th ST SE needs attention from motorist rolling through stops signs and speeding through park zones. I suggest bump outs and or speed bumps strategically placed to slow motorists down during park times in particular and in general. I would also like to see a calming circle, speed bumps, or pedestrian activate light with cross walk at the corner of 66th Ave SE and Lynnview Rd SE, perhaps on by Lynnview and 62nd to get to beaver dam flats... it is a concern with young families, young kids, the elderly and all people really crossing to get to the ridge, or their mail box.
- "Police presence. Commuters from other neighbourhoods speeding on Ogden road and 18th street.
- More marked(with lights) cross walks."
- "Intersection of ogden road and 76th very difficult to cross ogden road or turn into the neighbourhood due to commuter traffic and no traffic lights
- Police safety We've had a couple VERY close calls with police cars driving at insane speeds through ogden and specifically through playground zones with no sirens or lights on. Recently, our 2 and 4 year old were about to cross the street on their bikes directly in front of the playground when a police car sped by well over 60k/h. Very little time to react and despite our attempts to wave down the car, the driver didn't even look up from the monitor. Responding to a call is one thing, but do it in a manor that is safe for the



- residents that are walking their children to and from school, parks etc."

Vision Word: CONNECTED/GETTING AROUND MY NEIGHBOURHOOD

Selected - 21 times. Answers to "why" below

- More affordable living for seniors

- "People need connection to feel belonging and hope. Opposite is isolation and fear. My hope is to have a community hub where community member ideas for vision can be received, considered by a community panel, for example, where we can bring forth our ideas for consideration and development. For example, I would like to have a place within each community, including mine that addresses issues in our communities that are not being addressed there.
- More often than not, it is strictly professionalized individuals that support people in issues. My movement is one of a peer movement. My goal is to have a SHARED (free or nominal) space within my community of Millican-Ogden where various groups within the community can meet. These groups are made of of community individuals who are experiencing a similar issue. For example, AA and other 12 step groups do this. The goal is to provide awareness, support, empowerment and instills belonging and peer support. Various issues that the community is experiencing - sexual exploitation, drugs/addiction, parenting, mental health, and whatever other issues

- a community member would like to start a group about in order to support, provide information and awareness, etc. This then becomes a group of support and is run by a trained peer supporter. Other peers can be trained and the movement catches on slowly perhaps if first.
- This is about getting back to community inclusiveness, acceptance, belonging.
- This is about non-""professionalized"" services led by a trained peer support, mentor, advocate who has LIVED EXPERIENCE. Groups are organized, informal and/or formal, and peer-led."
- With an eroding culture of share and care, respect for elders and others we can bring this back with aspects of community living. By creating meeting spaces and open and safe areas for people to gather for events, festivals, etc. as well. This can be fostered by a stronger more diverse community association and programming that brings all aspects of the neighborhood together.

- music festival on the banks of the bow river...the way it turns towards downtown almost makes for a natural amphitheater. A little steep but with some upgrading maybe it could be a stellar location for out door music and one of a kind in all western canada.
- "Millican/Ogden is an outdated community in many ways. Facilities and housing are for the most part old and often in somewhat poor repair. Many updates are expensive and out of reach for our home owners, as well as on many occasions I have found the information on the area I can obtain from the city is sparse or incomplete. As an example, I have contacted the city multiple times regarding power to my home and if I am able to upgrade my panel to 100amps. No one has been able to tell me, nor have they been able to tell me who would know. I finally paid an electrician to come and look, and to the best of his knowledge, though the incoming could handle the load, over the 4 connected and individually owned properties, the only way *I* would be able to have 100 amp pass would be to upgrade the feed for all 4 properties, including paying to have my neighbours vard dug up and repaired, as he has the main access point. Keep in mind, that was someone *I* paid. He also inquired to the city about the status of the building and underground capacity to the hub and got no further than I did. Needless to say, I still have 60 amp service.
- Another example is the sewer drain outside my home often has a strong odour, similar to that of natural gas. I have gone so far as to have ATCO come and have a check of things and I assume

- found nothing, as they said not a word, nor has the city when I asked them.

 Apparently, my yard will just smell bad.
- These examples, as well as the high costs associated with updating our old properties has led much of our area to disrepair, outdated equipment, and unsightly curb appeals. Could incentives be put into place to assist in these areas? Could perhaps the city get an accurate picture of utilities in the area so that we can get the answers that we need? Could some of the city facilities and utility conduits get a facelift to begin bringing our little community into a more desirable light?"
