

Stakeholder Report Back: What we Heard July 28, 2017

Project overview

This is my neighbourhood (also referred to as TIMN) was created to provide an opportunity for residents to partner with The City of Calgary to identify ways to help make their neighbourhood an even better place to live, work and play.

In 2016, The City of Calgary delivered more than 100 programs, services and small-scale improvement projects to a first group of 14 neighbourhoods.

In 2017, The City of Calgary is working with a new group of 14 neighbourhood. The City will work with the neighbourhoods to first, identify a neighbourhood vision. From that vision, participants working with City staff, will come up creative ideas (programs, services and small-scale infrastructure improvements) that support their neighbourhood vision as identified in the engagement. In 2018 those programs, services and infrastructure projects will be implemented.

Engagement overview

This report back covers what we heard during the visioning for Spruce Cliff. This is the first step in the engagement for the this is my neighbourhood program.

What we asked

Residents in Spruce Cliff were asked:

What would make Spruce Cliff a better place to live, work and play? They were then asked to choose their top three vision words from a list, see below, or to add their own and explain why they chose that word.

How we connected

There were three different ways that citizens could provide feedback:

- 1. Everyone in the neighbourhood was mailed a postcard with vision question and could drop it off at Wildflower Arts Centre and the Spruce Cliff Centre. The postcards were sent to 1,030 residents.
- The vision survey was available online through the <u>http://engage.calgary.ca/myNeighbourhood/sprucecliff</u> portal page from April 7, 2017 until July 7, 2017. The survey was promoted on neighbourhood bold sighs, through Facebook, Tim Horton's TV, and recreation facilities as well as on Spruce Cliff community association websites. We received 197 ideas in Spruce Cliff through online engagement.
- 3. City staff attended various community events to gather feedback. We received 174 ideas through in person engagement. The table below summarizes the events we attended, where the event was and how many people we reached at each event.

What we heard

Generally speaking, the majority of stakeholders who provided feedback identified the main vision words as safe, beautiful, active, and accessible. When further examining the question of "why", the following themes were identified:

Safe – Participants of Spruce Cliff TIMN expressed a high value in upholding safety within the neighbourhood. Input on themes such as increased police presence, traffic calming measures, increased lighting, City owned infrastructure maintenance, and flood mitigation measures was received.

Beautiful - Participants of Spruce Cliff TIMN expressed a high value in the beautification of the neighbourhood. This beautification included themes such as the removal of litter, increased greenery and trees, regular landscaping, regular maintenance of infrastructure, and increased public art.

Active – Participants of Spruce Cliff TIMN expressed a high value in having active and recreational opportunities and programs within the neighbourhood. Residents suggested many specific kinds of activities that can be found within the verbatim section.

Accessible – Participants of Spruce Cliff TIMN provided insight within the vision word of accessible in two interpretations. Some participants expressed a high value in the neighbourhood having a well-integrated connection system for pedestrian/cycle/car mobility that is regularly maintained to ensure safe access and connections. Other participants interpreted the vision word of accessible to place a high value in affordable access to programs and services within the neighbourhood.

Verbatim Comments

The following is all of the verbatim comments we received for Spruce Cliff. The verbatim is broken down into the submissions received online, and those received in person through the postcards. One exception is If an inappropriate word was used then the following is used to indicate that it was removed: [inappropriate word removed].

Vision Word: SAFE

Selected – 66 times. Answers to "why" below

- Wire fencing in community by park is not safe
- Transient people in the community
- Programs are expensive hard to afford
- Lack of child supervision vehicles coming in fast in community
- Drugs in the community transient people coming in
- Bullying in the community need support
- Better lighting in the community. More chances to meet neighbours to be more safe
- Safety for little children is important. Many older kids smoke, drink, leave glass on the floor
- ages 13+ shouldn't play in playground
- I would like to see more kids stop bullying and using offensive mang towards others
- children need security to develop and become future leaders
- We have seen some shady activity with the opening of the Westgate station. Overall, the community feels safe but there is room for improvement
- No homeless drunk/drug camps living in the woods, littering, starting fires, and harassing people.
- More police patrols are needed as lots of rental homes that are housing stretchy people.
- This is a high density neighborhood and now that the c train is here there are more problems with theft, drugs, violence in our neighborhood.

- "Our lane & rear properties flood with fast winter melts & heavy rains/hail storms for the past 3 years. This is because there is an excess amount of fill spread in the lane from new construction.
- As home owners we have try to do everything you could think of to try and stop this flood, but without the fill being removed it will not stop."
- Most of Spruce Cliff is in the designated walk area for Wildwood School, yet the traffic on 36th street and especially 37th street is high and sometimes far too fast for kids to safely cross. I would like to see this area assessed for different options. Perhaps these roads that divide the community should be closed with better accessibility at 45 street, or some pedestrian signals be set up for safer crossing. I believe the pedestrian walkway across Bow Trail is also being revisited, which is badly needed.
- We've had our vehicles broken into several times over the 4 years, as well as caught people loitering and scoping out our property. There are also people going through recycling and trash every single night and we do not feel safe to go into our own back alleys or access our garages at night if alone. In close proximity to low income housing and the train, there is high number of transient people around and we do not feel safe going out alone at night. There are also a lot of old bungalows being rented out; earlier this year



there was a large police search in our area, with suspects being arrested, ghost cars blocking off our streets, and helicopter and ground searches included.

• The gravel lane behind my house (and most of the houses on Spruce drive between 3rd avenue and 35a street) doesn't provide the right drainage and my garage is constantly flooded.

• [safe. speeds on spruce drive before school zone should be reduced to 40km]blind corner. failures to slow in time.

• "Slow down the speeding traffic on 37th street. Would be nice to see more speed enforcement after peak hours when there is more speeding or reduce the speed limit to 40kph.

• There are more children around and there are too many vehicles speeding through."

• "Discourage loitering in and around the LRT terminal and Westbrook Mall.

• More police presence at the Barbary Walk complex.

- Discourage the itinerant camps on the Quarry Road trail and along the trails to the river."
- There is not enough street lighting and with the LRT line, more vagrants are walking into the neighbourhood and peoples yards. The overhead power lines need to be buried. Gross looking and a serious hazard.
- Turning lane into 8th from Spruce drive and removal of parking for first 50 ft of 8th Ave SW as very unsafe right turn on to 8th Ave from Spruce
- Feeling safe (while going for a walk, communicating, staying alone in the house and at night) is one of the most important factors to consider when choosing a place to live.

• There needs to be a reduced speed sign on the curve section at the north end of Spruce Drive. Drivers are going too fast and are ending up in the park, which is very dangerous Stakeholder Report Back: What we Heard July 28, 2017

• "The low income housing area does create a concern with trespassing, theft and property damage to various areas in the community.

- Additional CEPTD measures should be implemented to reduce crime in the area."
- Multifamily homes/ rentals you don't know who you're neighbors are.

• could have said walkable - east –west walkways feel unsafe, walking surfaces are uneven, they are poorly lit & overgrown with adjacent property bushes, cars often park at the ends making it difficult to cross the street to the next section, and there are no curb ramps for bikes or grocery caddies. These walkways are well positioned as we have few east west streets, but they are often covered in ice because adjacent properties direct there down spouts there and it seems unclear who is supposed to shovel the snow off of them.

• Crime has grown recently with more vehicle thefts, drug use and possible drug "house" in the area. We need to understand the "bottle picker" life; how to engage with vulnerable people, if necessary; who to call if one observes criminal and non-criminal activity, empower residents to take ownership of their community, be observant of what goes on in the neighbourhood and chat with neighbours.

• Spruce drive between 3 Ave SW and 35a Street sw is potentially hazardous for drivers who approach it inadequately. Even at 50km/h the turn is tight and consistent enough to get cars to slowly drift outwards.

• There is this pass on the curb going from the entrance of WestGate High-rises building to the Bow Trail where there is no pedestrian pass (approx. 6 meters). When it snows or rain this area is either full of snow or flooded and you have to walk out if the curb and get to the street to be able to get to the corner of the street. With



the summer coming perhaps is not a big issue but it is a pain in winter time.

• We have had lots of car prowling's and vandalism over the past few years. Also, the intersection at Bow and 37 Street SW is very unsafe for pedestrians because of the strange angles that cause drivers to need to look almost backwards to see pedestrians. We were told improvements to this intersection were coming but nothing has happened.

• Undesirable characters come from downtown on the train to our neighbourhood.

 Get rid of the trash and the under-utilized properties. Get rid of the grime and you get rid of the crime. Take the time to come up with a design that is cohesive but inclusive. Create spaces that can be used by all people in the community. For example, include some green spaces and play areas for children that will attract parents from all ethnic backgrounds where they will feel safe but also feel like they belong there. Find the common denominator. Coffee shops are also great for this. Perhaps even a movie theatre? People are naturally drawn to spaces where they feel they can be part of society. Right now there are only pockets of spaces within Westbrook that accomplish this but it's very disconnected and patchy. Simply filling in the gaps in a random process will not achieve this.

• We are experiencing vandalism and break-ins of autos and our building.

• "Park maintenance and cleanup is very important, the tall grass hides the dangerous biohazards from the illegal encampments that are taking over our parkland as well as others who miss use our park.

• As of late walking through our park is scary and uncomfortable with all the encampments and unfriendly people living there."

• the walk to & from the Westbrook LRT feels like a tunnel in the block south of 8th, in part because there are no people around on the golf course side and seems to be high walls on the west side. I often have to step out onto the road to pass people. If you walk the other route south down Poplar Rd, you hit a wall at the old library and if you go over to Bow Trail & south you are on a pathway on the edge of fast traffic that does not get cleared like a sidewalk does in winter, and you get sprayed from the road stuff.

• 37 street from bow trail to spruce drive is an obstacle course after all the constructions from the last few years (potholes, uneven road surface, elevated/sunk-in manhole covers).

• In several discussions lately, from different demographic groups- all appear unwilling to call the police or bylaw services for different reasons... including that they have no right to do so because of the development where they live or that it might affect area property values...(they want / expect someone else to do this for them) resulting in a false perception by statistical measurement that the community could not use a little help managing "bad behaviour". – Perhaps some awareness programming on how & who to ask for help, and the reasons why that is important – how we all have a part in the wellness of the community.

• "Spruce Drive between Wildwood School and Spruce Cliff school requires to be slowed down. I appreciate playground zones in place for part of this however we have a number of residents that do not observe these zones and the long drive between the 2 schools typically has cards travelling well over the speed limit. We need speed bumps put on this road to slow this traffic down once and for all. Perhaps even putting a 4 way stop at Spruce Drive and 37th Street SW.

• As well, there are a number of pedestrians (adults as well as children) where there are not enough cross walks on Spruce Drive (again between 45th Street SW all the way to the and 37th Street SW). A suggestion would be to include cross walks at Spruce Drive and 37th Street SW."

• lane way drainage restored to pre infill construction patterns, gravel levels have risen 150 cm in areas with the redistributed excess construction fill causing flooding of yards and garages. Every year for many years (5?) we are told annual lane maintenance will fix it but it never does and last year gravel was added making it even worse - although the bigger "clean" rocks did help with the dust.

• Urban forest planted (way back) cotoneaster shrubs at the back of walk that now are bigger than I think most expected them to get - in the days of the owner no long allowed to prune these bushes. – so they overhang the sidewalks – right at eye level for some of us. And every year some of us ask that they be pruned back – which is done to the edge of the sidewalk. Need a different solution – perhaps remove some of the sidewalk side branches at the base so this can become a 5 year cycle and not a ½ season cycle and reduce the eye poking risk.

• I don't feel safe walking by the low income housing.

• Just heard they are going to repave Spruce Drive and take out all the bumps; that currently act like speed bumps – really concerned; that the soon to be smooth surface will have cars / cyclist traveling even faster than some of them already do. Can anything be added to crowd the street?

 "East west travel between 8th Ave & 3rd Ave – we have the gated lane behind 8th Ave – we have the disconnected sidewalks in front of Spruce Cliff Centre (which is not a sidewalk for parks rule issues) – we have the unsafe route through a parking lot, we have the reasonably safe sidewalk in front of the strip mall, and the lane behind the strip mall.

• Could someone look at can the rule be changed and connect the sidewalks at Spruce Cliff Centre ? walk from the bus stop to the entrance of the building and see how that goes ;).

• Could the lane behind the strip mall become a street – to move the traffic that cuts through the parking lot (vehicle /cycle traffic) to a less conflicted route. And in an ideal world the above ground electrical wires on the edge of the school playground would be put underground- although the wires are handy for stopping the odd soccer ball."

• House numbers on the lane way face of properties to assist with emergency response call out.

• With 37 Street being a major artery into Spruce Cliff, I wish there was a way of making this more walkable, beautiful and safe. It is a concrete road with cheque cashing stores, Mr. Lube and the backside of a mall. I am not sure what can be done about promoting more retail locations that have a better feel to them...coffee shops, etc. I feel like the backside of the mall will always be an eyesore and not sure if the City can do anything about it since it is private land. Also, the Bow Trail green space beside the apartments...is anything being done with this? Just an open space...trees? Something?

• Someone keeps removing the "no bike sign plates" from the park walking pathways ... and could the police bike patrols occasionally travel these walking path routes off of the paved pathways ... the encampment population seem to know they generally do not and behave as if it is a safe haven. The camps are not just a behaviour issue, they do significant damage to



the park - cutting trees, the added risk of open fire pits and the bio hazards they sometimes leave behind.

• Road slowing measures as Spruce Drive, 2nd Avenue and 3rd Avenue are sometimes used as shortcuts into and from Wildwood.

• Road out front of lobby very icy in winter, broke my ribs once

• So we feel safe outside from danger

• Better lighting in the community of Spruce Cliff. Police presence - deal with drug dealing in community - in Shag.

• Speeding through the community - and in the complex - put playground sign back in

• There many unreported crimes here with a code of silence. Within the last week an alarmed robbery. Tehre is much evidence of drug activity.

• No lights on courts

• Many kids resort to violence stealing - need more programs

• Police presence, drug deals

• So many flowering weeds in the 'grass' in the park that they attract stinging inspects where our feet & seats are supposed to go. An issue for those of us allergic

• Accurate mapping of the walking pathways down to the river. Lots of visitors thru the community use this park too

• People travel too fast around the blind corner where Spruce Dr. changes direction. We have many 'T' intersections along Spruce Dr. & 37th St as well the North and of Cedar Cr. is one of the worst

• If the trees are planted between (on the side of) the main road, they also increase safety, mostly for young kids; conclusion: this would make the LRT access from Spruce Cliff much nicer too! Side-note: the mall would benefit also (& Calgary transit)

• All ages and families need to be safe to exercise and dog walk

• Cut down on vandalism

• Good lighting for a more secure feeling. Regular patrols around comm. Events

- More street lights
- We have no problem because we have a 30 zone

Selected – 25 times. Answers to "why" below

- Feel connected to others neighbours / know what's going on
- Know what services are available, know what activities are happening
- Meeting people outside of complex get to know neighbours
- Better communication within neighbourhood. Don't know what's going on/ where to find it
- no comment
- Community events advisory group to solve problems in the community meet others in the neighbourhood
- More community events & activities. More volunteer options in Spruce Cliff
- The quarry trail behind the golf course connects to the pathway system and would be great for cycling commuters, except it's in disrepair and very dangerous. Loose gravel and rutting mean people fall cycling there regularly. Consultations happened already and construction was supposed to begin in late 2016 but so far, nothing. Attempts to get updates from Evan Woolley have been unsuccessful. Very disappointing to have a path that connects to the pathway system that is so terrible for commuting.
- It would be nice if the adjacent high-rise apartments would share their fitness and pool facilities with Shaganappi High-rise residents. I would pay a fee if it was available to low-income residents.
- A connected community ensures that we look out for each other. How do we make 37 more ped friendly
- We have a beautiful library (Nicholls Library) but I see that space is limited. We

would love to get a bigger space to be able to enjoy more of the computer area. Some times at that area you see lots of people waiting to be connected and in this era of internet connections we need to offer to more accessibility.

- Because we are a multi-cultural, mixed income community that does not really engage people living in the large apartment, town home, and condo complexes in the area. We are living in separate realities, and not necessarily participating or feeling as though we belong to an integrated community.
- We enjoy walking in the neighborhood and we've noticed that there are several places where the sidewalks end abruptly. It would be nice to see those finished.
- "Build a pedestrian overpass at Bow Trail and Spruce Drive
- Lots of foot traffic occurs from Spruce Cliff to the LRT. Bike traffic also could use this overpass.
- The benefits are to people and bikes directly, but also to cars that do not need to wait for either bikes or pedestrians to cross Bow Trail"
- Seems the only way in or out is Spruce Drive or 37th. Even if you go down into the green space by the river, there's no nearby footbridges to cross the river.
- "The Spruce Cliff strip mall does provide quality goods and services to the residents of Spruce Cliff.
- The area should be more connected with better sidewalks, parking, and improved



public realm to attract people to this shopping centre."

- There is less green space to play now that the Ernest Manning football field has been replaced with the train station and the baseball diamond beside the Wildflower Arts Centre has been replaced with a Seniors Centre.
- With the golf course adjacent to Spruce Cliff and Edworthy, it is important for the community to been seen as an active area in Calgary. Additional Tennis Courts, bike lanes/paths would attract and promote an active lifestyle in Spruce Cliff
- It would be great if we had walking access to the shaganappi golf course right beside the community. A gate on the west side of the course would make it way more convenient to

walk there. I'm sure there would be the odd person that tries to golf for free, but the many marshalls on the course would quickly identify them.

- Ensure that sidewalks are easy to use to get to Irt
- There doesn't always seem to be many things going on in the community and often we have to leave Spruce cliff to find something going on.
- how about some turtle ball courts?
- Similar to walkable, this allows people to meet and enjoy exercise and maintaining their health in a fun and sociable manner. While the Spruce Cliff Seniors centre is available for older folks, for the majority of the residents who are younger than that, there are not a lot of options. The kids have their playgrounds but they seemed to be underutilized due to the relative lack of children in the area. There is city land available in the area to incorporate more adult-focused activity-based equipment.
- The Douglas Fir trail was closed without notice or signage, and again, little communication from the city on the future plan for it. A great inner city park that has been made inaccessible without adequate communication.
- A fitness center in the old library building would be ideal for low-income residents.



When decisions are made in the neighbourhood make sure that the neighbourhood and City use Active/Healthy lense. Focus on people movement

- More activities, more course would be great.
- "Getting outside for the sake of enjoying our surroundings promotes fitness and emotional wellbeing. Neighbors meet neighbors and we promote community
- Maybe a parkour gym in the park behind wildflower? A community garden in that school yard? Pickle ball court?"
- Great outdoor amenities. Basketball courts are great but here is no seating for friends and family.
- More events in the area to draw the community closer and make it even more appealing to visit, live, and play.
- There are a ton of kids in the area. It would be neat to do something for them, some free activity or sport or something.
- Spruce Cliff feels like quite a stale neighborhood. New stores have started to move into the little strip mall and it's becoming more lively. I'd like to see some incentives for neighborhood businesses and perhaps a little rezoning.
- Provide some vitality to the area instead of just driving by. Vendor in park days or promote food trucks around the sport courts.

- Sidewalks must be maintained and level to prevent falls, especially by seniors. Old sidewalks have become unlevel so that trips occur. Plus, some have sloped making them difficult in icy conditions, especially for those having hip and/or knee replacement.
- I find that the fencing along the subsidized housing on Spruce Drive is old and an eyesore. New fencing and/or vegetation in this area would be welcomed not only by the

residents in this housing project but also by the residents of the area that drive by it every day. It is low income housing and it looks like low income housing.

- Recently the recreation department community walking route map accessed through the Wildflower Art Centre site – was updated to remove half of the walking routes in the Spruce Cliff Community... most missed by me is the access down to our off-leash park in Lawery Gardens (could someone fix the spelling on the city off leash web site map?) via. the Douglas Fir Trail (east route) that starts at a branch north from Quarry Road Trail (west end). - understand this is in part due to temp closure of Quarry Road Trail for improvements & ATCO pipeline work but there are other well established routes from the west entering at 3440 Spruce Dr. that could be put on the map for the walking community. A big chunk of our community land is now not accessible to residents – with our demographic free park use/activity is very important and the walking loop options of varying lengths down to the river is a big part of that.
- Bow Trail is a long road to cross and the only bridge is accessible through Shaganappi Village which is NOT enjoyable to walk through nor is it aesthetically pleasing. The cross walk at Bow and 37th Street SW is also dangerous. In order for our community to be considered as "walkable" we require safer access to cross Bow Trail.
- A lot of people use the Quarry Road as a walking path and a bike area. It would be nice to see more little businesses that these folks might stop in at.
- Recently moved here from Cougar Ridge & miss our walking paths



- Plant trees along all 4 side-walks between Bow Trail/ 17 Ave and 33 /37 Street SW (LRT to mall entrance)
- Uneven pavement & sidewalks make it difficult to use, accessible
- Nicer sidewalks paved roads

There are many modern stores and restaurants dispersed throughout this area but also many undesirable (Cash Money) and not utilized businesses. Westbrook Mall has some random stores but at least it's cohesive. Westbrook LRT station is modern and clean but completely under-utilized (no commercial). There is no green space within this area to make walking through this area pleasant. It's all over the place!

- Update the pedestrian bridge by Westbrook mall. Looks old and unsafe.
- "Government should be shrinking, NOT looking for ways to justify higher taxes.
- This is expanding into areas that this tax PAYER does not support."
- This area is getting too dense. We pay a larger price to live in a neighborhood not full of multifamily homes. There is not enough parking for these people and it is getting way too crowded. There are enough apartments close by, we don't need to wreck every street by putting in multi home buildings.
- I love being close to Edworthy Park, the river pathway, the Douglas Fir Trail, streets with large beautiful trees, etc... Natural areas of the areas need to be enhanced, protected, and maintained. Many people from neighbouring communities often enjoy walking around Spruce Cliff. I love the open park areas around spruce drive as well.
- The variety of residential accommodations, business/service operations, cultural groups, demographics, scenery, challenges, differing community needs and solutions. The diversity is an advantage and a challenge to facilitate

inclusivity of these characteristics within the community. I think that bringing this residents together as a dynamic, friendly thriving entity will always be a challenge and limited as a whole . Enclaves of small communities within Spruce Cliff could solidify & connect such as the ethnic groups, seniors and young families once the latter reach a tipping point. Many residential towers are slated for development which would further impact diversity and questionable involvement of the residents. I think that mini communities may have some validity here. I've lived in Spruce Cliff since 1992 and I feel that the community has an "identity" crisis as high density development and societal pressure encroached upon the community.

- Too many people don't know each other. Making a vision of friendly means we are back to being neighbours
- The residential streets are beautiful, but Spruce Drive is a big open unattractive area. The area around the CTrain and the mall and the apartments near bow trail are also pavement-intensive. See point 1. Plantings along cedar crescent have been a welcome improvement.
- I cycle commute around the city, pathway access and maintenance is very important to me
- Cut back on programs/services, NOT expand

- parking has been reduced by 50%"
- Multifamily/ rental homes lead to citizens who do not value their home or neighborhood. This leads to bylaw violations whether it be fire pits, noise, parties, parking, drugs, theft, etc.
- Although the community is almost considered inner city (10 minutes from downtown) and very close to Bow Trail it has maintained its quiet and peaceful feel. The residential streets rarely feel congested. Its is a concern though that the peaceful nature of the community may be threatened through large multi-storey developments like the Ovation, Brava and Encore towers just off of Spruce Drive and bow trail. The tranquility of the community must be preserved!
- It is a walkable and beautiful neighbourhood and with further improvements & developments designing "theme" type features along the streets, businesses, parks, schools, improving pathways, adding youth activity areas and adult/senior " exercise features to encourage activity & health will help to improve connectivity and inclusivity. It's accessible to bike ride or walk to work or just enjoy the river and parks as well as golf and winter activities.

- Too many unfriendly and unhelpful people don't appreciate families and children. Being child friendly means our neighbourhood once again remembers what it is like to have a

- Spruce Cliff seems invisible, some think they live in the community to the west, others think the Srs. club which draws from everywhere, speaks for all. Some know us only by the failed model of social housing that segregates whole sections of our population. New condo developments have not helped as they are insular in there form. Community Signage on the NW corner vacant parcel at Bow Trail and Spruce ... and maybe even on the NE vacant corner at Bow & 37th?
- Too much of a divide
- The main entrance to Spruce Cliff at Bow Trail and 33 street has a vacant lot on the corner, and the golf course on the east side. The golf courses chainlink fence is unsightly and usually has litter along it. The vacant lot looks abandoned and neglected - a landscaped green space would be nice. It seems like a missed opportunity to beautify a very busy corner of the city. The public housing on 33rd street is kind of run down and the fences are in disrepair. I'm sure the residents there would have a healthier outlook if their homes were better maintained by the property management.
- In several discussions lately, from different demographic groups- all appear unwilling to call the police or bylaw services for different reasons... including that they have no right to do so because of the development where they live or that it might affect area property values...(they want / expect someone else to do this for them) resulting in a false perception by statistical measurement that the community could not use a little help managing "bad behaviour". – Perhaps some awareness programming on how & who to

ask for help, and the reasons why that is important – how we all have a part in the wellness of the community.

It was amazing to be able to attend and meet others in the neighbourhood with similar interests. I'm very sad we don't have a community center and that the users in the current new building are very possessive of the space. The City needs to reclaim the space and direct users appropriately. Right now as a young family in the neighbourhood the building is uninviting as it is run by the Seniors or Lawn Bowling. This building should be for the community and should be all inclusive. I'd rather become a member in Wildwood than our community. Change needs to happen to get this community united.
- The community is an ideal home for seniors. There is excellent access to transit and shopping. The community has organized senior clubs, lawn bowling and a variety of good senior friendly housing.
